





RECTOR'S ADDRESS

In celebrating our top achievers, one question looms large: How did they do it?

Typically, the drive from the boys and their families makes high achievement happen. And the school, for its part, is a crucial catalyst for such success; a vehicle for excellence; the place where achievement comes into fruition through different programmes and approaches. Where achievement is teased out and taught.

The school is a 'trial run' for what it takes to achieve in life, and is a 'toolshed' from which to equip for success, and a satisfying life.

The school can also be likened to a family. Like a family, we span generations with experience and wisdom old and new.

We have our own quirks and peculiarities, and ways of doing things - like a family (some ways can seem quite unusual to people beyond us).

We want to do better with, and for, each other - like a family.

We adapt to change, foreseen and unforeseen, like a family.

We draw strength from each other. Rallying, pulling together, in times of need for sustenance and support.

The school, like a family, needs to be where everyone can find their place and be able to do their bit - to belong and to know where and how they fit in.

And, like a family, we have to work hard at it because the important things, like high quality Education, don't come easily.

Maori have two words, two concepts that may capture much of what makes Timaru Boys' a catalyst for high achievement:

Whanaungatanga and Kotahitanga. Whanaungatanga – maintaining good relationships. Kotahitanga – unity or solidarity.

In Maori society, past and present, Whanaungatanga is about maintaining good relationships among those in the family or collective. And each individual has important links to the collective.

Individuals need to count on the support of others. And the collective, in return, needs to be able to count on the support of its individuals.

This concept is fundamental to TBHS achievement. And seeing its relevance in our student progress is not a big stretch – especially tonight.

The quality of the relationship between teacher and student, for example, is imperative in learning. A relationship that's firm but fair, mutually respectful, positive, aspirational, has shared constructive experiences, and a sense of inquisitiveness, and good humour, creates successful schooling. In the case of Thomas House, the extra familiarity and reciprocity of boarding, can make for even stronger relationships.

When individuals do well - the school does well. Our collective advance is the culmination of all the instances when individual students get it right and excel. When they have 'light bulb moments', pull together ideas or actions effectively, or reach individual conclusions. All of this stems from the quality of the relationship with their teachers, and with each other.

Without whanaungatanga/good relationships, disconnects can occur as relationships weaken and learning becomes impeded.

Kotahitanga, or unity, is also a catalyst for high achievement.

Kotahitanga, is working together to achieve common purpose; coming together when someone is in need or something needs to be resolved. It's the belief that we're greater together than apart. There is strength in unity.

Again, this second concept epitomises sources of high achievement at Timaru Boys'.

It's unity in our values. The TBHS POWER values are an assured way to excel - if followed, integral to our school identity and sense of belonging too.

It's unity of spirit. Every time we hoist our colours or perform together in or out of school, or join in healthy competition, school spirit binds us. We have solidarity. High achievers combining in a class, team or group, feel this camaraderie profoundly as they succeed.

A school without kotahitanga/unity, will struggle to deliver and reinforce high achievement.

Good relationships and unity have been important for developments in Timaru Boys' this year. Developments such

- implementing new teaching techniques to drive personal excellence
- expanding use of new technology in learning
- providing new measures for student wellbeing
- supporting more work readiness for those seeking employment
- instilling new 'lessons for life' at dedicated Year 11, 12 and 13 sessions
- diversifying participation and excellence in co-curricular Arts and Sport
- extending Thomas House help with in school learning
- increasing our focus on key academic thresholds and standards in NCEA
- and fostering TBHS biculturalism.

All of it, has again come down to the ongoing, overriding search for new growth and achievement, for boys. That is our core mission - helping them to know more, do more, and be more.

Our school grew in 2018 through the multiple efforts of fantastic people.

Thank you to our dedicated Teaching Staff, Thomas House Staff, and International Staff, who gave so much of themselves, so our young men could have the means and motivation to become better versions of themselves. I would especially like to thank staff who committed to challenging leadership roles, with a positive bearing on the boys, in 2018.

Thank you to all the Support Staff who ensured that the school not only functioned well but always had vital resources, knowledge and expertise available, to go with our activities.

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BOARD CHAIRPERSON'S ADDRESS: MR PETER STAYT



Welcome to invited guests, Rector and staff, students, families and friends

The Board of Trustees performs a governance role in the school, being responsible for student achievement, management of the Crown's assets (buildings, grounds etc), personnel and school finances

The legislated 'primary objective' in governing the school is to ensure that every student is able to attain his highest possible standard in

educational achievement. The School's Strategic Plan and from this, operational plans, are all focussed on this objective.

The school remains on a successful path of continued improvement that was highlighted and received favourable comment during the 2017 ERO report.

The School is in a sound financial position, although as you would expect, with set funding this is continually a challenge. Special thanks must go to our Business Manager Mrs Lyn Stewart for her stewardship of the school's finances. Lyn is retiring at the end of this year and we thank her for her dedication and diligence - and wish her all the best for her retirement.

2018 has seen some highlights including:

- opening of the Gillies Block upgrade. This upgrade has provided a new welcoming face to Timaru Boys' High School. This project was fully funded by Old Boys and supporters of the school
- the Thomas House Development comprising a 36 bed Senior Block is now under construction. This will provide modern accommodation for the Seniors and allow the retirement of some older facilities, with the new building due to be used from start of Term 1 2019.

This project is being fully funded by outside support and Thomas House contributions and operations. Special thanks to Thomas House Development Committee for driving this project-members include Virginia Callaghan, Colin and Kate Murdoch, Karla Yeatman, Susan Coker, Susan McNulty and Hamish Sheed.

- the planned classroom upgrade is proceeding after some external delays. These issues have been sorted with the assistance received from Ministry of Education. Total funding for this project is capped by the Ministry of Education, meaning any additional works required, are taken from the total funding package available.
- A proposal for an all-weather multi-sport sports turf to be laid on the old tennis courts beside the gymnasium is being explored. The objective is to improve the School facilities, maximising opportunities for the boys. This turf would be used by various school sports as well as the Physical Education Department, effectively providing extra teaching space. The project will be funded by the wider school community and support from South Canterbury community organisations. This project is being driven by Sports Director Gavin Miller and BOT member Nick Light.

 The Sports Council was established to promote and provide support for all sports within TBHS, aiming to increase opportunities for boys at all levels

Thomas House remains an integral part of Timaru Boys' High School. The role remains strong at around 125, with more applications being received than places available. As mentioned earlier, a Development Programme is underway which over time will lead to an upgrade of the boarding facilities. Thanks to Thomas House Management, House Masters and Hostel Staff teams for providing this 'home away from home' environment.

Thank you to the hard working BOT Team: Di Hay (Deputy Chair), Virginia Callaghan (who stepped aside as Chair in early 2018 due to other commitments - but has stayed on as Parent Representative), Bernadine Reynolds (Finance Chair), Shane Edwards (Thomas House Chair), Jane Sullivan (Sports Council Chair), Nick Light, a new co-opted member (Property Chair), David Foreman, a new co-opted member (Personnel Committee), Warren Leslie (Old Boys' Representative), Michael Howard (Staff Representative), Will Pudney (2018 Student Representative) and we welcome William Urquhart as 2019 Student Representative. Special thanks to BOT Secretary Mrs Carolyn Bunting for her help and guidance during the past year.

The school could not operate without the professionalism and dedication of the Rector, Deputy Rectors, Head of Departments and teaching staff who deliver the curriculum and enable the boys to develop and succeed; the International Department who run a very successful programme; administration and support staff for keeping everything running smoothly and the Property team who provide such a great environment for the boys.

To members of staff who are leaving us to further develop their career: we thank you for your service and wish you the best for your new challenges.

To staff retiring at the end of this year, we thank you for years of dedicated service and wish you a long and happy retirement, free from NCEA assessments and ERO reviews.

The Board is grateful for the huge level of time and resources provided by parents and the wider community in supporting Arts, Cultural and Sporting opportunities for the boys. Without this ongoing support, many of these activities and experiences could not be offered by the School.

GUEST SPEAKER'S ADDRESS: TOM LAMBIE, ONZM, HON DOC NAT RES

My family arrived in New Zealand at the end of 1972 from Scotland via a two year detour in Western Australia. I was enrolled at

Timaru Boys' High School (TBHS) in 1973-76 from Years 10-13. I enjoyed my time at TBHS and started a theme that would shape what I would end up being involved in throughout my life to date. I enjoyed social studies, history, geography and economics. I thank my many teaches for opening up the opportunities of observation and fuelling the curiosity of lifelong learning. I would particularly like to acknowledge teachers Mr Bruce Osborne, Mr Bruce Leadley and Mr Fred Windsor in that regard.

My family were dairy farmers and I had a dream and focus to be one. I enrolled at Lincoln College (now Lincoln University) in a Bachelor of Agricultural Commerce majoring in Farm Management and Valuation with that goal in mind. However in my second year, I realised I enjoyed bigger picture thinking and less detail and changed my studies from valuation to economics, marketing and international trade. Lincoln's economic researchers and lectures were at the forefront of advocating for the ceasing of the command and control economy by the government to a market/consumer focused economy. I was very fortunate to be at Lincoln and learn so much at that time.

In 1982 we moved to Totara Valley, Pleasant Point to an 89ha dairy farm and so began my farming career. Over a 36 year period the dairy farm has grown to 416ha and the farming dream fulfilled and continuing.

The 1980s were a very difficult time to enter farming. Rapid change in government policy on how the New Zealand economy was regulated, high interest and drought resulted in a survival mode on the farm.

It was during this period that I accidentally entered the field of advocacy and governance. A neighbour, Tom Henderson, took me along to a Pleasant Point Federated Farmers branch meeting and as the only dairy farm in the district, I was made their delegate to the South Canterbury Federated Farmers Dairy Section. There were only six dairy farmers involved and I ended up being Chair of the Dairy Section in 1987. I had to overcome an intense fear of public speaking, but hugely enjoyed being part of an era of huge political change and advocating for the rural community.

The skills obtained at Lincoln College helped me immensely during this period and allowed me to have a greater understanding and support for the change that was happening. The rest is history, culminating in roles as National President Federated Farmers of New Zealand, Chancellor at Lincoln University and Environment Canterbury Commissioner/Councillor and many other roles looking to create the right conditions for people, society and the environment to thrive.

I would like to share some advice which I think is applicable in whatever career you choose:-

- 1. Participate get involved; you build amazing networks of people and you learn and grow as a person beyond your wildest imagination. You learn by doing.
- Listen understand and tolerate everyone's point of view.
 It helps to shape your own views that change over time with greater knowledge.
- 3. Share there is a vast amount of knowledge out there in the world; share your knowledge and help others and you will receive far more in return.
- Failure is part of life, acknowledge, understand and move forward positively. Focus on the present and the future not the past.

- Treat your body and mind with respect life is a long game; you will possibly reach 100 years old. Exercise and moderation will see you mentally and physically contributing for your entire life.
- 6. Teams we all have strengths and weaknesses. Working with groups of people allows the collective strength of the group to achieve far more than any individual can.
- 'Close Doors' don't be afraid of things coming to an end; new often unexpected opportunities will present themselves and you will be in a position to embrace them.
- 8. Embrace Maori culture in your life it is what makes us uniquely New Zealanders and honours the Treaty of Waitangi
- 9. Be thankful for every day, for everything you do and to everyone who is involved in your life.

