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Pleased to support Timaru Boys' High School

Ross Stevenson



It was an extremely sad day for Timaru Boys' High School when our much loved Deputy Rector, Ross Stevenson, died unexpectedly on July 27, 2024. He and his wife, Julie, were just beginning their well-earned sabbaticals and were looking forward to visiting family in Canada. Ross was only 63 and it is tragic that an undiagnosed

illness would bring his life to such a sudden and far too early end.

Ross was born in 1960 and grew up in Oamaru. He attended Oamaru North Primary, Oamaru Intermediate and then moved on to Waitaki Boys in 1974. Ross was an intelligent boy who was drawn to the Arts. He went on to Otago University in 1979 and completed a Bachelor of Arts, majoring in English. After completing his Diploma of Teaching at Christchurch Teachers' College in 1982, he was ready for a life in education.

His first position was at Dunedin's Logan Park High School, where he taught English and Social Studies. After a couple of years in Dunedin, he ventured south to Verdon College for a 6 year stint. At Verdon, he had his first taste of management, becoming the Assistant HoD of English and the 5th Form Dean. Ross was always really keen to be part of a school's community. At Verdon, he was a debating coach, the stage manager for every school production from 1985 to 1990 and helped out in everything from sports photographs to the Verdon College Fair. At Timaru Boys', one of our values is 'Willing Participant' and Ross was the epitome of a willing participant in every teaching position and community role he took on.

By the end of 1990, Ross was 30 and ready for a change. Palmerston North Boys' High needed an English and Media Studies teacher and he was just the man for the job. He shifted up there for the 1991 year and was joined a year later by his soon-to-be wife, Julie. Ross had to start the management climb again but, by 1997, he was was offered a Management Unit and, by 2003, he was HoD of English.

Ross and Julie had a very busy life in Palmerston North. Two children were born, Reed in 2000 and Meg in 2004. Ross was

a wonderful Dad and a great husband- he was so very proud of his family. However, he always found time to help out with school and community activities. He was a long time manager of the PNBHS 1st XI Football team, winning the national tournament twice in 1995 and 2010. He was in charge of the school magazine, the 'Palmerstonian', ran a school newspaper, was the BOT staff representative, coached cricket, organised badminton, sat on the staff social committee and many, many other things. If we listed every activity that Ross got involved with, there would be no room for anything else. It's abundantly clear that, during the 22 years that Ross was working at PNBHS, he was a popular and positive contributor to the lives of students and staff.

Professionally, Ross was operating at a high level, with a real depth of curriculum and human resource knowledge. He was involved in NCEA external marking for English for a number of years, and he and Julie ran a 'Return to Teaching- Secondary Intensive Course' for returning or foreign teachers. By the end of the 2010s, he decided that it was time to make a move into Senior Leadership. Both he and Julie liked the idea of moving back to the South Island and when a Curriculum position came up at Timaru Boys' High School, he decided to try his luck. In February 2013, he was installed as the new Deputy Rector at TBHS.

Ross was well and truly ready for Senior Leadership and he quickly made an impact at Timaru Boys'. He was in charge of curriculum and if you track the NCEA achievement at TBHS over the years, you will see a steady rise from the time he arrived to the year he left. Ross and the HoDs worked together to find improvements that benefited our learners. He was also an awesome administrator and was able to devise excellent systems while sitting on his couch at home late at night, watching his beloved old Star Trek reruns. Due to Nick McIvor's move from Rector at TBHS to Headmaster at Kings High School, Ross was acting Rector, alongside his fellow Deputy Rector and good mate, Rod Sparrow, for a large part of 2012- unsurprisingly the school ran like clockwork.

As at Palmy Boys', the Stevenson home became a fun place to gather, where there was always a warm welcome. Ross loved Christmas time and he always decorated his house with an ever-growing array of lights, blow-up Santas, reindeer and the like. He really wanted everyone to share the fun. Of course, he climbed straight into the extra-curricular

world at TBHS, managing the football 1st XI for a number of years. He also managed and coached the school's very successful golf croquet side.

Given his growing family, his demanding professional commitments and his massive contributions to the wider school life, it's amazing that he had any time left over for his many interests. Ross was a person who loved life and he was determined to live it to the fullest. He was a man for sitting up late at night reading, listening to music and watching movies. He absolutely loved film and he had an incredible breadth of taste. He liked blockbusters, intense dramas, old movies from the Hollywood heyday, obscure experimental foreign films, practically anything as long as it met his one and only criteria - they all had to have some element that he could class as 'good'. He was a long time Film Society member and President in Palmerston North and he was the main driver of the inception of the Timaru Film Society in 2017, of which he was President. He sat on the National Executive of Film Societies from 1999 onwards and was President for more than one stint.

He played Football in his youth and then again in his early 40s. However, Golf was his true sporting love. He was a member of the Rangitikei and Palmerston North clubs in Manawatu and, upon arriving in South Canterbury, he joined the Temuka Golf Club. Golf was a passion, but being part of a group of like minded people was probably a greater passion. Before too long, he was the Club Captain and he was a much valued and loved member, who brought commitment and good humour to everything he did there.

Losing Ross at such a young age was devastating for his family and friends. He had so many wonderful attributes. His friends all knew him as a 'great mate', someone who was loyal, who would be there for his friends. He was interested in people and he wanted the best for them. When it came to his family and friends, he never gave in to cynicism - he always sought out the positives. Ross' favourite rock singer/songwriter, Lou Reed, said:

"But anyone who ever had a heart They wouldn't turn around and break it And anyone who ever played a part They wouldn't turn around and hate it"

That openhearted approach to life was Ross' modus operandi. He had many roles to play and he was determined to do them justice, to do them to the very best of his ability. Whether he was being a dad, a husband, a friend, a Deputy Rector, a Film Society President, a Club Captain or any other of his many roles, he always approached them with gusto, good humour and a real sense of duty and pride.

Ross is sorely missed at TBHS and we extend our deepest condolences to Julie, Reed and Meg.





40 HOUR CHALLENGE Luke Blair

Timaru Boys High has once again reaffirmed our commitment to service for our wider community by taking part in the 40 Hour Challenge. World Vision is a humanitarian aid organisation that advocates for, and provides relief to less fortunate communities around the world who are not able to enjoy many of the things that we may take for granted. This year, their focus was on Timor Leste, a small nation in South-East Asia. In addition to security risks and a poor economy, Timor Leste suffers greatly from climate change and extreme weather which is consequential for the population that relies on agriculture as a means of income.



World Vision's aim with the 40 Hour Challenge in 2024 was to address the situation of affected communities in East Timor. Raising funds promotes sustainable practices to improve the condition on the ground in the country by virtue of reforestation efforts, equipping local farmers with cost-effective agricultural equipment, and more. Our efforts started with initial brainstorming and strategizing on the best courses of action to achieve our goal and we initially came up with a goal of \$1,750.00. We also managed to get four Year 12s: Lachlan Crawford, Jack Parry, Oliver Mills, and Luke Winter up to a leadership workshop in Christchurch in May to help them strategize potential fundraising plans and gain a better understanding of the cause. We also had Year 13, Jack Clark speak at assembly to communicate the goals and initiatives behind the 40 Hour Challenge in order to create wider interest in the school. Other fundraising efforts we had included: a quiz night, a non-uniform day, and promotion of the donation website.

Our final event culminated in the lock in at the school gym. This saw over thirty senior students stay inside the school gym for forty hours without eating, seemingly resigning the comfort and luxury of the weekend. It was actually a great event and everyone had an enjoyable time as we played various sports, watched movies, played video games, and caught up on internals. We finished with a barbeque for breakfast.

In the end, we were able to raise: \$3,261.70, just over \$1,500 more than our initial goal.

A massive thank you to World Vision and all the students who participated in a noble and selfless initiative, and we must recognize the students who had to leave part way through the challenge to fulfil sporting commitments and still came back to complete the challenge. We also appreciate the staff who volunteered time out of their weekends to come in and help supervise us students. We would like to thank Mr Thorp who went out of his way to help sort out the gym and allow us to use it for the final push in our initiative. We also greatly appreciate the barbeque he put on for us on the Sunday. Finally, we reserve special praise to Mr Packwood who helped to guide us throughout this process. Whilst we mainly fronted with the speaking activities and advertisement, it was Mr Packwood who worked diligently behind the scenes to help arrange much of the logistics and administrative work. He also participated in the final challenge, going forty hours without eating too. His support is a defining factor in the success of the Timaru Boys' High effort this year.




























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RECTOR'S ADDRESS | Mr Dave Thorp

Honoured guests, parents, friends, whānau, senior students and all those watching online, it gives me great pleasure to deliver the Rector's address at our 2024 Senior Prizegiving in our 145th year since the foundation of Timaru High School.

There were two very tragic events this year: the passing of recent old boy, Billy Gillespie, and the passing of our Deputy Rector, Ross Stevenson. Billy was a big part of the hostel and he was in the same year group of this departing Year 13. He had lots of friends here and he was full of fun and life. Ross Stevenson was a much loved colleague of ours - a wonderful teacher and senior leader and a good mate to many of us. Our thoughts go out to the families of Billy and Ross. They will both be missed tremendously by the whole school community.

2024 was our first post Covid-19 year. We are still not back to the attendance that we had pre 2020 but things are improving. Bad habits can be created in a couple of years and I think, for the majority of boys, poor attendance is just a negative by-product of the Covid years, when we actively encouraged people to stay at home with the most minor symptoms of illness. Feeling a bit tired is generally not a signifier of the onset of illness. In fact, as most adults out there will know, if we didn't go to work every time we felt a little bit tired, we would soon be in serious money trouble.

I want to talk about some of the great things that happened this year. I haven't the time to mention everything so these are a few snapshots:

- ▶ In this speech last year, I was very happy that our 2022 Year 13 UE pass rate was only 4 percentage points below our Decile 10 cousins, Christchurch Boys' High School. Well, our 2023 UE pass rate was actually 6% above what Christchurch Boys' High School could muster. To attain a UE pass rate of 66% of our Year 13 cohort is an outstanding result and indicative of the excellent work our teachers do at Timaru Boys'. This is a provincial school with a strong association to the agricultural and industrial sectors, and not every student wants to go to university. We cater for a much larger range of possible vocations, so we are very proud of that UE result.
- ▶ We had our biggest Year 9 intake for at least 30 years. 200 boys strong and 8 classes! Over the last decade, the norm has been 5 or 6 classes. It was a surprise after settling on 150 for a few years. It took us a short while to adjust, but we are there now. We are certain that basic structure and clear instruction are the foundations of good learning for teenage boys. And we strive to keep Year 9 and Year 10 class numbers as low as possible. For next year, we already have 170 enrolments for Year 9 and expect to push quite close to that 200 number again.
- ▶ Our Year 9 Camps were wonderful, but we had to shorten the length of the stay to fit them all in. Our thanks go out to Grant and Rachel Murray, the managers of Godley Peaks Station and parents of Nick and Lochie, for allowing us such great access. Also, recently, the Godley Peaks Station has been purchased by old boy Warren Lewis, from the family that gives their name to the Lewis Wing at Thomas House. Warren is determined to strengthen ties between Godley Peaks Station and Timaru Boys' High and has committed to turning John Scott Lodge into a real 21st Century accommodation building, whilst retaining its charm as an ex shearing shed.
- ▶ We had another great year of sport. For me, the most satisfying statistic of any year is just the number of boys who actively engage in sport at Timaru Boys' High School. It's around 75% of all boys (over 500) and that's wonderful. The exercise is great, obviously, but what's more important is the camaraderie and pride that get created when a group of lads come together to achieve something. Thanks to all those coaches, managers, helpers (mostly parents of course) that make all this sport happen. You don't always get thanked, so I'm thanking you all now. I really appreciate the time you put into school activities.
- As always, we had ups and downs in our elite teams. That's to be expected because we are a relatively small school that spreads itself very thin at times. I just want to mention our amazing 1st XI Hockey team who, for the second year in a row, made it to the final in the Rankin Cup, the NZ Secondary Schools' Hockey Tournament. With a tiny bit of luck, they might have won it again, but it wasn't to be. However, a silver medal is an amazing effort.
- Also, our Rowers had another incredible season. I'm not sure exactly what it is. We obviously have some great athletes that consistently win medals. Two of our best performers, Payo O'Sullivan and Ben Allan, went on to row for New Zealand in Canada this year. However, a lot of credit must go to our Head Coach Brian Smith and his assistant coach, Liam Parker. Our small squad competed in lots of A finals and were rewarded with 2 national titles, as well as 2 silvers and 1 bronze. Outstanding!
- ▶ There is also an army of lads involved in a range of individual sports. Sometimes there is a way for them to represent us in tournaments but not always. A couple of notable examples: in the cycling world Reef Roberts and Noah Hollamby have been shaking things up all over the globe with incredible success and in kickboxing Will Knight attended the WKA World Championship in Scotland and came back with a gold medal.

- ▶ It was another good year for The Arts and Culture at Boys' High. Of course the main Arts highlight of the year was the combined Boys' High/ Girls' High production of Mallet Man. Our own Mr Doyle proved again just how creative he actually is. Not only is he a wonderful and successful HOD of Visual Arts, he is also a gifted writer and director. Yes- he wrote the entire musical! Mrs Parcell, Mrs Blake, Mrs Cheesman and others made huge contributions to ensure it reached the stage and shone as brightly as it did. Those of us who went to Mallet Man, and that's a lot of people, got to see our students acting, singing, dancing, clowning and joking- it was super fun. Our head boy Sam Roadley took the title role and was brilliant, as were the rest of the cast.
- ▶ Another wonderful thing happened this year in the Arts our Haka came back. For some reason, probably Covid-19, we started to lose the haka- we weren't learning it properly. However, by bringing in two amazing old boys, Mike Reihana and Hami Goldsmith, we have started to get it back, especially in the junior school. Watching 500 boys doing the haka at school park was truly heart-warming. It is an awesome display of Boys' High culture, expressing brotherhood in a way that could only come from Aotearoa.
- ▶ Debating is also back to stay. Boys' schools have always been strong in debating and, over the last couple of years, we have consolidated our debating club and we are starting to win interschools.

Sadly we are also farewelling some current staff.

- ▶ Ms Maxine Prinsloo has nearly completed her one year contract in the Science Department and will be moving on to another position.
- ▶ Mr Werner du Plessis is also moving on to another position at the end of the year, after helping us out in Commerce, Technology and Colts Rugby.
- ▶ Mrs Georgia Douglass, our HOD Technology, is heading off again on maternity leave. All the very best and we look forward to your return.
- Mrs Lisa Cowan is returning to the Legal profession, mainly because it's really hard to work part time and look after 2 little kids when you're a secondary school teacher. The tyranny of the timetable makes it very difficult.
- ▶ Mr Ryan Simpson, our TiC of Food and Hospitality is leaving us at the end of the year. Ryan and his wife will take up positions at an International school in Brunei.
- ▶ Mrs Ashley Roderique is heading overseas with her husband to have an extended OE after spending her registration years working in the Science Department and helping out with Hockey.
- ▶ Mrs Christine Swindells is also finishing at the end of 2024. Christine has done an incredible job at TBHS, especially in the last 5 years as our Business Manager. We are in a good place with finance and it's entirely down to Christine's guidance. We have undertaken some major works since she has been in the hot seat and she managed it all with exceptional competence and authority. Thanks so much Christine.

Thanks to our relievers, especially the ones that have already retired from Boys' High but keep helping us out.

Thanks to all of you for your service to TBHS. Thanks to all of our teachers and staff.

Thanks to my Senior Leadership team- Andy Lincoln, Rachel Fenwick, Steve Blair, Grant McFarlane and Christine Swindells.

Thanks to Thomas House- the boys, the staff, the parents- for all you bring to our school. The original refurbishment of Fraser Wing is finally finished and now Mr Blair is about to start on the ablution block downstairs. The artificial turf will also be a welcome addition. Our next big project will be an extended and refurbished dining room. We are determined to ensure our boarders have the best facilities possible. Thomas House is integral to our school culture and our school roll. Its ongoing success is of the utmost importance to Timaru Boys' High School.

Thanks to Brent and the Board of Trustees for your sage advice and overall governance. I appreciate the fact that this community service is on top of your already busy lives.



DIRECTOR OF BOARDING SPEECH Mr Steve Blair

Rector Mr Thorp, presiding member of the School Board, Mr Isbister, Chair of the Hostel committee Mr Henriksen, staff, boarders and Year 13 leavers it gives me great pleasure to present the Thomas House Director of Boarding speech for 2024.

I can't believe it is already a year since our last leavers dinner. Another year has flown by and already we are saying goodbye to another group of leavers. Personally, 2024 was a far more settled year in terms of what was going on. A lot of the disruptions of previous years, such as strikes and Covid were a thing of the past.

