

# RECTOR'S ADDRESS



Nick McIvor

It is fantastic to see our young men crossing the stage to receive these accolades. Their movement from side to side is much like the transition they each made in 2015. The steps across stage can be seen as a metaphor for those steps they took to advance academically, to become a prizewinner. Each boy adapted to new demands on his time and talent. Each met challenges from our national curriculum and NCEA progressively. embraced and internalised

Boys' High expectations on how excellence should look, and be nurtured, and valued. They also transitioned from starting unfamiliar courses containing new skills and content in January - to become high achievers exerting sophisticated control over the very same courses, by November. I offer my warmest congratulations to you all. You've done yourselves, your families, your friends, and your school proud. Savour this achievement and use it as motivation for much more.

An important source of success in learning, and aspect of our school vision, is to be inquisitive; to be questioning; to be curious; to be fascinated by the new and what it promises; to wonder; to exercise a healthy independence of mind. It is to seek new knowledge and self-fulfilment constantly. Or as early twentieth century Rector, William Thomas, once put it: 'the fruit of a wise education is seen in the enquiring attitude to life'. Words that 'ring true' in the present.

Closely associated with healthy inquisitiveness is the act of inquiry. Which is, to not only have an inquiring mind but to cultivate it using an inquiry methodology.

That is, to have a method that enables learners to convert healthy inquisitiveness into organised self – improvement; to produce new achievement from a continuous cycle of reflection and matching action; to respond carefully, and unrelentingly, to what can be learned from previous actions and experiences to improve deliberately. This approach to learning has been of immense benefit to both staff and students, and the source of much of the achievement we celebrate tonight.

For staff, intensified use of inquiry, to fix on key student performance data, and to translate it directly into new strategy, has generated better outcomes for the boys. It has also spawned new staff reflective practices this year. By knowing the specific needs of the boys even more, staff are able to be more selective in how they tailor their time, teaching techniques, and resource, to best effect. Inquiry has been central to implementing our third year of Positive Behaviour for Learning, for example. Each new positive measure is monitored and incrementally amended. Inquiry has also been the crux of new staff professional learning groups. These groups have facilitated new expertise and new teaching design

 as taken from the specialist inquiries pursued by each of the ten teams.

The boys are also making increasing use of inquiry - as a way to lift their self-awareness, autonomy and empowerment. When we give them:

- 1. more ways to understand how well they are doing personally;
- 2. what they should add or remove, and by what means; and
- 3. how they will know if they are successful marked improvement soon follows.

Student inquiry is also a process of staff-student collaboration or partnership as boys are taught how to identify and act on their own work to improve next time adroitly—with the support of their teacher. A direct combination of self-evaluation and suitable response leads each boy to new, bountiful territory in his education. Inquiry process reinforcing and expanding an inquisitive mind.

Inquiry-based changes, like other significant educational improvements, require an incredible personal investment from teaching staff, support staff, the Thomas House team, the Board, PTA, Old Boys' Association, parent volunteers, and student leaders. I commend and congratulate everyone in these critical groups in our school, who has bolstered the boys and made us who we are again in 2015. I thank everyone who has 'done their bit' to elevate our boys in so many diverse ways.

To the teaching staff, thank you for your professionalism and personal commitment to looking after and teaching the lads, and for the support you have given parents and your colleagues.

This year we fondly farewelled Raewyn Westaway after 20 years of service, as she left to teach English in Te Atatu, West Auckland, in Term 2. Roger van Booma also departed in Term 2 to shift 'to the other touchline', as he became Assistant Rector at Waitaki Boys' High School; prompting a new addition to our friendly inter-school rivalry!

From December Albert Pitcher returns to England from Technology after four great years of service. Todd Skevington remains in England following his year's leave, having decided to stay at Lucton School. We also farewell Tracey Atwool as she takes a new position in English at Papanui High School following important contributions in ESOL, English and Digital Technology since joining us in 2010.

Added to these four are Alannah Ford and Jana McNaught who move to Lincoln High School and St Margaret's respectively. We are pleased to have been able to support them both in 2015 to make terrific starts to what will, no doubt, be flourishing teaching careers – careers involving a range of schools that each extend their professional acumen. It was also great to welcome Janelle King and Jill Harland to the teaching staff in Term 2.

Most prominent in staffing is, however, the retirement of Ros Taylor as our Head of Music at the end of this year. The teaching and leadership contribution of Ros to Boys' High Music and wider Arts has been far-reaching. She has strived to give the boys multiple opportunities to access, master and enjoy different instruments, genres and contexts, and with differing degrees of challenge, since 1990. Ros has always shown particular strength in her organisation, knowledge of Music, and dedication to community musical involvement including leading our musicians in Productions, special school events, Rock competitions, Chamber Music Contests, Festivals, Primary school tours and numerous other music offerings. Her departure heralds the end of a full and accomplished career. The end of an era. Rector McIvor, Deputy Rectors Sparrow and Stevenson, Deans, Teachers and Family Members - you all must draw enormous satisfaction at seeing these students progress from youthful enthusiasm (perhaps tinged with a measure of misbehaviour) to fine young men, who are all destined for a productive and fruitful life

through your efforts and hard work.

Thank you for this opportunity to speak to your graduating students.

To the Year 13 Students: congratulations on making it this far. While it may seem the hard work has been completed, it has only just begun!

Congratulations on completing your schooling. This is no easy feat. It is a big occasion, and the fact that there are many of you does not diminish the huge effort that most of you had to put in to reach this point.

Where you are now, is at the end of the beginning.

Do not fear what lies ahead. It is the start of a new journey. It is where you begin to prepare for your life-time careers.

Yes, there is still plenty of study and learning to do. You will have to cram for exams. You are likely to have more freedom, and with this comes a requirement for a greater degree of discipline. You will likely need to find some part-time work to help you adjust to the demands of university life, or wherever your next stage of study lies.

Be in no doubt that what you do from now on, gradually becomes critical to where you will make your mark in life.

I would like to borrow some wise words from the Founder and Chairman of Mainfreight, Bruce Plested – a man I look up to and has taught me much about life. He shared the following words of wisdom with Auckland University graduands last year – and I have taken the liberty of altering them slightly to reflect my own thoughts. They are very appropriate for you all:

Third – look inward to see what motivates you. Do you get noticed, are you an introvert or extrovert, do you like order or chaos, do you like rules or like breaking them, are you a team player, or more of an individual. Identifying what motivates you may show you where your strengths lie.

Fourth – try to work out what you like. This can be hard if you like something but are not yet naturally good at it. Make the decision, you have lots of time. Set out to find a way of getting good (preferably excellent) at what you like doing.

If you are good at what you like, and you can create a career from it, it can be said that you will never have to work.

Fifth – set high standards in everything you do. Build life skills of getting up early, learning to cook, cleaning, fixing things that are broken, caring and considering others, being positive at all times; doing your job (whatever it is) with excellence.

Somehow you have to combine this discipline with a bit of rule breaking. Some rule breaking is always necessary, and with disciplined logic and emotion your rule breaking will create success.

Sixth – be grateful for the luck of your birth, and the country in which you live. Check your choices with the question, "would Mum approve of what I'm doing?"!! Wear rose-coloured glasses and see your surroundings and acquaintances with a positive perspective all the time. Most people are honest, and trying to do what they think is their best. Communicate your highest expectations from those around you – always.

Seventh – recognise crossroads when they appear in your life, especially a global financial crisis, accidents, redundancy, firing, death of someone close to you, a crime, world events. Bad events are fantastic opportunities for making you really think and take strong action – do I want to be here, what if I never see the world, how are we going to benefit from this event? Mainfreight benefits from every crisis.

(And by the way, make sure you do travel and see the world, it opens your mind to endless opportunities).

Eighth – If you start to think "I like this, and I think I'm good at it, better than those already doing it" – have a go. Either apply for that bigger role (or that extra degree) – or start up on your own and do it. Every single thing in our lives is the result of someone having a go, inventing something or improving on it. From the clock that wakes us up, the bed you get out of, the car, the mobile phone, the app ...

And please, you're not an entrepreneur because you invent an app – but you're getting the right idea.

Ninth – Try to wipe the word "I" from your vocabulary. Start your sentences with: "we", "have you considered", "have you noticed", "would you suggest". Always it is about what WE want to achieve or do. When we can remove "I" from our centre of thinking, we can probably move to number 10, the last recommendation.

Tenth – start thinking about making a difference to your neighbourhood, or community, or country, or the world, at a young age. We can all make a difference and the more of us who do, the better the world will be. Be like the Boy Scouts – seek to do a good turn for someone every day, be courteous when driving, smile at all those you meet.

Understand, part of your job on earth is to make those you come into contact with on any day feel a bit better than before they met you.

I note the vision of the School – "A Timaru Boys High School young man will be aspirational, respectful and a positive contributor to his community, with an inquiring and independent mind". Stand by those values and you shall indeed find success in your lives.

Good luck – you are now totally in control of the rest of your life. The apron strings have been cut!





The architect (Mr Dave McBride) continues to work on concept plans for a new 60 bed accommodation, common room mud and drying rooms, sick bay and housemaster flats. An evening meeting of all interested parties of the project was organised early in Term 4 with the aim of developing a fund raising plan. If everything goes to plan the goal is to begin construction in 2017. I would like to thank Virginia Callaghan and all those on the building committee for the countless hours that they have already spent on this project.

Numbers will only increase to around 130 with this building as it is envisaged that this new block will allow the hostel to redevelop some of our older dormitory areas in Fraser. Jubilee, games and weight rooms along the Common Room dorm will be demolished. The project will either be built in stages or all at once depending on when and how the finance for it is attained.

In late December last year I received a phone call on a Sunday afternoon. During that phone call I was told that I was the successful recipient of the Mark Parker Memorial Scholarship for 2015. All of a sudden I now had a once in a life time opportunity to travel to the United Kingdom to play cricket and attend one of the most famous private schools in England. I knew this was going to be a life changing experience and I couldn't have been more excited. With no idea what to expect besides very old buildings and posh accents. It made me quick to bombard my brother with questions of what I should expect on my adventure, as I was following in his footsteps. Within a blink of an eye it was April the 10th and I was saying goodbye to my family at the Christchurch Airport. It was much harder leaving my family than I originally thought. Thinking back now I was just pretty nervous about setting on my journey alone.

After some very long stressful flights, I found myself in Heathrow airport feeling very jet lagged. I was greeted by Mr Watson, the teacher in charge of cricket at Winchester College. I remember when I was first shown the school and the cricket pavilion, I was amazed by the sight of the buildings. The school was founded in the 1390s, which is a quite a bit older than Timaru Boys'. school with over 250 acres and 11 boarding houses for 700 boys was a lot to take in. I was allocated to the boarding house Morsheads, more known as "Freddies". In my boarding house I made some lifelong friendships with promises to meet again. Schooling at Winchester College was different to Timaru Boys', especially wearing a suit to school every day.

Cricket at Winchester College was more than I could ask for. My game improved hugely with having extra time to have one on ones with my coach. The cricket grounds that we played on were first class and a step above what I was used to. I had 24 games scheduled to play and with an unexpected great English summer, I only had one game rained off. We had our best season in five years, which was definitely a highlight. Winchester College is rich with tradition and has exchanges with other schools that have been going for hundreds of years. We played famous schools such as Eton College, where Prince William went to school. I enjoyed being a part of a talented side, where I batted from 1 to 4 and bowled first change. I went pretty well with the bat, with a top score of 94 not out and best bowling figures of 4-18. During 2015 TBHS was fortunate enough to be invited to send four students to spend a week at St Mark's Senior Secondary School in Delhi India to help celebrate their 25th anniversary. Students expressed an interest in going and four were randomly drawn. The four students were Campbell Brown (Year 10), Jack Deeley (Year 12), Oliver Prisk (Year 12) and Jack Winsley (Year 11). Despite arriving in Delhi at 2am we were met and taken to the school where a very warm welcome awaited us. The host students and families were waiting for us with signs and flowers. Despite the time of the day we could not have been made to feel more welcome.

Joining us for the week were also four students from Denmark and four from France. During the week at the school the students took part in workshops in cooking, dance, art and music, played 'friendly' games of soccer and basketball. We were also treated to some of the local tourist attractions. At all of these events the New Zealand students mixed with students from all three countries.

On the final day there was a formal cultural performance where every school performed in front of the school as well as invited guests from the various embassies. This was also streamed live and so parents and friends back home and around the world could see all the performances. While they were nervous the TBHS boys completely stole the show. They represented New Zealand, Timaru Boys' High School and their families with a great deal of pride and mana. After the performances we had a formal luncheon outside were the families and students joined us in yet another sumptuous meal.

The food throughout our trip was largely vegetarian, but to accommodate us was generally not overly spicey. If the boys had a complaint about food was that there was just so much food and they felt a little disrespectful in turning it down.

At the conclusion of the week the French contingent joined us for a four day trip to Agra and Jaipur. The highlight being the Taj Mahal, but other highlights included riding an elephant, visiting various forts and the discovery of a new 'sport'; haggling while shopping! This was first attempted when the boys' Indian 'brothers' were in attendance but they soon got the hang of it and were happy to see who could get the best buy

The Taj Mahal was simply stunning. Our first view of this majestic building was the view from our hotel room. That night several of the boys went to a cultural performance explaining the story of the Taj. It helped put our visit the next day into perspective. We were all in awe and must have snapped more photos on this day than any of the other days in India.

We had discussed the prospect of getting ill while we were away and how we could avoid the dreaded Delhi Belly. Fortunately we all escaped except for minor feelings of tiredness or feeling a little fragile.

The boys gained a greater appreciation of another culture, but also an appreciation of what they have here in New Zealand. Certainly a trip of a lifetime, but hopefully only one of many.



Rite Journey 10WT in fine vocal form

The Rite Journey at Timaru Boys' High School continues to offer all Year 10 boys significant support and guidance as student's transition from juniors to seniors in a time of their life that can pose difficult challenges. Given the current lack of rites of passages in the Western World, young people are left to invent their own, which are often unhealthy and unsafe. The Rite Journey reinvents the traditional process of a "Rite of

Passage" to assist in the transforming boys from dependency to responsibility.

Throughout the boys' Rite Journey year they have had to complete a range of social, emotional and physical challenges.

– The Hadlow to Harbour road race, a Class Sing off and a Clash of the Class Haka are examples of these and are all designed to push boys outside their comfort zone.

This year's Sing Off challenge was won by 10NL who sang In the Jungle - Caleb Cameron and Mac Edwards stole the show. Second place went to 10SP and 10MF came in third. The Clash of the Class Haka was won by 10WT, second was 10MF and 10NL came in third.

The year-long programme raises boys' awareness of issues that they might currently be facing as well as providing them with the skills and understanding that are required to navigate their way through beginning adulthood. This is supported through conversations with the class's Rite Journey teacher about a wide range of topics from dealing with change, emotions and relationships to future aspirations and bush craft. Many parents will be giving their boys the same messages and the programme is design to reinforce positive messages they receive from home. The more adult connections a student can have through this transition the less the risk of a negative outcome.

In 2015 the boys have had a range of internal and external support. These have included "Attitude" and Grant Lord who presented issues around drugs and alcohol; Blair Poulter (Careers Advisor) who provided boys with important careers information; Tony Bunting (Guidance Counsellor) who discussed issues surrounding pornography; Keri Brown (Timaru Police) who presented the facts around sex and the law. Linda Merrilees (Health Nurse) through our health programme is an important part of conveying messages around sexuality education.

Reon Nolan (NZ representative cyclist) shared his inspirational story of how his life spiralled out of control and led to stints in jail and failed rehab attempts before he picked up a bike and finally felt like he was an insider, not an outsider. Josh South shared some important life messages that he has learnt overcoming near-terminal cancer and his achievements through his sporting endeavours.