It has been a privilege to be a witness to this Timaru Boys' High School Senior Prizegiving 42 years after leaving the school and I wish all the students well for a bright and rewarding future.



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THOMAS HOUSE REDEVELOPMENT



INTERNATIONAL

WINCHESTER SCHOLAR



My name is Ben Stayt and I was fortunate enough to be selected as the 12th recipient of the Mark Parker Memorial Cricket Scholarship. This gave me the opportunity to attend Winchester College in Winchester, England during Term 2 2018 to play cricket for one of the top schools in the country. Mark Parker was a former Old Boy of our school who tragically died in the Bali Bombings in 2002, and whose father Murray, also a former Old

Boy and teacher, started this scholarship in 2006.

Winchester College is a school of around 700 boys, whose students are all boarders who live on site, divided up into eleven different houses - mine was called Cooks. When I first arrived at the house, I was afraid of being that one person who stands out from the rest. That weird kiwi guy who plays cricket, which was true but in a good way. I was welcomed with open arms from all the boys in the house, which made it a lot easier to get comfortable and settle into the new environment. I was also able to teach them a bit of slang from back home, including some Maori and also what the word "Maccas" means.

As for the cricket, I had one of my best seasons, playing multiple games for both the 1st XI, and also for the 2nd XI

when there were games I was not allowed to play. I hit 362 runs at an average of 25 per game, with a 50 off 38 balls against St Edward's being my top score. I also took 10 wickets bowling, including two against our friends from Christchurch, Christ's College.

The best thing that I found about the whole scholarship was the difference in both our school and Winchester. It was first opened back in the 1300s, nearly 500 years before Timaru Boys' started. That in itself shows the history of the school. An excellence NCEA student here would just be an average person at Winchester, with the majority of students going to top universities like Oxford, Cambridge or to the USA. They also had a six day school week, meaning that there were morning classes on Saturdays, something which I was not too fond of. But overall, I think the biggest difference between ourselves and Winchester was the sporting culture. We are obviously huge rugby supporters here in Timaru, but over at Winchester, they don't even play rugby, instead considering it, and I quote, "a peasant sport" compared to their own game of Winchester Football, which I am still unsure of how it is played.

For those of you that are young, aspiring cricketers and are considering this scholarship, I truly recommend it to you all. It has not only been the best experience of my life, but it has also widened my eyes to what is the big, wide world out there and is a once of a lifetime opportunity. And it's also pretty cool to tell your friends that you've been to the other side of the world and they haven't.

GAP TUTORS: MORITZ WALDVOGEL AND JARO PLETTENBERG



Hello, we are Moritz Waldvogel and Jaro Plettenberg and we were the Gap Tutors at Timaru Boys' High School from July 2017 until the following July 2018.

We are both from Germany and graduated from high school before we came here. Back in 2017, we arrived in a cold Timaru winter but to a warm, welcoming atmosphere from the Thomas House staff. Changing our life style happened quite quickly and we settled down

fast, getting to know everyone and our duties.

Our mornings in the school were always fun and usually packed with activities from the PE department. In the afternoon, one of us had to work in the hostel office and started driving when school finished. The other one came on duty just after dinner and drove all the boys to their appointments and practices. Exceptions to our everyday life were the different school trips



and activities. We both strongly remember the Year 9 camps, ski trips and farm days.

Hostel life was always vibrant and full of energy. We really got to know the juniors by driving them around and checking their dorms in the mornings. We also had to sleep in a separate room close to them as a first point of contact.

When we were not driving and had a small break in the housemasters' room, we often had some fun

discussions and jokes with the housemasters on duty. There was Gary Ivamy, the master of puns (who surprisingly didn't like Family Guy), who could not hold himself back when Germany got kicked out of the International Soccer World Cup just in the group phase. Then there was Cameron Gibb who never missed out losing against one of us in Badminton or Table Tennis. Blair Jones, whose kiwi accent was really hard for both of us at the

beginning of the year, but was also a really good practice for us. Don Farmer, the big strong guy, who is still scared of Jaro. Duane Brooking, a really nice and relaxed guy to who you could always have a nice chat with. Grant McFarlane, an old fella whose mood could affect your experience with him. And finally Nathan Archibald, who you could always ask about rugby when your German rugby ignorance showed a lack of knowledge.

Ross and Paula were really helpful to us. They showed us how to do things in New Zealand and how we should start our life

here. Ross always knew a guy for something and Paula was something like a deputy mother for us. Altogether, they were a great team; they all struggled with our incomplete German accent English and they all helped us a lot during this year.

Thank you to everyone that supported us in our year and made this a great experience for us. We both really enjoyed staying at Timaru Boys' High School and we are now looking forward starting our own life with all the knowledge and experience that we gained here.

GERMAN EXCHANGE: ISAAC DAVIES



Thanks to the opportunities that the school provided, I was fortunate to be able to head to Germany for two months, between 1 December 2018, and 1 February 2019. I had the chance to do things that I may never get the chance to do again.

I flew over as part of a group of around twenty (the flights all up were 23 hours long one way) before we all went our separate ways, to our host families, where I was welcomed with open arms. I lived in Oberhaching, a municipality in Bavaria, with approximately 13,000 people, about 15 km south of Munich.

Ko Cameron Stephen ahau

I am Cameron Stephen, the 75th Otaki Scholar - you can call me 75 if that makes things any easier... I would like to start by saying it is an absolute honour to be here, in New Zealand, on behalf of Robert Gordon's College, Aberdeen. When I first joined the College, I always used to think of how amazing it would be to be Head Boy and have the opportunity to travel out to other side of the world on behalf of your school. Now that dream is a reality for me and I must say I cannot express enough how excited and humbled I am to be here.

Some of you may not know the real reason for me being here today so I'd like to give a small introduction as to what the Otaki Scholarship is and what it all means.

The Otaki Shield is awarded every year to the School Captain. It commemorates a sea battle involving a former pupil during the First World War. This pupil went by the name of Archibald Bisset Smith.

In March 1917 Captain Smith was in command of the SS Otaki, a refrigerated cargo ship. With a crew of 71, he was sailing from London to New York when his ship was attacked by the German raider Moewe. Although armed with only a small 4.7 inch gun, the Otaki returned fire and fought bravely. But when the Otaki was badly damaged and five of his men had been killed, the Captain gave the order to abandon ship. He himself stayed on board as his ship sank.

After the war, Archibald Bisset Smith was awarded the Victoria Cross for bravery and devotion to duty. In 1937 his family presented a Shield to the College as a memorial and this is presented every year to the senior boy who is judged "preeminent in character, in leadership and in athletics". The New Zealand Shipping Company, later P and 0, offered a free passage on one of their ships to New Zealand for the winner of the Otaki Shield and the New Zealand government organised transport and accommodation for the boy during his travels there.

Robert Gordon's College is an extremely diverse learning environment and the values that we cherish most are the ones shown here. Every day in and out of the classroom we are encouraged and taught to become team players who will mature and develop into leaders, with a constant sense of community at the heart of everything we do.

The school offers an incredibly wide variety of extra-curricular opportunities, many of these involving the music department. I myself have been fortunate enough to have played drums for the school bands and take part in the biannual music tours to Italy and Spain, which I have to say, was definitely a highlight of my school career.

As well as being a musical school we are also a sporting school. We have an abundance of opportunities in sport, from badminton to hockey, and kayaking to rugby with many pupils gaining international honours across the range of sports offered. I personally play hockey, so relax guys; I'm fairly sure I won't pose much of a threat to any of you in your rugby teams as I am well aware that I am most likely standing in front of some very talented young sportsmen! So if I do end up being involved in sport while I'm out here, and I would love to, I'll be sure to remain true to my Scottish roots and be outshone by the Kiwis almost every single time.

Sport at school personally helped me relax and acted as a release from the four walls of the classroom as I'm sure many of you can relate to. Being able to spend time with your friends

and teammates along with the help of my great coaches at school I was fortunate enough to play for Scotland in a few international games and series.

As well as the opportunities already mentioned, Gordon's offers so many different opportunities for pupils to express themselves through drama and performing arts and through outdoor education such as hillwalking club or kayaking club. Even stretching to allotments.

It is the combination of the excellent, truly dedicated teaching staff, diverse pupil backgrounds and the multitudes of extracurricular clubs and societies that make Robert Gordon's the place to be all you can be.

JUDD RUGBY EXCHANGE




APIRANA TAYLOR – GIFTED ORATOR

Timaru Boys' High School was delighted to be able to again host Apirana Taylor, a renowned New Zealand poet, novelist, performer, story-teller, musician and painter.

Apirana Taylor, of Te Whānau-ā-Apanui, Ngāti Porou and Ngāti Ruanui descent, has published six collections of poetry, four short story collections, two novels, and three plays. He has also been included in multiple anthologies and has published prolifically in other mediums, including sound and video recordings. He writes for children and the theatre, and is involved in acting and teaching drama. Taylor's first collection of poetry, Eyes of the Ruru, established his powerful voice among Māori writers.

Apirana's poetry reading performance to a select group Year 9, 10 and senior students was thoroughly enjoyed by all attendees. The afternoon saw Apirana present a writing workshop to a smaller group of students, whereby boys write down ideas before continuing to compose a poem. This exercise saw boys thinking creatively in a new way, inspired to continue writing.

LIBRARY

2018 was about embracing technology in the library. There was further development of the eBook platform, improved access to library resources with a new library website, the introduction of eTV as a media resource for teachers and the addition of 30 laptops to the library resources to help with device equity amongst the Year 9 students and the increasing number of senior students who wanted to do more work in the classroom. The library has become the hub for all things technological with Mrs Hutchinson ever on hand to help students who have forgotten their passwords or how to print with the new system which has been confusing to a lot of students, and teachers!

We were fortunate to be able to move to a new library system called Access-it. As well as providing students with improved access to their library account so they could renew and reserve books from home, the system provides greater access to resources for students. Access-it has allowed us to incorporate access to the online EPIC databases provided by National Library, to create reading lists for classes with recommended books and articles for students to read as well as being able the ability to incorporate films from eTV and Youtube into the catalogue meaning that students have a one-stop shop for their research.

Amidst all this technology, the library did not forget the importance of books and reading to students with a massive

417 books purchased for the library. Mrs Hutchinson worked hard to completely rearrange the library so that the fiction section was divided by genre rather than authors. This has allowed for a wider usage of the collection as if a book that a student wants is out, they can find similar books on the same shelf without relying on knowing which authors write the books that they like. The biographies, true stories (such as war and true crime) and hunting sections were also incorporated into the new fiction display area as they have proved popular with students in the past and awkward to locate in between the non-fiction sections. The ability of students to browse for books with success has been identified by Mrs Hutchinson and the English teachers and it has also led to an increase in the variety of titles which are read. The library was as busy as ever with researching lessons and classes with Mrs Hutchinson working closely with senior PE students, junior environmentalists and historians from all year groups.

There was a new influx of Year 9s who were eager to help out in the library so they joined our student librarian team along with Jock Urquhart in Year 10 and William Urquhart and Xaden Stringer in Year 12. Cole Melhopt and Ben Hargreaves in Year 13 joined later in the year to help with issuing of laptops from Term 2. Xaden and William were also awarded service colours for their service to the library for their continuous service.