Staffing was very settled at the start of the year. We did welcome back to the school Mr Poulter as a housemaster. Mr Poulter informed me recently that despite enjoying the job he was going to be 'one and done.' So welcome to Thomas House Poults - and goodbye. Belinda also came on board sharing the overnight supervisors role. She is also finishing up at the end of the year as she extends her family with baby number four which is nearly enough kids to start a hostel of her own. Because our hours don't cross over I don't get to see Belinda, or Gayle, that often but when I do it is often in dramatic circumstances. This year alone we have had broken laundry equipment, fire alarms that couldn't be turned off, school alarms going off, intruders to be chased and a party to be shut down. All of this happens when most of you are asleep and oblivious to it all. In the kitchen Chrissy also started working at the canteen and doing some of our catering.

As the year went by there were a number of noteworthy events. We started the year with the compulsory in weekend for the Year 9's. An amazing race, swim at CBay, Bubble soccer were all fun. We also went to the scary maze which was a lot of great fun until we went to go home and realised we were missing 4 juniors and the organisers were packing up and leaving. We went to Dunedin for the annual rugby trip to watch the Highlanders beat the once mighty Crusaders. Once again Darren, Christine and myself went visiting some of our Year 9's at home during the holidays. It is a great way to see the boys in their home environment and does help explain why so many of them get excited when they see a tractor.

I would like to congtratulate all of the boys for their sporting and cultural success throughout the year. It is great to see so many boys involved in such a wide variety of activities. Naming all of the successes is not possible but I do want to make special mention of some people that had success at national level. The rowers again had success at Maadi and the First XI came so close to winning back-to-back Rankin cups. To the hostel boys involved, well done, it was great to be able to watch as you competed at the highest level. Lachlan Lovett has had a lot of individual success as a trapshooter, including winning the Junior Double Barrell at the Australian Championships and a NZ title. It is also great to have Reef back from Europe to hear about his successful time cycling. To win a multistage race is an impressive effort.

We don't tend to have a lot of musical success at Thomas House but it is great to see piping still going strong. We have a number of boys learning the bagpipes and it was pleasing to see Isaac Phimister (who piped us in tonight) and Morgan Harbutt gain success winning a title with the South Canterbury Pipe band at the national championships.

Unfortunately, we were once again rocked by some devastating and unexpected deaths which deeply affected both the hostel and school. We were saddend to hear that Billy Gillespie had been killed in an accident in Australia. Billy left last year and had many friends still in the hostel. I would just like to briefly acknowledge Billy's brother Sammy. Through such a tough time you have really handled yourself well, Sammy. I would also like to thank all the boys and staff who have supported Sammy and Billy's family through this time. In July we also got news of Mr Stevenson's sudden passing. It was a real shock to the school community, particularly the staff, to hear of his death. Many of us had known Ross for a number of years and the impact of his loss is definitely felt at school. He was a man of many interests, some very strange, but he was someone who could relate to all people and a friend to many.

To the staff of the House I would like to thank you. Christine, we continue to get the job done and I think we get most things right. I know this has been a tough year for you personally but thank you for the great work you continue to do. Darren it has been great to see you take the role this year and really make it your own. Getting the boys to bed each night is a thankless task so the fact you do it every week night and come back the next day with a smile on your face is impressive. I do wish you could get it right more often though when you are dishing out consequences. Your strike rate is to be fair very poor. In fact you are almost always wrong. The number of times I have come to work in the mornings and you have taken a phone off the wrong boy or someone who definitely wasn't talking. I was actually shocked in Term 4 when a Year 10 said it was him and he deserved not having his phone. In all seriousness you are doing a great job and I thank you for it.

To the housemasters- Mr Lowe, Mr Mac, Mr Mac Jr, Mr Packwood, Mr Poulter and Mr Sugar- thanks for all the work you do. To our overnight supervisors Gayle and Belinda, Mr Wagstaff, Justin and his team in the kitchen - Chrissy Janine, Phuti, Becs, Sue and Vanessa, our cleaners - Bernie, Sue and Haley, our Gappers Noah and Matteo for the first half of the year, and more recently

Dante and Paul, Pete our maintenance man. Thankyou all for the time and effort you put into making Thomas House the place that it is

Finally the Year 13 leavers' of 2024. For most of you Thomas House has been a big part of your lives and now that chapter is coming to an end. You started Year 9 as 28 and leave now with 12. We picked up a couple of boys along the way but you guys are the survivors. As others moved on to other schools, jobs, and being asked to leave you all stuck at it. I just want to also acknowledge Ben Morrissey, as if it wasn't for his tragic accident, I am sure he would be sitting here today as well. To Logan, thanks for the way you have lead the hostel. I appreciate the way you have gone about your role, and in doing so, you have done a fine job. It hasn't been an easy task with dwindling numbers. I would also like to thank all of the other prefects for the time and effort they have put into helping throughout the year and the other Year 13's that have helped out at various times.

In looking back at your time at Thomas House as leavers, you have all done a lot. By my calculations, someone who has been in the hostel for 5 years would have accomplished the following:



- You should have completed 800 hours of prep which is 33 full days
- You would have walked 6000 trips between the hostel and school- 300 kilometres
- You should have gone to 6000 periods of school- 285,000, minutes in class
- You would have been at the hostel for 24,000 hours- 1000 full days
- You would have eaten about 600 cheese rolls- 216,000 calories
- And...... you've probably put your sheets out for washing 6 times-10 mins of your life.



If you think about it then it is a big part of your life and I am hopeful that you are all proud of what you have accomplished.

In finishing I would like to say thankyou to everyone who makes Thomas House a great place to live and work. I hope you all realise that, despite the odd telling off, phone confiscation or extra dishes duty, it is a fantastic place for you to live and great community to be a part of. Many of the friends you make here will be for life and I am sure in future years you will look back on your time at Thomas House with many great memories. To the seniors as you leave for the year, study hard for your exams and enjoy the break. To the juniors - there is not too long to go in the year, make it productive. To everyone else, I know it's a bit early but enjoy the break when it comes around.

I would like to start off by telling you a bit about myself, so those who don't know me, can hear how my journey through Thomas House and Timaru Boys' High School has gone. I started at Thomas House as a year 9 in 2020, after boarding two





I would now like to share a few memories from my time in the hostel. Some of the things i remember from my year 9 in hostel was how aggressive the prefects of that time were. If you were not on their good side - they took their responsibilty of keeping us young ones in check!! There were some nights that just by opening your eyes would see you doing a wall sit, or their personal favourite - the broom handles! These left some pretty good marks.

There used to be a few trouble makers in Year 10. I recall one night when they decided it would be a good idea to muck around when Mr Mac was on. This resulted in the whole of upstairs getting an absolute barreling from him. This was enough to keep the majority quiet but did not quite get across to those boys who continued with their antics. In no time Mr Mac had come back up—we now saw ourselves doing shuttles at 6am in the morning during the winter time, in bare feet, on the hard frosty Rectory. I can tell you this was not much fun. Finally it was this time last year when some of the Year 13's started having a bit of silly fun, filling up around 50 rubber gloves with water and putting them on the floor of Reef and Payo's room. Then one of the boys decided to pop a fair chunk of them on the carpet. This led to their room flooding and, at one point it resembled a small lake. The stench that came from that room for months to come is something I wish to never smell again. Mr Blair's dehummidfier was working overtime but even this couldnt fix it, to the point the carpet had to be removed.

For our year group starting in Year 9 we had quite a large group which has since withered down to just 12 of us as a lot of the boys left school in Year 12 and the boys that lived close enough to be day boys once they got their licences. We have had some great times over the years, especially in the old 8 man dorms upstairs or in Jubilee with our dorm wars..... which saw fruit being banned for a period of time. But amongst the fun we have also had some extremely tough times over our senior years. These times have shown how close we are and brought us together, forming friendships that will last a lifetime. To those here tonight, and those that have already left, it has been a privilege to spend the hostel years with you and I hope that we all stay in touch. I wish you all good luck for the coming years. I hope wherever your journey takes you, it goes well. To the Year 9's make the most of your time at school and hostel because before you know it, it will be over. It seems like just yesterday that I was in your seats at my first leavers' dinner.

I would now like to take the time to thank everyone who is here today. I want to start by saying thanks to the housemasters. You keep the boys in line but know how to have fun while doing it. Mr Blair, you are willing to help us out when ever and you do a great job at running a house of over 100 teenage boys. Darren, you are always full of energy, keeping the boys active and getting them out of prep to play games. You also make sure we have done our what you call 'dishes diddies'. Christine you are always looking out for the boys, making sure everything is going well and I thank you for having a laugh with us while you do it. Finally thank you to everyone in the kitchen for the dinner tonight.

MANA TANGATA

POWERFUL PEOPLE

2024 was the second year of our Mana Tangata programme. This is designed around giving students a vehicle for growth around four different elements: Mātauranga Man, Manawaroa (Resilience), Future You and the culmination in the form of challenges both physical and mental.

The delivery of this programme is undertaken in several different formats both inside and outside the classroom. Boys are given the opportunity to stand in front of the class and deliver their own "my story." This is a great opportunity for the boys to learn from their peers and gain confidence from delivering something very close to them. The programme is designed for the boys to constantly reflect on who they are now and who they would like to become, how they are going to get there and those that have helped them get to where they are now.

The year-long programme raises boys' awareness of issues that they might currently be facing as well as providing them with the skills and understanding that are required to navigate their way through beginning adulthood. Through conversations with the classes, Mana teaches students about a wide range of topics from dealing with change, emotions and relationships, to future aspirations and bush craft. Many parents will be giving their boys the same messages and the programme is designed to reinforce positive messages they receive from home. The more adult connections a student can have through this transition, the less the risk of a negative outcome.

The boys competed in an interclass traditional Māori games afternoon on a beautiful sunny day at the Lower Grounds. This was a great opportunity to compete against each other and to work as a group. After the games of Te Uru were completed, 10Gl were victorious with 10RY coming second place.





The haka competition followed the Māori games, and this was won by a very impressive 10RY class. The Hautuanga award for best leader went to Tai Reihana who led his class superbly. Tai's brother Jay won this award three years earlier when he was in Year 10. In 2024, the boys have had a range of internal and external support. These have included: "Attitude", Jason Williamson (careers advisor) who provided boys with important careers information; the YMCA who came in and delivered a program around resiliency and conveyed messages around sexuality.

The final challenge of the journey is the newly formed Mana Excursion held at Raincliff Scout camp in early December. Whilst the boys were on the excursion, they were all given the opportunity to participate in a number of activities. This included archery,

damper making, shelter building, letter writing to their future selves and many others.

Thank you to the many staff who attended the excursion and made the day so enjoyable for the students who attended.

If a student successfully completes the Mana Tangata program, they receive their Timaru Boys' High School Mana Tangata badge.

A very important addition to the senior blazer.

PB4L

The acronym POWER helps our students remember the TBHS values of Pride, Our Responsibility, Willing Participant, Earning Respect and Right Attitude. These values are what it means to be a 'Boys' High student', and reflects the learning environment where positive behaviour for learning (PB4L) is clearly seen, and displayed by both staff and students alike.

Our PB4L POWER values have been demonstrated by our students in a variety of activities both inside and outside of the classroom throughout 2024.

Our sports teams have worn their uniform with pride and displayed the right attitude while watching from the sidelines or

competing, especially during our annual sports exchanges.









Our Year 9's have been actively displaying the values during their lessons for example; coming prepared for learning with charged laptops or the correct PE gear. The Year 9's have enjoyed the interactive weekly POWER draw, which has been conducted after assembly, and run by our Year 13 Prefects in their leadership role, which has certainly been a highlight for our students.

Depending on the year level, the acknowledgement system for PB4L has been tailored to meet the requirements of that cohort, for example; throughout the year the Year 9's have completed a series of bronze, silver and gold POWER cards, which their teachers have stamped during lesson times to acknowledge their active demonstration of our PB4L values, or a focus on a specific value that reflects the learning intention for that lesson.

Year 10 and 11's have also been 'getting it right' with their behaviour and demonstrating the PB4L values in the classroom, as they too have been acknowledged by their teachers with a variety of instant prizes via the student office.

Every three weeks POWER scores are given to each student by their teachers related to how they are demonstrating the values in that specific subject area. This information can be seen by the student and the whānau via the kamar portal. This important feedback/reflection progress is used to help start conversations between students, teacher and home about how they are engaging with their class work, and what could be their next steps to help improve their learning even further, so that they are active learners.

Our Year 13 students have been issued with a PB4L POWER profile card which incorporates a service/community element. This card could also be used by this student after they leave TBHS for a reference for flatting etc.

Thank you to Michelle Bower and Wendy Guthrie in the student office for their continued support of our PB4L programme at TBHS, and all the 'behind the scenes' work that they do, as it does not go unnoticed.

Finally a massive thank you to the local businesses who have supported our PB4L behavioural system at TBHS in 2024 with their generous contribution in the terms of acknowledgement prizes; Paknsave, Frontrunner, Burger Fuel, Hells Pizza, Subway, CBay, Columbus and Stirling Sports.

LEARNING AREAS

AGRICULTURE | Mr Nathan Archibald

Agriculture has continued to grow within the school, with 119 boys in Year 10 opting to study Agriculture this year. Two classes of Year 11 boys continued to achieve both academically and practically as with one Year 12 class. Many of these Year 12 students have moved on to further rural opportunities throughout the year.







Year 10 boys studied small engines and engines in general, exploring the differences between petrol 4 and 2 stroke engines as well as diesel

engines. Other units studied were sheep farming and the different processes that occur on a sheep farm throughout a twelvemonth period, as well as gaining a small insight into the global giant of dairy farming. Horticulture was popular with the boys, looking at limiting factors of plant growth as well as growing their own vegetables.

Year 11 Agriculture boys studied health and safety units, hydration, livestock behaviour, fencing as well as cattle and sheep breed units amongst others. The boys completed two days out at Agrilearn, experiencing and learning practical skills in the fields of water supply and fencing. A solid percentage of these boys move into Year 12 Agriculture for 2025

Year 12 Agriculture is designed around getting the boys 'work ready' in terms of acquiring skills and accreditation for these skills in a variety of areas. Farm bikes, tractors, chainsaws, animal handling and behaviour and further fencing practicals were completed through Agrilearn's accredited tutors, with most boys being very successful.

During class time, theory units including LUV's, further health and safety units, animal health and fertilisers were studied. The group included some exceptional future farmers, many of whom have since taken on full time jobs or been accepted into Agricultural Training Facilities throughout New Zealand.

DRAMA | Mrs Megan Blake

This year has seen a massive increase in the number of Year 9's attending TBHS. This has meant that the number of weeks for each Year 9 class for their Drama rotation has decreased to 10 weeks, instead of 13 weeks as previously done, to allow for all Year 9's to participate in Drama.

The main focus of this rotation in Drama is to promote positive participation, effective team work and clear communication. The Year 9's have had the opportunity to work on applying the use of Drama techniques and conventions to their performance work. They have collaborated within groups to create their own devised scripts related to current teenage issues (e.g. mental health, relationships, health issues etc) where they have clearly identified the issue and possible solutions. Once again this year the students have had the opportunity to experiment with the use of stage lighting, costumes, special sound effects and props to enhance their stage performances further. It has been great to see the number of students who have also actively displayed our TBHS POWER values throughout their rotations in Drama.

Year 10 Drama is into its second year of running over two semesters, which has seen an increase in the number of students completing the course. Once again it has been great to witness the students stepping outside of their comfort zone to experience extending their use of Drama techniques and conventions within this performance framework. This course has also highlighted the distinct culture of what it is to be a New Zealander, from devising monologues related to experiences of soldiers from World War 1 at Gallipoli to creating an original myth for Aōtearoa. This year's group has also been on a field trip to the South Canterbury Drama league to have a tour of the facilities, and what goes on behind the scenes when putting on a production. The students were amazed to discover how many volunteers are involved and needed to achieve a production of such a high standard. It was also great to see the number of students who were keen to be a part of this volunteer army in the future after visiting the Drama League.

Both the Year 9 and 10 courses have a heavy practical emphasis to provide opportunities for students to share, collaborate and experiment with technology to enhance a final performance on the stage. Both year groups have had the opportunity to work

with the South Canterbury Museum on performing a locally based play where they can put into practice their use of Drama techniques. It has been well received by the students, as they put their dramatic skills into practice, as well as an opportunity for improvising.

The senior Drama students have continued to travel to TGHS for their lessons. There has been the successful continuation of the TBHS theatre sport club which ran through Term 1 and 2 of this year. The annual theatre sports exchange between TGHS, TBHS and Craighead took place at the Craighead auditorium. This year TBHS has had their biggest team ever taking part in this inter school exchange, especially with the number of junior students involved.