The final challenge of the journey is the 20 hour solo at Peel Forest and its successful completion symbolises the boys' ability to be resilient, respectful and responsible. The 2015 Rite Journey group were absolutely outstanding.

If a student successfully completes the Rite Journey they receive their Timaru Boys' High School Rite Journey badge, a very important addition to the senior blazer.

Timaru Boys' Rite Journey Solo is a life-changing experience. From the moment you walk to the bus with your very heavy bag, you know it's going to be a wild ride. Students exchange conversations on the bus, asking each other: What did you

bring? Are you scared? We are nervous and excited, many of us have never been out in the bush alone, let alone sleep out there. You arrive at the hut where the teachers sleep (luxury).

The packed lunch is quickly devoured and soon, you are handed all of your equipment and sent off in small groups. These groups then walk out into the bush separating them from the rest of society. The group's individuals are then taken separately to their campsites. The teacher points out a flat area which looks like a good spot to put up your camp, and "poof" they're gone. This is where you will stay for the rest of the 20 hours alone.

One of the first things you must do is set up your camp; if it starts to rain, you will be wet in a matter of minutes. Some boys can struggle with this. Sure there are plenty of trees around, but you only get one rope, one tarp, two large sticks, and the environment. For cooking you get one cooker which you have previously made yourself out of cans, two sausages, one packet of noodles, two pieces of bread, and some other items. Several people had low to the ground tarps which only had one exit. Although the weather was pretty nice, the unexpected can happen.

The second thing is you have to deal with the boredom - although the teachers come to check on you once or twice, they visit, then leave. Sitting there in your camp with nothing to do can be torture for some people. That is why most people bring books, balls or some other form of entertainment. You can also eat your luxury food item. Every student is allowed to bring one food item, this can be a block of chocolate, a packet of chips, etc. This food satisfies most people who are bored.

As night slowly comes around the corner, you have plenty of time to think, and write a letter to your future self which the teachers will keep care of until you leave school. You would be surprised how quickly it gets cold. The familiar surroundings now become a strange dark place that you can hardly recognize, and you jump at every sound. I would suggest going to sleep before it gets too dark, so you can avoid tripping over your own feet when it is too dark to see.

After your uncomfortable night, you are told by a teacher that it is time. You leave your campsite with only a footprint and you only take the memories with you. The hut is now filled with chat from all the students before they are all fed sausages and bread.

The Rite Journey badges are then handed out. These badges can only be obtained by a student completing a certain amount of things that are challenging. These badges are still worn by Year 13s and they wear them with pride. The Rite Journey is definitely a life-changing experience.

#### **HISTORY** Teacher in Charge: Dr Jill Harland

In recent years, exhibitions and collections within museums have played a significant role in Education by developing historical empathy, and providing an opportunity for students to practise analytical and interpretative skills while making connections between the past and the present.

In 2015, the History Department intensified its collaboration with both local and national museums. In particular, studies of World War I history have been extended to provide for a more interactive experience for students both inside and outside the classroom environment. The latter initially commenced with increased

teaching time in our own Memorial Library with special coverage of the Jack Lovelock legacy, The Springbok Tour of 1981 and the iconic representations used in the stained glass window. Both Senior and Junior classes have benefitted greatly from this involvement in the history of our school and local culture.

History Scholarship students have also attended weekly meetings in the Memorial Library to further their studies. The recently acquired copy of the Magna Carta donated by one of our previous students has also been studied in relation to its unique 800 year old history.

All our senior students in History visited the South Canterbury Museum's exhibition on Gallipoli where primary sources such as letters detailed perspectives of those fighting in the Great War who heralded from Timaru and South Canterbury. Timaru Boys' High School were also invited this year to become a Research Partner with the Museum in creating historical material for the Scroll (South Canterbury Roll of Honour), which initially developed from short biographies of all South Cantabrians who served their country during World War I. One of the main objectives of this joint research programme is to document more individuals from the region and also support the one hundredth commemoration of World War I.

In June 2015, students from Year 13 History attended the Te Papa Student Day in Wellington. This was a wonderful opportunity to view an excellent and very interactive exhibition and archival collection entitled: 'Gallipoli: The Scale of our war.' The Lead Archivist, Kirstie Ross gave our boys a very warm welcome to the event as she had worked personally on the biography and representation in model form of Cecil Malthus. Malthus was born in Timaru in 1890 and attended Timaru Boys' High School prior to studying English and French at Canterbury College.

The visit to Wellington also included lectures at Wellington City and Sea Museum and the Great War Exhibition at the Dominion Museum, the latter created by Sir Peter Jackson. It is

envisaged that this excursion will become a yearly event for Year 13 students until the exhibition closes in 2018.

A great experience for all the boys involved.

The end of Term 3 was also hectic in the Outdoor Education Department. Yet again our Year 12 mountain bike trip was to Wanaka, which every boy agreed was far more interesting than having poor weather in Timaru and being in class. So over three days, the boys biked around the lake and improved their riding skills on the trails at Dean's Bank and Sticky Forest. Yet again we had great weather and a big thank you to Mr Chris Barclay, and EJ Hickey who helped out for the three days.

Our intrepid adventurers from the Year 11 class headed out into the Mt Somers and Peel Forest wilderness to battle nature, figure out the best way to not burn sausages, and important lessons on correct tent construction (important if it rains apparently). We managed not to lose anyone and the boys enjoyed the trip which was yet again a highlight of the year.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION HoD: Mr Grant McFarlane

The 2015 School Year has been another year of change and development in the Physical Education Department.

Tim Colson (2014 Head Boy) received a NCEA Scholarship in Physical Education which was an outstanding achievement for a very diligent and deserving student, Tim is currently studying Health Sciences at Otago University. Physical Education featured very strongly academically with seven boys gaining Excellence Endorsements and twenty five boys gaining Merit endorsements across all year levels.

The Physical Education department was very pleased to welcome the new addition of the TBHS Sporting Wall of Honour to the main foyer of the Gymnasium, these outstanding boards show our school's rich sporting past, which our students can then aspire to one day have their name etched in the history of the school.

The school-wide Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) initiative continues to be a priority in the Physical Education department with new curriculum materials designed around how the TBHS Power Values look in Physical Education. These new materials and units will give students a sense of belonging here at Timaru Boys' High School and identify the personal character traits that are valued in young men.

The continuation of recent initiatives such as the Swim School, Year 9 and 10 Haka and the senior mentoring and development of junior students have all been a great success this year. The TBHS Swim School is gaining in popularity and has been an excellent vehicle for senior students in the school to gain valuable leadership experience and opportunities, William McLeod has been at the forefront of the coaching and mentoring and his experience and enthusiasm have been positively received by all.

Some physical challenges across the year levels have seen boys inspiring themselves to improve on their own performances and set realistic goals for further improvement. This gives the boys an opportunity to reflect on their own performance and to utilise the theoretical component to make changes for future sporting endeavours.

#### TECHNOLOGIES HoD: Mr Mark Johnston

#### **DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY**

2015 has been a year of new beginnings and exciting change at Timaru Boys' High School. After a number of staffing changes over previous years, this was an opportunity to put in place solid plans and to build a platform for the future. Digital Technologies is an exciting area, and one with real relevance for the world in which the students live, and the future in which they will work. Throughout the year the focus has been on using Digital Technologies as a problem solving tool and students have been developing their computational thinking skills while working through a number of different projects.

In the junior classes, students have developed an understanding of the school network and gained experience in using the Google Apps ecosystem. They have explored basic programming concepts using Gamemaker (Year 9), and Scratch (Year10) and many students have created fantastic, fully playable games that incorporate mathematics and physics components to control aspects such as acceleration and gravity. Junior students have also developed skills with both Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator. These are industry standard tools which provide students with valuable experience in developing creative digital media. With the creativity and diligence shown by many of the junior students, the coming years are looking very bright indeed.

The senior classes have been hard at work all year, completing extensive and detailed projects. Digital Technologies is composed of many different strands including Digital Information, Digital Media, Computer Science & Programming. Our senior students have had the opportunity to explore each of these areas this year. In Programming, our Year 12 students have learnt the Python programming language and created fully functional text based programs, and at Year 13 the students have also developed their own graphical user interfaces. In Digital Media, students have showcased their Photoshop skills on websites that they have built using HTML and CSS, while Year 13 students have created impressive 3D models using Blender software.

2015 has also seen a number of innovations in Digital Technologies, with Peter Burke running a hardware and networking club for a group of enthusiastic Year 9 students. In Term 4, a lunchtime Photoshop club was started to provide another avenue for students to explore their creativity. Both of these projects are in their early stages, however across the department, a strong platform has been created for expansion and development in the future.

#### **FOOD DEPARTMENT**

The Food Department has had an extremely busy year and there have been many highlights. A continued focus for us is on strengthening community links to enhance the students' well-being, and the Food students did this by making gifts of food. To help celebrate and show appreciation of 100 years of ANZAC, the Food Department undertook a marathon effort to make nearly 1,000 Anzac biscuits. These were delivered by the

Year 10 Food Technology classes to representatives of the RSA. The interaction between the returned soldiers and the young students was a learning experience and equally appreciated. Packs of Anzac biscuits were delivered to 95 RSA members around Timaru. We wish to thank Bloomers for the donation of red ribbon that was used for these gifts.

The appointment of Mrs Marie Otley as the Food Technician has added a huge strength to the Department. Her knowledge, organisational skills, and community links have ensured us gaining the best prices for food. We wish to thank Farmers Mill for their sponsorship of products.

The Food and Nutrition students have had a very successful year, continuing to achieve well. It was pleasing to see two students enter into the South Island Saloon Culinaire Cooking competition. Facing up against tough competition from Southland Boys, Liam Arthur and Sam Early achieved an outstanding 1st place, but because they were too young, they were ineligible to go to Auckland for the finals. However, the competition experience was invaluable. We were very grateful for the use of a commercial kitchen to practise in and for the technique refinement and advice from Lindsay Bennett owner and Chef at Fusion Restaurant and his team.

The Year 13 class has investigated the concern of poor nutritional choices for breakfast. This saw them surveying the school, then teaching juniors to try and make a positive change to try and improve students' long term health and enhance their future potential, through good nutrition. Teaching the Year 9 class how to cook a variety of interesting and nutritious breakfast meals, along with eating them, was a highlight

Through the sustainability unit, the Year 12 Food and Nutrition students have broadened their skills to grow some of their own food and preserve it. They have enjoyed gaining skills that their grandparents have and cooking creative low cost foods.

The Hospitality students have enjoyed making a range of very good quality coffees for themselves and staff, and they continue to have a successful partnership with the Aoraki Polytechnic. Units focussed on Food Safety, knife skills and coffee making. All these units ensure that our boys will gain employment skills and skills for life.

The Junior Food Technology classes have enjoyed making pasta from scratch, food design challenges, and competitions along with demonstrations from Chefs to inspire them for their Chinese Challenge.

This year the Food Department decided to start a lunch club, which provides the use of the rooms facilities and this has been warmly welcomed by students.

#### **GRAPHICS**

2015 was a year of change for the Graphics department with the arrival of two new teachers, Greg Quinn and Jana McNaught into the department. With this change, there were also new units of work that were introduced for all year levels.

In each year level the boys seemed to be very positive about their learning and enjoyed each different unit of work that they had to complete.

3D printing was introduced at Year 9 level and it is hoped this will also be integrated into Year 10 classes and further. It was pleasing to see that some of the senior students used this technology as part of their design work. Further adjustment of the schemes to better suit the students will occur in 2016.

An initial goal for the Graphics room was to change the physical environment which has been done to some extent, although a positive change would be to add new work desks which would be in line with a changing philosophy within the Graphics department.

#### METALS DEPARTMENT AND ELECTRONICS

#### **YEAR 9 METAL TECHNOLOGY**

Students in Year 9 completed a 10 week rotation of study. They designed and made two projects incorporating the learning required to understand the importance of the design cycle. The first project introduced the use of the brazing torch to aid in the production of a pewter medallion. The second project introduced Tap and Die skills as well as use of a lathe to make the model wind turbine. This project also introduced a simple electric control circuit to charge an AA battery. Students evaluated their projects with assistance from their peers.

#### **YEAR 10 METAL TECHNOLOGY**

Students in Year 10 were challenged to expand their design skills in the production of an animal sculpture of choice. They used 3-D design software (using sketch up make) to aid in their design choices. They also had to decide on their materials and fabrication methods before embarking on the sculptures construction. Some students who completed their base model quickly were then challenged to improve their designs by incorporating moving parts for their sculptures. The resulting sculptures demonstrated a wide variety of innovative thinking by the students. After completing their projects students had to give a short five minute presentation to their peers about their design and fabrication development.

#### YEAR 11 METAL TECHNOLOGY NCEA LEVEL 1

Students followed a dual path in this optional route of study. They completed unit standards in Safety and following a plan to build a specified product. The product in question was a metal toolbox. This gave the students 12 Level 1 credits when successfully completed. After this was done they then switched to achievement standard work completing a design brief and prototype for a bottle holder that held at least six bottles. This was worth 10 credits when done for which they could also gain Merits or Excellences. In addition to all this they could also undertake a four Merit external assessment about materials. In the main the students worked with purpose to complete both their required documentation and project outcomes. The variety of design approaches demonstrated by this body of students showed that many would make fine potential engineers in the future.

#### YEAR 12 METAL TECHNOLOGY

This year saw a new project offered to the students in the form of the production of a team grass kart. Students worked in teams of no more than six students which resulted in three grass karts being constructed. They were given the option of also taking part in the South Island grass kart competition but only one of the three teams chose to partake of this option. This

project enabled the students to gain unit standards in a variety of task associated with all the skills required to successfully build a fully functional grass kart. In the course of the years study all three teams successfully built and tested their grass karts in addition to gaining their associated credits. The one team which took part in the South Island competition came 8th out of 15 teams.

#### **YEAR 12/13 ELECTRONICS**

This combined class of students followed two routes of study. The Year 12 students completed a variety of units at Level 2 that explored basic electrical and electronic concepts and how common components are combined to make a variety of circuits. In addition they made circuits incorporating discrete and semi-conductor components. Their major practical assessment was to build a fully functional audio amplifier. The Year 13 students explored in further depth how semi-conductor devices combine to function as more complex circuits. The major practical assessment was to improve a base circuit plan and incorporate a programmed IC to make a greenhouse controller. All the students worked diligently and managed to complete their studies two weeks before study leave.

#### **WOOD TECHNOLOGY**

This year has seen students produce innovative designs for wood based projects across the different year levels. Year 9 students continue to come up with challenging outcomes for their Pinball machines and it has been neat to see to inclusion of different mechanisms along with electronic circuits incorporated into the project. The shelving unit that Year 10 students designed extended their expectations on what a more aesthetic solution could be realised. Some exciting shapes emerged due to 3D thinking and interlocking parts fabricated from plywood.

Senior students honed their skills on a number of individually designed projects in order to meet the needs of their main stakeholder. Concrete has been introduced into the Year 12 course as a construction material for students to work with. A mould has been produced to pour concrete mixed with crushed glass into, the outcome being a planter box. When polished with a diamond incrusted blade the finished surface certainly had a nice sheen.

It has been pleasing to see a number of students benefit from their learning in this area through the opportunity to be involved in the Gateway program. This has enabled students to have authentic learning experiences outside of the school gates in order to give them a taste of a trade. The spin-off of this has been job opportunities that have opened up in the form of apprenticeships.

2015 has been a year of ups and downs for the various sporting codes. Rugby has gone from a stellar year in 2014 to a year where they lost two 1st XV coaches which had a flow-on effect for the team who played as hard as they could but ultimately struggled with the off-field confusion.

The outstanding effort of our two U18 rugby teams playing in the final was tempered by a lack of teams in this division and by the fact that there are no other town club teams in this grade. This has resulted in a number of school leavers having to play for the school as there is no other club to play for in Timaru at that age group.