In terms of staff use of the library, we brought back a book display into the staffroom to encourage a reading community amongst the teaching staff so that they can share their love of reading with students. Mrs Bennett, our Teacher in Charge of the Library, decided to retire to spend more time travelling the world. We thank her for all her hard work and contributions she has made to the library over the course of her leadership, she will be sorely missed.

The Rite Journey at Timaru Boys' High School continues to grow and develop just as the boys do from year to year, offering support and guidance to all Year 10 students as they transition through a very difficult stage of

their lives. We believe that we have fine young men who attend Timaru Boys' High but in offering a programme such as the *Rite Journey*, we enable our young men to complete a programme that has reinvented the traditional process of a "Rite of Passage" to assist in transforming boys from dependency to responsibility.

The delivery of this programme is undertaken in a number of different formats both inside and outside the classroom. Boys are given the opportunity to stand in front of the class and deliver their own "life story", a great opportunity for the boys to learn from their peers and gain confidence from delivering something very close to them. The programme is designed for the boys to constantly reflect on who they are now and who they would like to become, how they are going to get there, and those who have helped them get to where they are now.

Throughout the boys' *Rite Journey* year they have had to complete a range of social, emotional and physical challenges. – The *Hadlow to Harbour*, Class Sing off and Clash of the Class Haka are examples of these and are all designed to push boys outside their comfort zone.

This year's Sing Off challenge was won by 10GI who sang "Shotgun", this was a very popular song able to be sung in a low range and monotone, this attributed to the success of the song. The Clash of the Class Haka was won by 10AD, second was 10MF and 10SP came in third.

The year-long programme raises boys' awareness of issues that they might currently be facing as well as providing them with the skills and understanding that are required to navigate their way through beginning adulthood. Through conversations with the classes Rite Journey teacher about a wide range of topics from dealing with change, emotions and relationships to future aspirations and bush craft. Many parents will be giving their boys the same messages and the programme is design to reinforce positive messages they receive from home. The more adult connections a student can have through this transition the less the risk of a negative outcome.

In 2018 the boys have had a range of internal and external support. These have included Attitude Blair Poulter (Careers Advisor) who provided boys with important careers information. Tony Bunting (Counsellor) who discussed the impact of pornography, and the YMCA who came in a delivered a programme around resiliency and also conveyed messages around sexuality.

The 2018 Rite Journey programme culminated in the final challenge of the year, completed at Lindisfarne Presbyterian Camp.

Usually, the Rite Journey concludes with *The Solo*, an event where the boys spend 20 hours in the bush in isolation with no technology, providing an opportunity to build their own shelters and spend time reflecting on the year, whilst also planning for their future.





Unfortunately, due to a very irregular weather pattern, the trips to Peel Forest had to be abandoned; in true Rite Journey style however, a separate event was created that had elements of *The Solo* included, ensuring that the boys did not miss out on a special experience.

This year all five Year 10 classes made their way to the camp where both as a class and as individuals, they completed a number of different activities.

- **Bracelet making** with Ms Martin: designed to give boys a new experience and an opportunity to give back to others.
- **Shelter making** with Mr Richardson: a condensed version of what they would have completed at Peel Forest.
- **Penny Stove cooking** with Mrs Hutchinson: the boys made their stoves prior to *The Solo* so appreciated the opportunity to use them to cook a snack.
- Letter to self with Mr Rooney: a letter the boys wrote to their future selves, receiving this back when they leave school. They set goals, write about things they are thankful for and reflect on their lives to date.
- Haka practice with Darian and Sidney: the boys practiced the school haka in preparation for the final *Haka Challenge* during the day, an event that was won by 10AD.

A big thank you must go to all of the boys; their participation and attitude on the day reflected that of what we would expect to find in a fine young man. Also, sincere thanks to the staff who ran activities and to Mrs Staples for her organisation and facilitation of the event.

Special thanks to *The Rite Journey* teachers for giving so much to their students throughout the year and delivering what is something unique and special to Timaru Boys' High School.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS SWIMMING

Congratulations to Jonathon Smitham who competed in the Special Olympics South Canterbury SS Swimming Event, recently held at at CBay.

Jonathon came first in the 25m Freestyle, 50m Backstroke and 50m Freestyle. He also came second in the 4x25m Freestyle Relay.

A number of TBHS students volunteered to assist on the day, impressing the organisers with their efforts - their interaction, encouragement and cheering for the contestants was much appreciated, and helped make for a successfully run event. Thank you to those boys who assisted – you were a real credit to yourselves and represented Timaru Boys' High School well.



STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council had another productive year under the guidance of Rector, Nick McIvor and the support of our librarian, Stephanie Hutchinson.

Each year the Council endeavours to be part of a major change in either aspects of the school, or in terms of educational opportunities for all boys. This year was no exception in terms of being part of change. With NCEA Level 1 under review on a national level, the Student Council submitted a report to NZQA re the proposed changes during Terms 2 and 3.

Initially, the Council sent an online survey to students, asking questions about their personal experiences of NCEA. From there, two focus groups were created where a further six ideas were discussed. The senior and junior focus groups allowed the students to communicate further the advantages and disadvantages of NCEA, removing external exams, lowering credits, the preparation that studying allows for future study, and how NCEA can be improved.

By September, the Council had typed up the results and had submitted their formal responses to the relevant authorities. To date, NCEA are still collating the data and their findings will be publicly acknowledge the data in due course.

SWIM SCHOOL

The 2018 Swim School had the largest turn out ever with 10-15 boys from Years 9 to 11 showing up regularly on Tuesdays and Thursdays lunch times.

This increase in numbers is due to Swim School being more actively promoted around the school. The instructors encouraged all students to come Tuesday and Thursday lunch times and to give it a go. This was done through PE teachers, class notices and posters around the school.

The Instructors were Riley Taylor (Year 13), Reed Stevenson (Year 13), Jack Sands (Year 12) and Will Tudgey (Year 10) who are all national level swimmers.

At the beginning of the lessons, the boys were asked about what they wished to gain from swim school, whether it be improvement on current skills, or how to swim in general. Most of the boys' answers were around the development of speed, as most boys wished to get faster for their Year 9 or 10



PE Challenge which includes running and swimming. Some of the boys were also working on the Year 12 PE Aquathon assessment.

Another answer to this question was to improve survival sculling. Survival sculling is essentially staying afloat upright so their head is out of the water and they are able to breathe easily. They do this for 6-10 minutes in the diving well to represent how to survive in deep water such as the ocean or large lakes.

Coaching will be continuing next year, as Jack Sands and William Tudgey have already volunteered to continue swim school throughout their future schooling. This will hopefully lead to future development with students that still wish to increase their skills. Through all of this training, all of the students who have attended are now able to swim a length of efficient freestyle in the 33m Timaru Boys' High School pool without touching the bottom or stopping for a period of time. This made swim school in 2018 a very successful activity for the swimmers as the goal was to simply improve their confidence, skills and knowledge.


TANE MAHUTA CARVING

Mā te mātauranga te mana. Empowerment through education and being connected to our past and our future is the story behind the new whakairo (carvings) on the mahau (porch) of Tane Mahuta our whare.

This year we were privileged to have Master Carver Tamati McGregor (Ngāti Raukawa) from Taranaki fashion new carvings for our mahau. His theme for the work encompassed our spiritual connection with Ranginui and Papatuanuku, Tane Mahuta's journery to the heavens to receive the three baskets of knowledge, and Maui's great feat of fishing up Aotearoa from the deep sea. Each of the carvings links the present to the past and our hopes for the future.

Whilst here, our Te Reo classes have enjoyed spending time with Tamati as he worked on the new mahau, learning about the heritage, spiritualism and symbolism, and technique of traditional carving, and how they can become involved in it more themselves. Of note, is how Tamati has continually expressed in the carving Mā te Mātauranga te Mana, Scienta Potestas Est, Knowledge is Power.

The new carvings were erected and presented to the school at a special ceremony and blessing. Our local kaumatua, Te Wera King and the family of Matua Smiley Haua attended alongside Tamati. The carvings were blessed and Tamati told us the story behind his work. We are humbled by their beauty and their mana.





TAIOHI SUMMIT

Congratulations to Brooklyn Galbraith who was selected to participate in the inaugural Taiohi Summit, held at Lincoln University from 5-18 November with more than 150 young Māori, aged 16-24, participating in the event.

Over four days, Māori rangatahi engaged in work streams aimed at activating them in the following topics: sport and recreation, mahinga kai, putaiao (science and

technology), pakihi (Māori business), 'Am I Māori enough?', and whānau ora.

Quarterly regional hui led by local stakeholders as well as online engagement, enabled the young people to work on identified priorities from the hui and look at opportunities to lead and implement them locally. This allowed for a regional approach that is tailored to the regional resources available to taiohi while drawing on national resources where available.

At the beginning of the year, the Regional *TeenAg* competition was held in Waimate, where we had seven teams of two competing. Unfortunately, this clashed with the first weekend of Club Rugby and many boys understandably chose rugby. The fourteen boys competed in a series of activities such as practical modules, written exams, speech presentations and a practical race off. They completed all events to the best of their ability and did themselves proud.

The year was challenging with access to industries due to the introduction of Mycoplasma Bovis in the rural sector. 5 Star beef lots and various farms postponed trips due to



the regulations and risk of spreading the disease. We did however visit South Pacific Sera who are globally renowned for production of animal derived bio reagents. Although very advanced and academic information was presented, all boys enjoyed the opportunity to look around the laboratories.

Throughout the year the boys have been out at AgriLearn cutting up and carting firewood to fundraise money for the club's trips etc. We have worked hard in the past to raise money to purchase our own chainsaws and safety gear and two crated trailers to deliver the wood.

LOGAN WILLIAMS - ENTREPRENEURIAL OLD BOY

Old Boy Logan Williams is an entrepreneur and student of the University of Canterbury and was one of the ten shortlisted nominees for the 2018 Young New Zealander of the Year Award.

Williams is an inventor who has invented polarized contact lenses for people who suffer from light sensitivity and has also developed a method to turn pest algae Didymo into useful materials.

He says, "My passion is to develop revolutionary technologies to improve people's lives from all walks of life." He was selected for the Kōkiri Māori Business Accelerator making him the youngest entrepreneur to be selected for the programme with the only South Island-based company in the start-up accelerator programme.

We were fortunate to have Logan return and speak at a school Assembly, encouraging our current students in their study and future focus. The following is his speech to the boys:

I know what you are thinking: here is another person who is going to tell me what to do or who I should be. I have been in



your shoes and that is the last thing I want to do today. Above all else today, I want to convince every one of you that you can achieve your own success if you put your mind to it.

I will start by introducing myself. My name is Logan Williams I am a scientist, inventor, and businessman, based in

Christchurch. Last year I was a finalist for Young New Zealander of the Year, and was selected as New Zealand Student of the Year for Business and Finance. I have completed a Bachelor Degree of Science with First Class Honours and am now studying a Master's in Business part time at the University of Canterbury.

However, these are all arbitrary titles; to put it simply, I create solutions to problems which I use to create businesses. To date I own three businesses: Biome Innovation which turns Didymo or rock snot into materials. Polar Optics, which creates polarized contact lenses to treat epilepsy, and Biolina a system that grows spirulina in effluent tanks on a farm to purify water.