Auditions and rehearsals for the 2024 combined musical 'Mallet Man', written and directed by Mr Wayne Doyle took place in Term 1 and 2. The final shows were on stage at TBHS at the end of Term 2 to packed audiences. The cast also performed to the 'old boys/girls' network and to Bluestone Primary School. Congratulations to all cast members and staff involved in supporting this successful musical production.

Once again, congratulations to all the students who took part in Drama activities throughout the year.

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TECHNOLOGY, FOOD | Mr Ryan Simpson

In 2024 we saw an increase of numbers in the junior school. We welcomed all students, but it was logistically challenging with rising interest also in senior Hospitality. At its peak T5 had around 180 boys per week manipulating a plethora of ingredients as they worked their way to producing in excess of 300 dishes.

During these classes the boys displayed a variety of techniques, talents and temperaments. The students developed their knowledge, transferring theory learning into the practical environment with much enthusiasm. Junior students continue to enjoy the hands-on component of Food Technology, while ensuring all

written requirements were met to allow for the practical learning to go ahead. It was no surprise that the practical was just about everybody's favourite part of the week. Whether it's a student's first introduction to preparing and cooking food independently, or further developing their prior knowledge, together with their partner, they are learning to collaborate, manage their time effectively and lay the foundation for a lifetime of self-sufficiency, beyond packet noodles and the drive through!

Senior Hospitality students began the year by preparing, cooking and presenting dishes for service at the TBHS Open Day. Level 2 and 3 boys used the opportunity to produce food for 'customers' having used practical lessons during the week to prepare for the event. Senior students worked hard to complete all written and practical expectations over the year, including multiple assessments, which involved producing dishes worthy of service in the Hospitality industry. Barista training for both Year 12 and

Year 13 students provided an opportunity for customer interaction. Both levels demonstrated their practical learning service, pouring coffee and the likes to teachers and other invited guests, and accepting feedback which was overwhelmingly positive. The added extra for senior students

was an opportunity in Term 4 to participate in a MasterChef style competition where pairs created a dish within a criteria of available ingredients. They then had to showcase their capabilities and were judged by a panel of professionals all with a lifetime of extensive culinary consumption experience.

By all means 2024 was a very successful year in T5. There was a large amount of positive engagement in a learning area which continues to grow from strength to strength. 2025 will see a change in the room with a new teacher taking the role as Teacher in Charge of junior Food Technology and senior Hospitality. With solid numbers choosing, in particular, senior classes next year there will be further opportunities for Timaru Boys' High School students to participate in written and practical learning. This will provide knowledge and confidence while amassing skills that are as much part of our school's curriculum, as they are a part of a boy's independence and growth.



Forging the Future: A Year of Growth in Metal Technology

The Metal Technology students had an exciting year in 2024, advancing their skills through hands-on projects that introduced them to essential tools and techniques. From basic drilling, milling, lathe and MIG welding, each year level

built upon their knowledge, preparing for future careers in engineering and fabrication.

Year 9 students began their journey by crafting key rings and key holders, learning the

fundamentals of metalworking. They became familiar with hand tools and gained confidence using the drill press, an essential machine for precision drilling.



Moving to more complex projects, Year 10 students created a hammer and an LED night light. They were introduced to the lathe machine, a key tool for shaping metal, and used Inkscape to design parts, which were then cut using a laser machine.



Year 11 students constructed a G-clamp, marking their first experience with MIG welding. They further refined their skills by making a soft hammer, strengthening their understanding of fabrication techniques.

> Year 12 students took on advanced projects, crafting a bevel gauge to develop milling skills. They also built a nutcracker and a kindling splitter, further enhancing their MIG welding abilities.

> This year's projects have given students invaluable experience, equipping them with skills for the future in metalwork and engineering.



TECHNOLOGY, WOOD | Mr Nigel Lowe

Kia Ora, Talofa, Mālō e Lelei. It has been another exciting year of learning and teaching technology at Timaru Boys'. We have farewelled Mr Ryan Simpson who left us to go teach in Brunei with his family. He will be sorely missed after all the hard work he has done in the hospitality area. We also farewell Mrs Georgia Douglas who is away on maternity leave, expecting baby number two. We wish her well, and no doubt will see her return in 2026.



In Year 9 the students have been introduced to safety in the workshop and a very basic electronic circuit involving LED's, resistors, capacitors and transistors. What is great about this project is, if the circuit doesn't work they have to problem solve what has gone wrong. Very frustrating for some, but also a great challenge, and it could come down to a simple component facing the wrong way. This project gives them the basic skill for their project in Year 10.

Year 10 boys started with a basic wood project to teach them to measure and cut accurately. It also gives them basic knowledge on how hand tools work and how to care for them. They then go onto designing a case, which involves them finding images which they then cut out on the laser cutter, ready to assemble for their bluetooth speakers. The students love this as they get to test them out. It does mean I get to listen to a variety of music getting played over a couple of weeks! If it doesn't work out, then they need to use their problem solving skills again.

In Year 11 and 12, students really start to learn about safety and the law, and this is

a big component of the course. They also get to learn about different timber joints and how to mark and cut accurately. All the assessments they do relate to the practical workshop and this is why our numbers in the class seem to be growing each year. Aside from their workshop knowledge expanding, they also get to take home some great projects. Projects made in Year 11 are a toolbox and coffee table. Year 12 students will construct a saw stool and bedside cabinet.

Year 13 is the ultimate year for taking ownership of all the skills they have learnt over the last few years. They get to design and make an object of their choosing, and some of the ideas they come up with have been impressive. This year we had a student make a rimu queen size bed and another make a dining table with epoxy resin in it, made out of macrocarpa wood, which looked fantastic once finished. It is up to the student to complete their work at this level and it is great watching boys take ownership of their projects.







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VISUAL ARTS | Mr Wayne Doyle

It's been another successful year in the Visual Arts, where students have created a diverse selection of creative images. We are fortunate to have students who are naturally gifted, and willing to try new and exciting techniques. Students are encouraged to experiment as they pursue creative excellence, and push boundaries within drawing, painting and photography.


The Year 9's have created art works that have ranged from pencil sketches, to dynamic watercolour paintings, stencil art and selfies.

SPORTS DIRECTOR Mr Gavin Miller

2024 has seen several excellent performances across a range of sports in the school. For results across the board in our larger team sports it was again a very pleasing year. Our rowers and cyclists performed with distinction on the National stage. The 1st XI Hockey backed up winning the Rankin Cup in 2023 by making the final again this year and coming within a couple of minutes of retaining the title before losing in a penalty shoot-out.

The achievement level of some of our boys and the opportunities available are reflected in where they are plying their sporting trades. Cyclists Reef Roberts and Noah Hollamby spent a large portion of the New Zealand winter cycling in the European summer. Ben Allan and Payo O'Sullivan were also in Europe representing New Zealand at the world age group rowing championships as was Will Knight in kickboxing. Lachlan Lovett travelled to Australia to pick up an Australasian trap-shooting title while Canterbury under 17 cricket representative Hamish Caird spent Term 2 at Winchester College in England as the Mark Parker scholarship representative.

Their performances will be outlined further in this magazine, but it is very gratifying that boys and teams from a school with a roll of around 700 from a provincial town can still compete and achieve at Canterbury, South Island and even national level. It is very important for us that potential students and parents see this and that you can access a variety of sporting pathways and competitions as a student at Timaru Boys' High School. Indeed, if you are wishing to have access to certain competitions, tournaments and sporting opportunities, then we are well placed to offer that in the local region.

Throughout the year Sport Canterbury out of their South Canterbury base at the stadium in Morgan's Road run numerous Aoraki school sports events. These give a wide range of kids the opportunity to have a crack at a broad range of sports.

The TBHS participation rate of the boys representing the school in a sporting code for the year now sits at around 80% and has remained pretty stable in the 75-80% range for a number of years. This is well above the national average which is around 50%. One of our management challenges is that over 80% of our coaches are from the community and not directly involved at school. While having this support is great, it does lead to some organisational and logistical challenges. We are fortunate that a small number of staff play very key roles in facilitating and allowing our sporting programme to run smoothly but our control in this area is a little tenuous and if and when some of these staff move on or retire, we might really find ourselves stretched. As an example, Glen Austin, after around 20 years of coaching basketball and managing multiple school sides during the week at practices, on Friday nights in the local competition as well as interschools and at tournaments, is looking to step back from that commitment. All those hours will need to be filled by other people.

From a number of surveys, it has been established that young men are very keen on high levels of involvement in their sport. Modifying games or reducing numbers to increase involvement is important. As is playing with friends, having good facilities, at times reduced seasons and flexibility around when you play. As an example, midweek to allow the opportunity to play other sports, or have free time in the weekends to do other things. Interestingly, smaller towns probably make it easier to implement some of these things and certainly some of the sports that are doing so like Hockey and Basketball tend to be the ones that are thriving.

The majority of our sporting old boys give readily back to their old school, speaking at assemblies, attending events and turning up on the side-lines to watch TBHS teams. Reconnecting the old boys with their old school through sport also provides the opportunity for further connections through the Old Boys' Association and can only be good for the school.



FOOTBALL 1ST XI IN REVIEW

The 2024 season began with preseason training and trials in January and February. A squad of 16 players was selected with Taylah Hurrell named as captain for the season, backed up by vice-captain Dakota Henderson.

Throughout the season the team played thirty three games, winning fifteen, drawing five and suffering thirteen losses. Goal scoring was an issue all season, the team enjoyed plenty of possession in most games but a tendency to miss chances at big moments proved costly in a number of games.

MEMORIAL CUP

The season began with the Memorial Cup match between last years Division 1 champions (TBHS) and the holders of the South Canterbury Cup (Pleasant Point) in a rematch of the cup final from the previous season. Goals from Taylah Hurrel (2) and Dakota Henderson gave TBHS a 3-0 lead before Pleasant Point fought back with two goals to make for an interesting last ten minutes. Through a combination of good defending and little bit of luck, TBHS were able to hold on for a 3-3 win to retain the Memorial Cup.

MENS DIVISION ONE

The Division One campaign began three close losses to Geraldine, Thistle and Hearts as the young players got to grips with playing

against adults on a weekly basis. A 1-1 draw with Pleasant Point showed the team were improving and the following week the boys recorded their first win with Taylah Hurrell scoring five goals in a 6-5 classic game of two halves against West End.

The pattern of close losses, draws and the odd tight win remained throughout the season. It was great to have six very competitive teams in Division 1 this year. Close games are always more interesting than some of the blow outs that had been the norm in previous seasons. While the players and to some extent the coaches, were disappointed not to finish higher up the table the football was always enjoyable.

SOUTH CANTERBURY CUP

With the number of teams entering the cup competition down from previous seasons, the first round featured only one game with the First XI drawn to play against Mens Division 1 champions West End. It was a game neither team really wanted but proved to be an excellent football match played at Windsor Field. In a back and forward encounter, West End eventually got on top and came out 4-2 winners on the day.

Coming back from winter tournament week the boys faced Geraldine in the plate semi-final. Battling tired legs meant, although the boys dominated possession, goals were hard to come by but eventually we were able to score through Daytona Smith and Marshall Solomon to qualify for the plate final against Temuka, who had beaten the Second Xi in the other semi-final.

The final against Temuka was a one-sided affair with the boys playing very well to win 9-0. In his 70th and final game for TBHS, captain Taylah Hurrell scored five goals to ensure the 1st XI won some silverware in the first and last games of the season.

INTERSCHOOL EXCHANGES

The 1st XI played exchange games against Otago Boys', St Andrews and Waitaki Boys' along with a qualifying game against Kings High School.

In early May the team travelled to Dunedin to play Kings in a national tournament qualifier. On a blustery day in south Dunedin both teams struggled to play any football into the wind, with each half dominated by the team with the wind at their back. Choosing to play into the wind in the first half proved to be decisive as the defence held firm under constant pressure to go into half time 0-0. Turning around with the wind at their backs, the boys ramped up the pressure on the Kings' goal but could not break through. With five minutes to go, Daniel Jackson, in his debut game, seized on a poor clearance from the Kings keeper and scored from close range. Five minutes of frantic Kings attack was matched by resolute defending to give TBHS a 1-0 win. Unfortunately after this game we became aware that some of the squad would not be available for tournament so the difficult decision was made to withdraw from the qualification process.

Otago Boys' visited later in May. A close game resulted in 1-1 draw.

Our other traditional exchanges games against St Andrews and Waitaki Boys resulted in 3-2 and 1-0 wins to TBHS.

JIM WISHART TOURNAMENT

The Jim Wishart Tournament was held at Foster Park in Rolleston during winter tournament week. TBHS were drawn in a pool alongside Nayland College from Nelson, Buller High School and the hosts Rolleston College.

Day one saw the team kick off the tournament against Nayland College. Goals to Taylah Hurrell and Dakota Henderson meant the team got off to the perfect start, winning 2-0.

In the afternoon game the team played Rolleston College. Rolleston had a couple of very good midfielders who controlled the game. Two missed penalties didn't help the cause and a couple of soft late goals saw the final score finish 4-1 to Rolleston.

Day two, the team knew they needed a big win over Buller High School to secure either first or second in the pool. With the help of a couple of supporters keeping a close eye on the game between Nayland and Rolleston next door, we were able to achieve the desired result and go through to the playoff stages in the top half of the draw.

Day three started with a quarter final against Hutt Valley High School. Both teams provided a real spectacle in a very close game that featured some excellent possession football, great defending and just one goal. Unfortunately the goal went the way of Hutt Valley, meaning TBHS could at best finish fifth in the tournament.

In the afternoon TBHS faced a very physical James Hargest High School from Invercargill. We were fortunate to have a nationally ranked referee take control of this game and keep things in check in a game that at times threatened to boil over. Goals to Dakota

Henderson and Jack Browning gave TBHS a 2-1 win and a chance for revenge over Rolleston in the playoff for fifth on day four.

The final game against Rolleston showed the fighting spirit in this group of young men. On very weary legs, they fought with everything they had, with goals to Dakota Henderson and Koda Davis just before half time giving the team a 2-1 lead which they held onto through a tense and tiring second half.

Fifth place was a pleasing result but it could have been so much better but for the odd goal in the quarter final that was one of the games of the tournament. All players stepped up throughout the tournament as injuries and fatigue took their toll on day 3 and 4. Across the tournament, six different players picked up MVP points, with Dakota getting the overall award at the end of the week for his tireless work rate and nine goals.

OVERALL

Overall during the season the team played well often surprising teams with our ability to maintain possession, to be comfortable with the ball, and for the attractive and positive attitude on the field.

The support from parents and extended family during matches was always encouraging with our home games at Windsor Field always well supported. A big thank you to the coaches, Nick Henderson and Kai Rumenapf, for your efforts throughout the season.

FOOTBALL REPORT

2024 was a successful season for Timaru Boys' Football both on and off the field. Once again, we had six teams entered in senior and youth grades with over 100 boys turning out on a weekly basis across the season.

The 15th grade proved to be a very even competition with the TBHS Hammerheads, Makos and Tiger Sharks generally having good close games particularly against eachother. When selecting these teams, every effort is made to spread the talent evenly across teams so that each team stays competitive in the grade. Unfortunately, not all clubs share this philosophy which does lead to occasional lop-sided scores. The 15th grade team teams were well coached by members of the 1st XI and volunteer coaches who put a lot of time into these teams. Ashton Hurrell and Taylah Hurrell looked after the Hammerheads, the Makos were coached by Mr Mark Walker and the Tiger Sharks were coached by Mr Michael Wentworth-Smith and Daytona Smith.

TBHS Bull Sharks competed in a very even 18th grade competition. 

Our two U16.5 teams had solid years and can be pleased with their results. Players play the game of rugby for many valid reasons and these squads highlight this exactly. Thanks to everyone who was part of these groups – you were all great ambassadors for our rugby programme.

The U15A Colts won the South Island U15A tournament for the first time since 2006. They also won the local grade, were second in the Highlanders grade and won several other big games. What a team this was in 2024, and clearly our best team results wise. To every one of you on and off field – well done! You were a credit to the school and club in the way you always conducted yourself and this was noticed and appreciated.

The moment of the year goes to the minute this U15A Colts won their sixth game from six at tournament 36-31 over Nelson in the final. We really fronted in this game and it was a great win after defending for the last five minutes. The absolute joy and relief for this team will live long in the memory of the players, the management and the hundreds of others present watching. Honestly what a week!

Our five U14.5 teams were superb. All finished in the top 7 teams in the grade and can be well pleased. The grade had 11 teams. The games between our teams were awesome as always, and we had a lot of great players in this grade. The way we run this grade is good and it provided a great building block to our U14A team that was also successful this year. To all of you involved in U14.5 rugby, well done.

Many of our players played in representative teams over the season. They performed with distinction and had good individual and team performances. Representative pathways are still important for boys and this year was no exception. There was also club of origin this year – this concept was enjoyed by most boys and looks here to stay in some capacity next year and beyond.