Hockey celebrated the winning of the India Shield for only the 2nd time in their history as they defeated Auckland Grammar 2-0 in the final. This ranks the team 17th in the country.

Bowls, both indoors and out, grabbed the headlines with Tom Taiaroa excelling outdoors and Cameron and David Ellis winning the National Secondary Schools indoor pairs competition. All three of these boys look to have a great future ahead of them.

James Watt was a star on the tennis court while William MacLeod made a clean sweep of the senior titles in the swimming pool.

Success in archery and croquet demonstrated the wide breadth of sports that are available at Timaru Boys' High School. Currently there are twenty four sports offered at Timaru Boys' High School.

Participation rates in the school continue to be high with a participation rate of 74% which basically means that three out



of every four students are playing a sport of some category for the school. This continues to stack up well against the national average. 45% of staff are involved in sport in some way with fourteen teachers in coaching roles.

The winner of the Todd Burtenshaw Cup for Junior Sportsman of the year was Riley Taylor for swimming and the joint winners of the Sir Roy McKenzie trophy for Senior Sportsman of the Year were Cameron and David Ellis for Indoor Bowls.

A momentous occasion occurred for the school

The Wall celebrates over eighty Old Boys who are either Olympians, Commonwealth Games Athletes, World and New Zealand Champions and New Zealand full age group representatives. There are nineteen sports that are included in the wall. Names such as Jack Lovelock, Marc Ryan, Tom Walsh and Hayden Paddon appear on the board. The board has certainly attracted a lot of interest and discussion.

#### **SOUTH ISLAND ATHLETICS 2015**

It was a long but worthwhile trip to Nelson for a number of our athletes at the South Island Secondary Schools' Athletics Championships. The weather was mixed but the athletes who had done the hard training were given just reward for their efforts.

Each school provided a team of six archers who in turn put forward two competitors for each round. The competition consisted of a total of three rounds, with each round requiring archers to shoot six ends (groupings) of three arrows. From this, the scores were totalled.

Archers shoot from a static standing position into 80cm and 60cm targets from a distance of ten metres away. Keen eyes, a steady hand along with the bow sights correctly set are required from each participant to maximise scores.

TBHS students scored first placings in all three rounds, enabling them to take out honours for the second consecutive year.







# 1ST XI CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOLS COMPETITION

The year began in January with another tour of Australia by the 1st XI. This time the destination was Melbourne. The team played five games winning four of them, with the highlight being a win against Geelong Grammar, the current Victorian State Champion. The two batting stars were Jamie Trezise and Chris Hogan, both scoring in excess of 200 runs over the five games. The bowling was headed by Mark Otley with 10 wickets; and Sam Brosnahan, Josh Mehrtens and Sean Wills provided solid support with 8 or 9 wickets each. The tour was excellent in terms of development both individually and as a team. The team had excellent support from parents and was very well managed by Sam Richardson.

Following a successful promotion relegation series played against Ashburton College in December, the 1st XI resumed playing in the top tier of the Christchurch 1st XI competition after Christmas. This placed them in the top eight secondary schools in the Canterbury region.

The end of 2014 saw the departure of three long standing members - Jamie Trezise, Jacob O'Connor and Jack Green.

Their contribution to TBHS school cricket has been immense.

The season was a challenging one for a young team however. With a successful tour to Australia in January under their belt

they acquitted themselves well, finishing seventh out of eight teams after beating Shirley Boys' High School on their home ground.

The Interschool games were again challenging with losses in all three games. The challenge of playing consecutive days of cricket and the discipline of batting time are things that need to be developed if we are going to again become competitive in these fixtures.

There were some outstanding performances over the season with Josh Mehrtens scoring over 450 runs and taking 47 wickets; Chris Hogan scoring 628 runs including an unbeaten century and taking 20 wickets; Shaun Rooney scoring over 400 runs; and Mark Otley taking 39 wickets. All of the players contributed at some stage of the season and there is some exciting talent coming through which bodes well for the future.

Prior to Christmas, Josh Mehrtens was announced as the recipient of the Mark Parker Memorial Scholarship for 2015. Josh was the tenth recipient since the scholarship was introduced in memory of Mark Parker, who was killed in the 2002 Bali bombings. The scholarship was set up to advance the cricket and life skills of a cricketer at TBHS and is awarded annually. Josh spent twelve weeks of Term 2 as a boarder at

Mark Otley was chosen to represent Canterbury at the national Under 17 tournament held in Wellington in the middle

of January. Mark, a promising fast medium bowler was one of the youngest members of the squad and will be eligible for selection in this team again in 2016. Well done to Mark in being selected in this age group team at such a young age, he is obviously being ear marked as a young player of the future.

# **CANTERBURY ROAD RACE**

With the completion of the school event attention turned to the interschool competitions, the first of which was the Canterbury Road Race which took place in Christchurch's Hagley Park. 1st XI Football benefited during 2015 with some positive leadership and strategic planning from teacher in charge Cameron Gibb. The Football Committee chaired by Cameron Gibb took on-board some learning from the 2014 Football season and brainstormed ways of improving the football experience for the boys during 2015. This included the 1st XI style of play, consistent team structure, football on the School Rectory, improving relationships with South Canterbury Referees, building connections with opposing teams by holding after match functions for home fixtures and attending the hospitality offered by opposing teams after away games.

From a 1st XI perspective the key outcome was the style of play characterized by possessing the ball for large portions of the game, moving the ball quickly from one player to the next breaking opposing teams down with short and quick passes. This started by getting the boys more comfortable on the ball and getting them to keep the ball even when they're under pressure.

However the Coach, Manager and the players showed resolve to keep to plan and bounced back with a 4-3 win over Temuka in the second match of the season. In the fourth match of the Division 1 season the boys secured their second win with a fantastic come (0-2) from behind to win 3-2 away to Meadowbank.

During the first half of the season the team also had school exchange defeats to Christchurch Boys', Otago Boys' and St Andrew's College. This part of the season saw a strong performance against Pleasant Point in a Division One fixture. Although the boys lost 1-0 to the eventual champions this showed the positive progress being made and the character within the team.

In the local school battle for Timaru supremacy TBHS had already beaten Mountainview 9-2 in an earlier Division One fixture with included 'hat tricks' from Oliver Prisk and Ross Godwin when they faced each other in a two legged preliminary qualifying match for the Premier Secondary Schools Tournament. After a nervous 2-1 win away to Mountainview the boys secured a comprehensive 5-0 victory on a windy Rectory to win on aggregate 7-1.

During the rest of the Division One campaign the 1st XI secured further victories against Timaru City (2-0), Meadowbank (2-1), and Mountainview (4-0). A further draw against Thistle gave the team 19 points for the season. In the last match of the Division One season the 1st XI played Timaru City with a chance of finishing fourth in the league. Unfortunately after dominating most of the play the boys lost 1-0 and had to settle for a creditable sixth place.

In the Secondary Schools Premier Tournament qualification after the win over Mountainview TBHS faced another two

legged fixture against Cashmere. In one of only a few disappointing performances during the season the 1st XI lost 3-1 on the Rectory to face a difficult task of overturning this in the return away fixture. The boys showed lots of character and resolve again and after pressing for a result finally lost the match 5-2 and the tie overall 8-3.

In the South Canterbury Men's Cup the 1st XI had a comfortable 5-0 win over Timaru City reserves to draw Timaru City As in the Quarter Finals. In an entertaining match on the bare Caledonian Ground the boys again played the best football but could not see off a resilient City team. The teams were locked together at 2-2 after extra time. Unfortunately the older more experienced Timaru City team went through to the semi-finals 4-2 with the resultant penalty kicks.

In the last of the traditional school exchanges for the season the 1st XI needed a strong second half performance to eventually beat Waitaki Boys' 4-1.

After being knocked out of the Premier Secondary Schools competition the 1st XI entered the Jim Wishhart Tournament in Christchurch. The team started well in their first group match with a convincing win over Hagley Community School 6-1. However defeats in the last two group matches to Ashburton College and Middleton Grange saw TBHS boys playing for the 9-16 places.

Two good victories over Hillmorton (8-0) and Mt Aspiring (1-0) resulted in the boys playing for 9th/10th place. In the last game of the season the boys finally ran out of steam and lost the match 4-1 to Wanganui High.

Overall during the season the team acquitted themselves extremely well. They won praise from the opposing teams and referees for the attractive style of play and from referees particularly for their attitude during the South Canterbury Men's Division One campaign. Max Pierce and Jack Deeley led the team admirably during the season as co-captains.

A tally of 19 points during this campaign was a vast improvement on the three secured during the 2014 campaign. The attendance from the boys at the home and away after match functions was extremely positive and achieved the aim of improving relationships with opposing teams and referees alike. This could not have happened without the excellent support from parents who supplied and prepared teas for home fixtures and meticulously cleared up afterwards. The support from parents during matches was extremely encouraging to all the players and helped immensely with the overall ethos within the Timaru Boys' 1st XI. This was typified by the support not just with local matches but with those played in Christchurch.

Ross Stevenson, Team Manager showed his experience in this role throughout the season but particularly at Tournament. This was appreciated by Steve Deeley and the team.

#### PLAYER PROFILES

Hamish Rodgers (Goalkeeper) – Hamish played in all 32 matches during the season. He stepped up from playing 16th Grade during the 2014 season into the school's number one role. Throughout the 2015 campaign Hamish acquitted himself extremely well especially in the demanding South Canterbury Men's Division One league for a young goal-keeper. Hamish had a number of highlights during the year however his outstanding save in the match away to Meadowbank in the last minute sticks out to secure the team a 3-2 win. Hamish was selected to play in the South Canterbury Men's representative team at the end of the season which is testament to his growing reputation in the region.

Max Pierce (Midfield and Co-Captain) – Max played in 31 matches during the season. His attitude and commitment as a player and captain was faultless during the season's campaign. Often Max's energy and enthusiasm were a catalyst which inspired the team during the difficult battles. Max often played deeper in midfield, winning the ball with his competitive tackles and releasing the attacking midfielders and forwards with good vision and awareness. Although playing the deeper role Max still scored six goals for the season, notably his goal in the early win against Temuka 4-3. Like this year Max will be a key player next season in his last season for TBHS 1st XI.

Jack Deeley (Central Defender and Co-Captain) – Jack played in 30 matches during the 2015 season and is currently the most experienced 1st XI player with 85 appearances to date. Due to the team dynamics Jack played in central defence throughout the season which he handled calmly and with a degree of high confidence. Jack's distribution from the back with short or long range passes ensured the team's philosophy of maintaining ball possession was maintained. Jack still contributed four goals from centre back with the highlight being his free kick in the win 3-2 away to Meadowbank. Jack will be a key player next season also in his last season for TBHS 1st XI.

**Dylan Fraser** (Central Defender) – Dylan played in all 32 matches in his last season and finished with 65 overall for TBHS 1st XI. Dylan's no fuss attitude and resilience based upon his natural ability to read situations and deal with them effectively made him a key player during this campaign. Dylan leaves school at the end of 2015 and will be missed by the TBHS team. He will be an excellent signing for one of the other senior teams in Timaru next season and we will need to be at our creative best to beat Dylan when we meet his opposing team next year.

Ross Godwin (Striker) – Ross played in all 32 matches last season and now has 55 total for TBHS 1st XI to date. Ross's 100% commitment was motivational during some difficult games. He was always willing to listen to advice and added some key elements to his game which enhanced his performance and that of the team. This is particularly noted in his improvement to hold the ball up and bring other players into the game. For any striker a return of 19 goals in 32 matches is a great achievement and one he should be proud of. His two goals in the defeat by Pleasant Point (8-4) were superb and gave the team some hope of pulling off the upset. Ross is another player in his last season next year at TBHS and will be a key player.

**Oliver Prisk** (Midfield) - Oliver played in 31 matches last season and now has 66 appearances for the 1st XI overall. During this campaign he scored seven goals with the highlight his hat trick over Mountainview High School in the 9-2 win in the South Canterbury Division One fixture. Oliver is extremely dangerous at all angles around the edge of the opposing team's box. He has the ability to deliver something 'special' in this attacking area which he did on a number of occasions. Oliver is comfortable on the ball, technically adept and creative, especially when he takes on players in the key areas of the final third. Oliver is

another player in his last season next year at TBHS and will be a key player then.

**Cam Anderson** (Striker) – Cameron played 31 matches for TBHS 1st XI last season and now has 45 overall to date. He was the squad's second top scorer with 10 goals for the season. The highlight was his hat-trick against Mountainview in the second leg of the Secondary Schools qualifier. Cameron is technically gifted and excels when on the ball. He will make good decisions and rarely gives the ball away cheaply. Cameron holds the ball up well linking positively between midfield and attack. Cameron is another player to watch next season.

**Ben Deeley** (Midfield) – Ben played 29 matches for the 1st XI last season and now has 30 overall. Ben has a bright 1st XI future in front of him as he is currently still finishing Year 10. He also played the majority of last season at less than 100% fit through injury, but still had a major impact on the team in central midfield, often dynamic when taking players on or creating opportunities for team mates in key areas. Ben is technically very proficient and has the pace to cause opposing defenders problems. He scored nine goals last season and promises to deliver more next year. Ben is another key player to watch from a game and leadership perspective.

**Gali Templeton** (Fullback) – Gali made 27 1st XI appearances last season and overall has represented the school at this level on 32 occasions. Due to the team dynamics Gali played the majority of the season at right back rather than his preferred position in midfield. He adapted to this change superbly and rarely gave a below par performance. Gali is technically good and does the simple things really well. He is a good fit for the new TBHS philosophy of ball retention until the ball reaches areas that can hurt the opposing teams. Gali did manage to get on the scoresheet once with a goal against Pleasant Point.

**Caleb Riley** (Midfield) – Caleb made 25 appearances this season and now has 33 for the 1st XI overall. He was totally committed last season and took feedback positively during coaching one to one conversations. Caleb continued to grow his game and is prepared to put the extra work in to make this happen. He did get on the score sheet last season once with a goal in the 6-1 win over Hagley Community College at Tournament.

**Hamish Murdoch** (Midfield/Striker) – Hamish made 23 appearances this season and now has represented the 1st XI on 55 occasions. Hamish made the transition from goalkeeper to outfield player this season and had a positive impact in a number of games scoring four goals in the campaign. 

not enter, with only TBHS and St Bede's on the card, along with seven North Island teams. Some schools do take part in an invitational tournament for U15s during the same week, which is a shame.

Looking at the teams we would be facing it did appear as though we would have an uphill battle as they were significantly bigger than us and generally have their own turf facilities, so on paper it did not look good. With five teams in our pool we started off with a bye, next we faced a very strong Hamilton Boys' 3rd XI (a team that eventually came second, beating their 2nd XI) and went down a creditable 2-0. We could not match their development programme or their ability to import and pay coaches, so we were happy with the way the game went. The Tuesday saw us face Wellington College. A tight game that could have gone either way, unfortunately it went their way with a single goal in the second half. On the Wednesday we played Tauranga Boys' HS. A great game that we won 2-1 with goals from Jimmy Robertson and James Copland. In the afternoon we played Palmerston North Boys'. The final ended up 1-2 with another goal from Jimmy Robertson. These results meant that we ended up 4th in our pool of five. What we hadn't realised was that getting third would see us not have a game on the Thursday so we were pleased to have come 4th.

As we left the ground at the conclusion of pool play, Whangarei Boys' did a rousing haka which looked quite intimidating. We discussed how we would meet the challenge when we faced them the next day. Our boys were significantly smaller and no-one felt they could lead the haka with the mana it deserved. 

#### **SEASON REVIEW**

The 2015 Rugby season was a reasonably successful one in many ways albeit very challenging. Reflecting overall we are making progress but some areas definitely still need to improve and this report will outline some of these. This year we had about 250 registered boys across 11 teams. There were more injuries this year due to the dry weather meaning a lot of knocks particularly early in the season.