But my life wasn't always like this, in fact six years ago, I was sitting exactly where you are as a Timaru Boys' High student. I wasn't an incredibly successful student, I was not a Peer Support leader, Prefect, or had any leadership roles to speak of. I grew up in a rundown flat on Tekapo Street which at the time was infamous for gang violence, and I suffered from crippling depression.

So what changed? Well I found out that my biggest weaknesses were actually my greatest strengths. At University, privileged children who had the world given to them would fail at the first sign of a barrier, whereas I knew what it was like to have nothing, and therefore would let nothing stand in my way. If you think for a second that you are not smart, or rich enough for University you are dead wrong; with hard work, focus and dedication, you can be more successful than any of the more privileged.

When I was writing this speech, I thought to myself, what advice would I have wanted when I was sitting in your position. So I am going to give you my four tips to being successful, please feel free to write these down on your phones.

The first is what I call reverse engineering, where you draw a picture of who you want to be in five years' time and what you want to accomplish. Once you have that picture work backwards, for instance, in five years' time I want to be a certified electrician, well to do this I need to find a company to support me, which requires a polytechnic degree, which requires these skills and grades at high school.

The second piece of advice is writing SMART goals, which stands for specific, measurable, achievable, realistic, and time bound. I personally have 250 goals I want to achieve this year sitting on my wall at home. This will clearly map out what you want to accomplish, and will always be in the back of your mind, then whenever you are doing something think does this help me to achieve one of my goals.

The third piece of advice, is that learning is critical to anything you do. You must learn how to learn, the faster you can learn, the better you will be at anything you put your mind too. From learning a language, to getting a job, and parenting everything you do in life involves learning. I personally use what I call immersion, where I verbally record, highlight, draw, and deeply consider my notes in order to learn.

The fourth and final piece of advice is probably the most important above all else, and I had to work it out for myself. It is incredibly difficult to become rich and successful if you are working for someone else. Through capitalism, workers get paid less than what they are worth; that is how a company makes a profit. So the sooner you can start your own company the better off you will be. For me the single greatest tool in business is the lean canvas, L.E.A.N Canvas. This single sheet of paper will make you a millionaire if used correctly. Any company in the world can fully explained on this single piece of paper.

Those are my four pieces of advice, which I hope you use to their full potential.

I would like to end this speech today with a quote by Nelson Mandela: "Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate, our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light not our darkness that most frightens us. You're playing small does not serve the world. There is nothing enlightened about shrinking so that other people won't feel insecure around you. It is not just in some of us it is in everyone."

A group of 21 boys from all Year levels had the privilege of working with Sir Don McKinnon (ONZ, GCVO) in the Memorial Library on Friday 2 March. Sir Don visited to promote the New Zealand Memorial Museum project at Le Quesnoy in France for which he is Patron.

This project is an exciting one. It will

give New Zealand a special facility (in a converted chateau) that future generations of Kiwis will be able to visit from November. It is in the town we liberated from German occupation in 1918, and is our first permanent War Museum on the Western Front.

Sir Don was accompanied by Andrew Falloon MP and LTCDR Grant Finlayson (Resident Naval Officer), Bevan Killick, and Alistair Furnival.

Considering the nature of this project, meeting in the Memorial Library couldn't have been more appropriate – nor could having Sir Don speak near the thirteen Old Boys found on the

As former Deputy Prime Minister and Commonwealth Secretary - General, Sir Don did not disappoint when it came to captivating discussion; his view not only on World War One but New Zealand's place on the wider international stage was prescient.

The afternoon was wrapped up with further conversation, fuelled by a tasty Thomas House Catering lunch.

In the year that we commemorate the ending of World War One, it's a fantastic achievement for our country to open this new museum at Le Quesnoy.

We hope it will be a place of pilgrimage for many of our boys in future.



LEARNING AREAS

AGRICULTURE

HoD: Mr Nathan Archibald

Agriculture has maintained solid interest within the school, with close to 90 boys in Year 10 opting to study Agriculture this year. Two classes of Year 11 boys continued to achieve both academically and practically, along with a Year 12 class that has seen many of its students move onto further rural opportunities throughout the year.

Year 10 students were challenged this year by the temporary removal of the Agricultural Plot area, necessitated by the new Hostel redevelopment. Instead of growing and cultivating plants and soils, we took a deeper look into the theories surrounding these processes. The boys also explored the global environment and markets to which New Zealand exports her goods.

The boys studied small engines and engines in general, exploring the differences between Petrol 4 and 2 stroke engines, as well as diesel engines. Other units studied were sheep farming and the different processes that occur on a sheep farm throughout a twelve month period, as well as gaining a small insight into the global giant of Dairy Farming.

The course was capped off with a trip to Bruce Westgarth's farm on Kelland's Hill where we were privileged to hear from a variety of presenters. Shearers, Wool Buyers, Rural Bankers, Dairy NZ representatives, Dog Handlers, Animal Health and Chainsaw experts, Agronomists and Mobile Abattoirs put on displays and small presentations to groups of boys in a rotation style day.

Year 11 Agriculture, which is a Unit Standard based course, enabled 44 students to explore a variety of aspects related to rural New Zealand. Practical days have been limited due to funding and legislation but the boys have the opportunity to undertake these practical skills in Year 12.

The boys studied Health and Safety units, Hydration, Livestock Behaviour, Fencing as well as Cattle and Sheep Breed units amongst others as well as completing two days out at Agrilearn, experiencing and learning practical skills in the fields of water supply and fencing. A solid percentage of these boys move into Year 12 Agriculture for 2018.

Year 12 Agriculture is designed around getting the boys 'work ready' in terms of acquiring skills and accreditation for these skills in a variety of areas. Farm Bikes, Agrichemicals,





Chainsaws and further fencing practical's were completed through Agrilearn's accredited tutors with most boys being very successful.

During class time, theory units including Agrichemicals, further Health and Safety units, Animal Health and Fertilisers were studied. The group included some exceptional future farmers, many who have since taken on full time jobs or been accepted into Agricultural Training Facilities throughout New Zealand.

At the 39th Artarama Prizegiving held on 18 August at the Aigantighe Art Gallery, two of our students came away with overall prizes, out of all the entries from local schools throughout South Canterbury.

HISTORY

PROFESSOR GLYN HARPER'S VISIT



We were very fortunate to have renowned historian, Professor Glyn Harper visit our school on Wednesday 15 August.

Glyn Harper is a professor of War Studies at Massey University in Palmerston North. He was the Director of the Centre for Defence and Security Studies for eight years and is currently Massey Project Manager for the Centenary of History of New Zealand and the First World War.

Professor Harper co-ordinated

two sessions in our Hogben Assembly Hall. The first focused on the Great War and was attended by both the Senior and Junior year levels. The second was designed specifically for History students in Levels 2 and 3 and focused on the Holocaust.

History Scholarship students also attended a special seminar on Gallipoli with Professor Harper after school in the Memorial Library.

ANIMALS AT WAR

As part of our Social Studies *Animals at War* unit, 10GI and Year 9 Totara students visited the South Canterbury Museum on Thursday 22nd November during Periods 1 and 2 to see the latest exhibition on World War One entitled *Enduring the Inferno* which included details of servicemen from Timaru and interesting artefacts from this time period

In addition to the main exhibition, both classes watched a presentation created by Malcolm Brady who is an expert on World War One and who has an amazing private collection of memorabilia including his grandfather's military uniform. The topic was "Animals at War" and Mr Brady discussed the relevant history of animals involved in human conflicts.

From the glow worms that assisted soldiers to read documents and newspapers in the trenches, to horses who died in their millions on the Western Front.

Dogs were employed to search and rescue, camels, elephants, mules, donkeys and oxen carried supplies and munitions. More recently, dolphins have been used in mine detection.

During the Year 9 presentation, students also had the opportunity to try on replica gas masks that were designed from 1914-1918 for members of the military, dogs and horses also had their own gas mask protection!

JUNIOR SECTION

We had a good number of boys gain great prizes this year. In the Year 9 and 10 section, eight boys gained prizes.

In the Intermediate Individual Science category, Reuben Bowen Year 9 received a BRONZE award with his project entitled: *Banana Breakdown*. Nicos Shearer Year 9 received a SILVER award for his project entitled: *Take half and leave half*.

The following boys received awards in the Technology Open section: Ross McCulloch Year 9 with his project: *Fire the Fire*, Neil Meyer Year 10 for his project entitled: *Speed of Light* and Thomas Corbett Year 10 with his project entitled: *Possum lures - what's best?*

Nathan Harbutt Year 10 for his project: *Nitrate fixing with Woodchips*, gained a SILVER award in the Intermediate Science Individual category and a Technology Open award. Balkrishna Uniyal Year 10 for his project: *Swing Chaps* gained a GOLD award in the Intermediate Science Individual category and a Technology Open award.

Sam Wilson Year 9 for his project entitled: *Pivots vs Roto-Rainers*, gained a BRONZE award in Intermediate Science Individual category, a Technology Open award as well as an ECAN (Environment Canterbury) award.

SENIOR SECTION

George Mulder Year 11 entered his investigation entitled What's the best pasture growth provider in winter? winning a SILVER award in the Senior Science Individual category as well as the Otago University Hands on Science Prize. George placed second overall in the Fair.

Bailey Lissington Year 12 entered his investigation entitled: *Without a Drought*, winning not only a GOLD award in the Senior Science Individual category, a Technology Open award, and a NIWA (National Institute of Water and Atmospheric Research) award but placing FIRST overall in the Fair.

The Science Department is very pleased with the effort and skill these boys have shown in carrying out and presenting their investigations. They can be extremely proud of themselves and be assured that they have a bright future in the Science field if they so choose.

ICAS SCIENCE EXAM

Five students from Timaru Boys' High School achieved outstanding results when they participated in the 2018 ICAS Science exam.

Those students whose achievements were outstanding were rewarded with Certificates of Merit, Credit, Distinction.

ICAS Science tests students' skills and knowledge in Science and provides insight into students' understanding and thinking skills.

The following boys were awarded certificates in 2018:

- Josh Earnshaw Year 11 gains a Distinction Certificate which places him in the top 4% of students in New Zealand and the Pacific region
- Thomas Corbett Year 10 gains a Credit Certificate which places him in the top 12% of students
- William Jack-Hydes Year 10 gains a Credit Certificate which places him in the top 25% of students
- Neil Meyer Year 10 gains a Merit Certificate which places him in the top 37% of students
- Ben Walker Year 10 gains a Merit which places him in the top 37% of students

YEAR 12 PHYSICS TRIP TO UNIVERSITY OF CANTERBURY AND RUTHERFORD'S DEN

On 11 September, the two Year 12 Physics classes were given the opportunity to travel up to Christchurch for a series of workshops.

The day was planned by Miss Everitt in preparation for their final internal assessment for the year, Level 2 Atomic and Nuclear Physics, and marks the first time such an opportunity has been offered to senior physics students at this level. It was a successful day out that we hope to further refine and offer again in future years. With forty students and staff, it was a very busy day for all!

At Rutherford's Den, the boys learned more about the history of the atom and Ernest Rutherford's scientific experiments and discoveries – notably his "Gold Foil Experiment" which revolutionised our knowledge of the structure atoms. They also heard about the many practical applications of nuclear physics as well as the dangers of nuclear radiation.