Despite many positives, it can be a real challenge to get boys to every practice and to make them want to get fitter and improve their skills. Boys play multiple sports and many of them work now. Rugby is being now challenged increasingly by many things, but we are continuing to do well in this tough environment. One practice, as seen this year, was enough for our mixed teams with A team groups training twice.

Jay Reihana was the only player we had to make the Crusaders U18 squad. Hamish Melville made the final trials for the New Zealand U18 Maori team. We wish all Y13 leavers well, whether it is on or off the rugby field. Your dedication and commitment over five years to rugby at our school is appreciated. Make sure you keep playing in the future as well as supporting us.

Tristan Gaffaney was amazing in the video work across many teams. His attention to detail and diligence was first class. For all his work he received a service colour for rugby, the first non-player to ever get this honour. Thanks so much, Tristan. He ended up also doing 50 games of 1st XV rugby. How we replace him going forward will be a big discussion. He will be difficult to replace.

The Sevens rugby squad did not go off to Condors this year. We entered the qualification again, but it was not to be despite our best performance for three years. The other six Canterbury teams were all strong this year. It will be good to get back to Condors in the future, and with talent coming through competing in other tournaments, this is a realistic goal in the next few seasons.

Old Boys continue to be involved in rugby immensely across the world. It is great to see many of them play both internationally and nationally. There are too many to name here, but well done to you all. It is great to watch you all progress so much. Boys I encourage you all to keep being involved in rugby as it can create friendships and fellowship that lasts a lifetime – and this is anywhere in the world.

School Park remains a good facility and is improving. Much work has been completed around the grounds and changing areas and we have plans to improve the lighting and parking. These things are expensive though. Our relationship with the Old Boys club is getting better and there are some real opportunities for the two clubs coming up to work effectively.

Exchange games are dwindling, which is a concern as we need games. Finding teams to play is a real challenge as most schools in Dunedin and Christchurch competitions usually give their top players all the good rugby they need. Playing in Ashburton has become a good compromise here to find some games. We are at a disadvantage in this regard. However, we did get more games than usual for our U16A and U14A teams.

The U16A team got invited last minute to Christchurch on tournament week to play St Andrews, Christs and Nelson. To save money we travelled each day, and the 1st XV coaches took the team as a first step in our 2025 programme. What an amazing three days this was as we won 3 from 3 and won the Quad. Well done on the excellent wins here. It was great for your morale moving forward and our club and school in general.

The U14A programme was the best we have had for several years and involved several Tuesday night practices and several games. Thanks to Coaches Nate Robinson and Kelvin Sadler and Managers Ange Henskes and Nic Etti for looking after about 35 boys and managing this schedule through many other rugby and other sports commitments. Ange Henskes wrote this summary of 14A for this report:



The boys started off the season with a hiss and a roar against Waitaki Boys', and they really showed strength. Being a new team, they came together and played well.



The score was TBHS 415 to Waitaki 408.

In June the TBHS Competitive Trap Shooting group participated in the annual Intercollegiate shoot at the Timaru Clay and Target Club over a weekend, with over 80 shooters from schools ranging from Dunedin to Christchurch. Congratulations to the members of this TBHS team who represented our school with pride and by displaying the POWER values throughout the competition. These students were Regan Anderson (Year 11), Ryan Bell (Year 12), Harry Bradley (Year 10), Jacob Burgess (Year 11), Ben Chivers (Year 9), Gibson Preston (Year 10), Simon Henriksen (Year 13), William Henriksen (Year 13), Lachlan Lovett (Year 12) and William McCabe (Year 12). If there was a theme to 2024 for the library it would be to return to the importance of books. The mobile phone ban at school also meant that more students were reading during class time and at break times,



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

RECTOR'S MESSAGE TO OLD BOYS

Kia ora koutou. Hello to all our Old Boys around the country and overseas. Overall, 2024 was a good year for the School but it was touched with loss and sadness. Two very recent and much-loved Old Boys, Billy Gillespie and Cale Tairua, tragically died in separate accidents during the year. Also, our Deputy Rector, Ross Stevenson, died suddenly as he was about to embark on a much-deserved sabbatical. Ross was a wonderful teacher, senior leader, colleague, and friend. Our deepest sympathies go out to the families of Billy, Cale, and Ross. They will remain forever part of the Boys' High brotherhood.

The year started extremely well by learning that we had achieved the best academic results for some time. The staff has been working hard to better streamline and structure the lessons so that boys are more likely to engage with complex and difficult learning material. It is very pleasing to know that our approach is working. These results may well be one of the reasons our roll is growing – 200 boys came into Year 9 in 2024 and we think that we will get close to that again in 2025. We expect that we will start the year in 2025 with 800 students, the biggest roll for decades.

Another pleasant surprise in 2024 was learning that an Old Boy, Warren Lewis (TBHS 1980-1984), had recently purchased Godley Peaks Station. Warren is a part of the Lewis family who were major contributors to the building of the Lewis Wing in the hostel. He wants the School to continue using John Scott Lodge and he has plans for an upgrade to the existing building. We look forward to working with Warren on this project.

Once again it was a strong year for sport. Our rowers kicked off the year with another wonderful run at the Maadi Cup, New Zealand's Secondary Schools Rowing Championships. Our small crew won two golds, two silvers, and one bronze, out-performing nearly all of the bigger boys' schools. Two TBHS rowers, Payo O'Sullivan and Ben Allan, went on to row for New Zealand in Canada. Many people ask me why our rowing results are so strong. We have some great athletes at school but I truly think it has something to do with our head coach, Brian Smith – he really knows how to get the best out of these lads.

Our hockey 1st XI, after having won the 2023 national title, the Rankin Cup, set themselves a more modest goal. They wanted to win the Canterbury Secondary Schools League. They achieved that and then went on to appear in the Rankin Cup final again, just missing out in a penalty shootout with Tauranga Boys' College. Another fantastic year!

There were other sporting highs and lows, but I will leave you to read about them in other pages of this *Timaruvian*.

We had another full year in the arts. The main event was the TBHS/TGHS joint production. 2024 was our turn to lead and our HOD of Art, Wayne Doyle, directed a musical of his own creation, *Mallet Man*. It was extremely popular with a large cast of boys and girls taking part and having so much fun. Our head boy, Sam Roadley, took the role of Mallet Man and his performance was

extremely accomplished and downright hilarious. Keep an eye out for his name because I think he has the talent to make it in the big wide world of entertainment.

Old Boy Dick Tayler contacted us in early 2024 and asked if the School would be the custodian of his 10,000 Metre Gold Medal from the 1974 Commonwealth Games in Christchurch. I was 13 when Dick won that race and those images will be forever seared into my memory. It was such an honour for the School when Dick came up to hand over the medal during our Sports Prizegiving Assembly in May. He spoke about his time at school and how he revered Jack Lovelock and wanted to emulate him. He was also very funny and he won the students over immediately. Later in the year, we held an unveiling of Dick's medal in the Memorial Library. The display case and its installation costs were provided by Old Boy Bruce Lund. It is positioned beside the Lovelock Collection which Dick is very happy about!

The School and the Old Boys' Foundation together funded a redesign and clean-up of the Lovelock Oak area. It looks absolutely beautiful and it was wonderful to have Dick here to officially open the area. Next time any of you are in Timaru and want to see the Lovelock Oak area or have a look at Dick's medal and the Lovelock Collection in the Memorial Library, just drop in and ask – someone will definitely sort you out. The same goes for Thomas House.

I thoroughly enjoyed working with the Old Boys' Association Executive in 2024 and (at the time of writing) I'm looking forward to 2025. All the best to every Old Boy and their families for the coming year. *Scientia Potestas Est*.

The Association made a substantial contribution to the upgrade and revitalisation of the Lovelock Oak surrounds. The tree remains in good health and continues to attract visitors all year round.

We were able to give due recognition, with the award of Life Membership, to two special contributors to the Association. Gregor Macaulay is recognised for his scholarship and editorial skill as school historian and Old Boy *Timaruvian* editor. Dion Crooks has been a stalwart of the North Canterbury Branch and loyal Old Boy over decades and his award was thoroughly deserved.

R.J. (Dick) Tayler remains one of our most high-profile Old Boys. It may be 50 years since his memorable track victory at the 1974 Commonwealth Games but still that race features as one of the

nation's great sporting moments. Dick's decision to gift his gold medal to the School and Memorial Library is hugely appreciated. He gifted the medal in his inimitable style at a school assembly in August.

The appointment of Paula McMecking as Library Archive Administrator has been popular. Paula picks up the role from Jeff Elston, whose dedication over more than two decades is acknowledged. Noel Davies (1961-1962), Auckland Branch, deserves thanks for enabling remuneration for the position.

Old Boys around the regions have had several gatherings worthy of note.

John Welch initiated a Blenheim Old Boys' gathering in October. A reminder that in the regions and towns around the country Timaru High School Old Boys can be found with a common bond.

Alister Wing and his Ashburton team had their Old Boy gathering for the year in October with an encouraging turnout.



In Auckland in early November, Noel Davies organised a gathering of around 20 Old Boys.

The North Canterbury Old Boys had planned a get together before the end of the year but postponed until April/May 2025.

Rob Crozier (1960-1964) took the initiative in arranging a reunion of sixth form classmates from 1964. Rob is based in Otaki but marshalled 14 final-year mates to meet up in Timaru. Reports of a most enjoyable weekend have filtered through.

At home base, an end of year Christmas function with around 25 Old Boys in attendance took place in the Memorial Library in early December. Dick Tayler's 1974 gold medal in its new display case was unveiled by Peter Tayler (Dick's brother), Bruce Lund (display case donor), and me. It will sit alongside the Lovelock display.


NORTH CANTERBURY BRANCH

As was noted in our 2021 edition, he was remembered by fellow First XV member Gavin M. Miller (1985-1989, staff 1998-) as "a really nice guy, quiet, friendly, and hard-working, strongly focused on his academic studies". He went on to the University of Auckland, where he completed a BSc(Hons) degree in computer science. That was followed by an MSc degree from the University of Oxford and, some years later, a postgraduate diploma and MBA degree from the University of the South Pacific. He was a civil servant in Tonga and in regional agencies based in Fiji from



1996, rising to be CEO of the Tongan Ministry of Public Enterprises. He has been a member of the Tongan Legislative Assembly (Parliament) since November 2014. He became Deputy Prime Minister of Tonga in 2015 and Prime Minister in December 2021, serving in that role until his resignation in December 2024.



The Teschemaker Cup is awarded annually and recognises "an outstanding old boy who has achieved national or international prominence in the area of sport, cultural activities, business or public affairs".

HONOURED BY THE KING

Just one Old Boy has been identified in the 2024 King's Birthday Honours and none in the 2025 New Year Honours (although the editor would welcome information on any who might have been overlooked). The citation for THSOBA Auckland Vice-President **Noel L. Davies (1961-1962)**, who was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) for services to engineering, business, and the community in the King's Birthday Honours, is as follows (he was invested with his insignia by the Governor-General in Auckland on 24 September 2024).

Mr Noel Davies joined the New Zealand Heavy Engineering Research Association (HERA) Executive Board in 1992, becoming the first non-engineer Chair of the organisation in 2003, stepping down in 2023. Mr Davies was appointed as a voluntary Board member of the New Zealand Engineering Federation in 1986, where his work elevated the profile of New Zealand manufacturing companies,



providing a voice with industry and stakeholders including government. Through HERA, he led cross-sector industry initiatives and was instrumental in HERA developing a research and development-related industry advocacy role. From 2006 he was a Trustee and Chair of the HERA Foundation, providing industry scholarships and establishing an industry member recognition awards programme. He was a category winner of the Ernst Young Entrepreneur of the Year and has chaired a significant number of different enterprises. He was a Trustee for 15 years of the Auckland Medical Research Foundation and chaired the Development and Communications Committee. He is a Life Member and past Chair of Baseball New Zealand and has chaired Tuatara Baseball and Tuatara Basketball. He held offices with The Navy Club Association and HMNZS Otago Association. Mr Davies has mentored younger business leaders and entrepreneurs through the Young Presidents and Entrepreneurs Organisations.

There is much that the citation does not mention. Noel served for 21 years in the Royal New Zealand Navy, retiring in 1985 in the rank of lieutenant commander. He is currently involved with several trusts involved in eradicating noxious weeds, pests and vermin, plus planting native trees and building tracks through reserve land in the Waipu/Langs Beach areas. He has been a director of the Hydraulink hydraulic hose and fittings businesses in New Zealand and Australia since 1989. Hydraulink has grown to where the business now has more than 400 service points in the two countries, complemented by a fleet of 24/7 mobile service vehicles servicing almost all types of industries, and on-site service facilities servicing primarily the mining, oil, and gas industries.

ANOTHER FIVE-GENERATION LINK



As far as is known, only three families (the McKeowns, the Grants and the Talbots) have had five generations in a direct male line attend Timaru High School/Timaru Boys' High School since its foundation in 1880.

Other students have had their great-great-grandfather attend the School, but the family link is through a maternal line or with a missed generation. Such families are known to include the Bells, the Howells, the Selbies and the Shaws. Recent research adds the **Steven family** to this group.

George Steven was born in Ayrshire in 1852 and emigrated to New Zealand with his family in 1864, settling in South Otago. Although George had no formal teacher training, he became a teacher and taught successfully in several schools, including Balclutha. In January 1881 he was appointed from nine applicants as a junior teacher at Timaru High School, at an annual salary of 100 pounds. By January 1886 his salary had increased to 224 pounds per annum. However, in November 1886, the

Timaru High School Board resolved that one member of the staff be dispensed with, so that a proposed increase of fees could be minimised. George Steven's employment was thus terminated. He continued teaching in country schools until turning to a farming career, winning a balloted block when the Rosewill settlement was sub-divided in 1904. He died suddenly in Timaru in 1922.

George Steven had three sons. Eldest son James died of wounds in the First World War in 1917. His brother John P. Steven (1896-1958, TBHS 1911-1913) was dux, prefect, and a member of the cricket First XI and of the famous 1913 First XV. After service in WW1, he completed BA and LLB degrees and had a successful career as a barrister and solicitor in Timaru.

Youngest son G.H.M. (Hector) Steven (1900-1970) won a scholarship to Timaru Boys' High School but did not take it up. His labour was needed on the family farm when his brothers were at the war, so he completed his secondary education at Pleasant Point District High school. But Hector Steven contributed to TBHS in another capacity. He served as the Levels County representative on the Timaru High School Board from 1948 to 1957, being closely involved with the development of School Park in Quarry Road.

The third generation is represented by Hector Steven's two sons. J.A. (Jim) Steven (1932-2017, TBHS 1945-1948) farmed at Fairview, while John H. Steven (1935-, TBHS 1949-1952) took over the family farm at Rosewill until retirement nearer Timaru.

Another family connection is that Jim Steven's wife, Mrs Kathleen M. Steven (née Borrie), was a sub-matron in Thomas House for several years in the early 1950s. Mrs Steven died in 2021. Jim Steven's sons continued the family link. George J. Steven (TBHS 1978-1982) farms at Fairview, while David W. Steven (TBHS 1984-1988) completed MB ChB degrees at the University of Otago and has for some years practised as an ophthalmologist in Cape Town, South Africa.

The fifth generation of TBHS Old Boys is represented by George J. Steven's three sons (Peter J., 2010-2013; William I., 2013-2016; Timothy G., 2015-2016), and by John Steven's grandson James M.J. Steven (2012-2016).

In 2030 the School will celebrate its 150th jubilee. Will there be a sixth-generation student in the School? Or is he already there? With acknowledgement to John H. Steven (1949-1952).

UPDATING THE DYNASTY

The 2023 *Timaruvian* included an article (page 134) featuring the **McKeown family** dynasty at TBHS. It noted the probable record of Robert J McKeown (1894-) as having the largest number (17) of male line descendants to have attended the School.

But the article was out of date before it went to print. In 2023, Reuben J McKeown moved from Geraldine High School to TBHS to become the 18th descendant. His father is Mayfield farmer Kevin J. McKeown (1977-1981). Reuben joins his third cousin Dion J. McKeown ((2015-2019) as a direct fifth-generation student. Both are great-grandsons of Robert J. McKeown, but from different branches of the family. Both have fathers, grandfathers, and great-grandfathers who are Old Boys.

Reuben McKeown is a talented young sportsman, having already represented TBHS in the national secondary school cross country championships. He is also captain of the cricket Second XI, and a member of both the cricket First XI and the football Second XI.

MEMORIAL LIBRARY 100 YEARS OLD

The Timaru Herald for 21 March 1924 carried a detailed report of the official opening of the Memorial Library by the Governor-General, Viscount Jellicoe, the previous day (it can be found on the Papers Past website at https://paperspast.natlib.govt.nz/newspapers/THD19240321.2.11 and the following article is summarised from it. The format of the ceremony and the sentiments expressed in the speeches are products of their time but it must have been a moving occasion for those who had lost sons, brothers, or friends in the Great War (as the First World War was still known), which had ended less than six years previously.