This meant once again we were the biggest Rugby Club in the area by some distance. However having these numbers meant some big challenges; simply organizing this quantity as well as finding sufficient help for all teams was a huge challenge. Having good people involved with the day to day running of these teams and at committee level is the biggest area we still need help with.

The committee deserves credit for their work this year. It's a small group which we must look at expanding, but their input is incredible. Margaret Hayes will leave the committee this year after six great years of service. The work she completed in a number of areas has been invaluable and she will be missed. Many of her roles will be hard to replace.

Facebook continued to be the main way we communicated with boys and parents this year. This is a marvellous tool for those on it and it has been used for much of our organisation. By the end of the year all teams were using this tool effectively. Challenges remain communicating with those parents not using Facebook and we may look at emailing a lot more information to them in 2016.

The beauty of Facebook is the updates are live and things such as photos are well liked by the boys. When their name is tagged on it, any links to them pop up on their phone instantly and we know as a committee who has read the message so there are no excuses for the boy not responding to it in the right manner. It has taken time for all coaches and managers to maximize this tool but the vast majority do now.

School Park was rock hard this year due to the drought. This was a change from the normal and players took a while to adjust. Several concussions occurred throughout the region. There is also now a lot more gear at School Park for our teams and it is all well used. This is an area of real improvement over the last decade and we are confident this will continue in the future

The half game rules continued to have a lukewarm place amongst all clubs. It relies totally on the honesty of all teams and this is simply not there, particularly in big games. We can be confident that we do this well, sometimes too well and it has impacted on our results. Dispensations and regrade issues continue to rear their ugly head and limited solutions have been found in this area

Zac Saunders and Thomas Edwards made the Crusaders Schools Training group. This is a great achievement. Unfortunately Zac could not participate due to a serious injury but for Thomas to make this at prop as an Under 15 player in Year 11 is outstanding. He has a big future in the game and you could see his game go to another level on his return.

The Cantabrians camp was also attended by two of our boys. This camp is a development group where 1st XVs nominate people whom they believe have potential on and off the field and will do well in the game when they leave school. Liam Cooper and Kurt Whittaker-Prendeville thoroughly enjoyed the experience of going to this and came back a lot better for the experience.

Year 13 players numbered 33 this year. We take this opportunity to wish you all well for the future whether it is on or off the rugby field. This year two boys joined us from Fiji and lived at the Hostel. Both fitted in well in to the School and Club. Thanks to all the group of people who helped out looking after these boys in the best way they could.

Sevens Rugby continues to grow as a sport. Following on from Todd Skevington, Nate Robinson became coach and manager for 2015 and the numbers for this were high. An Aoraki event was held, though we were the only school to turn up and then the boys attended the Crusaders event, coming third. Planning for the next few years has already begun with sponsors now coming on board.

This year we mixed all our teams except the 1st XV and 15A Colts. Overall this proved successful and with no 16A team this year it meant the other four teams in Under 18 and Under 16 were stronger with more depth. There is still no reason why an U16A cannot happen but to do it resources around other teams must be strong enough to cope with it. From our perspective this year, this was not the case and we were proved correct.

The Under 14 A team completed extra trainings as group of about 30 throughout the season and then the best 20 played three Exchanges, all of which were lost. This was a difficult year for this team and some areas need to be addressed on and off the field. It is a challenge for this team to do well but one we must meet full on as this team needs and does have an important place in our system.

Well done to all the boys who made the Town and South Canterbury teams. There were many of you and it was also pleasing that many of you gained awards at the South Canterbury Awards. Also winning that night was our U14.5 Tigers team who gained the most points by any IAB team in South Canterbury this year, ahead of even the two teams who finished higher than them on the points table for the season.

As always there are many Sponsors that make any Rugby Club be the success it is. Our group this year consisted of KPMG, Spraymarks, McCain, Johnson Gluyas Tractors, Peter Walsh & Associates, XCM Group, Stuart Chapman, The Sail Café and Bar, Export Meat Warehouse, Highfield Service Station plus 1st XV jersey sponsors and also the many 'host families' in our livestock scheme. Apologies if anyone was missed.

The 1st XV had a difficult season marred by changes in management mid-season. The final placing was 10th in the University Championship and four losses from four games in the Exchange programme. The competition was stronger this year than it had been for a few years and with some serious injuries and indifferent form at times affecting us, we missed the Top 8.

We take this opportunity to thank all those involved in this team at a management level for the time and energy you gave to this team. Mark Cvitanich was with them all year and was excellent with the boys on and off the field. Graham Sharp stepped in when we really needed him and provided great experience for the boys. Rod Sparrow and Tom Shelker deserve great recognition for the work they put in also.

2016 coaches and managers have been appointed. Graham Sharp and Mark Cvitanich return and they will be assisted by Gavin Miller. We believe going forward these three will provide a good platform for the 2016 team to be successful after a difficult 2015. Eddie Grace has been appointed as Manager and Rod Sparrow will be back as School Liaison.

In the Under 18 grade we had two even teams where our next best 40 players showcased their skills. Our two teams were clearly the best in the grade and deserved the right to play in the Final. The final score was 22-18 to the Blue team in what was a very tough game. This was the fourth time the two teams had played this season and there were never more than eight points in any of the games.

In the Under 16 grade our 15A Colts team was the best of our three teams. They finished 3rd for the season and were very unlucky to not go further. This is a young team with good potential, who once they found their feet in this grade, did well. The other two teams, Blue and White, also had a good season finishing 5th and 8th. These boys were divided based on Town and Country. This worked and is something we may look to continue.

These latter two teams also played a school from Australia, James Sheehan Catholic High School from Orange. This was a hugely successful two days and something that we want to continue, either with them coming again or with us travelling that way. We also had Melbourne Grammar visit in June; they won versus our U14A team.

Nelson College 14A, 16A and 2nds visited in August where we won the 16A game and Darfield 1st XV visited in July and our 3rd XV won this game. These matches are all invaluable for our boys and provide them with opportunities to play other boys from other areas. The local competition, through no fault of anyone, does not provide for this at all.

The 15A Colts team had a very successful tournament losing only one game to the host school Shirley Boys' on the first day. Thereafter the team won games well versus Nelson College, King's High and Christ's College to gain a very respectable 3rd place from 8 teams. Several boys stepped up well over the week and have a lot of potential for the future. This team was a credit to the school at tournament on and off the field.

In the Under 14.5 grade we had five teams of 18 players out of 14 teams in the grade. This meant everyone got the game time they wanted but it also meant at times we were definitely stretched in terms of numbers when the flu hit at finals times. Our results were adequate this season but there are areas where we need to improve. For example we were just not as fit overall as we can be and this must change.

The Panthers, Jaguars and Leopards finished in the bottom half of the grade but the Tigers and Cheetahs were very impressive, finishing 3rd and 6th respectively. Many new capable players were found but the feeling was we were not pushing the boys as hard as we possibly could have. Some more structure was still needed as well as greater discipline by many of our boys.

The TBHS Rugby scene is organised by a small group of volunteer teachers, parents and friends who want to help all our boys succeed in this sport. We thank you all and also thank the many coaches and managers who help the individual teams. To the boys who played, thank you. We appreciate the effort you put in and we want to see you all back next year.

Several members of this group moved on at the end of 2015. Most notably Don Garland after many years of service will not be on the committee in 2016. Also Steve and Vicki McKnight have moved on after being President and Secretary this year as well as a great job helping looking after our Fijian and Tongan players. Margaret Hayes also leaves after six years of outstanding service in a variety of contexts.

Graham Bolton does an amazing job as TBHS Rugby Club Captain. The work he does is beyond the call of duty. He puts many hours in to aspects of the Rugby Club and he always has best interests of the boys at heart. In the committee the following people can also be acknowledged, Mark Cvitanich,

#### **SEASON EVENTS**

#### January - March:

#### April:

Eleven of our teams start competitions across the province. All teams apart from 15A Colts and the 1st XV are of even and mixed ability. For the first time in several years Grading Day is held so dispensations can be checked by all clubs.

#### May

For the first time we had a TBHS Club Day. This was a hugely successful event with the feature game leading to a commanding victory to the 1st XV over Roncalli.

The weather curtailed the majority of the Christchurch Boys' Exchange. The 1st XV game was not played but the 2nd XV had a good win while the 15A Colts just lost.

Having two teams of equal ability was starting to work; both U18 teams at the top of the table while the Town and Country approach to selecting U16 was also successful.

#### June:

The 1st XV lost to St Andrew's College but the 2nd XV and the 15A won. 16A also lost. Against Otago Boys' the 1st XV and 15A suffered heavy defeats.

Local competitions continued with good results in U18 and U16. The U14.5 results were up and down and planning started for their A team to practice and play.

#### Julv:

# September:

The 15A Colts finished Tournament in third place, a great achievement. The team only lost to Shirley Boys' while King's High, Nelson College and Christ's College were all beaten. Southland Boys' won the Tournament.

Nelson College visited post season. This was a great initiative; one we will look to continue. The 16A won but the 2ndXV and 14A did not. The James Sheehan visit was superb also with both U16 teams playing them.

#### October:

The 1st XV coaches are appointed for 2016 and planning begins for the new season.

The TBHS 7s team attended the Crusaders tournament and did very well, finishing in third place.

The established coaches from the 2015 season brought in a new backline coach in Mark Cvitanich who saw the Colts through to a very successful 2014 season. The pre-season training period saw a wider training squad of 60 boys begin training in November. The three pre-season games saw wins over Rangiora and Shirley Boys' with a loss against Burnside in Christchurch. It was clear from the outset that 2015 would be a much more challenging season than 2014 with less experience in the squad. A young squad was picked by the three coaches with an eye to the future.

The season started with the long trip to Nelson for a tough away game against an experienced team. A poor start cost us the game but a strong second half performance showed some good potential. An excellent home win 58-5 followed in the local derby against Roncalli with some excellent running rugby played. The next two home games brought a loss against St Bede's despite playing most of the game in their half and a win against Lincoln. This was followed by three consecutive away games with a loss against Christ's College, a narrow win over Ashburton College in a televised game and a loss against eventual cup winners Shirley Boys'. We also played a midweek inter school in Dunedin against the powerful Otago Boys'. The decision to rest a number of our frontline players resulted in a heavy loss 67-0.

The next game at home against St Andrew's College proved pivotal for injuries, ending the season for both Zac Saunders and Isireli Kawa, while side-lining half back Tyler Blackburn and prop Thomas Edwards. These two players returned to the team after a few weeks. A narrow unexpected loss the following week to St. Thomas's cost the team a top 8 playoff chance.

During this period the unexpected resignation from Shane Enright resulted in Mark Cvitanich taking over as head coach mantle and Graham Sharp joining the team as the new forwards coach.

Three away games followed with a win over Rangiora and two heavy losses against Marlborough Boys' in Blenheim and eventual runners up Burnside in Christchurch. The second last pool game was at home against a very classy Christchurch Boys' High team with our boys playing exceptionally well, taking a half time lead after a very good performance, and only narrowly losing 22-16 with a try disallowed on full time. The final pool game was a win against Waimea College in a home game in Hanmer Springs (a two year arrangement to meet half way).

The end of the pool games saw us even on points with Christ's College and Ashburton but with the best for/against ratio. However, the rules of the competition relate back to the games between the three even teams which meant we despite finishing 9th on the table and had to play away for the next two games.

To all the parents and supporters and Old Boys thank you for your support this year and long may it continue.

Overall the season proved challenging but very satisfying as we were able to give many young future star players a chance to play against the best players on the South Island in a very tough competition. This will hold the team in good stead for the next few seasons with fifteen returning players next season. Nine of these players still have two or more seasons at TBHS.



## THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT REFLECTS

One of my goals was to encourage and participate in regional gatherings of Old Boys around the country. Ifeel that I have had some success in that respect, having attended nine functions in seven different centres during 2015. These, of course, happen only thanks to the efforts of a core of dedicated Old Boys around the country. Some of these have been doing the task for years; others have willingly "started from scratch" this year. My sincere thanks goes out to all who have responded to my encouragement.

Another of my goals has been to see more "young" Old Boys involved in the Association and its activities. Attendees at functions tend to be mostly those who attended school between about 1950 and 1980. For me this is ideal. These were the main part of my teaching years and I get to meet lots of fellows of whom I have memories.

But the future of the Association lies with the Old Boys of the next three decades. Branches need to make a conscious effort to involve these younger men. Auckland and Mid-Canterbury are leading the way in this respect. I hope that other areas can follow their lead.

I noted four years ago the need for the Association to keep up with modern developments in communication. This is something that we have not done well. The Old Boys' website has remained well out of date, and an executive subcommittee formed to update it has found problems. Once again, the Auckland Branch has led the way, with an excellent website promoting their regional activities.

But communication has improved through the distribution of the monthly school newsletters to all Old Boys for whom we have email addresses. We continue to receive interesting responses, with many leading to new subscriptions to the Association and interesting news items for the Timaruvian.

Throughout my term of office, I have enjoyed excellent relationships with two Rectors, with teaching and office staff, and with pupils. Last year, I noted that the School is a friendly and welcoming place. That situation still pertains.

Executive Chairman Jeff Elston will report on the work of the executive and the archival team. I thank all those Old Boys for their continuing contribution. Thanks also go to Old Boys' Editor Gregor Macaulay for his ongoing work, although publication delays within the school continue to be frustrating.

There are exciting times ahead for Timaru Boys' High School. Planning for the upgrading of the frontage of the school administration block is well under way, thanks to a generous donation from an Old Boy. For those of you (and there were many of you) who deplored the decision to demolish the old main block in 1977, now is your opportunity. You can contribute to a new frontage, which will bring back some of the former visual features and match more appropriately the Memorial Library frontage.

Thomas House also has major building plans, to bring the older accommodation in line with the standards expected today. Boarder parents have already begun major funding schemes. Former boarders will be given the opportunity to contribute to this project as the year progresses.

By the time that you are reading this, the Association will probably have a new National President. We hope that the role will be taken over by C.G. (Chris) Moore (1957-1961) of Havelock North. Chris has been a stalwart supporter of the Association since his school days. He is well-known as an enthusiastic and efficient organiser of Old Boy functions in both the Wellington and Hawkes Bay regions. He has the added advantage of being familiar to the older generation of Old Boys as the son of N.A. (Buster) Moore (1913-1915; staff 1920-1960). I wish Chris well as he works to further stimulate Old Boy activity around the country.

For my own part, I shall try to maintain the Old Boys' database and contribute to other tasks for as long as I am able. I have lived within 200 metres of Timaru Boys' High School for 58 of the last 62 years. I have no wish to break a lifelong association.

## NATIONAL EXECUTIVE REPORT

The Timaru-based National Executive met regularly throughout 2015, maintaining the administration of the Association's routine activities.

The annual general meeting in April brought few changes to the executive personnel. Brent Bruce, former treasurer of the North Canterbury branch, took over as National Treasurer, relieving Aaron May of the role. Aaron had volunteered as Treasurer following the sudden death of Graeme Gliddon in 2013, willingly taking on this task in addition to all the work that he does for Old Boys as computer and database specialist.

Laurie Shanks was re-elected as National Secretary, now well into his second decade in the role. I was re-appointed as Executive Chairman, and Gregor Macaulay was re-appointed as Old Boys' Editor.

The only new member elected to the executive was Edward R. Patterson. Edward attended TBHS from 1993 to 1997, before graduating from the University of Canterbury with a teaching degree. He joined the TBHS staff as a reliever in 2004, became sports co-ordinator, and has latterly been a full-time member of the teaching staff.

During the year the Executive hosted two social functions for local Old Boys, one following the annual general meeting in April and the other following the annual inter-school sporting fixture with Waitaki BHS in August. School staff members and some parents shared the post-Waitaki function.