At the University of Canterbury, the boys were taken through the Department of Physics and Astronomy and put to work in a first-year physics laboratory where they conducted two experiments of their own. First they investigated the effectiveness of biological materials (carrot slices) in absorbing beta and gamma radiation, to appreciate the effect of ionising radiation on exposed tissue or skin. Next they investigated the radioactive nature of unstable copper isotopes, monitoring the level of radioactivity and measuring beta particle emissions to calculate half-life. Finally the boys were treated to a number of exciting demonstrations, including using liquid nitrogen, to illustrate some of the experiments and opportunities they would have as a first-year physics student.

TECHNOLOGY - FOOD

Teacher in Charge: Mrs Lynda Paul

In 2018, the Food Department warmly welcomed Mrs Megan Blake as the Senior Hospitality teacher. We are very fortunate to have a highly experienced and enthusiastic teacher to guide the students in a popular career pathway course. It is also pleasing to see a number of students who have undertaken Food, now undertaking study both in Food and Hospitality and have gained jobs in the industry. We are especially proud of Cole McDonald who this year has won the Sid Young Memorial Cup for best Commis chef of the year.

The Food and Nutrition students have continued to enjoy expanding their knowledge and skills of food hygiene and safety, nutrition for good heath, budget family meals and practical skills.

The Year 13 class has investigated societal issues such as the ethical issue of a sugar tax, the concern of poor nutritional choices and analysing their effect on society.

The Year 12 Food and Nutrition students have been analysing sustainable food related practices and preserved seasonal and local food. The Sports Nutrition unit entailed following and advising an athlete on how to enhance their nutrition to improve their performance along with investigating nutritional issues for families and society included food poverty and obesity.

The junior classes have been focussing on low glycaemic foods to enhance sports performance as well as investigating cultural foods - competing in a competition and designing authentic foods for real clients was enjoyable – especially with the ice cream unit. Demonstrations from chefs to inspire and give our boys industry standard feedback has been appreciated for their culinary challenges. This year has also seen a Year 9 class trial making their own cooking demonstration video which was both challenging and fun

In 2018, the Year 12 and 13 Hospitality courses have provided our students with an excellent platform to advance into a diverse and exciting industry, where food preparation, quality of service and client satisfaction are key components to success. Both year groups had the opportunity to experience what it will be like to work this fast paced and stressful environment and have been assessed under the same conditions: experiencing time pressure, quality standard checks, presentation scoring and client expectation, at the ARA Institute of Canterbury Timaru Campus Commercial Kitchen.

Year 13 Hospitality students have covered a range of unit standards, for example: Baking, Group Contribution, Complex Sandwiches, Origins of Coffee and Barista. The Year 12 Hospitality students have completed unit standards in salads, grilling, handling knives, food safety and Barista and were also involved in a successful pop-up coffee café at ARA during Term 3.

ARA FOOD AND BEVERAGE COMPETITION

On Monday 18 June, Matt Kennedy, a Year 12 Hospitality student, participated in the ARA Food and Beverage Competition held at the Christchurch Campus where he entered two events.

The first was the New Zealand Beef and Lamb Event which saw Matt preparing and presenting two identical main courses containing beef as the protein, a balance of starch, vegetables and a suitable sauce - all within the 60 minute time frame. In this event Matt competed against professional chefs and produced an impressive dish.

The second event, the National Secondary Schools Culinary Challenge (NSSCC) saw Matt prepare, cook and present two individually plated portions of an entree course within 60 minutes with New Zealand tomatoes as the principal component of the dish. Congratulations to Matt on winning a Silver Award which is both a credit to his hard work and dedication this year and is a confirmation that if he continues this in the future, he could potentially have a great career in this industry.

TECHNOLOGY – METAL

YEAR 9

Students in Year 9 completed a 10 week rotation of study during which they designed and made two projects incorporating the learning required to understand the importance of the design cycle. The first project introduced the students to basic hand tool use in the making of a key ring whilst the second project saw the design and manufacture of a mini hacksaw. Many new and valuable life skills have been learnt.

YEAR 10

Students in Year 10 were challenged to expand their design skills by first making a sheet metal toolbox and then designing their own mini hammer. Those that completed the hammer were encouraged to manufacture an innovative stand using multi materials to display their hammers.

YEAR 11

Students followed a Unit Standard course facilitated by *Competenz*. They completed unit standards in safety and following a plan to build a specific product. The product in question was a Wind vane. The last option was to manufacture a G clamp which was done to a high standard by having the final product powder coated.

YEAR 12

This year, students followed the course which was to build a mini bike. A kit which consists of the engine, wheels and plastic components was bought and the students had to design and complete the rest of the bike.

For the first time this year a team of 8 boys went up to the North Island to compete in the Secondary School Championships. In 2019 boys will have the option of building a 70 cc Pit bike.

TECHNOLOGY - WOOD

Teacher in Charge: Mr Mark Johnston



This year has seen the introduction of a new Level 3 Year 13 BCATS Building, Construction and Allied Trades Skills course. This has involved students designing and constructing a project for a client. The students have covered skills such as research, designing, quantity surveying, costing and extending

their practical skills. A range of different projects have been constructed of various sizes that can be used in and around the home.

Year 12 students covered two set projects which included a saw stool and a bar stool. A variety of different materials complimented the bar stool designs which often used Rimu slats on the top and aluminium supporting bars at the base of the legs. Their third project was left to their own personal choice with coffee tables being a popular option, glass topped or in one case a resin filled section of a native timber slab of wood. These projects are a welcome compliment to any home, built with pride and attention to detail.

The introduction of the Cape Cod or Adirondack



Chair into the Year 11 course has been a great success. Each student fabricated an outcome while personalising the style to their own requirements, adding extras such as a drink support



or a food tray. A range of processes and fastening methods have been undertaken to build each part then assemble them together. What a great way to finish the year off, sitting on the deck in the sunshine enjoying a cold drink and a bite to eat.

The junior school students continue to explore a range of possible outcomes in their project design by using SOLO. This has enable them to critically analyse existing designs in order to come up with features and functions relevant to their own design requirements. Students who have used BYOD opportunities effectively have found this platform a great way of researching, writing up and presenting information. Practical skills learnt at this level challenge and encourage the boys to explore a variety of different materials, tools and construction methods in order to build their projects.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS' MINI BIKE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Sunday 14 October saw a team of eager young men meet in front of the school and start the big trek north, loaded with eight mini bikes. We arrived at the Picton camp ground in the afternoon and after setting up camp, headed into town for a dinner of fish and chips.

Monday morning was an early start as we had to catch the ferry at 7:00am; the crossing was a bit rough and a few boys felt what it was like to be sea sick for the first time. After leaving Wellington, we went directly to the race track in Feilding where the bikes were scrutineered and locked away for the night.

Qualifying was first on the program on Tuesday followed by a series of races for all the different classes. After the day's racing, bikes were serviced and locked away again ready for the final race day.

In the final races, we looked good for two podium placings but unfortunately Cadell lost his exhaust and had to stop whilst William had a mishap and took a tumble on one of the last bends.

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SPORT

SPORTS DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2018 has been a strong year for Sport at Timaru Boys' High School with a range of quality performances on the National and International stage. This has tended to be by individuals in sports away from the direct confines of the school such as Water Skiing, Wrestling, Motocross and Speed Skating and in sports where although there are school based events and opportunities to represent the school, much of the work and training is done at clubs. Swimming, Athletics and Tennis have been particularly notable in this regard.

It is good to see our boys involved in a range of sports and in Term 1 of each year there is a focus on trying to highlight the wide diversity of sports available in the region and to provide tasters of these sports. Our participation rate remains stable at around the 75% mark and when you consider this does not include those boys involved in sports outside of the school, over three quarters of our boys are actively giving it a go. The ideal would of course be that every boy in the school is involved in at least one extra-curricular activity and event each year.

In the traditional team sports, Hockey continues to lead the way with consistently high level performances at Canterbury and National levels. Basketball has enjoyed a surge of interest and numbers. Young 1st XI Football and 1st XV Rugby squads had rebuilding years that hinted at promising things to come.

Interschool results have tended to fall into quite a consistent pattern. Aside from small pockets of success, competing against the powerhouses of particularly Christchurch and Otago Boys' is a challenge for us. We are far more competitive and successful against St Andrew's and Waitaki. John McGlashan College has emerged as a new full winter and junior summer exchange. In terms of size, strength and attitude they are a very good fit for us. They have excellent facilities and the winter exchange saw our senior sides and staff hosted by them on the Monday evening which was a throwback to interschools of old and enjoyed by all.

Sport Canterbury through the South Canterbury office provide a wide range of enjoyable Aoraki competitions which also provide opportunities and exposure to at times new sports for our boys. While we have consistent success at this level which is highlighted by the number of boys who received awards at the Aoraki Schools awards night including Riley Taylor's Young Sportsman of the Year award, it is important we keep this in perspective. With our relative size in the region we should be a dominant school. Being strongly competitive in Canterbury, South Island and at times National competitions should remain the key focus for us.

To this end we have established a Sports Council at the school which looks to oversee the organisation and running of sport at the school. Like it or not sport in many schools in now increasingly run on a semi to fully professional basis and recruiting and retaining the top sporting talent has become very competitive as has striving to succeed in the vast array of competitions now out there.

The onus is on us to be as proactive as we can in terms of providing sporting opportunities and enjoyment alongside good facilities and coaching. We are very reliant on volunteer help from staff and the wider community where some individuals selflessly give hundreds of hours of their personal time for no direct rewards. Ensuring there are good systems and support for these people is paramount to sustaining their involvement.

SUMMER SPORTS REVIEW 2018

The 2017-18 Summer sports season has been a successful and busy one for Timaru Boys' with the highlights coming in Tennis, Rowing, Swimming and Athletics.

Our Tennis team made a rare appearance in the National finals, courtesy of finishing 2nd at the South Island Championships in Timaru where they defeated schools of the calibre of Christchurch and Otago Boys', St Bede's and Marlborough College. They were competitive at the Nationals and finished in 7th position.

The Maadi Cup is probably the school sporting show piece of Term 1 with a large team of twenty four rowers attending the Championships at Lake Ruataniwha this year. Pleasingly, a number of crews made A finals and Hamish Yeatman and Josh Wilson came away with Bronze Medals in the U15 Boys' double sculls. James was selected in a South Island squad at the conclusion of the regatta to row against the North Island.

A strong team of thirty three athletes represented TBHS at the South Island Secondary Schools Athletics Championships held at Aorangi Stadium. We came away with seventeen medals including four titles to George Guerin in the Steeplechase, Bailey Gebbie in the Triple Jump, Taiyo Watanabe in the Javelin and Thomas Valentine who set a new meet record in the Hammer throw.

This success continued into the National Secondary School Track and Field Championships in Dunedin in December where TBHS came away with 6 medals; a fine performance from a team of only 12 athletes. The highlight was the Gold Medal to Ryan Bagrie in the Junior Boys' 1500 metre final in a dominant performance.

Our Swimming is also currently in a very strong and healthy position. The performances of Riley Taylor and Jack Sands in breaking a combined total of seven records at the school swimming sports in February deserves acknowledgement. Riley was selected in a swim New Zealand squad that competed at the Australian state championships in October.

Term 1 contains numerous Aoraki Competitions. The Touch team led by the "White Serevi" Jimmy Robertson, again defended their title. Our Bowls and Volleyball teams filled minor placings in these competitions. The TBHS Saints Softball team won the South Canterbury competition and it was pleasing to see Timaru Boys' compete in a South Island softball tournament, especially the achievement of Lucas Mullings in making an age group New Zealand side.