On arriving at the School, Lord Jellicoe (in the uniform of an Admiral of the Fleet) reviewed he School Cadet Corps (under the command of Lieutenant C.A.S. Hind MC) and was then greeted by Rector William Thomas, Mr William C. Raymond (chairman of the Memorial Committee), and Mr J. Bitchener MP (chairman of the Board of Governors). Once the official party had joined other guests – who included Mr F.J. Rolleston MP, Mr G.J. Wallace (Mayor of Timaru), Mr F. Milner (Rector of Waitaki BHS 1906-1944), and former TBHS Rector Mr G.A. Simmers (one of his six Old Boy sons, William W. Simmers, TBHS 1906-1911, had been killed in action in Belgium) – on a dais, proceedings began with a moment's silence, the singing of Kipling's Recessional ("God of our fathers, known of old", with its refrain of "Lest we forget – lest we forget", accompanied by the School's brass band), a Bible reading and a prayer (led by Old Boy the Rev. S. Parr MC). Mr Raymond made a speech listing apologies, welcoming His Excellency, and outlining the genesis of the library.

Lord Jellicoe, "who was received with cheers", said "This memorial cannot fail to impress the rising generation with the duty that they owe to their country and to the Empire of which we are all so proud to belong. It will remind them of the great ideal of the protection of the weak and the sacredness of treaties. ... Such memorials as the beautiful one I am opening this afternoon give

boys pride in their school and help them to remember the great deeds of their brothers who fought. ... [It] is not necessary to wait for war to come for boys to show the qualities of patriotism and self sacrifice. If you will carry out the ideals of unselfishness and patriotism you will not only be happy yourselves but will make others happy also." He then declared the Memorial Library open: "This Hall," said his Excellency, speaking in a clear, firm voice, which could be heard at the farthest ends of the grounds, "is erected in memory of old boys of the Timaru Boys' High School who laid down their lives in the Great War (1914-18), and is, this 20th day of March, 1924, committed by those who raised it to the keeping of the School in the sure and certain faith that as long as its stones endure it will be an object of reverence and inspiration to future generations."

The Last Post was sounded — "The crowd stood with heads reverently bared. Here and there a woman sobbed." The Reveille followed, there was a minute's silence, then the hymn O God our help in ages past was sung and Mr Thomas read the names of those listed on the roll of honour. Mr Raymond formally handed over the Memorial Library to the School and Mr Bitchener spoke briefly in reply. Mr Thomas gave an address, mentioning in particular his predecessor, Mr Simmers, whose eldest son was named on the roll of honour and who had known almost all of the other Old Boys listed there. Mr Parr gave a concluding speech, the National Anthem (i.e. God Save the King) was sung, and the library was opened for inspection by the public.


"After the ceremony His Excellency was entertained at afternoon tea at the Rector's House; officials who sat on the platform and parents of the fallen also had afternoon tea at the Rectory, and the old boys and their friends were similarly entertained at the Preparatory School."

THE ARMOURY

At the time writing, the fate of the old Armoury building on the western fringe of the Rectory field was under consideration. It dates back to the move of TBHS from Cain Street to North Street in 1913 but is dilapidated and has been on the demolition list for some years. The rifles used by the School cadets have long gone military exercises and Barracks Week finished in the 1970s – but remnants of the firing range can still be seen behind the Armoury. There remains inside the building a rich history of boys recording their names on the ceiling and walls. Several hundred names can be deciphered - some dating back to early 1910s - and a preservation project to retain this slice of history has been proposed.

THE CHAPLAIN'S CROSS – AND THE MORIORI

Among the many and varied items of memorabilia in the archives of the Memorial Library, the Chaplain's Cross is perhaps the most special.

The Chaplain's Cross is a small brass cross which is placed in front of the Memorial Window for the Anzac service each year. It was presented to the School in 1992 by the Rev. Canon H. Ivor (Hoppy) Hopkins OBE (1921-1926), who had been guest speaker at the Anzac service that year. Hoppy's link to the School continues, with his great-grandson, Jack Taite (2023-), as a current student.

Canon Hopkins, who died in 2003 aged 94 years, spent his life in the Anglican ministry in a variety of roles. As well as many years as a vicar, he served also as an army chaplain and prison chaplain. At the end of the campaign in Crete in 1941, he chose to stay with the wounded who could not be evacuated and remained a prisoner for the remaining four years of the Second World War. The brass cross accompanied him throughout those years.

Among recent visitors to the Memorial Library was Canon Hopkins' daughter, Ms Judith Taite, now a resident of Temuka (where her father was once vicar). She had a particular story about the cross from the Pow-Wow magazine (published by the New Zealand Ex-Prisoner of War Association), which she wished to pass on. It noted that "the base could serve as a hammer to crush the concrete-hard sugar lumps which came to the POW camps in some of the Red Cross parcels. They were so hard that they dented the metal." Sure enough, the underside of the base still shows clear evidence of such usage.

Ms Taite was accompanied on her visit by Charles Solomon-Rehe, and another interesting link was revealed. Charles is a grandson of Tommy Solomon, the last full-blooded Moriori, who died in the Chatham Islands in 1933. Canon Hopkins had been vicar of the Chatham Islands for four years. Both Canon Hopkins and Charles Solomon appear in a 1986 film recording the unveiling of a statue of Tommy Solomon on the south-east coast of Chatham Island. Charles Solomon-Rehe is not a TBHS Old Boy, but his son Tane H.T. Solomon attended in 1997, and grandson Marshall Solomon (2021-) is a current pupil.

Question: Has TBHS had any other students of Moriori heritage?

MEDALS PRESENTED TO SCHOOL

The 2019 Timaruvian included an obituary for George F. Risk (1941-2019, TBHS 1955-1959), a Thomas House and School prefect and dux in 1959. Having graduated with BSc(Hons) degrees from both the University of Canterbury and Victoria University of Wellington, he had a notable career with the Geophysical Survey of DSIR. He specialised in using electrical resistivity surveying techniques to investigate geological problems and his work on groundwater and geothermal investigations has been of significance in the development of technology for geothermal power production and other industrial uses. In 1999, George was awarded a prestigious honour, the New Zealand Science and Technology Bronze Medal, by the Royal Society of New Zealand, "for his exceptional contribution to New Zealand through his science", and that, together with his TBHS dux medal, was presented to the School by his sister, Mrs Helen Henderson, at a ceremony in the Memorial Library in June 2024. Also present was Bruce Leadley, a staff member

when George was at TBHS, who recalled him as a quiet and modest farm boy who adapted well to Thomas House life and whose extremely sharp mind and bent towards perfectionism meant that it came as no surprise to anyone at Timaru Boys' that he went on to have such a distinguished career in the world of scientific research.

Hugh Brown in recent times

MEMORIES OF TBHS 1958-1961

Hugh P. Brown (1958-1961, staff 1st term 1968) now lives in Bali after an international career as a transport economist. After TBHS he completed a BE degree at the University of Canterbury and a PhD degree at the University of Melbourne.

After growing up on a farm near Arrowtown, Hugh came to TBHS as a boarder in 1958. He was in Thomas House for his third form and part of his fourth form year and then became a day boy, after his parents had moved to a new farm at Rosewill – eventually commuting on a 50cc scooter and later a Royal Enfield 350cc Silver Bullet motorbike. He participated fully in all aspects of School life – rugby, soccer, athletics, boxing, gymnastics, swimming, singing, cadets, essay competitions (he won four in his five years at school) – and was a prefect and head of Dawson House in his final year.

He has been writing a personal memoir for family purposes (with the title *A Letter to My Great-grandchildren: A Life on the Move)* and has kindly supplied the chapter concerning his TBHS years. We hope his full memoirs, when completed, will be added to the Old Boy publications in the Memorial Library archives. Unfortunately, the length of the chapter means that it cannot be reproduced in full here, but a couple of edited extracts follow to give the flavour of the memoirs and the era. The precision of his description of the layout and geography of both the School and Thomas House, Hugh's accounts of the daily and weekly routines within the institution, his perceptive pen portraits of teachers and other staff, and his remembrances of his fellow pupils all provide a very special record of Thomas House and TBHS in his time.

Thomas House

Mum and Dad and I drove up to Timaru a few days before I would start at Thomas House, and stayed at the Ashbury Motor Lodge, where we had stayed previously. The day came, and off I went in my suit and silver and blue tie, brand new dark blue cap with two white circles on the top, polished black shoes, my very first pair!

There must have been some sort of induction programme for the 50 or so new boarders, to meet us and parents at the front of Thomas House and take us to wherever our starting point would be, to our assigned dormitories, show us our lockers in the heaving locker room filled with excited returning and quaking new students, and generally steer us through, but I have no memory now of what it might have been.

We parked somewhere near the entry to Thomas House, to our right as we looked north with the Lovelock Oak in front of us, and the main playing fields to the left. Further on to the right was the Dining Room and, beyond the Dining Room, the locker rooms and main dormitory block, in front of a double tennis court.

To the left, between the tennis courts and the playing fields, was a single storey prefabricated timber building which was the Third Form Dormitory Block, my first destination and now temporary "home".

There were four separate dormitory rooms in this block, each with three rows of three beds, and a row of lockers at the "central" end of the room, beside the entry doors to a central foyer. A small room off the foyer between dormitories was the bedroom and study for the Head Prefect, who also had the task of "looking after" us all.

I do remember the shock of finding my dormitory and locating my bed. I was in the second dorm to the right, at the very front of the middle row of three beds, about two feet from my neighbours on either side. As I was to learn, each dorm had a dorm "head", usually a 5th or 6th form student, to look after the kids in the dorm and provide counsel and support where needed. They also presided over the 6.30 a.m. "wake-up", to make sure that the group was organised, dressed, beds made and clothes put away, and on time for the morning roll call and run at 07:00. Showers (always with cold water) came after the morning run. "Lights-out" was at 10:00 pm, and dorms were not open until 8.00 p.m. There was going to be little opportunity to lie on my bed and read a book!

The Head of my dorm was "The Whale" Waymouth, a huge 6th form boy from Dunedin. Next to him on the back row was Euan "Bodgie" Bell, who was in the 3rd form but had been at TH in the Preparatory (Primary) School for 2 years. He was a great athlete, and quite a good boxer — quite a nice guy but quite an intimidating presence. Peter Ashcroft, from Wellington. Neil Scott from Geraldine, father at school with my mother. David "Digs" Gardiner from somewhere in Mid-Canterbury. Gus Jones, from Lake Coleridge in the mountains of Mid-Canterbury at the head of the Rakaia River. David McInnes from Waimate, in the bed on my right — nice guy, great sportsman, excellent singer, would be Head Prefect at TH in our last year. Philip Campbell, from Cromwell, on my left.

The Start of it All: 3rd Form and Classes



I started off on my first day, Tuesday 28 January 1958 in Room 1, the first room on the left of the side entry to the Hall, with the Maths teacher Mrs Dromgoole in charge, as what would be the Form Master for Class 3A1. There were around 30 of us, nervous little third-formers, many alone, quite a few in school or friendship groups. We had single square wooden tables, some with a lid that opened, some more heavily carved than others, and noisy scraping wooden chairs. I struck up an early conversation with a boy beside me, and we chatted as permitted through the day. This was Don Lucy, and he became and has remained one of my closest friends, during high school, university and more than 30 years living at the same time in Jakarta and Bali!

There must have been nearly 200 boys in 3rd Form, and I don't remember how we were allocated to classes for the first two weeks or so of school. However, allocated we were, and on the second or third day there was some sort of aptitude/intelligence test applied, and early in the second week, we were

re-allocated to what were to be our final classes for the year.

I found myself in the A1 stream and would remain there through fifth-form and School Certificate, with the main subjects English, French, Latin, Social Studies, Science, Maths and Physical Education. We would also have classes in either Woodwork or Metalwork for a term, and in Art and Music for a term, as an exposure to non-standard subjects.

The first experience of subject-based classes was wonderful – after primary school, when you were never sure whether you were studying social studies or spelling, the structure of classes provided a certainty that hugely facilitated and encouraged learning. This was also supported by the variety of subjects and study locations. We had two Phys Ed classes a week, held in the gymnasium and/or the athletics field; at various times we also had Trades classes; and for a short time, Art and Music Classes. Plus on Wednesdays, we had Cadets in the afternoon, and on two afternoons a week after classes, there was sports training – cricket, rugby, soccer. By contrast with primary school, high school was just so much better.

Mrs Dromgoole was our Maths Teacher and Form Mistress. She was an energetic little lady with very grey hair and prominent front teeth, originally English and an MA from Cambridge. She had quite a few bright students in her class, which was just as well, because I think she found some of the rest of us fairly hard work. Our English Teacher was Alan Miles, who would later become our French teacher, a very friendly and concerned teacher who had been at the school for many years. Not as many as "Buster" Moore, who took us for French in 3rd Form, and was a one-time pupil and one of the longest serving teachers. Despite being fairly old and quite chubby, he also coached soccer — son Chris was in 4th Form, and a good soccer player, just as well! Our Science teacher "Chimp" Murray had also been a pupil, and was Deputy Rector, and son David was in 6th Form. His brother Craig was a farmer, only about 2 miles up the road from us. Chimp (I don't remember his proper name!; it was Lin, Ed.) was a delightful man. The Social Studies teacher was "Wuzzie" Wilson, who also taught Geography in 6th Form, an excellent teacher with what seemed to have an encyclopaedic knowledge of the geological history of New Zealand. The school Chess Club was allowed to use his room, Room 8, up the stairs at the back of the hall, for lunch time chess games, and it was a great place to eat one's sandwiches. Because the school did not have a Latin Teacher in 1958, the 3A1 class was given an additional Maths class, taught by Mr Neale, who would later be our Physics teacher.

I won't list all the classes and teachers we had over my five years, but, with very few exceptions, they were excellent, and we really did benefit greatly from this educational start.

HOGBEN AND HAAST CONNECTIONS AT THS/TBHS

Haast Pass, the Haast River, two Mt Haasts, and the extinct Haast's eagle are all named after Sir Julius von Haast KCMG FRS (1822-1887), the Prussian-born explorer, geologist, and founder of the Canterbury Museum. He has some indirect connections with TBHS. Haast's second wife (married 1863) was Mary Ann Dobson (1844-1913), a daughter of the Canterbury Provincial Engineer Edward Dobson (1816-1908). Dobson's youngest daughter Emily Frances (1857-1943) had in 1885 married George Hogben (1853-1920, Rector of Timaru High School 1889-1897 and of TBHS 1898-1899) and their second son, Julius McLachlan Hogben, was named Julius after his maternal uncle-by-marriage, who had died only six weeks before the child was born.

The name J.M. Hogben appears on the First World War roll of honour in the Memorial Library, but that is an error: the Hogben son killed at Gallipoli was mining surveyor George McLachlan Hogben (1886-1915), who was enrolled at the Timaru High School



in 1897 and at Wellington College from 1898 (the year before his parents moved north) to 1902.

Julius Hogben was at THS/TBHS 1897-1899 and at Wellington College 1899-1904. He studied law at Victoria University College and was admitted as a barrister and solicitor in 1911, although he did not graduate LLB until 1922. He practised in Thames and then in Auckland, where he was prominent in musical circles as founder of the Auckland Festival Society and its president 1948-1964. He was appointed OBE in 1961 for services to the arts and music and died in 1973. The 2014 *Timaruvian* included an article on his son, Rhodes Scholar George Lawrence Hogben DSC (1916-2015), whose only son is another Julius Hogben.

Sir Julius von Haast had a son born in Germany in 1848 by his first wife; she died in 1859 while Haast was in New Zealand and the boy was raised by her family. With Mary Dobson, he had five further sons and a daughter. The youngest son, Julius Hermann von Haast, was born in 1873. Known as Hermann, he attended

Christ's College 1883-1887 and Timaru High School 1890-1891 (it is not clear where he was in 1887 and 1888 – Christchurch BHS has been ruled out); it is probable that he boarded with his aunt and uncle in Timaru. He died in Wanganui (now Whanganui) in 1941, survived by his wife Margaret Muriel (1877-1945, née Gudgeon, married 1902); there were no children. They had farmed in Canada for some time and also lived in Burma, where Hermann was in charge of a river dredge, before settling in about 1920 in Wanganui, where he was in business as a shipping agent for many years before becoming a commission agent. He was a notable lover and connoisseur of art, serving as secretary of the Sarjeant Gallery Advisory Committee and the Wanganui Arts and Crafts Society.

A RURAL CHAMPION



The Otago Daily Times sponsors a Rural Champions award, recognising people for "making a positive contribution to both farming and community throughout the South Island", although with an emphasis on Otago and Southland. The 40 or so nominations in 2024 included not only farmers but an orchardist, a meat plan manager, a veterinarian, a technical field officer, an apiarist, and others, including Old Boy W.J. (Jimmy) Johnstone (1974-1978), an accountant in Balclutha. In October, Jimmy was selected by the judging panel as one of the three finalists in the rural services providers category (there were five finalists in the farmer-grower category).