Executive members also hosted visitors to the Memorial Library on the School Open Day, and another successful Open Day was held between Christmas and New Year. An advertisement in the *Ashburton Guardian* attracted a number of Mid-Canterbury visitors.

There was another social function in October, when many of the Year 13 leavers were entertained to afternoon tea in the Thomas House dining room.

The need for effective communication with Old Boys has been on the Executive's agenda throughout the year. The Rector's proposal to distribute the regular school newsletters to all Old Boys with email addresses on the database proved well worthwhile, bringing interesting replies and some new members.

We have recognised the need to improve the Old Boys' website. A committee of Cameron Gibb, Aaron May and Edward Patterson is working on re-development. The Auckland Branch has provided us with a fine example of what can be achieved by improved communication.

#### **MEMORIAL LIBRARY REPORT 2015**

The Memorial Library remains the focus of Old Boy activities, and it is still the magnet that attracts many Old Boys back to North Street. The maintenance of the Memorial Library and its contents remains a major focus of the Old Boys' Foundation. As Custodian and Archivist, I am delighted to have the support of the enthusiastic team of researchers and cataloguers whose contribution has been noted in previous years. Doug Drake, Gordon Bower, John Button and John Freeborn have continued to work faithfully through the year, despite the need for some of them to take "time out" for health problems. Gordon Bower, in particular, has taken a special role in the "detective" task

of matching names to photographs using some new computer technology. We appreciate the time that he spends on Old Boy tasks at home, as well as during his days on site.

Aaron May and his staff at M-Tech Computers continue to generously provide the technical back-up on which all the work on the archives and database depends.

As reported last year, money from the Colin McLeod bequest was to be used to upgrade the storage and technical facilities in the small archives room. This work has progressed during the year, providing additional space for the archiving team.

The Library is well used. All Year 9 classes have orientation sessions there, establishing their connections with school history. Classes in social studies and history make use of the book collections and archive material. The keen research



We decided to widen the possible numbers by getting the Old Girls involved and, while we knew of some of them, we needed






It is very likely the exercise will be repeated in the new year.

The 2015 award of the Cup was to A.J. (Jim) Wakefield (1947-1951), of Christchurch, for his contribution to harness racing and his philanthropic activities. After he was appointed a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) in the 2012 Queen's Birthday Honours List, The *Timaruvian* reported on his considerable involvement in racing administration. As the representative of the New Zealand Trotting Owners Association, he was a board

member of Harness Racing New Zealand from 2000 to 2010, and held the role of chairman from 1999 to 2003. During this time, he played a key role in promoting a number of important changes, especially the development of the Racing Act 2003, and from 2003 to 2006 was Harness Racing New Zealand's inaugural appointee on the New Zealand Racing Board. He also chaired the organising committee for the 2007 World

But his interests and philanthropy extend beyond horses. In 1999, Jim and his wife Susan established the Ravenscar Trust, which now has assets of \$18 million. Over the past 15

years it has donated \$895,000 to charitable organisations and initiatives such as the Christchurch Art Gallery, the Canterbury Charity Hospital, Isaac Theatre Royal, Nurse Maude, the Local Heroes project at The Arts Centre and educational scholarships. It was announced in December 2015 that the Christchurch City Council had gifted land in central Christchurch to Canterbury Museum for the proposed Ravenscar House Museum, a contemporary house museum to display the Ravenscar Trust's collection of New Zealand arts, sculpture, modernist furniture and classical antiquities. There are five paintings by Colin

McCahon and ten by Frances Hodgkins amongst the 110 New Zealand paintings from the 19th century to the present day in the collection. And TBHS is especially grateful for the Trust's annual funding of the Jim Wakefield Scholarship for a senior student proceeding to study at the University of Canterbury.

Jim's professional career was as an accountant and company director. He joined the Christchurch office of what became KPMG in 1952 and spent 27 years as a partner in the firm, with three of these as Christchurch managing partner.

## A CAREER IN GEOMORPHOLOGY



Martin Thoms

When Martin C. Thoms (1972-1976) attended Timaru Boys' High School, he was noted as a talented and versatile sportsman. He played soccer (as it was then known) for the First XI and was a leading member of the A basketball team in his senior years. He was also a talented athlete throughout his school career, in both sprints and events, representing Canterbury at the National Athletics Championships on several occasions. Martin was

accredited UE, but he would be the first to admit that his name never figured significantly in academic prize lists.

But since leaving school Martin has become very successful in the academic world. He has been associated with six different universities over the last 40 years, and has held a professorship since 2008. His research endeavours have been recognised through numerous awards and appointments to various national and international scientific panels. In 2002 he was awarded the Binghamton International Geomorphology Symposium Prize for innovation in geomorphology and won the University of Canberra Vice-Chancellor's award for innovation and excellence in research and enterprise in 2005 and 2007. He has served a term with the United Nations International Scientific Team to determine water allocations in the Kingdom of Lesotho and was recently appointed as a senior international research fellow with the US Geological Survey.

Martin attended the University of Canterbury (1977-1981), completing a BSc (Hons) degree and then an MSc in Geomorphology. From 1985 to 1988 he studied at the University of Loughborough in the UK, graduating with a PhD in fluvial geomorphology. He was then awarded a postdoctoral research fellowship at the University of Adelaide (1989-1991), working with the River Murray laboratory for four years. The periods in between were filled with global travel and the undertaking of various pursuits, like surveying the sunken German World War One Fleet in the Scapa Flow, off the Orkney Islands, and restoration activities in the rivers of Kruger National Park, South Africa.

In 1993 Martin joined the staff of the University of Sydney, and in 1998 transferred to a position as Associate Professor at the University of Canberra. At the University of Canberra he established Riverine Landscapes Research Laboratory, which became a very productive team of scientists and managers that focused on providing research to underpinning the management of rivers within the Murray Darling Basin, Australia. While at the University of Canberra he joined the Co-operative Research Centre for Freshwater Ecology where became the programme leader for the Flow-Ecology programme.

Martin became Professor of Geography and Planning at the University of New England, NSW, in 2009. In the following year he was elected as President of the International Society of River Science, and in 2012 he was awarded a Senior Fulbright Research Fellow. This enabled him to spend six months doing research on river systems with the US Geological Service in the Upper Mississippi system. He is currently the Director of the Research Institute of Rural Futures at the University of New England.

In his spare time, Martin rides his mountain bike competitively and has three energetic retrievers that keep him busy. Despite living in Australia, he is a very keen All Blacks supporter.

# HONOURED BY THE QUEEN

Three Old Boys and one former staff member were named in the Queen's Birthday Honours in 2015.



David L. Halstead (Preparatory School 1958-1961),

of Christchurch, was awarded the Queen's Service Medal for services to business and the community. After TBHS, David boarded at St Andrew's College, Christchurch, then studied at Massey

University and Lincoln College. He began his working career in a wool industry job focused on the processing of raw materials into fabrics in the late 1960s, then much later moved on to owning his own business. He worked in Dunedin for Alliance Textiles from 1980 until he left in 1988 to become South Island manager for Vita New Zealand, a petrochemical and plastics firm with 120 staff that made furniture and bedding. After seven years he bought HydraQuip, a supplier of pressure cleaning equipment, which he sold in 2008. A former president

of the Canterbury Employers' Chamber of Commerce, he was also a member of the Canterbury Manufacturers' Association and is chair of the Merivale Business Association. He was a member of the Christchurch College of Education board for ten years from 1997. From 2007 he served on the Christchurch Polytechnic Institute of Technology council and as a trustee of the Otautahi Education Development Property Trust. He has been Honorary Consul for Austria in the South Island for several years.



D.G. (Don) McFarlane (1958-1960), of Geraldine, was appointed Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) services to agriculture and the community over a period of more than 50 years. He

operates a farm near Temuka and has also been instrumental in growing cooperative businesses for rural communities, including Combined Rural Traders (CRT), Farmlands, New Zealand Honey and Blackcurrants New Zealand. He has served as chairman of the Aoraki Regional Development Council, as Federated Farmers South Canterbury president, and as a district councillor. He is currently involved in the community as Director of Presbyterian Support, and through the Temuka Challenge Trust, Ngai Tahu iwi, Lions International and as a Justice of the Peace. He is currently a director of Hunter Downs and the South Canterbury Irrigation Trust. He chairs Clough Holdings and is a director of Farmlands and Moeraki Investments. Don said he has always found South Canterbury a positive community and a place where "things get done".

Graeme D. Murray (1957-1959) was also appointed MNZM, for services to tourism and conservation. Graeme was major figure in the development of Lake Tekapo's Air Safaris, the company running sight-seeing flights over the Southern Alps, working with the

company from 1971 to 2001. He then co-founded Earth and Sky Astro Tourism, a night-time astronomy tourism business. As part of the company, he worked to refurbish and install a modern telescope in an unused observatory on Mt John and constructed a conservatory-like café. The business draws around 75,000 tourists per year: "They just breathe in the air and they grasp the spirit of the atmosphere. It is a very special place for the community." Graeme has also been involved in preserving the darkness of the night sky in the Mackenzie region and has served 20 years on the South Canterbury Regional Development Council and 14 years on the Mackenzie Tourism and Development Board.

A. Keith R. Mair (staff 1976-1985), now living in Wrexham, North Wales, was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) for services to basketball. Born in Taumarunui, where he first played basketball aged 16, Keith graduated in accounting from Victoria University, and his subsequent career has encompassed chartered accountancy, stockbroking, teaching, coaching and sports administration. At TBHS, he built the basketball team into a national force,

and his vision also saw the development of the Seahorses, a South Canterbury national second division side that attracted packed houses for home games. He was head Tall Blacks coach from 1988 to 2000 - before that having been assistant coach for four years and coach of the under 20s team from 1980 to 1983. He also led New Zealand to Olympic qualification in 2000 and was part of two World Championship campaigns. Keith also coached in the NBL, having stints in charge of the Canterbury Rams from 1989 to 1995 and the Hawke's Bay Hawks for two seasons after that. He moved to the United Kingdom in 2003 and took up the role of chief executive of Basketball England, before moving back into coaching, taking on the voluntary role of Wales head coach in early 2015. But all of these jobs have been part-time roles while working as a chartered accountant. Keith featured in the local news in Wrexham in November 2015, paying tribute to staff members at a local fitness centre who had saved his life after he suffered a heart attack the previous month during his regular morning swim.

One Old Boy was listed in the 2016 New Year Honours. Alan D. MacKenzie (1958-1960), a former judge of the High Court, was appointed a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit (CNZM) for services to the judiciary. After TBHS, Alan completed his secondary education at King's High School, Dunedin, where he gained a University National Scholarship. At the University of

Otago (1963-1967) he completed both a BA degree (majoring in history) and a law degree. He then moved to Wellington to work as a staff solicitor in the law firm Chapman Tripp & Co. and was admitted to the bar in February 1968. He moved to Stone Kurta & Co in 1970 where he became a partner of the firm, now Stone & Co., in 1971 and also gained an LLM degree from Victoria University in the same year. He continued as a partner when the firm became Rudd Watts & Stone in 1983. In 2001 he left the firm to practise as a barrister sole. His areas of practice were as a litigator and legal adviser, principally for commercial and Government sector clients. He was the New Zealand general representative for Lloyd's of London from 1975 to 2000 and was chairman and vice-president of the Maritime Law Association of Australia and New Zealand from 1984 to 1988. In 2004 he was appointed to the bench of the High Court in Wellington and sat in that court, and on occasion in the Court of Appeal, until his retirement in September 2015. Alan's two sons are both lawyers in Wellington.

President of the Old Boys' Association, Bruce Leadley was invited along as a staff old boy, and to help keep everyone in order. He delightedly brought his old 'leather' along for this purpose, but unfortunately it didn't get used.

A dozen of us gathered in Washdyke at Robbie's Restaurant and Motel, the night before, so that we could catch up over a 'warm up' dinner, bed and breakfast. That went very well. Most of us then adjourned to Geraldine for lunch, before proceeding to TBHS on Saturday afternoon. We gathered at the Cricket Pavilion, chose our beds, and then Cameron Gibb, the affable housemaster, guided our group for a brief tour of Thomas House, the School, and the Memorial Library. We were impressed with the general improvement in the TBHS facilities; the gymnasium, in particular, is quite magnificent. Back in the comfortable Cricket Pavilion Lounge, we then got down to seriously catching up with old friends, over a couple of hours of pre-dinner drinks. Cameron was our obliging barman. An interesting fact that was most evident, on meeting people after so long, was just how little personality actually changes, from teenage years to dotage. Sure, three of the chaps had picked up PhDs, and others all manner of qualifications, achievements and experiences, but it was really just wonderful to again see the survivors of our group, whom we had got to know so well by living with them, all that time ago. After a sumptuous dinner, we adjourned to the Lounge again to watch the Bledisloe Cup, and to partake of the odd nightcap. Most were in bed by 1 a.m. Ollie Turner took some photos during the evening. Late next morning, after breakfast, people drifted off. Heads were

buzzing with the myriad of stories that had been told, and with the friendships that had been rekindled.

John Gardiner and I remembered the old cricket pavilion burning down in 1961. It was used by nameless boys for brewing Sakeetc in its walls, and by the smokers, and this was probably why it caught on fire. After dark, Johnny and I used the fire diversion as a great opportunity, to speedily bike over to rendezvous with our girlfriends at the Girls' High sports ground. Trouble was that Ferdie [Mervyn A. Bull, Rector 1947-1964] took it upon himself to do a couple of dorm checks that night, and my empty bed had been noted twice. Johnny was okay, because John Kirkland had kindly swapped beds for one of the dorm checks. Soon after we got back into bed, Mr Bull came around, and fortunately he was benevolent, so after he had sat down and given me a whispered bedside chat about wartime POW diversions and escapes, he allowed me to go to sleep. Maybe he knew more than we thought he did.

Cate Sutherland is the caterer at Thomas House, and her standard of cuisine, as evidenced at dinner and again at breakfast, is nothing short of excellent. It would have been great to have had her catering in the early 1960s.

Russell Leech Timaru Herald



In July 2015 it was announced that Rangatira was

on the hunt for new investments and Phil said he expected to make some announcements in the following six to 12 months.



Richard Rowley

After seven very successful years with Hamilton law firm Tompkins Wake, **Richard P. Rowley (1957-1963)** resigned as their chief executive in mid-2015. A partner in the firm said that Richard had been a strong leader and had been pivotal in doubling the size of the firm, with offices now in Auckland and Rotorua as well as Hamilton – the firm had grown from having seven partners and a total staff of 42 to having 18

partners and just over 100 staff. It was reported that Richard planned to do some consulting and to work with businesses to assist them in their growth and development.

Barry Adie (1964-1968) awarded the inaugural Mackenzie Mayoral Volunteer Award in September 2015 on the basis of 27 years' service as a St John ambulance volunteer in Fairlie. After managing a Fairlie business for many years, Barry worked as a caretaker, and retired in May 2015 but has continued his involvement with St John: "I think I keep sticking around because I really do enjoy

working for the community in this role. ... The stimulus and the experience you get at St John is something that most people never get to have."

Fraser B. Ross (1947-1952), of Timaru, was recognised with the highest honour of the Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society of New Zealand (Forest & Bird), a Distinguished Life Membership Award, in June 2015. Fraser has devoted more than 40 years of his life to conservation and has advocated on conservation issues to Government ministers and agencies, made submissions, and sought to stop the conversion of indigenous west coast forest to plantation pine. He has also used his expert botanical skills to undertake field inspections in the South Island high country and has submitted a number of tenure review proposals for the region. Among many other things, Fraser has been the key person responsible for the restoration of Arowhenua Bush - a significant remnant podocarp forest on private land near Temuka. After persuading the original owners to retain the forest rather than clear it for grazing pasture, he has eco-sourced and planted hundreds of native plants here, encouraged their

growth and controlled weeds. He has also provided a major source of energy and expertise for undertaking weed control and active management of Conway's Bush, a forest remnant in the foothills near Geraldine which is protected as a Forest & Bird reserve. He has advocated on pest management, weed control, wild places and indigenous biodiversity under the Resource Management Act, and is an active and energetic watchdog on the Department of Conservation's management of public lands. Fraser was awarded the Queen's Service Medal for services to conservation in 2009.