The performances of our Colts cricket teams in both interschools and the National Knockout competition provides hope for the future. Some dedicated, consistently hard work is needed to lift the standard of our 1st XI cricket.

Individually, both Will Gibson in Water Skiing and Keaton Swindells in Inline Skating have made New Zealand teams to compete in International competitions, showing the benefit of both hard-work and initiative on their part to get involved in sports outside of the mainstream ones offered at TBHS.

At a recent evening held for Timaru Boys' High Coaches, former All Black Coach Sir Graham Henry was kind enough to provide a video contribution. In it, he mentioned the role of provincial New Zealand in producing a number of outstanding sports people and an advantage he felt we had in being a part of that type of community with a high percentage of teenage boys being actively involved in a range of sports compared to the big cities. In recent years, TBHS Old Boys such as Hayden Paddon in Rallying and Marc Ryan in Cycling, have been to the forefront on the international stage. We can also lay claim to being the New Zealand school who has produced the current New Zealand Sportsman of the Year and a reigning World and Commonwealth Shot Put Champion in Tom Walsh. Ten years ago, Tom was sitting exactly where our boys are now as a Year 12 student and who was not unsurprisingly a school Shot-put Champion as well as a member of the 1st XV Rugby, 1st XI Cricket and Golf-Croquet sides whilst also playing some social hockey in his limited spare time. He managed all that while still trying really hard in the classroom to overcome the reading challenge of being Dispraxic. Hopefully, this is food for thought for all our students in terms of what someone from Timaru and Timaru Boys' can achieve.

WINTER SPORT 2018

The 2018 Winter Sports season has in many ways been a pleasing and successful one.

Our Hockey team emulated the feats of our Tennis team in being ranked in the top eight schools in the country at Rankin Cup.

Our swimmers have continued to shine at South Island and National competitions.

The Senior Basketball team enjoyed its best season in a number of years with a top eight finish in the South Island Championships. A number of boys are performing well nationally and even internationally across fields as diverse as Cross Country, Skating and Water Skiing.

The Rawlins twins William and Peter were to the fore in the U16 Boys events. William claiming the 200-400 metre events, while Peter chased home St Kevin's College's talented Max Yanzick in the 1500 and 3000 metre events. Peter's time in the 3000 metres would have broken the existing record eclipsed by Yanzick.

In the Senior (U19 Boys) grade, TBHS was especially dominant. Bailey Gebbie won the 400-800 metre double as well as the triple jump. Ben Sewell was victorious in the 110 metre Hurdles and Long Jump, while Taiyo Wantanabe claimed the field event double of Javelin and Shot put. George Guerin put in a strongly controlled run to record a decisive win in the 1500 metres.

These boys then went forward to the South Island Secondary Schools Championships held in Timaru during the weekend of 23-25 of March.

SOUTH ISLAND ATHLETICS

The South Island SS Athletics was held in Timaru on 23-25 March.

The weather was cold but ideal for athletes to gain personal best performances.

TBHS had 35 Athletes which were selected from the Aoraki sports but only 33 competed in the South Island Athletics. The team consisted of a mixture of seniors as well as juniors.

This year TBHS had all four 4x100m relay teams qualify for the South Islands but only three teams competed, as the Under 19 had to be scratched because of an athlete who was injured while competing on the Saturday. We also entered two 4x400m relay teams an U16 and an U19 team. Both teams finished in the top 6. All 4x100m relay teams made the finals and the Under 14 were placed 3rd.

NZSS ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

The New Zealand Athletic Championships were held in Dunedin over three days from Friday 30 November to Sunday 2 December, an earlier date than previous years.

The weather over the weekend was sunny but very windy, which at times affected any records which were broken. TBHS had 13 athletes competing this year - seven juniors (four Year 9) and six seniors.

The results this year are the best we have ever had for many years. TBHS athletes won six medals and seven of the thirteen athletes made the top eight in New Zealand.

Standout athletes who gained medals were:

- Ryan Bagrie: 1st 1500m Junior Boys, winning by over 50 metres in a time of just over 4 min 8 sec. His performance in the 1500m was one of the best in the entire athletics meet.
 Ryan has a great future in the sport.
- George Guerin: 2nd Senior 2000m steeplechase, and semifinalist in the Senior 800m
- Thomas Valentine: 3rd Senior Hammer
- Dean Andrews: 3rd Senior Javelin
- Ben Sewell: 3rd 300m Senior Hurdles and 3rd in the 110m

Senior Hurdles, missing out on Silver by 0.06 seconds. Ben was also competitive in the Senior High Jump.

Other creditable performances were:

- William Valentine 4th in the Senior Javelin and 5th in the Senior Discus. William also performed well in the Senior Shot Put
- Quinn Motley 6th in the Junior Discus, was competitive in both the Junior Javelin and Shot Put
- Jed Syme made the Semi Finals for the Junior 100m and 200m
- Liam Johnston had two good performances in the Senior Hammer and the Senior Discus.

The four Year 9 Athletes performed very well against older Junior athletes: Saxon McNoe in the Triple Jump, Harry Schmack in the Long jump, Jackson Ross in the Discus and Reuben Bowen in the Long Jump, High Jump and Javelin.

This year the results were personal best performances for most of the athletes. They are all extremely talented and all of them should go a long way in this sport. Next year, the National Athletics will be held in Wellington and I am confident the results will be as good as this year.



Our team needed to shoot well from the 3-point line to upset this eventual tournament finalist. But scoring proved difficult and the team faded in the second half, finally losing 79-43.

On the second day, two wins were needed against John McGlashan and Burnside, the pool's number 2 seed. Playing John McGlashan for the third time this year, both teams were familiar with each other's strengths. The final score was not a true reflection of how hard this game was, as John McGlashan shot well staying in touch for most of the game. Jack Crossan led the team, scoring 27 points and James Watt added 25 points in the meritorious 92-79 win. In the crucial game against Burnside, TBHS led all the way, building a 16 point advantage, but Burnside rallied in the third quarter and we were made to work hard for the victory. Ben Robinson hit crucial 3-point baskets to extend the lead when the gap had narrowed. The final score was 73-68 to TBHS.

A win in the last pool game against Marlborough Boys' would see the side into the top eight. We were the smaller team, but with the pressure defence working well, a comfortable win was achieved - 81-59. Seb van den Bosch continued his steady play off the bench as he had done in all games, hitting vital shots and playing great defence.

TBHS were now into the quarterfinals against Middleton Grange. The well drilled Middleton team play a very structured game and were a good matchup for the team. The winner of this game would qualify directly for the nationals. The team stayed in touch all game, but could not stop this well-drilled side which moved the ball well on offence and shot with incredible accuracy. Unfortunately, James Watt twisted his ankle in the third quarter. Without James protecting the basket and gathering rebounds, it was going to be hard to mount the comeback needed to beat Middleton. Despite Jack Crossan scoring 26 points and Will Lyall adding 16 points, the side went down fighting, losing 87-74.

With James Watt out for the rest of the tournament, the last two games were a big challenge for this young side. The St Andrew's College and Rangiora High teams proved too big and experienced for the tiring TBHS team. All members of the team who had worked hard throughout year got to play in these games and got to experience play at the top level. This experience will be invaluable for next year's team.

In conclusion, an 8th placing in this very competitive tournament, featuring the best South Island senior secondary school boys' basketball programmes is a great achievement for a small to medium high school. It reflects the need for more depth, height and valuable experience to break through into the top six in the South Island, but is a creditable step in the right direction for TBHS.





With ten players returning from the 2017 side, the 2018 1st XI had a strong mixture of age, size, experience and attributes which led to a season the team can be proud of. Valiantly led by Co-Captains Harry Pearce and Tom Baxter, the five-month campaign had highs and lows, and the way all sixteen team members continued to work and compete, paid dividends at season's end with a second consecutive South Canterbury Cup Final and 5th place at the South Island Secondary School Tournament.

The South Canterbury Men's Division 1 campaign started with a 5-0 win away to Meadowbank, highlighted by a Taylor Donaldson hat-trick. Three losses to Geraldine, West End, and Pleasant Point followed as we continued to make line-up and formation adjustments to find what matched our personnel and style.

As tournament qualification and school exchanges ramped up, the team faced travel and fatigue which began to show in the final quarter of league games, where traditionally Boys' High teams take over. Four games in seven days in Dunedin, Christchurch and Timaru is an example of the challenge the team faced mid-season, and the test of squad depth and mental strength.

More often than not, our games came down to moments. Whether it was in tight wins or big losses, moments were proving decisive. In the first half of the season they seemed to be going against us, with Geraldine scoring a 90th minute equaliser and Timaru City scoring an 85th minute winner. The focus at trainings became about always being engaged and the ability to consistently execute basic skills to allow us to gain and hold more possession.

Highlights of our Men's Division 1 season included the opening round win over Meadowbank, a hard earned 2-2 draw against Northern Hearts and the growth of both our younger players.

Ending the league with a two win, two draw, ten loss record, we finished a disappointing 7th out of 8 and in a congested table, the team was left to rue what could have been.

The South Canterbury Cup is the highlight of the local season with a knock out style competition involving the top men's divisions. In Round 1 we drew Thistle Reserves and avoided a slip up by dispatching them 3-1. The quarterfinal matchup took a step up as we drew Meadowbank with whom we split the two regular season games. Dominating both possession and territory a semi-final spot was booked thanks to another Taylor Donaldson hat-trick.

With a two week break before the semi-final against Thistle, we had time to develop and practice a game plan. Having lost 5-0 and 8-1 during the season, the team needed to be at their best and that is what they delivered. In the game of the season, the starting 11 executed their roles and thanks to a goal from Harry Pearce and doubles to Matt Rayward and Taylor Donaldson, Thistle's hopes were dashed with a 5-4 score line as the team secured a second straight Cup Final appearance.

Another two week gap before the final left the team prepared and confident for what we knew would be a 90 minute battle. A fearless performance allowed us to spoil a lot of Hearts ball and cut attacks off at the head. Entering half time down 2-1 and hoping not to rue missed opportunities, confidence was high but Hearts came out firing. Quick goals by Hearts took the game away from us with the final score reading a 9-3 loss, which didn't reflect the nature of the game and the fight the team showed.

A busy Interschool schedule with both national tournament qualifiers and traditional matches meant every game was important and preparation was key. Needing to finish top two out of five Otago schools to qualify, a trip to Queenstown was up first with a contentious 3-2 loss eventuating, followed by a 1-0 away win to Kavanagh College in Dunedin. With a 3-1 loss at home to King's High School, a win was needed over Otago Boys' but possession didn't lead to goals and we fell 2-1, sending the team to the South Island competition.

Traveling to Nelson, the 1st XI aimed to finish in the top three, which was proven a realistic goal. Up first was Kapiti College on a field suffering from days of rain in the days prior. Whatever the cause, the team weren't locked in and paid the price by conceding early and eventually going down 3-2. Needing to win the remaining two games to reach the quarter finals, the team came out focussed to beat Rangiora High School and Mountainview 3-0.