After TBHS (where he was an athlete, tennis player, and prefect) and BAgCom study at Lincoln, Jimmy's first job was as a Wrightson NMA stock agent in Clinton. He later switched to studying accounting at the University of Otago and spent three years in a large Dunedin accounting practice and seven years in the

rural sector, principally in rural finance. In 1991, he joined Balclutha firm Shand Thomson and became a partner in 1999.

Jimmy's nomination said that he was widely recognised for his work in the agri-sector, as a pioneer and leader in key performance measurement, benchmarking, and improvement metrics for farming businesses, and for his wise and practical approach to farm succession solutions and that he was highly respected by his clients, professionals, and the communities in which he worked.

He served on the Institute of Chartered Accountant's primary sector committee for five years and the Institute (now Chartered Accountants Australia and New Zealand) recognised his community and professional contributions by awarding him fellowship status in 2006.

Jimmy has a record of assisting community-owned organisations to successfully take over and maintain the provision of health services to rural communities. He was the inaugural chairman of Sport Clutha and served on the Rosebank Primary School board of trustees. One of his most satisfying projects had been the development of the museum in Owaka, recognised as one of the best small museums in New Zealand, and, more recently, he was involved in an advisory capacity with the development of the Clutha District War Memorial and Community Centre (opened in August 2023).

ANOTHER INTERNATIONAL CAREER

Although we endeavour to keep up with interesting Old Boy careers around the world, many are inevitably unknown to us. So "Gone – No Address" is a relatively common label on the database.

One who has been so labelled for over 50 years is **John S. Ryan (1952-1957)**. But John is no longer "GNA". He lives at Coatesville, north of Auckland. Prompted by a dinner attended by C.J. (Chris) Hogg (1974-1978) and James R. Meager MP (2001-2005), John

decided to write to the Old Boys' Registrar. The correspondence revealed an interesting international



John Ryan was born while his parents lived abroad and came to New Zealand when his mother returned early in the Second World War. His father was a war casualty, shot down over Denmark while serving with the Canadian Air Force. His mother settled in Wellington, and John boarded at Wellesley College for most of his primary schooling. Family links saw John enrolled at TBHS in 1952. He boarded privately until entering Thomas House in 1955.

John started a law degree at Canterbury University, but after two years left for San Francisco to undertake a course in creative writing. Then followed time in London, before returning to Christchurch to complete his law degree. He worked first in the Public Trust Office before moving to Simpson Grierson where he became

a partner. He moved to open their London office in 1979, before setting up his own practice in Lincoln's Inn Fields. Growth in commercial law and banking saw the practice grow and merge with a large London City firm.

While in practice, John established or bought companies in London and New Zealand and later retired from law to concentrate on business. The businesses were in the food, supplements and pharmaceutical raw material industries. The last of the United Kingdom interests was sold in the 1990s and the New Zealand manufacturing business in 2000. John and his wife Avril settled back permanently in New Zealand that year, but he retained one of his business interests and continues to be actively involved.

While at school, John had unremarkable sporting interests in hockey and rugby and coached junior rugby. But he had some interesting competition later in life. While in San Francisco in the early 1960s, he played two seasons of rugby with the Olympic Club. While in London, he played for the London New Zealand Cricket Club. This included travel to Nice to play the Monte Carlo Cricket Club. Included in the same team was TBHS contemporary the late Graeme J. Pateman (1956-1960).

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PORTRAIT PAINTER



Although his entry was not placed, Dunedin painter Dr Brian G. Stewart (1966-1970, staff 1984-1990) was "gobsmacked" that a portrait of his granddaughter Shelby Sutherland was selected as one of the 37 finalists (from 451 entries overall) for New Zealand's most prestigious portrait award, the biennial Adams Portraiture Awards (results were announced in May 2024).

Having painted only five portraits in the past, Brian had "never dreamed" his work Maid of the Mist would make the finals but entered on the urging of his partner Carmen. A retired marine biologist, Brian is a self-taught artist. He painted the work from a photograph he took on a grandfather-

granddaughter trip to Milford Sound visiting Stirling Falls: "I could see her trying to drink in the grandeur of the place and attempted to capture that look on canvas."

Brian's usual subject matter varies widely from colourful geometric abstracts to more mundane scenes, usually with an emphasis on realism. He often drew on inspiration from visiting Antarctica as part of his old job. "I tend to avoid traditional landscapes, preferring works with perhaps a hidden meaning or that might make people think or do a double take." His work has evolved in the 20 years since he picked it back up again as his confidence has grown. "I don't do as many abstracts now as I used to. I find I have been willing to tackle much more complicated subject matter over the past few years."

He paints in a small upstairs room in his 127-year-old home at least three days a week when not distracted by house renovations or "tinkering" with his sports car: "I find painting quite therapeutic, and selling a work is always very gratifying."

MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN SOUTH DUNEDIN

Old Boy Liam F. Arthur (2012-2016) and his partner Jackie Bannon have developed a pioneering Dunedin eatery to provide healthy meals to the community at a minimal cost and have now gained global recognition and a financial boost. The Bowling Club (customers bring a bowl) offers meals for as little as \$4. Their unique model encourages those able to pay to cover the cost of their meal and someone else's. They are serving up to 900 meals a night and also deliver hundreds of frozen meals each week to those in need. The Bowling Club, which began as a food truck before opening at its premises in South Road, Caversham, in February 2023, was announced as one of four New Zealand businesses to win \$20,000 from the Xero Beautiful Business

Fund in October 2024. The eatery was also recognised as a global winner and will receive an additional \$50,000 – bringing its total to \$70,000. "Anyone can come here and afford to have a meal and a chat", said Liam, "we want to develop a real sense of belonging". The international award will enable the socially-conscious pair and their 14-strong team to continue to deliver quality inexpensive food at their South Dunedin eatery.



THERE AND BACK AGAIN

There and Back Again is the subtitle of J.R.R. Tolkein's The Hobbit and an apt description of the career of K. Nils Macfarlane (1998-2002) who has provided this account of his life since leaving school

After leaving TBHS, I went to Christchurch to pursue a career in teaching. At this time this was through the College of Education, and I lived in the halls of residence called Sonoda Campus. I was still in the first few weeks of courses when we went to a school

for orientation. It was here that I realised although I liked teaching for one hour I didn't think that I would have the enthusiasm to do it every day, five days per week. Luckily the Christchurch College of Education also offered a School of Business programme so I quickly changed my courses and completed a Diploma in Business, and a Diploma in Human Resource Management (2004). While I was completing these qualifications, one of the subjects I really enjoyed was the commercial law paper and so I decided to continue with further education and complete a law degree. I was lucky enough that throughout my tertiary education I had my accommodation and food provided by being a resident advisor at both Sonoda Campus and College House. This role also gave me the opportunity to travel to Japan on an exchange to the Sonoda University in Osaka.

My decision to become a lawyer was largely based on the course that I had done at the College of Education and my tutor there. However, after the first year at the University of Canterbury I questioned whether it was something that I really did want. Although I had my doubts, I decided to persevere with law as it was very hard to get into the second year and didn't want to waste the opportunity that I had been given. I graduated with my law degree (2009) and thought that since I had the degree I might as well take the final step and complete the final qualification (New Zealand's equivalent of sitting the bar exam in the US) to become an enrolled barrister and solicitor of the High Court of New Zealand. My admission was moved by my tutor from the College of Education who had sparked my interest in law all those years earlier.

After always pushing ahead to do law but knowing it wasn't what I was fully invested in and that my biggest passion was film, I decided I would not go into practice and instead remain a student and go to Wellington to study film through the New Zealand Television and Film School. This year-long course was amazing and allowed me to make a short film and have a screening in a theatre which was a great experience. After this course I was ready to make my own films but needed money to do this. I decided to become an assistant language teacher through the JET (Japan Exchange and Teaching) programme and returned to Osaka to save money to return to New Zealand to make films. This was an amazing experience where I went around three or four schools each week and talked to the students about New Zealand and tried to teach basic English. I meet some wonderful people from all around the world in my time at JET and have been fortunate enough to have remained in contact, visiting their countries and showing them around New Zealand when they have visited here. Unfortunately my time in Osaka finished abruptly with the 2011 earthquake when I decided to return home.

Without a job to return to, I was lucky enough to use this time to go on a real film set as an extra in Peter Jackson's *The Hobbit*. This was a great experience and fulfilled my desire to make films. After this experience I decided that I would return to law and became an immigration adviser in Christchurch. I did this for four years and then opened a branch in Timaru so I could be back here to raise my daughter. I continued doing immigration work for another four years and then a few other jobs until in March 2024 I was appointed the general manager of Multicultural Aoraki (founded in 2004 as the Aoraki Migrant Centre to provide support, advice, and advocacy to local multicultural and newcomer communities). I love welcoming people to Timaru and making them feel at home in our community. It has been challenging to find funding in such an uncertain climate but I am proud of our team and the work that we do, celebrating and supporting all cultures and everyone who moves to Timaru.

OLD BOYS HERE AND THERE



Physiotherapist **G.A.** (**Geoff) Anderson** (**staff 1982 and 1985**), son of Arnold T. Anderson (1912-1996, TBHS 1925-1930, staff 1938-1939), was one of the Phantom Riders, a group of Dunedin-based cyclists, who biked 2700km from Cape Reinga to Bluff between 2 and 23 March 2024. Their trip was in memory of a fellow cyclist, who suffered a fatal injury in 2023 when he came off his bike in gravel, and raised money for the Otago Southland Rescue Helicopter Service.

Bruce A. Lund (1952-1956) also took part in a fundraising cycling trip. He was a first-time entrant amongst 113 cyclists taking part in the three-day 385km Central South Island Bike Ride in February 2024 (Timaru-Tekapo-Kurow-Timaru). He was 85 at the time. "I could cark it quite easily, but that's all right," Bruce said with a laugh after completing his final training ride (he survived and completed the course). "I like to have a bit of a challenge in life sometimes, and so the charity bike ride was recommended. I'm glad I came along, and they are a wonderful group of people." At his age, tackling the ride was "a bit debatable whether it's very sensible or not", he said. But he hoped it might spur him to other achievements.





Bruce Lund's son, Dunedin property developer **Russell V. Lund (1977-1979)** has converted an 1873 warehouse building behind the Dunedin Railway Station into an upmarket apartment block. Unusually, it includes 30 'five-star' social housing units for housing people in desperate need of accommodation. The project, completed in May 2024, was a partnership between Russell and the Salvation Army which is funded by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development to select and support the tenants.

A 12-year project came to fruition in July 2024 when a 700-page book on the history of the Makikihi, Otaio, Hunter, and Hook districts by **Bill T. Washington (1950-1952)** was published. It covers the sweep of history from early Māori history in the area, to

the arrival of settlers from Britain, the economic depression of the late 1800s, the break-up of the big estates, and the rise and decline of Makikihi as a commercial and community hub. Bill's parents took up the Makikihi general store in 1935 and his book provides an in-depth view of what it was like to live in a small close-knit rural community from then through to the 1960s before immense social, economic and technological changes kicked in. After leaving TBHS, Bill worked at the family store until his parents sold up in 1956. He went on to become the founder and owner of drilling company Washingtons Exploration, based at Washdyke.





Adrian A. Mann (2002-2007), who owns and operates the Alexander Pianos instrument repair business, moved premises in August from central Dunedin to a new workshop in Mosgiel. He took with him one of the world's longest pianos, a 5.7m-long, 1.2-tonne instrument he built more than 10 years ago. He has been commissioned to make two more pianos of the same size by a client in Switzerland: "I've been wanting to make one for ages and in my mind there has been all these changes and developments that I wanted to incorporate into the next one." The unique unwound bass strings would remain a part of the design for the new pianos.

W.K. (Ricky) Cheng (1993-1997) studied at Victoria University (Bachelor of Building Science 2002) and then spent about 20 years in Hong Kong, where he had a career focusing on 3D animation games ("Even creating things like slot games for mobile phones."). In a major career change, he has returned to Timaru and in April 2024 he and his wife Vani Yu (a Hong King native with a background in business development for international fashion and jewellery brands who has also worked as a travel and food columnist) opened Canjoy Cantonese Cuisine at the corner of George and Stafford Streets. The premises were occupied in the 1990s by Cheng's Chinese Restaurant, a business established by Ricky's uncle Victor. Ricky's father Chris brought his family to New Zealand in 1992 and later took over the restaurant and ran it for more than a decade – Ricky worked there as a boy, washing dishes and waiting on tables.






Guy C. McDonald (2012-2016) had an early passion for New Zealand wildlife, volunteering at Forest and Bird while still at primary school. After TBHS he went on a year-long trainee ranger course, based in Nelson but with a four-month summer placement — paid work with the Department of Conservation — which he spent on the Chatham Islands. He features, as project lead of the Southern New Zealand Dotterel Recovery Team, based on Stewart Island, in a short documentary *Underbirds*, released in late March 2024, about work to save the critically endangered Southern New Zealand Dotterel from extinction.

In an issue of the *New Zealand Listener* in November 2024, there was lengthy review of the latest novel (his sixth) by **R. Carl Shuker (1988-1992)**. The chief character in *The Royal Free*, published by Victoria University Press, is a copy editor for the fictitious *Royal London Journal of Medicine*, and Carl has been able to draw from his own experience as a former editor at the *British Medical Journal*. The review concludes favourably: "Shuker in top form".





In the same issue of the *Listener*, there was another positive review for an Old Boy author – **Owen M. Jones** (1955-1959), more widely known as Owen Marshall. His latest collection of short stories, *New Stories*, published by Penguin, continues what the reviewer calls his "masterclass in the art of the short story", maintained since his first story was published in the *Listener* in 1977.



Yet another Old Boy author had a book published in 2024 – posthumously. It was a reprint of *An Island to Oneself* by **T.F. (Tom) Neale (1902-1977, TBHS 1919-1920)**. Tom led an adventurous life in the Royal New Zealand Navy and in a variety of jobs in Tahiti and the Cook Islands. He spent a total of 16 years (in three sessions) between 1952 and 1977 living alone on an island in the Suwarrow atoll. His account of his first two periods there was first published in 1966 and became a best-seller.

An obituary for **John W. Elder (1933-2022, TBHS 1946-1950)** was published in the 2022 *Timaruvian*. A prefect and dux at TBHS, he topped the New Zealand Junior University Scholarship list for 1950 and went on to study at Canterbury University College and the University of Cambridge and to a distinguished career as a geophysicist. He was also a novelist, artist, and musician. John was posthumously inducted into the Timaru District Hall of Fame in November 2024.





Ross Campbell (1955-1958) was a Thomas House and School prefect and a member of the First XV at TBHS. He had three brothers who were also at TBHS: Peter (1950-1954), Fraser (1956-1959), and the late Ian (1951-1953). Ross spent many years in Ghana as a Baptist missionary with WEC (Worldwide Evangelization for Christ). He and his Australian wife Avrille arrived separately in Ghana in 1969. They met there and married in 1971. In 1974 they became the founding national directors of the Ghana Evangelism Committee which in subsequent years achieved remarkable success in planting churches in unchurched areas and amongst previously unreached tribal groups. After returning to New Zealand, and based in Christchurch, they have worked successively with the AD

2000 Movement (1994 to 2000), the Movement for African National Initiatives (MANI, 2001 to 2006), and, since 2009, the Ghana Evangelism Committee. Ross writes "Currently we are excited to be working with former staff and mentoring a new generation of leaders who have a vision to reach *their* generation." Ross and his wife now live in Rolleston.

Last year's *Timaruvian* reported that Ashburton-based **James R. Meager (2001-2005)** (Ngāi Tahu) had been elected to Parliament for the Rangitata electorate in the 2023 general election, becoming the School's tenth MP. In the January 2025 Cabinet reshuffle, despite being in only his first term as an MP, he was appointed a Minister outside Cabinet as the Minister for Youth, Minister for Hunting and Fishing, Minister for the South Island, and an Associate Minister of Transport. He is the fourth Old Boy in the School's history to become a Minister of the Crown.



LINK WITH LOVELOCK REDISCOVERED

In August 2024, it was reported that a 91-year-old athletics trophy had been found in Dunedin. The inscription on the cup — Presented to the Otago University Athletic Club by the Oxford University Athletic Club to commemorate the World's One Mile Record of 4min 7.6sec set up on July 15 by J.E. Lovelock — President of the Oxford University Athletic Club and previously captain of Otago University Athletic Club — refers to the mile record set by John E. (Jack) Lovelock (1910-1949, TBHS 1924-1928) in



1933 while a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford, three years before he won gold in the 1500m at the Berlin Olympics in 1936. It was the first time a New Zealand athlete had set a recognised world record.