Forest & Bird also honoured Guy McDonald (2012-), a current TBHS pupil, with their Te Kaiārahi Rangatahi o te Taiao Youth Award. Guy already has more than 5 years of service to conservation projects in South Canterbury under his belt. As a member of the Kiwi Conservation Club, Guy carried out a katipo spider monitoring programme for the Department of Conservation and quickly became recognised for his ability to identify a range of insects from a young age. His strong interest in insects lead to him becoming a great advocate for New Zealand's native praying mantis. He started an initiative to teach people to identify the lava of praying mantis, hoping people would learn to enjoy having them in their gardens and see their value as a natural way to control aphids. Guy is now an adult member of Forest & Bird and regularly helps out at their monthly working bees at Kakahu Bush. It is Guy's job to climb the trees to disentangle the passionfruit vines and barberry bushes that have such disastrous seeding potential. He is especially good at crawling into inaccessible areas that the adults cannot reach! Looking to the future, Guy wants to have a career in conservation and dreams of being part of the team that makes Stewart Island predator-free.

Mike started playing in 1963 and encouraged his son from a young age. Mike has played for 50 years and Scott is notching up 25 years. Both are in the South Canterbury Highland Pipe Band, with Mike made a life member in 2015. Scott is the current bagpipe tutor at TBHS.

2015. They also became fellows of the Property Institute of New Zealand, along with seven others from around New Zealand. The fellowships recognised their years of service to the profession and the esteem in which other practitioners held them.

Robert B. Walker (1968-1972) continues to make his mark in the insolvency business, recently as liquidator of the numerous companies owned or controlled by Christchurch property developer Dave Henderson. After TBHS, Robert studied politics and American studies at the University of Canterbury before training as an accountant in London. He returned to New Zealand in 1988, initially working as an assistant group accountant for the BNZ and as a partner in charge of the audit department of the firm BDO before specialising as a liquidator. He has been described as "a very skilled accountant, good at unpicking companies and not frightened of litigation".



Hayden Burford

While working as a communications intern at New Zealand Rugby League headquarters for several months in 2015, **Hayden J. Burford (2003-2007)** was responsible for ensuring that rugby league's Four Nations Trophy visited South Canterbury as part of a whistlestop tour in the wake of the Kiwis' win over Australia. Hayden was owner-manager of Gizmo Hand Warmers Ltd from 2007

to 2014. Now based in Auckland, he describes himself on his LinkedIn page as an entrepreneurial events co-ordinator.



Ken Miller

K.H. (Ken) Miller (1948-1952) now lives in retirement in Hampden, Otago, after a varied and interesting working career. After leaving TBHS, he worked for the National Insurance Co. in Timaru until 1957. He was then posted for the next five years to the firm's Karachi branch (Pakistan), the control office for the Middle East, with significant authority to conduct the company's affairs not only in

East and West Pakistan but also in Aden, Kuwait, Bahrein, Iraq, and Lebanon – the slowness of communications in those days meant that it was often not practicable to refer matters to the head office in New Zealand.

Back in New Zealand from 1962, he was a local or branch manager for National Insurance in Whangarei, Wanganui, Rotorua, and Invercargill before being transferred in 1979 to the head office in Dunedin with responsibility for national purchasing and administrative matters.

In 1983 he left insurance to become a self-employed commission agent selling consumer electronic accessories until his retirement in 2004.

Outside work, Ken has been involved in a wide range of sporting and other activities over the years, including being an active rower and rugby player in Karachi. In New Zealand, he has variously been a squash player, a football administrator, a Rotarian, and an active member of horticultural and conservation groups. A particular interest has been ostomy education: in 1979, Ken was diagnosed with colon cancer, leading to a successful operation and a permanent colostomy, and from 1979 to 2000 he was a leading figure in the Otago Ostomy Society.

Since moving to Hampden in 2000, he has heavily involved in community activities and has been a member of the local hall committee, a census collector, a writer on local history, a school board of trustees member, secretary of the masonic lodge, and even a supervisor of offenders carrying out community service.



Thomas Lambie

Thomas (Tom) C. Lambie (1973-1976), stepped down as Chancellor of Lincoln University on 8 April 2016: "I am a dairy farmer ... and as the industry enters challenging times it has become obvious that I need to turn my focus to the farm." Tom joined the Lincoln University Council in 2002 and became Chancellor three years later. He was appointed ONZM in the 2014 New Year Honours.

#### FROM TBHS TO ARMY COMMAND

Lieutenant-Colonel **Eugene A. Whakahoehoe (formerly Walker, 1985-1989)** is Burnham Military Camp's new commanding officer, a position he has aspired to throughout his army career.

He is in charge of the Second First Battalion, Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment, with about 450 under his command. He took up the role in March 2015 and is loving it: "Everyone aspires to something, and in particular I wanted to command this unit as it has a really good reputation", he said.

After TBHS, he graduated from the University of Waikato as a Bachelor of Social Science in 1994. He also performed with the Tasmanian Youth Orchestra, Tasmanian Discovery Orchestra, and Australian International Symphony Orchestra Institute (AISOI) and was a regular player with the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra. He then travelled to Luzern, where he auditioned successfully for a place in the class of Immanuel Richter and Philippe Litzler. He spent two years at the Hochschule für Musik, completing his degree in orchestral trumpet and piccolo. Alongside his studies, he performed with various European orchestras. Since returning in late 2015, Slade has performed with Orchestra Wellington alongside his brother Barrett, who is the Principal Trumpet.

**Barrett F. Hocking (1995-1998)** is Principal Trumpet of Orchestra Wellington but is also an itinerant music teacher with various schools and has his own trumpet studio of brass musicians. Barrett often performs with other orchestras around the country and in the past year has played with the

#### SPORTING LIFE

T.P.G. (Tom) Walsh (2005-2009) continues his winning ways with the shot put. He finished fourth at the 2015 World Championships on 23 August in Beijing, throwing a new personal best of 21.58m - he was just 11cm off the bronze medal. He improved his personal best to 21.62m on 8 September in taking first place at the Hanžeković Memorial in Zagreb, Croatia, and on 11 September he won his first Diamond League meet with a throw of 21.39m in Brussels. Tom broke his own New Zealand resident record with a throw of 21.12m at the national athletic championships in Dunedin on 4 March 2016. Less than a fortnight later, in the World Indoor Championships in Portland, Oregon, he won the gold medal with a throw of 21.78m, breaking his own New Zealand national and Oceania area indoor records three times in the process. He hopes to complete his building apprenticeship in Christchurch before leaving in May for training in the United States and Europe in the lead-up to the Rio de Janeiro Olympics.



Hayden Paddon

Hayden C. Paddon (2000-2004), New Zealand's top rally driver, competed in 12 rounds of the 13-round World Rally Championship in 2015 as an official manufacturer driver for Hyundai Motorsport. He scored his first podium finish at Rally Italy in Sardinia, with second place, and performed well in the second half of the season, with five top five finishes in six events. He had a difficult start to the year, but turned around after coming back to New Zealand and winning the Otago

Rally in a classic car. In October 2015, Hayden signed a three-year contract with Hyundai Motorsport, and in February 2016 scored a second podium finish, with another second place, this time on the snow of Sweden.



James Hawkey

Selection into the Crusaders' Rugby Academy in December 2015 capped off a great year for **James N.M. Hawkey (2010-2014).** He was to move to Nelson in early 2016 to join the academy, and hoped to be able to continue his electrical apprenticeship there. In his first year of senior rugby, with Timaru's Celtic Club, James did not miss a minute of their Hamersley Cup winning season and was the top club points scorer. He then went on tour with both the New Zealand Marist

colts and senior sides and was selected in the New Zealand Heartland under-19 side. In April this year the Crusaders set up the first New Zealand rugby academy aligned with a Super Rugby team. James is the first player from South Canterbury to be selected. The academy aims to increase the talent base available to the Crusaders for the future and has two bases, in Christchurch and Nelson. James's father is David N. Hawkey (1970-1973) and his grandfather is Noel W. Hawkey (1941-1942).

South Canterbury bowlers Keanu P. Darby (2009-2013) (Temuka) and Barrie W. Andrews (1965-1970) (Timaru) exceeded expectations at the Stoke Invitational bowls tournament in Nelson in February 2016. The pair were invited to the three-day tournament, which is a considerable honour as it features some quality men's bowlers. At 19, Keanu, who reached the semi-finals, said he was stoked with his form: "I'm really pleased with my performance and how I went. To make the semifinals in a tournament like this was a massive achievement for me." Barrie made it through to the quarterfinals of the invitational: "I'm really happy with that effort. I played some good bowls. I went up there hoping to do well and I did that which I'm happy with." He said being invited to such a strong tournament was great for him

and Keanu: "Keanu was superb. He played really well and the New Zealand selectors were present too."

It was announced in February 2016 that midfielder Samuel T. Beard (2004-2008) was leaving Edinburgh Rugby after three seasons to play for the Newport Gwent Dragons under a two-year contract. Sam said that it was a hard decision to make, "But I am really looking forward to the new challenge that lies ahead. The chance to try something new was a great opportunity for me, one which I

couldn't give up." He will be deemed a local player, qualifying for Wales through his grandfather.



Zane Sanders

Zane W. Sanders (2003-2007) is one of three New Zealanders playing rugby for the Old Crossleyans RUFC 1st XV ('the Crocs') in Halifax, Yorkshire. He moved there with a two-year working visa in August 2015 and is also working at Crossley Heath School, a co-educational grammar school, as a cricket and rugby development coach. He made his senior club cricket debut for the Timaru Cricket Club in 2007

(he eventually captained the team), and his senior rugby debut for Harlequins RFC, Timaru, in 2009, and notched up 75 games for them in a number of different backline positions.



Sam Naylor Timaru Herald

Samuel (Sam) T. Naylor (2003-2007), of Christchurch, comfortably won Timaru's first ocean swim in over 20 years on 24 January 2016. He led from the start of the 2.25 km course and completed it in 31 minutes and 23 seconds. Thirty-seven competitors started on the beach at Evans Bay, swimming in the inner harbour before heading along the North Mole and into Caroline Bay. All completed the full course. The previous weekend,

on 16 January, Sam came third with a time of 32 minutes and 32 seconds in the inaugural 2.5km 'The Ruby' race for open (elite) men in Lake Wanaka.

## OLD BOY HEALED RICHIE BENAUD'S HAND

Richie Benaud, the noted Australia cricketer and commentator, died in April 2015. He had no direct connection with TBHS, but an Old Boy played a significant part in his career.

Benaud was in Timaru with the Australian cricket team in February 1957 for a game against a combined South Canterbury, Mid Canterbury and North Otago team - which included Old Boys H. Noel Dellow (1943-1946) and Murray W. Jack (1948-1950). The man who would go on to captain Australia and then the voice of the game as the head of Channel Nine's cricket commentary team, was then a talented leg-spinner suffering from dengue fever which he had contracted in India a few months earlier. He had gone for a walk through Timaru to buy tablets to combat its effects when he went into the pharmacy of Ivan D. James (1922-1924) - now Cameron's Menswear - on Stafford Street. When Benaut handed over the prescription, Ivan, who died in 1986, noticed his fingers. He had large raw spots on his finger almost to the bone where the seam of the ball cut in. Nothing had ever healed the wound. They were so bad Benaud faced the prospect of having to stop bowling.

In his 1998 autobiography, Benaud describes being handed a small wide-mouthed bottle plus a container with white powder and a piece of paper with the suggested remedy written on it. He remembers being rather wary of it, but as James had gone to so much trouble, he took the lotion and decided that even though it was a long shot he would give it a go. "The treatment instantly worked and the skin was toughened so that even prolonged bowling spells didn't produce cracking," Benaud wrote. "The word genius is much over-used in our society. Mr Ivan James turned out to be a genius. There has never been one moment of doubt in my mind that walking into that chemist's shop in Timaru saved my bowling career and was one of the key reasons why from that moment I moved into top gear as an important all-rounder in Australian cricket."

The miracle cure was a combination of an oily calamine lotion and boracic acid powder, previously used to treat ex-servicemen with ulcers caused by gassing. The lotion was rubbed into the wound, then the acid powder rubbed in to form a waxy filling in the wound. Ivan also recommended that Benaud carry a piece of fine sandpaper with him to sand off any bits of torn or dead skin. He had the lotion made up all around the world and used it faithfully for the rest of his career.

Ivan's connection with Richie Benaud did not stop there. He featured in a *This is Your Life* tribute to Benaut in Australia in 1976 and even after Ivan's death Benaud continued to write to his wife Thelma on a regular basis until she died in 2003.

Writing in *The Independent* in England, that newspaper's editor said "I have always thought it wonderful to think that, had [Benaut] reached over with his left hand in that Timaru chemist six decades ago, you and I would most likely never have heard of him."

# **CECIL MALTHUS, ANZAC**

At Te Papa in Wellington, the exhibition *Gallipoli: The Scale of Our War* features, amongst artefacts, information panels, and dioramas, eight massive figures, made by Weta Workshop and much larger than life-size, depicting eight representative New Zealand participants in the Gallipoli campaign. The last figure that visitors encounter, just before the exit, depicts Private Cecil Malthus, who was at TBHS from 1903 to 1908 (although the likeness to his photograph is possibly not immediately obvious).

Born in Timaru in 1890, he graduated with an MA in French and English from Canterbury College (now the University of Canterbury) and was teaching at Nelson College when war was declared in 1914. He went through the whole Gallipoli campaign and as a member of a patrol of scouts was often at the forefront, including a stint at Quinn's Post, the attack over the 'Daisy Patch' at Cape Helles, and the assault on Chunuk Bair in August 1915. He was hospitalised three times with illnesses caused by the dire conditions. Redeployed to France with the New Zealand Division, and promoted to sergeant, Malthus was wounded on the Somme in September 1916, losing toes on his right foot to an exploding bomb.

Back home, he taught briefly at TBHS from 1917, then returned to pursuing his academic career. In 1920 he received a Canterbury College travelling scholarship to continue his

studies in French language and literature at the University of Paris. In 1923 he became Professor of Modern Languages at the University of Tasmania. He was awarded the degree of Doctor of Literature by the University of New Zealand in 1933 on the basis of a dissertation, written in French, on the influence of Shakespeare on the French playwright Alfred de Musset. He returned to Christchurch as Professor of Modern

Languages at Canterbury University College in 1934, and held that position until 1955.

In 1965 Malthus published *Anzac: a Retrospect*, an account of his time at Gallipoli based on his war-time letters and diaries. It was acknowledged by many of his former comrades as one of the best accounts of the New Zealand experience of Gallipoli.

The companion work, *Armentières and the Somme*, remained unpublished until 2002, when Reed Books put it into print with the assistance of New Zealand military historian Christopher Pugsley.

Cecil Malthus died in Christchurch in 1976, aged 86.

### **OBITUARIES**

#### JACK STANFORD ALLAN



One of our oldest Old Boys, Jack Stanford Allan, died in Hamilton on 4 November 2015, in his one hundredth year (he was born in Invercargill on 6 March 1916). He had been an active member of the Waikato Old Boys' group in its heyday, and had been honoured nationally for his

contribution to education.

Jack Allan attended TBHS from 1930 to 1935. He was a prefect in 1935, held the senior athletics championship in both 1934 and 1935, and was also active in drama.