Finishing second in the pool, a missed opportunity against Kapiti left us to face eventual winners Shirley Boys' in the Quarterfinal, going down 5-2 but being their stiffest challenge of the tournament. A bounce back 2-0 win against Christ's College set up a playoff for 5th/6th against Otago Boys'. With the end in sight and injuries mounting there was one more job to do and trailing 1-0 with five minutes to play, Logan Kerslake stepped up to score the most important goal of his season to level the score and send it to penalties. Fifth place, as well as some revenge, was secured with a 4-3 penalty shootout win which drew to a close our season and farewelled nine players from Timaru Boys' Football.

The way the team carried themselves throughout the season, showed dedication to our goals on and off the field, and showed up ready to work each week was a testament to their character and the leadership of Tom, Harry and other senior players.

Thanks to Cam Gibb, Monique Bastings, and Ross Stevenson for their unconditional support and for putting up with weekly demands. The success of our season and the ease of my job was dramatically improved with your help.

I would also like to thank Fred Windsor for his mentorship throughout the season. His wisdom, experience, and knowledge was invaluable and being able to call any time to ask for ideas and opinions helped develop my coaching and improve our team's results.

Liam Barclay (30, 0) Liam's work ethic and team first mentality set the tone for his season. He was ever confident between the sticks and his continued work on kicks from the ground and hands as well as constructive communication went a long way to securing his six clean sheets.

Tane Francis (5, 0) After strong performances for the 2nd XI, Tane earnt his debut against Christchurch Boys' and held his own in a 1-0 loss. Tane's strengths lie in his communication and athleticism and his continued growth will be key in the success of the 1st XI moving forward.

Henry Baxter (31, 0) Henry was one of the first names on each game's team sheet. His reliability, speed, and touch set him apart and his attitude made him a pleasure to coach and a great teammate. Henry will be vital to stabilising a young team in 2019 both on and off the field.

Harry Pearce (32, 2) As co-Captain and the team's most capped player, Harry was going to be an integral part of the team and he didn't disappoint. His strength in both the air and in the tackle was essential in the South Canterbury Men's competition. A leader off the field, Harry's contribution to the 1st XI and TBHS Football will be missed.

William Rawlings (30, 0) After reverting to his more comfortable position at centre back, William was a rock in our back four. Often tasked with marking the opposition's best players, his fitness and commitment shone through as he went toe to toe with South Canterbury's finest.

Bram van den Bosch (27, 1) Bram was the energy of the team and played with his heart on his sleeve. Bram always showed his character and team first approach by giving 100% to whatever role he was asked to fill even if that meant reduced minutes.





SEASON OVERVIEW

The 2018 rugby season was another hugely successful one with many great results across the numerous teams and grades that altogether, showed we were again the premier rugby school in the area and still one of the best rugby schools in the South Island

We had approximately 220 players spread across ten teams. This was a small drop off from previous years but the school size was also smaller and the lack of a local U18 competition meant that it has become more difficult to attract and retain players in Year 13, with some wishing to work or play Senior B rugby locally.

Our player numbers however are very strong and well above the national average for players in a school. The success of all these teams is based around what people do for them. Hopefully the boys and parents see the work these volunteers do in this regard and how it continues to benefit our boys.

All Saturday teams were of mixed ability except the 1st XV, 2nd XV and 15A Colts. Pleasingly this year, we also improved the 14A team structure and while 16A was to be worked on, we feel that finally we are working towards some good succession planning for the better group of players we have at each age level.

One challenge that comes from mixing our teams is getting our A team structure correct so they are ready to play other schools. This year we trialled several initiatives and many of them worked well before the weather, grounds and other sports on Wednesday nights caused disruption.

Getting boys to enough practices and even games around their work commitments and other sporting commitments is becoming more and more of a challenge for us. Boys do play for many reasons but to play well, there is still a need for practice to hone skills and fitness.

The reality is, that sadly in this day and age, priorities have changed for many and to attend two practices and also work on their own game in their own time is not seen as important by many boys as much as it maybe was in previous generations. There is no easy fix for this.

We had an awesome group of coaches and managers this year who gave great service to the boys. Many were new to the role this year but they soon realized what this means to the boys playing it and how they could effectively meet the challenge of properly fulfilling these roles.

It must be remembered that every one of these people is a volunteer, giving their time freely, to look after boys who are not their own. To do this, they must be commended for without them we would be nowhere near as successful as we are every year.

Speaking of coaching, it was also awesome to see about twelve of our 1st XV members plus Year 13 student Neil Paver do some coaching of U14.5 teams. Your experience and leadership here was great and the boys loved having you there, and I think many of the coaches and managers did as well!

Well done to you all for undertaking this important work. It was also great that when asked, you were willing to give even more time when we needed help in U14A and U15A teams. Sam Tayler of Year 12 also took on refereeing this year and Ben Sands and Shane Fikken coached the Waimataitai Primary School team.

The committee had a good year and can be well pleased in how they contributed to the successes we had on the paddock. There is still the challenge of enlisting volunteers to take on committee roles and with some stepping down this year, it will mean other parents will have to step up.

One huge event that summed up how well the club is working was the very successful evening we had in April to raise money for the club. Brendon Laney, an Old Boy, and Kees Meuws, a former All Black, were superb quest speakers and it was awesome to raise as much money as we did. In the main, this event was organised by Year 10 parent Lisa Aitken and her small band of helpers. Thank you Mrs Aitken for your efforts here. The 250 people who attended loved the event and all promised to return if we were to have another one.

Talking of finances, it is often overlooked how much it costs to run the club. We are much smaller than many schools in this regard but we are also growing by the year and we will need to continue to be well run in the future so we can remain competitive with the other schools we play against. Rugby is costing us more, both financially and in time to organise in the changing landscape of the game today. We must meet these challenges and not lag behind. The expenditure of other schools and the resources they have in this area, borders on a professionalism in the school setting.

To have ten teams running properly each week does create challenges but we are confident in many ways we are doing

more than enough. The boys largely enjoy their rugby and the even teams and competitions they are in are well liked by them and their families.

Small Squad size means good game time but also conversely this means when injuries, concussions and sickness hit, we can be left light on numbers. The balance is hard to find as one less squad this year would have meant twenty two player squads and many more half games for boys. In turn, too many half games can lead to discontent.

The weather was a lot better this year than the prior two seasons ensuring more rugby for boys and less cancellations. While School Park was still muddy at times, we did have a lot more rugby there this year. The turf developments at both school and Alpine Energy should help us immensely in the future.

Judd Exchanges continued and the second year of this exchange proved just as successful as the first. Callum Stables and Theo Daviron were here in July and David Edh and Quinn Motley, chosen from a very high quality applicants, were our representatives sent there in November.

While here, the boys from Judd stayed with the Bampton and Bell families. We thank these families very much for taking them in for the four weeks and giving them great experiences that they will always remember. Long may this exchange continue to grow. It has proved to be very exciting this year and we think it will only grow in popularity. This experience can only enhance the boys who go and the families who hosted their boys here. Thanks to the Rector for this initiative. Next year the whole Judd team is visiting Timaru Boys'.

One real concern for us in 2018 was again concussion with at least twenty five players being affected. This meant many squads were short at times, as we never expected the numbers to be this high.

I wish to thank the following people on the committee; this is not to discount the others but the four individuals gave beyond their calling daily and without them we would be lost. They are Craig Bampton, Vicki Robinson, Kent Adams and Rod Sparrow.

Craig was our new Chairperson and he settled in to the role well. He was surprised by the size of the job but never shirked from making tough calls and doing his best for the club. Kent was Club Captain and brought large rugby experience and good balance to the role.

Vicki was again an effective Secretary who put in huge hours in her own well organised way. She has made administration in our club much more efficient. Rod was again Treasurer of a club which now has a large turnover and he always has a good handle of where we are financially at any one moment.

I believe the whole committee need thanking again as do all our coaches and managers for their work this year. Your help has been immense and you have laid a good foundation for our future. For those who are leaving, all the best but please keep an eye on our progress as we will keep an eye on yours.

It was great also to have many teachers on board this year helping with rugby in their own time. These persons all brought great experience in the game, and your willingness to help was valued. Please come back next year and help us again as we need teacher input in rugby.

South Canterbury representation as players and management was again high. In addition to this, Shane Fikken and John Vasu made the Crusaders School Camp with Shane in particular having been very unlucky to not make the final team that played the Hurricane Schools.

The recognition the above two boys got was a great advertisement that boys form Timaru can still make these teams and are a great example to our own boys of the

commitment required on and off the field to succeed in rugby. This does not just happen, it requires much work.

Thank you to all our rugby club sponsors for 2018. Without you all would mean huge cost increases for our boys and probably mean less teams overall. Plato Creative is a chief sponsor and their help over the next three years will be huge for the whole club.

Facebook and regular newsletters home to all caregivers continued to be the main way we communicated with everyone this year. These are marvellous tools and both have been used for much of our organisaton, meaning there has been little need for meetings at school.

Having sponsors and Old Boys functions remains challenging. Brent Isbister has been active in this area and it was great this year to have a couple of functions in this regard. There are hundreds in the community that want to know how Rugby is going at TBHS and we need to tap in to this in some way.

Many of our club members did well by gaining nominations and winning awards at the South Canterbury Rugby Awards. It was pleasing also to see teachers Grant McFarlane and Gavin Miller again involved with the South Canterbury Heartland team.

Our Year 13 players numbered thirty two this year. We take this opportunity to wish you all well for the future whether it is on or off the rugby field. Your dedication and commitment over five years to rugby and school is appreciated. Please make sure you all keep playing in the future as well as supporting us.

For the first time in several years, we did have some discipline issues on the field with players from a couple of different teams. Though disappointing, we are confident we dealt with this effectively and quickly. With the number of players we have had, there have been few issues overall. This is because of the systems we have in place and the excellent expectations that are placed on the boys by the individual team protocols, ably supported by those at club and school levels. Long may our good work remain happening in this important area.

The 1st XV had a solid season and finished 9th in the UC Championship, winning the Bowl final after only two wins in their first eight games, including one fateful loss in the last minute on Sky TV. One huge win was the Christ's game at home, a team who eventually played in the final; this was an amazing achievement and an awesome day.

Other good wins enjoyed by all was the win at Roncalli over Aoraki Combined - very comprehensively - plus the John McGlashan and Waitaki exchanges. Then there was the bowl semis and final wins over St Thomas's and St Andrew's that showed the true mettle of the team and how they improved over the year.

The first real challenge for the 1st XV this year was even finding a coaching team. After a worldwide search unearthed nothing after six months of attempts, it was great to have former South Canterbury, Southland and occasional Highlander, JP Koen apply for the vacancy. He saw the vacancy through a Facebook post! While he had not coached a lot previously, he did show the boys quickly he had great knowledge and experience in the game. He then progressed very well as a coach as the year proceeded and by the end of the year was definitely a great asset for us as the boys really grew from him on and off the field

We approached Robin Parker who did not know JP, to ask him to be his assistant late in 2017. It is fair to say he was hesitant and with his son rowing it meant that he was not really seen till March. When he arrived however there was no turning back and he has done an outstanding job all year. Robin's experience, friendship and expertise was quickly seen and the boys learned much from him quickly. Like JP, he has a great

love for the game and desire to help young players. Pleasingly for us now, both wish to carry on next year and we have now reappointed them to this role for 2019.

Looking back, this was the hardest job of the year. Finding a coaching team in this situation was difficult and worrying but these two, once they came together just clicked. We could not have asked for better and we are confident they will come back even better in 2019.