The trophy was uncovered in a former recreation centre building at the University of Otago and is now in the hands of the Hill City-University Athletic Club (formed when the Otago University and Hill City Clubs amalgamated in 2012). It is not clear if the cup was a challenge cup or a commemorative trophy, and it also appears to be missing its stand which might have had further information engraved on it.

A RISING BOWLER



After watching his grandfather play bowls, **Keanu P. Darby (2009-2013)** decided at the age of 12 that this could be the game for him. He joined the Temuka Bowling Club and proved to be a whizz on the green with immediate success, winning the Temuka Junior Singles in 2009. He then won this event again in the 2011 and 2012 season. Keanu then represented the club at the South Canterbury Junior Champion of Champion Singles and had great success, winning two South Canterbury Junior titles back-to-back. He then moved to the senior ranks and cleaned up the guns at the Temuka club in winning the Senior Singles and went on to win his first South Canterbury Senior title in the Singles final.

Keanu is a competitive bowler and likes winning and with this attitude he won the New Zealand Secondary Schools Singles title. He teamed up with Tayla Bruce to win a bronze medal in the Mixed Pairs at the 2015 Junior World Cup in Brisbane. Keanu had an outstanding year and with these efforts he was named the New Zealand Under 18 Bowler of the Year. While still at school, Keanu was selected for the Senior intercentre team to travel to Auckland where he performed brilliantly.

Keanu shifted to Dunedin to study hospitality management and advance his sports career. Although he loved playing in South Canterbury, there were more opportunities in Dunedin with a greater pool of players. He has won nine Dunedin titles and many major tournaments around New Zealand, made all New Zealand age group teams, and was selected for the New Zealand Development team. A big breakthrough came in 2023 when he teamed up with clubmate Roger Stevens to win the National Silver Champion of Champion New Zealand Pairs title. He then won the Stoke Pairs and North East Valley Mixed Pairs with Tayla Bruce.

Keanu was named in the New Zealand Blackjacks team in December 2024 – only the second bowler from South Canterbury to represent New Zealand in the elite team – and in January 2025 was runner up in the New Zealand National Open Men's Singles in Auckland, although the Blackjacks lost to Australia in the Trans Tasman International at Naenae Bowling Club in Wellington in February 2025.

SPORTING LIFE

On 1 March 2024, shot-putter T.P. (Tom) Walsh (2005-2009) celebrated his 32nd birthday in Glasgow with his fifth medal at athletics' world indoors championships — equalling Dame Valerie Adams's record haul from the global meet. He won silver with a best effort of 22.07m. However, a groin injury put him out of contention during the Olympic Games in Paris in August 2024 and he was later also diagnosed with a torn adductor. In a Facebook post, Tom said, "Devastated to end my season early. I love my sport and I love competing. But I will be back, I have unfinished business to attend to." In November 2024 he said he was at about 80% of full fitness and hoped to compete in the Summer Circuit events in New Zealand between January and March 2025.

Tom Taiaroa (2012-2016) was named as South Canterbury Bowls' men's player of the year in May 2024. The West End Bowling Club member had an outstanding year in representing New Zealand Black Jacks at under-26 level, winning the South Canterbury open singles and finishing runner up in South Canterbury triples. He was also named as the recipient of an Aspect Trust Leading Athlete Scholarship and, as one of 18 athletes in the 2024-25 Bowls New Zealand wider training squad, hopes to compete at the 2026 Commonwealth Games.



TBHS visual arts teacher **Wayne Doyle (staff 2019-)** – an old boy of St Patrick's High School (merged with Mercy College to create Roncalli College in 1981) – broke a New Zealand athletics record in February 2024. Competing at the

New Zealand Combined Events Championship in Dunedin, Wayne – in his 60th decathlon – broke the New Zealand points record for his Masters 60-65 age group, amassing more than 6000 points on his way to a first-place finish, and was later named the Masters South Canterbury Sportsperson of the Year. He has been competing in decathlons since he was about 16 years old, holds four different decathlon records in New Zealand going back to when he was 40, and also won the New Zealand title for pole vault when he was 18. One of his biggest highlights was winning a bronze medal at the 2016 World Masters Athletic Championships in Perth, Australia. Wayne credits much of his success to the coaching he received from Ian Baird, the original coach of Old Boy shot-putter Tom Walsh. Beyond the disciplines of the decathlon, Wayne has also competed regularly (every 10 years

since he was 30!) in bodybuilding: he won the masters athletic 60+ class in the NABBA South Island Body Building Championships in Dunedin in September 2024 and again at the national championships in Invercargill in October.



Ollie W. Berry (2020-2023), who fought across several different weight divisions, won a gold and silver in K1 and two silvers in glory rules for New Zealand at the 2024 World Kickboxing Association World Championships in Scotland in June 2024. Ollie and TBHS Year 12 student Will Knight (whose father Wayne is their coach) were the only fighters from the South Island to make the New Zealand squad for the competition which featured more than 600 fighters.

In the 2020 *Timaruvian*, it was reported that **John R. Ensor (1962-1963)** had retired from coaching with the Timaru Boxing Association after 55 years of involvement with their Craigie Avenue gym. A life member of the Association, he

hoped he might still be asked to help as a judge or referee from time to time. His services have indeed been called on and in September 2024 he was reported as having refereed six fights in Timaru a few days previously, and judged four of them, and in the previous week having reffed four bouts for a boxing club in Christchurch. He was due to referee at the national championships in October and had further commitments lined up. John had not long previously been asked not only to referee at a Timaru tournament but to receive a special presentation recognising his 60 years of involvement in boxing. John's interest in boxing was sparked at TBHS, where it was part of the physical education curriculum from at least 1913 until the 1960s, coached for many years by George Hillind (TBHS gym master 1946-1974) — Jack Lovelock was an unlikely School boxing champion in his class in 1928. The Craigie Avenue gym opened in 1964 and John joined it in 1965. He qualified as a referee and judge in 1986.


He refereed several big names during their amateur days, including David Tua and Joseph Parker. Another notable Old Boy boxer from the Timaru gym was A. Le R. (Tony) Godkin (1943-2007, TBHS 1957-1960), New Zealand amateur welterweight champion in 1970.



Craig D. Cumming (1989-1993) left Dunedin in February 2025 after four and a half years as head coach for the Sparks, the Otago women's cricket team, to take up a three-year contract as head coach with English women's cricket team the Blaze, based in Nottingham. Craig played in both the rugby First XV and the cricket First XI at TBHS, then went on the play cricket for Canterbury, South Canterbury, and Otago, and also played 11 Test matches and 13 One Day Internationals for New Zealand. He has worked as a commercial manager and a head of school sport and has been a regular on television and radio cricket commentary teams. Craig's sons Jacob and Zac are promising players with the Otago Volts.



In last year's *Timaruvian* we noted that rally driver **Hayden C. Paddon (2000-2004)** and co-driver John Kennard had become the first drivers from outside Europe to win the FIA European Rally Championship (ERC) title in August 2023. They won the ERC title again in 2024 and Hayden also won the 2024 FIA Asis-Pacific Rally Championship in November 2024 with up-and-coming New Zealand co-driver Jared Hudson.

Trevor James Betts was born in Timaru on 1 April 1947 and died at Christchurch on 1 February 2024. Trevor, son of Les and Margaret Betts, and sibling of brothers Robin (TBHS 1957-1959) and Alistair (1945-2004, TBHS 1959-1963) and sister Anne, attended Main School prior to attending TBHS (1960-1964).

Trevor was multi-talented. He was academic, musical, and athletic. He was also "relaxed" (he simply didn't give a s**t!!). Although of short stature Trevor had great stamina and excelled at harriers. Later he took up climbing and had a unique ability at scaling vertical faces. Former flatmates say he perfected this skill climbing

the exterior walls of their dwellings with the dexterity of Spiderman. Trevor was a talented musician who could play numerous instruments. He played in the TBHS brass band and also took lead roles in School productions, including *The Mikado* and *The Pirates of Penzance*.

Trevor attended the University of Otago, gaining a BSc degree (graduated 1969). He revelled in student life. On graduating, Trevor chose teaching as a career. His lifelong love of the outdoors saw him teach mathematics, biology, general science, and physics at mostly rural schools, including Harihari District High School, Ranfurly District High School, Cheviot, Cromwell and Maniototo Area School. He taught part-time one year at TBHS (1971).

Teaching was a great career choice for Trevor. He had the combination of intellectual rigour and the ability to inspire and motivate students to achieve. Living in regional centres gave him the opportunity to be active in the wider community including coaching rugby and other sports and introducing young people to tramping, camping, and climbing. He was also very talented at home handyman/carpentry and renovated/restored numerous houses with flair.

Teaching was not particularly well paid in the early days. Trevor spent the holidays working in orchards and on farms, cooking in restaurants and as barman. He had to be "doing something". Unfortunately, Trevor became disillusioned with the system and disheartened with apathetic students and retired from the profession early. He continued to tutor students "so long as they were engaged!!"

Trevor married Sandra Denley in 1970. They had three daughters (Emma, Kate, and Maja) before divorcing. Trevor's memories live on through numerous grandchildren who also show talent. The caricature accompanying this obituary is the work of granddaughter Skye. In retirement, Trevor lived in Hanmer with his partner Annie. The mountains and remote areas were his happy place.

Miss Joan Isobel Dellow was for 16 years the 'tea lady' for the staff at TBHS. Joan became quite a personality on the mid-morning shift in and about the staffroom. Her death on 25 April 2024, aged 80 (she was born on 2 February 1944), was acknowledged by the staff of the 1990s and early 2000s.

Joan began at TBHS in November 1992. Her duties were to set up the staffroom for morning tea and occasionally help the office staff. Joan became quite an identity amongst the staff and about the School. She made her way in all weathers from her flat in Wilson Street to the School. Milk had to be picked up from Thomas House prior

to morning tea prep. She was good with routines.

Very quickly Joan was fully integrated with staff. She came to know staff birthdays and other family milestones and could recall dates with ease. A ringing of the staffroom bell at 10.45 a.m. would be followed by Joan announcing whose birthday it was and enthusiastically leading the singing of 'Happy Birthday'. No one was exempt! Joan also embraced the children of staff members. Remembering their birthdays was easy and over her decade and a half at the School she enthused at their development and accomplishments.

There were two significant events in the School year that Joan relished: the staff photo and the School Ball. Joan would be first in line for the photo and morning tea would have to wait. For the Ball, Joan dressed up, arrived early, sought a dance with the Rector, and awaited supper.

In 2008, Joan reached retirement age and ended her tenure at the School, but didn't lose her School links. She was often on the phone to staff with whom she felt a connection. The chat would be to share news or make an inquiry. It would be a brief chat ...till next time. She felt supported by her former colleagues.

The School was good for Joan; she felt welcome and was able to engage with the School community. Joan was also good for the School.

David Leigh Halstead was born in Timaru on 28 September 1948. His father, Dr Charles G.D. Halstead (1913-1992), was also an Old Boy of TBHS (1925-1927). David attended the Preparatory School (1958-1961) as a boarder and then as a day boy. He then went to St Andrew's College as a boarder for his high school years. He talked, however, with great fondness of his time at the Prep School.

David attended Massey and Lincoln Colleges, earning a Wool Diploma and had a 25-year career in textiles with Alliance Textiles, firstly in Timaru and then in Dunedin. He won the F.R. Callaghan Wool Board Scholarship in

1974 and spent a year in the UK with the International Wool Secretariat. He worked in every facet of the business of Alliance Textiles as a trainee manager, ultimately becoming the sales and marketing manager at Alltex International Dunedin, and then the export manager. He travelled extensively in the role.

In 1988 he moved his family to Christchurch and became the general manager for Vita Foam Ltd. After nine years in that role he purchased his own business, HydraQuip, in Durham Street, Christchurch.

He served in several governance roles on the boards of both the Christchurch College of Education and Christchurch Polytech (Ara). He was a community board councillor for the Fendalton Waimairi Community Board. He served on the Canterbury Chamber of Commerce Board for several years and as President for three years. He served a term on the board of Business NZ, became a life member of the Chamber of Commerce and a Fellow of the Institute of Directors. David served as the honorary consul for Austria for the South Island for 11 years and was recognized for this work by the President of Austria with The Gold Star of Austria. He was also a member of the Consular Corp. In June 2015 he was awarded a Queen's Service Medal for services to the community and to business.

David was active in many sports over his lifetime, including skiing, boating, yachting, and tramping. He had a great love of the mountains and lakes of the South Island and regularly holidayed at Tekapo and Wanaka.

David married Noeline Butterfield in 1971 and they had two children, Gabrielle and Jonathan, and five grandchildren. David and Noeline have travelled extensively over latter years in the UK, Europe, Asia, and USA where their son and his wife and family live. They moved to Wellington in February 2024 to be closer to their daughter and her family as David had become unwell. He died at the Malvina Major Hospital in Wellington on 21 October 2024, aged 76. His memorial service was held in Christchurch at Lamb and Hayward's Westpark Chapel on 14 November.



Peter Keith Hawkins died in Auckland on 10 June 2024, aged 82. Born on 13 September 1941, he attended TBHS as a day boy from 1955 to 1957.

After leaving school, he spent many years in the Territorial Army and working for PG Wrightson and Pfizer selling agricultural products in South Canterbury. In the late 1960s he moved to Auckland with Pfizer where he worked until 1992 as sales manager for New Zealand. He founded his own business, Hawkins Watts Limited, in 1992, importing and distributing food ingredients. That business currently employs over 70 people across New

Zealand and Australia and is still family-owned by the Hawkins family.

Throughout his life, Peter remained friends with many he met during his time at TBHS. At the Royal Akarana Yacht Club on 5 July 2024, Peter was given a great send off attended by many from all over New Zealand, both friends and business colleagues. He is survived by his wife, Lynley, their two children Scott and Rachael, and four grandchildren. Peter's brother, Gary W. Hawkins (1938-2021) was also at TBHS (1953-1954).

Mrs **Charmian Elizabeth Hemming** (née Andrews) died peacefully in a Wellington rest home on 19 December 2024, aged 81. Born in Yeovil, Somerset, on 26 July 1943, she trained as a teacher in England and married Derek Hemming in 1970. With their two daughters, Charmian and Derek moved in January 1978 from the UK to Timaru, where Derek taught at TBHS from 1978 to 2009.

Charmian, who herself worked as a relief teacher and teacher aide at TBHS from 1989 to 1998, also worked in a variety of roles at other schools in South Canterbury: West School, Watlington Intermediate, Timaru College,

Mountainview High School, TGHS, Craighead, and Roncalli College as well as Waimate Main School (for a year). At TBHS, she is remembered especially for her successful and sympathetic work with students with learning difficulties and special needs and for her work with colleagues Wayne Osten and Fiona Green in Transition finding employment placements for students.

Charmian's death notice concisely summarised many of her accomplishments: she was a music and art teacher, industrial chaplain, national president of SPELD NZ and Speld teacher, composer and pianist and occasional organist in church, and a keen gardener. She was also a Presbyterian elder and a marriage celebrant. Charmian and Derek had moved to Waikanae in 2014 and Derek, her husband for 54 years, survives her together with their daughters Rebecca and Sara, and grandson Cody.



John William Macaulay was born in Geraldine on 27 April 1951. After Winchester School, he attended TBHS from 1965 to 1969, initially as a bus boy but as a day boy from July 1965 after his family moved to Timaru from their farm between Winchester and Temuka.

After a year at the University of Otago, John worked for the Department of Agriculture in Tauranga and on a farm near Ashburton before travelling in the UK (where he again worked on farms) and Europe. He spent five years in the nickel-mining town of Kambalda, Western Australia, initially as a surveyor's chainman before

completing an adult apprenticeship as a boilermaker.

Back in New Zealand, he worked at Marsden Point and Twizel (on the hydro scheme) before settling in Dunedin in 1984 and working for a firm which specialised in manufacturing equipment for freezing works and abattoirs both in New Zealand and overseas. He retired in 2017.

John was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in June 2023 and died in Dunedin Hospital on 9 September 2024, survived by his wife Pam (née Climie, married 1990), daughters Rebecca and Megan, three granddaughters, and brother Gregor (TBHS 1966-1970).



Donald Gordon McCully, born on 9 March 1949 to Robert S. McCully (1912-1983, TBHS 1927-1928) and Nancy Johnston McCully (née Purvis, 1916-2014, married 1936), died in Timaru on 3 July 2024, aged 75.

Don grew up in Orton, the fourth of five boys, and attended Clandeboye School before boarding at TBHS from 1963 to 1966. He was a hostel prefect in 1966, and represented TBHS at tennis throughout his school career

He went on to work at the BNZ in Timaru as well as travelling overseas. He then had a varied career, working successively at the Geraldine Licensing Trust, the South Canterbury Club, *The Courier* (where he worked as a

reporter and then an advertising rep), and the electoral office of MP (and his niece) Jo Goodhew, then as the general manager of the South Canterbury RSA for six years before retiring.