He trained as a teacher, completed an arts degree, and taught in a variety of schools before joining the staff of Christchurch Teachers' College, where he served for ten years.

When the Hamilton Teachers' College was established in 1959, Jack Allan became the founding principal, continuing in the position when it became the Waikato University's School of Education. He retired in 1979.

In 1976 he was made an honorary Fellow of the New Zealand Educational Institute and he received an honorary doctorate from Waikato University in 1980. In the 2007 New Year Honours List, he was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for his services to education over a 40-year period.

Jack's wife of 72 years, Joan, predeceased him by nine weeks, aged 98, and they are survived by five of their six children.

#### JOHN NORMAN CLARK



John Clark, born at Tuatapere on 9 October 1951, spent his childhood on Southland and Canterbury farms before moving to Timaru where his parents owned motels. John attended Timaru Boys' High School from 1965 through 1969 as a day boy, and had a very active life both within school, in sport and music, and outside (though sometimes in school time!) surfing at Scarborough.

It was possible in those days to check out the surf conditions from a window high in the old Main Block.

John was one of those popular, able and good-looking guys who was always with friends and at the centre of anything good happening (shades of envy there!). He ably took the part of Pooh Bah in The *Mikado* in 1969, with a strong tenor voice and a great sense of fun and occasion. He also played cornet on the School brass band, and was a member of the Timaru Operatic Society.

After some time roaming the world indulging his love of rock climbing, and working in a variety of places – fishing off Queensland and welding on North Sea rigs – John returned to complete university studies in commerce and education.

After studying at both Canterbury and Auckland Universities, he commenced a teaching career, first at Kelston Boys' High School (Auckland), then as head of commerce at Waimea College in Nelson. During this time he and his wife Janet bought and ran an orchard. A keen surfer, he also played basketball, volleyball, indoor netball, and golf and skied. He also became a harbour swimmer and tried both triathlons and half marathons. He also coached a number of school sports teams with some success, and a huge affinity with his high school students.

In 1999, John was appointed campus director at Southern Cross Campus in Mangere, a massive complex with four separate schools on one site, and made a deep impression with his ability and success in such a diverse multicultural and multiracial environment

John was caring, inspirational, positive, intelligent, engaging – all attributes which made him a great teacher, principal and mentor in education – appreciated by staff and former students alike.

In 2007, John and Janet headed off to the Middle East for John to work as an education consultant with Cognition Consulting where he provided professional learning and leadership for the management team of a new boys' high school for its first year, was project leader for an 'IT in schools initiative', and project leader for a one-year teacher training project for approximately 400 Qatari mathematics and science teachers.

On returning to New Zealand John became the assistant director of a professional education and mentoring programme for first-year principals at the University of Auckland. He was also involved in educational projects in New Zealand and in the Pacific Islands and stayed with these until the last few months of his life.

Sadly, John's battle with cancer ended on 16 August 2015, but he has left a legacy of outstanding work in the education field, and the respect and love of a vast number of friends, colleagues and pupils.

#### **DONALD JAMES DIACK**



Donald James (Jim) Diack (1935-1939), a long-time "Family Friendly" Stafford Street pharmacist (from 1951) and for seven years a member of the New Zealand Pharmacy Board, died on 10 April 2015, aged 92 (he was born in Waimate on 1 November 1922).

A multi-talented musician, Jim sang and played the piano from the age of seven, played the cornet in the School

Band (and was bandmaster in 1939). He sang in every solo competition and played Grenicheux in *Les Cloches de Corneville* in his final year.

His long career in conducting began with the Simmers House choir in 1938. In 1954, Jim joined The Clarion Octet of eight male voices performing in support of various charities and later led the group. In 1969 it expanded into The Diack Singers of mixed voices who practised assiduously, did radio broadcasts, twice-annual charity performances, and featured twice in the lead on television's *Praise Be*. He retired from leadership in 2005 but still sang with its successor, The Phoenix Singers, until "his health affected his quality".

From childhood he had been "Music" at the Woodlands Street Methodist Church and was organist and choirmaster for about 65 years. During this time he filled every other office or role in the church (without actually being ordained).

Jim was predeceased by his wife Isabel and is survived by his three sons and two daughters, all of whom attended "Our Schools"; his sons are Ian (1961-1965), Peter (1964-1968), and Andrew (1973-1977). He is remembered as a man of generous community spirit – humble and with an empathy for all his fellow men.

#### **CHARLES JOHN FOWLER**

Charles John (Jock) Fowler (TBHS 1951-1955) was born on 7 June 1937.

Jock was the first of a crop of "bus boys" who came to the school in the early 1950s from the St Andrews and Makikihi area who excelled both in the classroom and on the sportsfield (from time to time when the Pareora River flooded they were unable to return home and had to stay overnight with schoolmates).

Jock played for the 1st XV from 1953 to 1955 with a "powerful striding run and a lengthy kick....he stiffened up the backline both in attack and defence and ran his wings into position very ably, as well as scoring some good tries himself.....and in the 1955 game against Waitaki won 35-6 Jock scored 20 points—with two tries, two penalty goals and four conversions." That same year he was the first schoolboy ever to be selected for the South Canterbury Colts.

Jock also excelled at other sports – he and Mervyn Taiaroa won the fives doubles championship in 1954 and 1955 and Jock was also one of the winning combination for the senior tennis doubles in 1955. In 1955, as well as being head prefect and captain of the 1st XV, Jock was awarded the M.J. Scott Cup for the best all round sporting performance over his whole school career.

Perhaps persuaded by fellow bus boy, Neville Galletly, who was Pipe Major, Jock, in his last year at school, took over the role of drum major of the Pipe Band – a role he also later performed for the Waimate Pipe Band.

Jock was always more mature than his peers and was the first schoolboy they knew to have a car (a 1928 Plymouth) which enabled them to travel to dances all over the district and to seven-aside tournaments in Temuka, Geraldine and in the Maniototo (Central Otago), usually with success.

When Jock left school he took up a position at South Canterbury Farm Accounting in Timaru and began studying accounting part-time. At the same time, his rugby career flourished. He played for the Old Boys RFC and their 1969 golden jubilee history stated that "Fowler, direct from TBHS 1st XV was quite brilliant...of the 161 points scored in Skinner Cup matches....Fowler accounted for 107 points...a record at that time" (perhaps still?) and was included in the "Old Boys team of the decade."

In 1957 Jock enrolled at the University of Canterbury (flatting with Mervyn Taiaroa and Ron Hoskins). He obtained an accounting job and continued his studies part-time while

trying his luck on the rugby field. By 1958 both Jock and Ron had made the championship winning University 1st XV team which also included All Blacks Mick Bremner and Brian Molloy.

Unfortunately, it was about then that Jock got the call for help with the family transport business which by this time was located at Makikihi. His accounting studies were interrupted but proved to be useful in running the business which at that time included his father but later also included his brother Les (TBHS 1954-1956; he had completed his motor mechanics apprenticeship by this time) and later again, his other brother, Bryan (TBHS 1953-1956) after some years in building and a similar transport business.

Together they survived the ups and downs of largely rural-based businesses during those times, followed by the drift of dairying southwards, irrigation and the need for limesowing. The business grew from 5 trucks to 15, and further investment followed in four wheel lime sowers, stock trucks and trailers capable of delivering stock all over the South Island, the Gordon Valley limeworks, and readymix concrete.

Throughout, Jock had maintained a hands-on role physically driving trucks and overseeing the company accounts until the deterioration in his hearing made the task just too difficult and in 1998 he sold up and moved to Christchurch.

In retirement, he continued his interest in family and horse-racing and began writing verse. He died peacefully in Christchurch on 5 December 2015, survived by his wife, Frances, six children and twelve grandchildren.

#### JOHN LINCOLN KNOWLES



John (Jack) Knowles, born in Timaru on 20 October 1920 died in Wellington on 26 January 2016, aged 95.

An only child, he was brought up by his mother and his father, a World War I veteran and an accountant. At TBHS (1934-1937), he became an accomplished athlete, particularly

in middle distance running, having been advised by Jack Lovelock that this was his forte.

At 17, the strapping lad (6' 2" tall) joined the Territorials, having tried and failed to join earlier by falsifying his age. He was initially turned down for service overseas when the Second World War began, but in 1941 he was finally able to enlist. He served in Fiji before being posted to Italy where he was eventually appointed as a platoon commander with the 27th Machine Gun Battalion and saw action at Cassino.

He was not injured during the war and earned the nickname "Lucky Jack" because of the number of men who survived under his command. He ended the war in Trieste where he recalled taking the surrender of one of the many high-ranking German officers, in this case a general.

Jack had a love for Italy that spanned his long life, extending beyond the country itself to art, opera, food, and wine. He returned to Italy several times, in some cases being the official tour guide for groups of New Zealanders. In 2004, at 83, Jack was one of five veterans from the Wellington region who travelled on an RNZAF plane to Italy for 60th anniversary commemorations in Monte Cassino. His last visit to Cassino was in 2014 at the age of 93.

At the end of the war, Jack returned to New Zealand via Cairo, where he met his first wife Sheila, a South African nurse. She followed him to New Zealand in 1946 and they were married in Timaru where they settled. They had two children, Gail and Denise.

In 1949, Jack re-enlisted in the New Zealand Army and after a number of internal postings he was posted to the Middle East in 1957 as a military observer for the United Nations Truce Supervision Organisation. He spent a year living in Damascus and Tel Aviv while his family stayed behind in New Zealand.

In 1963 he was posted back to the Middle East, this time with his family, for another tour of duty as an observer. His luck ran out during this posting when a UN jeep he was in came under fire in the Golan Heights. He was thrown from the jeep and received a back injury that would trouble him for the rest of his life.

Retiring from the army as a major in 1968 after a 30-year military career, he returned to Wellington where he spent a brief period at the Department of Tourism before moving on to the Office of the Prime Minister. He was a press secretary during the terms of four New Zealand prime ministers – Keith Holyoake, Jack Marshall, Norman Kirk, and Bill Rowling.

Sheila, from whom he had been separated for some years, died in 1999, and Jack married his second wife, Anne, in January 2001, at the age of 80. She survives him along with his two daughters, four grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

#### JAMES BARR STEWART MCINTYRE

James Barr Stewart McIntyre, known as Jim, James or JBS, died in Ashburton on 11 September 2015. He was born in Ashburton on 1 January 1931. He attended Dromore School and then Timaru Boys' High School as a boarder from 1943 to 1948.

Jim was very proud

of Timaru Boys' High School and was delighted when two of his grandsons, Michael Dewar (2007-2011) and Hamish Dewar (2010-2014), attended and his daughter Penny was on the Board. Jim attended all of his grandsons' prizegivings, standing up and singing the School Song, of which he remembered all of the words. He played in the Pipe Band at school, and maintained a love of the pipes all his life.

Jim was a keen sportsman, playing both cricket and rugby for the School. He continued to play both of these sports when he left school and was a passionate follower of both codes his entire life. After hanging up his playing boots, he took on coaching his son's team and became involved in the administration side of rugby, both at club and Mid Canterbury level. He led the fundraising campaign to purchase the first video camera to film players for coaching purposes. He finished his time on the rugby union as the president. His passion for following rugby led him to going on an All Blacks' tour of South Africa and Australia.

Jim was also a reasonable middle distance runner, winning the Wardell Cup for the mile in 1948. A very proud moment for Jim was when his grandson Hamish won the same cup for the 1500 metres in 2010.

Jim started his farming career as soon as he left school, working mainly in the Mid Canterbury area, He was a sheep farmer at heart although he branched out into cattle grazing later in life. He loved the land and travelled to South Africa and Canada, with a group of farmers, visiting farms in these areas. He travelled extensively through Europe, England, Scotland

and Wales. He had a particular love of Scotland, catching up with relatives and revisiting areas where he lived as a child during his two years there.

Jim was a proud family man. He and his wife Karen were married for 60 years and had four children, two sons and two daughters.

Jim and Karen moved into Ashburton in 2008 and Jim spent his retirement years enjoying his flower garden and creating raised vegetable gardens. He took up indoor bowls again, a sport that he always enjoyed, and became involved in Ashburton Men's Probus and the Pakeke Lions Club. He was the organiser of the Lions' large Christmas stocking raffle for many years.

Jim is remembered as an honourable and honest man who treated everyone as an equal and gave a lot to the Ashburton community.

#### **WILLIAM IAN FERGUSON MACLEOD**



William Ian Ferguson Macleod (known as Ian), born in Timaru on 19 January 1923, died in Tauranga on 1 November 2015, aged 92.

He was the third of six siblings. To ensure they received the schooling their parents wanted for them, lan's mother lived with her four sons and two daughters on her own in Timaru while

his father lived and worked on his own at Ferintosh, a sheep station at the base of Mt Cook. Ian attended Waimataitai School and, skipping a year, arrived at TBHS aged just 12 in 1935. His youthfulness led to a nickname that lasted 80 years when Buster Moore, the master in charge of a singing quartet that Ian was part of, started calling him Chick, given he was the chicken of the group singing soprano. From that time on his lifelong friend Frank Brosnahan (1922-2011; TBHS 1935-1939; Vice-Chancellor of the University of the South Pacific 1969-1982) only ever called him by that nickname.

By the time he finished high school in 1939, he had proven himself both academically (completing two first-year university subjects, English and mathematics) and in sport, playing cricket and rugby. He then went to teachers' college in Dunedin where he captained both the 1st XI and the 1st XV and completed all but a couple of papers towards a Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Otago.

Shortly after finishing teacher training, he enlisted for war service, initially in the Army but then as a pilot in the RNZAF in the Pacific. Two of Ian's brothers were also pilots in the war (and survived): Alan M. Macleod (TBHS 1933-1935; RAF; died 2002) and Derrick D. McLeod (TBHS 1938-1942: Fleet Air Arm; died 1991). His youngest brother, Colin C. McLeod (TBHS 1941-1945; died 2007) was too young for service. (Two brothers used the Macleod spelling, and two McLeod.)

After the war, Ian completed both his BA and a BSc degree at Canterbury University College, then returned to Dunedin to complete a Master of Science degree in mathematics before at last beginning teaching, first at Nelson College and then at Matamata District High School.

In the mid-1950s he was headhunted by Hamilton Boys' High to be head of mathematics then quickly promoted to deputy headmaster. In 1962, aged only 39, he became headmaster at the co-educational Takapuna Grammar School – the school board's chairman at the time said that "Mr Macleod has outstanding teaching ability, personality, wide cultural interests and a talent for organisation and leadership."

As well as being very involved with his new school's sporting and cultural activities, he was also an active member of Rotary and was chairman of the newly formed Lister Hospital, the first private hospital on the North Shore.

After nearly nine years as a headmaster he was appointed liaison officer at Massey University in Palmerston North. He retired 14 years later, in his early 60s, and moved to Tauranga, where he enjoyed golf, cycling, reading, and gardening. Although he had long thought his travelling days were over, he was delighted to be part of a delegation that travelled to New Caledonia in 2013 to commemorate the 70th anniversary of New Zealand's involvement in the war in the Pacific.

Ian is survived by his wife Beverley (née Pomeroy, they married in 1953) together with their two daughters, Annette White and Christine Cloughley, and their families.

#### **ANTHONY LEWIS MATHIAS**



Anthony Lewis Mathias (known always as Tony), born on 27 July 1934, died peacefully on 5 October 2015, after a short illness, aged 81 years.

Tony was a notably loyal Old Boy of TBHS, where he boarded for eight years (1944-1951) during the most vulnerable and formative years of his life. He was a keen sportsman and athlete, an average scholar, and a friend of all. TBHS

showed more love and concern for his wellbeing than he had ever known.

At TBHS Tony learnt to play the bagpipes, an achievement and interest which he maintained throughout his life. He was also a popular pianist at boarders' dances during his senior years.

Due to his father's illness, Tony left school to return to the family run in the Mackenzie Country. Following his marriage to Betty 55 years ago, they bought their own sheep property in the Fairlie district.