Beginning in 1968, when he was encouraged by two BNZ colleagues to audition for a play, Don was deeply involved in the activities of the South Canterbury Drama League. He directed at least one or two plays a year as well as acting in many productions, including musicals. He was the League's president from 2002 to 2006 and he had been involved in many of its committees. He was made a life member in 2019.

Other activities included service as a JP for 17 years (he was on the council of the South Canterbury Justice of the Peace Association and served as treasurer for a time).

As an Old Boy, Don retained a strong interest in the School, helping to organise reunions and jubilees. He joined the executive of the Old Boys' Association in 1998 and continued as a member until his death. He was executive chairman in 2017 and 2018. He was also directly involved with the School through his talents and interest in drama and a succession of drama teachers and students benefited from his collaboration in the preparation and presentation of school productions.

Don's life was celebrated at a crowded memorial service at the Timaru Playhouse on 27 July 2024, with THSOBA National President Kevin O'Sullivan recording his contribution to TBHS and the Association. He will be sadly missed by the Old Boy community and by the School. His loyal and practical service, over many years, has been much appreciated.

Don is survived by his son Guy D. McCully (TBHS 1997-2000), daughter Charlotte, granddaughter Penelope, and brothers R. Bruce McCully (TBHS 1951-1952) and John S. McCully (TBHS 1953-1954). He was predeceased by his two other brothers, Andrew J. McCully (1944-2017, TBHS 1958-1959) and H. David McCully (1952-1975, TBHS 1966-1969).

Dr **David Ross McInnes**, an Old Boy whose life had been spent in the international business world, died in Nelson Hospital on 9 March 2024, after a brief illness. He was aged 79 years. He had retained a keen interest in the School throughout his busy life. Recent Old Boys will remember his challenging address at the 2014 prizegiving.

David McInnes (born 9 May 1944), son of D.S. (Don) McInnes (1910-1971, TBHS 1924-1928) from Waimate, attended TBHS as a boarder from 1958 to 1962. He was a talented cricketer, playing for the Second XI in his

third form year. He continued as the dominant opening batsman of the First XI throughout his school career (captain in 1962) and also represented South Canterbury at senior level.

His other special talent was on the stage in the Gilbert and Sullivan era. As a contralto, he played Ruth in the 1959 production of *The Pirates of Penzance*. In 1960, as a baritone, he was Captain Corcoran in *HMS Pinafore*. He played Marco in the 1961 production of *The Gondoliers*, followed by Pish-Tush in The Mikado in 1962. David retained his love of music and singing. He sang at the Sydney Opera House with choirs on two occasions, as well as having the opportunity to conduct the Queensland Philharmonic Orchestra for a charity event.

David completed two years at Dunedin Teachers' College but taught only briefly before deciding that teaching was not his vocation. He completed a BA in geography and economics at the University of Otago, before moving to Australia. He graduated from the University of Sydney as a Master of Town and Country Planning and later added to his qualifications with a doctorate in Business Administration from Bedford University in Florida.

Sydney-based for much of his career, David quickly established a reputation in the planning of golf courses and other resorts and profited from the boom of Queensland's Gold Coast. In 1985, The Timaruvian described David as "an economist, town planner and tourist specialist, with an enviable international reputation, having established a network of consulting practices throughout Australasia, South-East Asia, the USA and Canada". By the 1990s, it was noted that his Texas office had designed and constructed over 110 golf courses throughout the Americas, while other projects were located in places as diverse as the Bahamas, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, Andorra, and Fiji.

In 2003, David McInnes and his wife Kim moved from Sydney to the Bahamas, where David had been previously involved with a resort. Then it was to Toronto (Canada), South Beach (Florida), and in 2006 to Dubai (UAE). There, David was the vice-president of a major development corporation and travelled extensively throughout the Middle East with various projects. By his return to New Zealand in 2011, David had worked in over 51 countries with major developments throughout the world.

David and Kim lived in Queenstown initially, before moving to Christchurch, where David was invited to manage a planning company involved with the Christchurch rebuild, while continuing to maintain international business interests. More recently they moved to the Marlborough Sounds. David soon became involved in the local community, joining a choir in Blenheim and contesting a seat on the Marlborough District Council at the 2022 elections.

Apart from his business ventures and involvements, he also travelled and experienced many wonderful events and environments, including Everest, cricket and other sporting activities, and Thai elephant farms, and (in his own words) "lived several lifetimes in one".

David McInnes is survived by his wife Kim, a stepson in Australia and a sister in the UK.

The following tribute is from Andrew G.D. Ross (2008-2012), head prefect in 2012: "David was a role model and mentor to many in the wider planning profession. His passion for planning and urban design was inspiring. I was very fortunate to have had David as a mentor. Despite the years separating us, David and I frequently shared fond memories of our time at Timaru Boys'. Over the last decade, David's dedication to the Old Boys' network and his commitment to inspiring future generations was very evident."

Graham North died at Auckland City Hospital on 26 May 2024 aged 79 years (he was born on 15 April 1945). Graham was the fifth of nine children, born and raised in Timaru. All of his six brothers, Morris, Nelson, Russell (deceased), Malcolm, Stuart, and Andrew, also attended TBHS. Graham attended Timaru West Primary School and then TBHS from 1959 to 1961 (he was a member of the School pipe band). He worked at McBeths Four Square, Church Street, after school and during school holidays.

On leaving TBHS, Graham commenced a baking apprenticeship at Herron's Bakery in Church Street, Timaru, which was started by his grandfather, Jim Herron, in 1917. After completing his apprenticeship at 21, he sailed to Southampton, England, and enjoyed the next few years working and travelling around Europe. He met his wife Betty in Canada and they returned home to Timaru.

Graham recommenced work at Herron's Bakery, then moved to Christchurch to work at Boon's Bakery, then to Auckland to work at Findlay's Bakery. He then joined his brothers Stuart and Malcolm at North's Bakery, Auckland. When that business was sold, Graham and Betty went to the USA and ran bakeries in Los Angeles and Columbus, Ohio.

After retiring from the USA baking scene, Graham and Betty returned to live in their family home at St Heliers, Auckland. Betty predeceased Graham in 2017. In retirement, as well as playing the bagpipes, Graham took an interest in grape growing and purchased a vineyard at Gibbston Valley, Central Otago. He is survived by his children Jacquie, Karl, and Sara and his 6 grandchildren.

Godfrey Richard Coles Payne died in Sydney, Australia, on 4 June 2024, aged 82 years. Godfrey had a long and interesting international career, both in the mission field and the diplomatic service.

Timaru born (26 July 1941) and bred, Godfrey attended TBHS from 1954 to 1956. His family then moved to Wellington, where he completed his secondary education at Wellington College, leaving to enter the work force after gaining university entrance.

Godfrey had a strong Christian commitment throughout his life and moved into the mission field at an early age. He spent time with the Karen people of Burma, where he succumbed to life-threatening diseases. He credited his survival to the care of a Thai teacher, whom he subsequently married.

While in Thailand, Godfrey met Sir Brian Talboys (then Minister of Foreign Affairs) and a friendship developed, leading to Godfrey's appointment to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Wellington. Subsequent appointments took him to work in France, Italy, Iran, Tanzania, Kenya, and the Solomon Islands.

When he retired from the ministry in 2011, he moved to live in Sydney, Australia, to be closer to his two daughters who lived there. He is survived by his wife Thasanee and his daughters.

In a special tribute, his brother Bernard emphasised Godfrey's strong Christian faith and his passion to improve the lives of deprived peoples throughout the world.

Victor Marinus Cornelis Schikker of Tinwald died in Christchurch Hospital on 11 August 2024 after falling backwards and striking his head during a social game of curling at Staveley.

Born on 30 March 1957, and raised at Mt Somers, Victor attended TBHS as a boarder from 1970 to 1972. He was regular attendee at Old Boy functions in Ashburton.

Victor was a well-known stock agent – he would have marked 50 years working for PGG Wrightson in January 2025 – who spent his entire career in and around the Mid Canterbury area. His initial focus was sheep and

beef before moving into the dairy sector of the livestock business, an area he grew to have considerable passion for, including co-ordinating the Mid Canterbury region's annual IHC calf and rural scheme from its inception in the 1980s. He was a former president of the Ashburton A&P Association.

PGG Wrightson chief executive Stephen Guerin said that Victor would be remembered "as a man with a big heart [and a] sharp-witted sense of humour and will be sorely missed by all who knew him", and Victor's three children, Emma, Liam, and Nadia, have expressed their gratitude for all their father did for his family and his community, as well as the opportunities he created for them to lead the lives they have: "The support that he gave us throughout all our years so far, we could just never be more thankful."



The Rev. **John George Sinclair**, whose reflections on his time at TBHS (1946-1949) appeared in the 2022 *Timaruvian*, died in Dunedin on 22 May 2024.

John was born in Dunedin on 29 April 1933; he had a younger sister and brother. His father was Francis Roderick Sinclair (1897-1966), a marine engineer who had found work with the Union Steam Ship Company and settled in Dunedin. His fiancée, Mary Rendall Mason (1898-1988), joined him and they married in Dunedin in 1932. Both of John's parents came from Orkney and John both retained something of an Orkney or Scottish accent

and continued to read *The Orcadian* (the Orkney newspaper) throughout his life. John's birth was announced in The Orcadian but not in the *Otago Daily Times*.

The Sinclair family lived in Dunedin until 1941, when they moved to Timaru (John's father worked on recommissioning the harbour dredge). John had his final two years of primary schooling in Timaru before proceeding to TBHS, where his choice of Herries Beattie (a writer and researcher on early New Zealand history) for a project on a New Zealand author deepened his interest in New Zealand history. The family returned to Dunedin in 1949 and John completed his secondary education with a year at Otago Boys' High School (1950). Although TBHS always ranked higher in his affections, he appreciated the teaching of an outstanding history master at OBHS.

Indifferent success with mathematics caused John to abandon early ambitions to be a civil engineer and he turned to arts subjects with a view to becoming a secondary school teacher. At the University of Otago he completed a BA degree, specialising in history and geography, and also began (but did not complete) a BD degree (he said he "had to wrestle with Greek and Hebrew [and] never really won"). Involvement with the Student Christian Movement had led to a decision to train for the Presbyterian ministry at the Theological Hall, Knox College, Dunedin. He was ordained at the end of 1958, serving initially at Popotunoa (Clinton), then in St Andrew's parish, Ashburton, from 1969 and in St Clair parish, Dunedin from 1988. He retired from full-time ministry in 1996 but continued as assistant minister at Dunedin's First Church of Otago, where he worked assiduously in the church's heritage centre.

His passion for history was also reflected in his membership (from 1992) of the Friends of the Hocken Collections and service as a committee member from 1998 and as president from 2002 until his retirement in 2012. John was a long-term member of the governing council of Knox College and is remembered for his very practical contributions on committees. His services were recognised with appointment as a life fellow of the College.

John married Dorothy May Bruce on 25 January 1958 and she survived him (although she herself died on 29 September 2024) together with their children, Elizabeth, Fergus, and Louise (both Elizabeth and Fergus graduated with honours degrees in history from the University of Otago), and three grandchildren.

Cale Tompkins Tairua, born on 26 January 2006, died in a road crash on the Cave-Albury Road on 19 December 2024. He had been a boarder at TBHS from 2019 top 2023.

From an early age, Cale was noted as a talented rugby player and was reportedly usually first on the list for selection for the JAB South Canterbury under-11, under-12, and under-13 representative teams and was always the pack leader.

Cale, a lock/loose forward, was only 15 when he first played in the First XV in 2022 – he was also noticed by the Crusaders, making their Knights team as their youngest player that year and captained the First XV in Year 13. He was at Lincoln University in 2024 and continued to play well there. TBHS teacher in charge of rugby Edward Patterson described Cale as "a well-loved and respected young man." "All of us who knew him remember him fondly", he said. "Cale was a very pleasant young man, a mightily good player, and a person with a very good future on and off the rugby field. During his time at TBHS, he excelled in many areas, and we are sure this would have continued into the future."



Roger Samuel Tasker died peacefully at Ashburton Hospital on 3 August 2024, aged 82. Born on 5 May 1942, Roger was the only child of Herb and Mary Tasker, who farmed at Ruapuna. After Ruapuna School, Roger boarded at TBHS from 1956 to 1958, when his father told him it was time to return to the farm, although his preference would have been to train as a vet. Aged 20, Roger travelled with Peter Johnston for a year in South America, working on large farms in Chile and Argentina and picking up Spanish. Back home, Roger joined the Mayfield Young Farmers Club, and, with a love of debating and stock judging, he took up a leadership role and also joined the Toastmasters in Ashburton, and eventually joined the Mayfield Lions Club. A farm accident in

1965 meant that he spent some months in Burwood Hospital for treatment of severe friction burns on an arm and shoulder, but he regained full use of the injured arm.

He had met Beverley (Bev) Ann Woolley shortly after returning from South America, and they married on 22 October 1966. Their eldest three children (Jeffrey, Julia, and Leighton) died tragically in a flood at Peel Forest in 1975. Son Hayden survived and Roger and Bev went on to have three more children: Fraser, Logan, and Hilary.

Roger was 35 years old when he was elected to the Ashburton County Council in 1977, the start of a 20-year involvement in local government. He was elected chairman of the council in 1986 – the last before the amalgamation of the county and borough councils into the Ashburton District Council in 1989. He was elected to the new council, serving as deputy mayor, and was also elected to the newly formed Canterbury Regional Council at the same time. Subsequent legislative changes meant that he could not serve on both councils and he decided to stay on the regional council as the only representative for the Ashburton District. Bev replaced Roger on the district council and served for 18 years. After almost three terms on the regional council, Roger was appointed as a commissioner to the Environment Court in 1997. When his contract expired, Roger became an independent commissioner, chairing Resource Management Act hearings across the South Island and Chatham Islands.

Roger retired when he became aware that his memory was not as sharp and travelled widely in Britain, Europe, and North America with Bev. Roger then suffered several heart attacks, had cancer treatment, and was diagnosed with dementia. He had retired to the farm, now run by son Fraser, but needed to go into full-time care just three months before his death.

Survived by Bev, four children, and seven grandchildren, Roger is remembered as a devoted family man and as a strong and articulate advocate for the Ashburton district.

Warren Leslie Thin, born on 10 May 1952, was at TBHS from 1965 to 1969 and made his mark as a track athlete both while at school and in the following years. However, he eventually tired of running big mileages in training and instead from the age of 26 concentrated on the weight training he had used for keeping fit between track seasons. So began a notable career as a bodybuilder. He went on to win the country's major bodybuilding title, Mr New Zealand, on seven occasions in the 1980s and early 1990s. He also won three Pan-Pacific titles and competed at world and Mr Universe championships.

After working in a variety of jobs and operating a gym in Timaru, Warren moved to Christchurch and became a sought-after personal trainer, initially in inner-city gyms but later from a well-equipped gym in his home, as well as an organiser and promoter of bodybuilding competitions.

Warren was diagnosed with nephritis in 2002 and had two kidney transplants. He died in Christchurch on 15 November 2024, survived by his partner Sharon, his children De-anne, Hayden (TBHS 1993-1997), and Jennah – both De-anne and Hayden have also been successful competitive bodybuilders – and six grandchildren. Warren's brother Denis (TBHS 1967-1969) died in 2023.



Mrs **Mary Anne Ward** died in Timaru on 24 July 2024. She was a vital and engaging member of the teaching staff from 2005 to 2008 and made a comeback for the 2010 school year.

Mary Anne's good humour and dry wit often featured in the staff room. She was a passionate mathematician. She delighted in numbers. Her ease in completing sudokus impressed us all. She provided students and staff a challenge with 'the problem of the week.'

Prior to her TBHS tenure, Mary Anne was a colleague of former Rector Kevin O'Sullivan and Deputy Rector John Middlemiss at Aranui High School in the 1980s. Beyond the classroom, Mary Anne undertook an editorial role with The Timaruvian. Her wisdom and experience were utilised in pastoral care as Year 13 Dean. We never fully appreciated Mary Anne's competence and delight in music. She did acknowledge that she found it 'atmospherically tough' working in a room of 30 fourteen year-old boys who exhibited little flatulence control.

Mary Anne embraced living in the Fairlie community. The journey each day gave ample time for reflection. On leaving TBHS at the end of 2010, Mary Anne moved down North Street to work at Roncalli College. She retired from teaching in 2022. It proved to too short a retirement.

She passed away peacefully, surrounded by family, "aged 68+1". Her Timaru Herald obituary notice captured a glimpse of this very special woman: beloved wife of Alan, mother of three, and "wicked" stepmother to another five. Mary Anne's love of numbers was evident in every aspect of her life and death.'