Tony was a life member of the Mackenzie Highland Pipe Band and the Mackenzie A & P Society. He also served on the Four Peaks Rabbit Board and was a member of the Fairlie Golf Club.

#### **ROBERT JOHN MORRIS**

Robert John Morris (known by all as Bob) was born on 1 February 1941 and died suddenly at his home at Prebbleton on 14 October 2015.

Bob was raised on a farm at Hororata before attending the TBHS Preparatory School in 1953-1954. He then attended the senior school for the following four years. Bob was a gifted sportsman. It was here that he made his great contribution to the School, as a member of the First XV and the First Cricket XI. As an athlete he excelled in the long distance races and also showed exceptional skill in the gymnasium.

Sport, especially rugby and cricket, continued to play a big part in Bob's life after leaving school. Playing in the Malvern competition, Bob represented Canterbury Country as a medium pace bowler and a useful bat. But it was in rugby that he really shone, playing for the Christchurch Club side in the 1960s when it was the competition winner many times. Bob's rugby years were highlighted by representing Canterbury on the wing from 1964 to 1968.

Bob's working life began when he returned to the family farm, where he worked until it was sold. From there he went to work in the seed department of Wrightsons, from where he retired after 40 years' service.

Bob had a love for horses, spending enjoyable hours working and training them until his sudden death.

Bob is survived by his partner Claire, son Andrew, and two grandchildren.

#### JACK GARFIELD NAYLOR



Jack was born in Lower Hutt on 9 January 1923 and moved to Timaru about 1924 when his father was appointed Secretary to the South Canterbury Hospital Board. He was educated at Waimataitai School and was at TBHS from 1939 until 1941 when he enlisted in the RNZAF and trained as a wireless mechanic. The war ended before he was able to enter active service. Later in life he became a

reservist serving with the Royal New Zealand Navy.

After the war, he completed a degree in electrical engineering at Canterbury University before taking up a graduate apprenticeship with British Thomson-Houston (BTH), a British engineering and heavy industrial company at Rugby, England, which specialised in electrical systems and steam turbines. BTH was a subsidiary of the General Electric Company of New York, and its graduate apprenticeships were very highly regarded and sought after at that time, with apprentices exposed to the production of a wide range of industrial products.

He later transferred with the company to London where he joined the Hampstead Young Conservatives, and met his future wife, Betty, whom he married in Hampstead prior to returning to New Zealand where he took up a job as branch engineer with Turnbull & Jones. That was where he first became involved with teaching, taking a final year Certificate in Engineering class at Wellington Polytechnic.

That was followed by three years with the Technical Correspondence School in Wellington before he was appointed to a senior lectureship in engineering at Auckland University. Later he took sabbatical leave and returned to London where he had gained admission to a course on engineering in medicine at Imperial College, London, widely regarded as amongst the best universities in the world. Jack was one of six clinical specialists from around the world selected for the course, which he described as "finding my niche".

On his return to New Zealand two years later, he rejoined Auckland University as a senior lecturer in medical engineering and remained there until his retirement in 1990.

Jack and his wife travelled widely throughout the world. He was a keen photographer and a fly fishing enthusiast and regularly fished at Turangi and Lake Taupō. Freemasonry was an important part of his life, and he was involved in the allocation of masonic scholarships and bursaries for more than 20 years. He was also closely involved with hospice as a volunteer worker.

After the death of his wife in 2010, Jack sold his house in Manurewa, Auckland, where they had lived for more than 50 years, and moved to Taranaki to be nearer to family. Jack died in the Taranaki Base Hospital in New Plymouth on 12 November 2015, aged 92.

#### JOHN VERNON ROBINSON



John Robinson (1939-1943), a pioneer of engineering and computing in New Zealand, died in Wellington on 26 June 2015.

His family's farm at Four Peaks – a mere 12 kilometres from Geraldine (where he was born on 31 December 1926) – was so 'remote" as not to have electricity until 1960. After Te Moana School and TBHS, John was to acquire various scholarships

and was the first graduate of the University of Canterbury's School of Engineering to be awarded a PhD degree.

His professional life began with the Ministry of Works, and was newsworthy when he superintended the continuous pouring of 15,500 cubic metres of concrete over 11 days for the Roxburgh hydro dam.

On a fellowship to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1956 he was introduced to the mysteries of computerisation, then a novelty, and later proceeded to integrate its use into all fields of engineering. After a long career in expanding the development of computerised systems throughout the public service, including the Treasury, he established and became founding director (until 1998) of the University of Auckland's Centre for Information Science as well as earning an honorary fellowship of ITPNZ (formerly the New Zealand Computer Society, of which he was a founding member in 1960 and president in 1974-1975).

Not bad for a boy who at the end of 1942 was, because of the demands of World War Two, unable to leave the family farm. It was only a visit by the then Rector, Mr Tait, that enabled him to return midway through the first term. What would have been a tragic waste of a brilliant brain that otherwise would have been lost to us was averted by a caring Rector just going that extra mile.

John's wife Jan (née Jobberns) died in 1993 but he is survived by their three children and eight grandchildren.

#### **BENJAMIN JAMES TAYLOR**

Ben Taylor, born on 5 April 1982, died in Toronto on 1 February 2016, aged 33.

From 1995 to 1999, Ben attended TBHS where he did well academically and loved sport. Cricket became a huge part of his life, and he proudly played for his school, and achieved a bar for cricket. He also played rugby throughout his school days and beyond. In his final year at school, Ben developed his skill at public speaking, and this was to serve him well in his professional life.

He attended the University of Otago (2000-2004) and graduated with both a Law degree and an Arts degree majoring in English and history. He headed to Canberra to work for RuleBurst, a small Australian IT company that was acquired initially by Haley, and subsequently by American software giant Oracle. His initial role as an analyst was to break down the 'rules' of legislation into small bite-sized chunks that could be coded for an on-line interface. He was very motivated and excited by his work. One project he worked on in Canberra, developing a Visa Wizard for Australia's Department of Immigration, earned an Australia Day citation from the Australian Government in January 2009. He was very proud of this project.

While in Canberra, he prepared and delivered lectures for an Information Technology Law paper at the Australian National University. He loved the challenge of stepping back into academia.

In 2008 Ben was seconded to Oracle America, based out of Washington DC. His secondment was initially for six months, but he rose to being a senior principal consultant, delivering client presentations about Oracle products, and stayed for six years. He worked in many different states, and with many major clients in both the government and private sectors. Ben always said his New Zealand accent was an asset.

In 2014, Ben moved to Toronto, initially remaining with Oracle, then joined an Oracle partnership company, TruePenny People. At the time of his death, he was planning to return to the southern hemisphere, based in Australia, to continue his work with Oracle Policy Automation.

Ben remained dedicated to sport in general, and the All Blacks and Black Caps in particular. He was the go-to man for questions about any sport for many family members, friends and colleagues.

Ben is survived by his parents, Jillian and Gordon Ireland (TBHS 1968-1969), and Kevin Taylor (TBHS 1964-1968), and his five siblings, including James Ireland (1994-1998).

#### IAN NEILL UTTLEY



Former All Black Ian Uttley, together with his wife Christine, was killed in a motor accident on the Napier-Taupo highway on 15 September 2015.

Ian Uttley, born in Christchurch on 3 December 1941, attended the TBHS Preparatory School from 1947 to 1950 before attending Karori Main Primary School, Wellington College, and Victoria University.

Ian began playing first class rugby in 1961 in Wellington, while with the University Club and soon attracted national attention. In 1961 he was first selected for North Island Universities and after three seasons with that team earned selection for New Zealand Universities in 1963, the same year he made his All Blacks debut. He played at centre in two Tests that year, both victories against England.

After five seasons with Wellington and a second campaign with New Zealand Universities, Ian moved north to Auckland and played two games for the senior side in 1966. The following season he played for Bay of Plenty, before returning to Wellington. He was selected for All Blacks trials in 1963, 1965 and 1967 but did not appear again for the national team.

Only 10st 9lb (67kg) and 5' 8" (1.73m), he had a deceptive gliding run which, combined with moving in or out to take a pass, enabled him to make many openings and earned him the nickname 'the Grey Ghost'.

Once he had hung up his boots, Ian continued to contribute to rugby as a coach and administrator and was a long-serving representative on the New Zealand Universities Rugby Football Council.

The Uttleys lived everywhere from Auckland and Wellington to London, while Ian worked as senior executive at Shell Oil. They moved to Napier from Waikanae about 10 years ago to be near their children and grandchildren.

#### **RUSSELL STANLEY WAKEFIELD**

Russell Wakefield, the son of Wilfrid (TBHS 1917-1918) and Christina Wakefield, was born on 18 December 1938, and died in Ashburton on 5 October 2015, aged 77. Russ grew up in Timaru with his parents and his brother Jim (TBHS 1947-1951), and attended Waimataitai Primary School before entering Timaru Boys' High School (in 1952), where he excelled at sport.

Russ became a member of the 1st XI; he played halfback for the 1st XV and 2nd XV; and he was on the school gymnastics team. Boxing was also a great interest, and he was awarded the trophy for most scientific boxer in the annual school boxing tournament four years in a row. Later, Russ also represented South Canterbury at various grades in rugby. However, his most preferred sporting activity was golf. His talent for golf first emerged during his early teens after he began working as a caddy to senior players at the Highfield Club. Russ's ability was such that he quickly developed his game and became a scratch player by his late teens. One of his particularly outstanding achievements was beating golfing legend Bob Charles in an age-group tournament. He also represented Canterbury in the Freyberg Rosebowl Tournament. Russ was approached to become a professional golfer, but he decided against that direction.

After leaving school (1955), Russ joined the grain and seed division of D.C. Turnbull & Co and worked his way up from an office junior to the company grain sales representative. He was very good at his job, and he enjoyed the challenge of being on the road dealing with farmers, many of whom became lifelong friends.

Russ remained involved in Timaru Old Boys rugby, and played through the grades up to senior reserves, before later coaching the team. He also continued boxing for Wes Jack and his gym, and later, when he moved to Christchurch, he joined the Russley Golf Club. When Russ competed in the Air New Zealand Classic, an official described Russ's long drive as either the result of a ricochet off a rock or as possibly cannon fire – suffice to say that Russ won the title for the longest drive.

Russ married Sharon Penny in 1959 and they had three children (including son Carl G. Wakefield, TBHS 1974-1976). A loving and dedicated husband and father, Russ was a true family man with a cheerful, fun, and resilient nature.

#### RICHARD ANTHONY DRUMMOND WIGLEY



Richard Anthony Drummond, or 'Dick' to those who knew him well, was born (on 15 October 1921) and raised in Timaru, where he attended TBHS from 1936 to 1939. He studied medicine at the University of Otago, graduating MB ChB in 1949 – and with a Doctor of Science degree 60 years later, in 2009, awarded on the basis of his research into rheumatology.

He travelled to London in 1949 for postgraduate study, and married his wife Patty (a Karitane nurse) in 1952. They returned to New Zealand in 1954 and raised a family of seven sons and one daughter. He travelled around the country to remote Maori communities trying to reduce rates of tuberculosis before specialising as a rheumatologist in Palmerston North, both as a practitioner and a researcher.

He wrote more than 100 papers on laboratory, clinical, epidemiological and rehabilitation studies covering the distribution, causation, genetics, treatment and prevention of rheumatic diseases and edited *The Primary Prevention of Rheumatic Diseases*. His colleagues have called him an "inspirational mentor" and believe that, along with the fathers of rheumatology in the United Kingdom and North America, he helped lay the foundations of modern rheumatology. He was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) in 2003 for services to medicine, in particular rheumatology.

After a long career as a pioneering rheumatologist and advocate for recognition of RSI, he worked until just before his

death at 93, seeing patients, such as long-serving meatworkers struggling with their Accident Compensation Corporation claims. Dick Wigley died in Palmerston North on 1 June 2015, survived by his wife and daughter and six of his sons.

#### JOHN VALENTINE WILSON



John Valentine Wilson, born on 12 May 1922, died peacefully at Strathallan Lifecare in Timaru on 8 July 2015, aged 93 years. Known throughout his life as Jack, he was a loyal Old Boy who served the School faithfully as engraver of the School trophies handed out to generations of pupils.

Jack Wilson attended Timaru West School and then TBHS (1937-1939).

He worked as a clerk at the Timaru Gas Company before volunteering for the army and later transferring to the Air Force. He trained from 1943 to 1945 and was in Canada when the war ended. But a lifelong love of flying remained.

Returning to office work was not fulfilling, and his interest in the arts led him to train as an engraver. He worked first from home and then set up premises in The Arcade where he was in business for forty years, employing four staff. He was widely known as a high quality engraver, supplying silver cups, shields and trophies of all kinds. He was South Canterbury's first manufacturer of enamel badges and the first local agent for Seiko watches.

Jack had a broad interest in art, as engraver, jeweller, sculptor, potter and painter. He was a foundation member of the South Canterbury Arts Society in the 1950s, successfully exhibiting his landscape paintings and becoming patron of the Society in his later years. On retirement from work he formed the Thursday Art Group and was a patient tutor of other artists.

The love of flying was always there and in semi-retirement Jack gained his private pilot's licence. He bought a Jodal D11 ultralight plane, and also built a microlight in his garage in Rowan Place. At one stage he owned three aircraft.

Jack was a man of varied interests: maintaining holiday houses at Pareora Huts and Twizel, raising goats on a lifestyle block at Gleniti, and keeping Norwich canaries and budgies.

Jack Wilson's wife Peggy predeceased him by a few months. He is survived by sons John (TBHS 1965-1967) and Andrew, daughter Ruth, and three grandchildren.

#### **DAVID EDWARD WOLFF**

Talented Timaru brass bandsman, teacher and musical director David ("Wolffie") Wolff, born 12 June 1942, died in Timaru Hospital on 16 January 2016, aged 73.

Remembered for his laid back and likeable

character, he was well known and respected in the New Zealand brass band movement. Musicians from throughout the country gathered to form a 50-strong band to farewell David at his funeral held at St Thomas's Church in Timaru.

At the age of 11, David took up cornet playing for the Waimataitai School band and then joined the band at TBHS, which he attended from 1956-1960 along with his brothers

John E. Wolff (1953-1957) and Gerald R. Wolff (1958-1962). He became a member of both the Timaru Municipal Senior Band and the first National Youth Band when he was 15.

In 1965, he moved to Wanganui where he played in the Wanganui Garrison Band. By this stage he had the ability to play a number of instruments and his talent was being recognised. Moving to Auckland after almost a decade, he took up the role of conductor of the Howick Band.

Returning to Timaru in the early 1980s, he re-joined the Timaru Municipal Band, becoming conductor-musical director and drum major until 2005. During this time David introduced annual band concerts to the South Canterbury community, including *Variety and Brass*, at the Theatre Royal, and *Cathedral and Brass*, in St Mary's Church. Under his leadership the band was invited to participate in the 1993 Chingay New Year procession in Singapore. In demand, he diversified into theatre and was musical director for many South Canterbury Drama League musical comedy section shows.

Finding he had a natural rapport with young musicians, he trained as an itinerant music teacher. Then he returned to

his roots, tutoring the next generation of young musicians in the bands at Waimataitai, TBHS (part-time music tutor 1984-2008), the Municipal Junior, and Canterbury Primary Schools' Orchestra. He went on to establish the Grantlea Downs School hand

David received awards from the New Zealand Army Band, the New Zealand Brass Bands Association and Timaru District Citizens in recognition of his work with young musicians.

Aside from the music world, he was a model railway enthusiast and had a vast collection of hand-built sets. He was respected and admired and will be missed by fellow model railway enthusiasts, and in banding circles for his knowledge and friendly disposition.

David is survived by his wife Jill, daughter Joss, son Tim and their families.