In addition to these two men, two fathers took on the roles of manager - Rod Sands and Chris Pudney. Both were outstanding and we could not have asked for better. We want both to continue next year. Never once did they not have the boys, team or school at heart in what they did.

Mr Sparrow, for the fourteenth year in a row, was part of this team also as teacher in charge. Thank you Mr Sparrow for continued efforts here and also to the leadership group of Shane Fikken, Ryan Greenslade and Ben Sands; well done - you often had to do more than expected and you did it admirably well. Thank you.

It was also great to have a physio with the team this year; Matthew Joubert from Motus physiotherapy was awesome in this role. Don Garland also once again did a superb job with fitness and needs to be commended on his continued support as an Old Boy in our school.

The 2nd XV, with unavailable local competition, played in the Canterbury Metro U18 competition again. This was tougher than last year with all the Christchurch Boys' teams present in the grade, and also having to play Division 1 with a squad probably not as good as the previous year. All in all though, the move to Christchurch is a good one and though results this year were somewhat disappointing, it does give the boys a taste of what is required in the next level from local games before the UC Championship. There was no 3rd XV this year, for reasons outlined previously in this report.

The 1st XV had a two win, three loss record in their exchange programme. These as always were amazing days. We lost to Christchurch Boys', Otago Boys' and St Andrew's but we did have great wins over John McGlashan away and Waitaki at home.

The 2nd XV team also played exchanges against St Andrew's, John McGlashan, Waitaki Boys' and Christchurch Boys'. Of these four, Waitaki was won but the other three were too strong for us. All these fixtures were in damp conditions and the Waitaki win did show some great ticker and heart after a tough year.

The 16A had a mixed season with many only playing a couple of games. Most of the better U16 players were already in 1sts and 2nds and this meant this team was rarely at full strength. Attempts to find more games proved fruitless as other schools and clubs were just not interested.

Thanks to Reon Keenan, Sam Robinson, Lochy Gillespie (2nds) and Brent Isbister, Clint Carter (16A) for coaching these teams in exchanges. All of you took time off jobs in the middle of the day, plus ran extra practices so the boys could enjoy these exchange games that are so important to the school.

The 14A had its best programme for some years and we want this to continue. The programme complemented the South Canterbury U14 one and most players were in both these teams. Also John McGlashan invited us to an inaugural tournament held at their school on Tournament Week.

Despite a few players being at U15 tournament, we sent a strong side south and ended up finishing 2nd of the 4 teams there. This tournament was good for our development and will help immensely in the future. There we beat John McGlashan and Southland Boys' but lost to St Thomas's.

Credit has to go to experienced coaches Terry Murray and Brendan Smith who gave much to this team and have helped us immensely by doing it. They had a clear game plan and structure and worked well with the players to now create a group ready to play 15A next year.

Fundraising at short notice had to take place so the team could participate. Tribute for this goes to Heidi Clemett and Jill White here for selling pies and chocolate to everyone and sundry to reduce the final costs needed to be covered by parents.

The local Under 16 grade had seven teams, three of which were ours. Our mixed teams finished a credible 4th and 5th. The 15A Colts team finished 1st, going through unbeaten. This was a good competition where all boys seemed to enjoy their rugby. Most now move in to U18 Rugby next year while some may even play 1st XV.

This will require a step up in fitness and skills as the intensity of those games will be much higher in every aspect. The big question for us is how many of our boys really want to do this. Some of them will also leave school which concerns us as our depth in this grade is somewhat eroding.

The 15A Colts were outstanding and deserved the win, only not getting a bonus point in one game. This was an impressive team, though the grade was to be fair, weak. They were not challenged all year really except in exchanges where they bet Waitaki, John McGlashan and St Andrew's but suffered a close loss to Otago Boys'.

Afterwinning the local competition the boys went to tournament and only lost one game, to eventual winners Shirley Boys'. This meant they finished the tournament in 3rd place and all in all it was a very successful week in Nelson. Once again then this team is something vitally important to our club.

There were many promising players in this team and some may even end up in the 1st XV as early as next year. Teachers Steve Blair and Tim Clack deserve credit here while Kent Adams assisted them well and they together created a game plan that was hugely successful.

Dave Boraman was an awesome manager; his work this year will be hard for anyone to replicate. His attention to detail and organization was first class and a credit to him. Kris Edh as trainer was another top man who helped immensely over the year. Well done to you both.

In the local Under 14.5 grade we had five teams of the eleven teams in the grade. Squads only numbered 18-19 and this meant everyone got the game time they wanted but it also meant at times we were definitely stretched in terms of numbers. Having no Colts in this grade also eroded depth a little across our teams,

Our teams finished, 2nd, 5th, 6th, 9th and 10th. A great achievement and a testament to how well the boys and their adults in charge fronted up all year. The performance of the Panthers making the final was impressive. They went to Fairlie and won their semi against a very good opponent but were not quite good enough in the final.

In this game they were riddled by injuries with seven players out and St Kevin's just proved a little too good overall. We never stopped trying however and a 12-36 loss was no disgrace against a much older and bigger team who had beaten them by 40 points only a few weeks earlier.

This grade definitely serves a purpose. The Cheetahs only missed the semis due to a countback and the Leopards were competitive with everyone. Also while the Tigers and Jaguars found it tough, there were still many players who grew and learned much about the game that will no doubt help them and us in the future.

U14.5 rugby is usually reliant on three or four good or bigger players been dominant. This year was no different and there is definite correlation in teams and how well they went based on who was fit and who was not fit. For example the 9th place Tigers only lost to the 2nd place Panthers 20-17 in the last minute on a controversial call.

Carol Dale continues to look after our overseas boys and this year was no different to the great work she has now put in over a number of years. Thanks Carol for all your work with John and Sio this year. It is appreciated and long may this continue if you are willing.

Sevens rugby continued to grow and more information is presented on this later on in this report. Boys want to play this version of rugby as it gives them the freedom to express their skills in a relaxed environment. I think it will only continue to grow in the years to come. South Canterbury Rugby is also using this mechanism as a way to promote the game in the district. The game teaches discipline, heart and fitness and that you cannot hide. The boys who played it loved it, but were left absolutely shattered after games by it.

They ended first equal in the competition but on a cold July afternoon at School Park, we outplayed them in front of a huge crowd. An amazing day, one of the best ever for rugby here!

PLAYER PROFILES

FORWARDS

Ben Sands was a tough and abrasive hooker who had a very good season overall. We needed leadership from him this year and in most games we saw that. While his throwing improved over the season it was at break down and scrum that we saw him at his best. He was a player that every team wants, and he can look back at some great successes from the three years he has played in this team.

Blake Tippett's impact is such that in the six games he missed due to injury, we only won one of them. This young man is talented and wants to learn and does a lot of work and graft that others just will not do. A huge ticker and a real drive to develop. Will play a lot of rugby in the future and we think at quite a high level. His progress will be watched with interest.

Darian Dysart became a real leader in the team this year. He was a first-year player, but never once did he shirk the front row position he was placed in early in the year. He is a very strong young man who was very good at moving opposition bodies in the road. He was also our Haka leader for 2018 and did an excellent job of this. He will be back in 2019 and we will continue to expect good things from him.

Dion McKeown was an extended player in Year 12 who got few opportunities but was always the ultimate team man and was prepared to play anywhere in forwards. Dion trains and trains; he has a tremendous work ethic, and whenever called upon he gave his all. Back in 2019, he should allow us to see the best of him. What his position is though is still really a discussion between him and the coaches and what the team might need.

George Brown is a flanker who immensely enjoys his front and is quite proficient in his core roles as either a 7 or 8. He is very good over the ball and created many turnovers for us this season. Unfortunately, concussion ruled him out of three games early in the season where we had desperately needed him on the field. Will be a very important player in 2019 for his playing ability and leadership.

George Mulder is a Year 11 boy who was thought to be too young and lean at the start of the year, but once added to the squad, he added immense value. George is a very good line out player and as his bulk increases the work he does around the field will become even more noticed. He is also a leader and that role plus his ability mean he will be very important to us in 2019 and 2020.

Jack Pudney did remarkably well this season. It was only his second year in the front row, and he was not that big at all. But he never once gave up and became very important to the team's bench when we required impact. He also went and helped the 2nds when they needed front rowers. Jack will be a better player the next two years because of his involvement in the squad this year.

James Davidson had a slow start to the season after a very long rowing season and having to adjust from local U16 rugby to this level. To his credit he worked hard, listened to advice, and ultimately worked his way in to the starting 15. This showed his commitment off the field as well as strength on defence and at the breakdown where he just worked and worked every game for the whole 70 minutes. Important player next year.

Logan Goldingham epitomises what we want from players at our school. Though he gained not much game time as he was the second hooker, he was not far behind in ability and he had a tremendous attitude to trainings and game preparation. As the season progressed these qualities were noted and praised by his team mates and management. Logan was also happy to do a lot of side-line jobs that we needed assistance with over the year.

Mac Edwards was a strong player who played 1st XV at various times in four of his five years at this school. He appears best suited in the 6 or 8 role he took on this year but also showed his strength, versatility and leadership by playing prop on a few occasions. His willingness to go in there for the team showed the positive attitude he had towards team first and him second.

Ryan Lewthwaite come on in leaps and bounds in 2018 as a Year 12 student. He is a work horse, and though not physically big, he has a huge heart and loves his rugby. He can play anywhere in the forwards so was used a lot off the bench. He never complained and become a good leader in the team. We are not sure of his final position going forward but we do know despite this, that he will serve the team very well again in 2019.

Shane Fikken (Captain) is a superb player and a great leader. He had a superb year and he well deserved his Crusaders Schools 'B' selection and we thought he deserved better. Three great years in the team and he will do well in 2019 in Dunedin we are sure. Ended up with over fifty games in the team over three seasons. A fine achievement for a very promising prop who we think will go far in the game.

Sio Latu arrived from Tonga in May with obvious potential but a lot to learn. He did come a long way but did not get a lot of game time. Plenty of time to learn though, he is only Year 11 so we should see the best of him the next two year. Can play lock and flanker but we think he might best suited to eight. However to do this will require him to learn a lot about team systems and structures and to do work in these areas.

TJ Lensley is a very hard-nosed forward who just toiled away every game. He was one of youngest in the team and not huge physically, but he always wants to improve his game. A great trainer and a great model for our younger players, we expect a huge year from him as a Year 13 in 2019. TJ looks at home in a rugby jersey and that he really wants to be out there doing anything he can to get his team a win.

William Pudney had a slow start to the year but once he was confident and really wanted to play at this level, he showed how good he was as a player. Probably a 7 he played most of the year at 6 but filled an important role for this team where he became someone who would tidy up other errors and mistakes then suddenly, he would burst away, run 40 metres himself or take an important intercept. A great team man who loved the year.

BACKS

Bailey Gebbie came in to the team mid-season as a cover for injuries. He did not get a lot of game time, but you see the pride he took about being in this elite team. Bailey is a good tackler for his small frame and a very quick runner which he used to his advantage many times. It would be great to see Bailey continue the game next year when he leaves school as he has good potential possibly as a halfback.

Dean Andrews came in to the year with the possibility of him been a major weapon for us. However, it was not to be as he struggled for confidence because of a few injuries and concussion. We know this was disappointing for both him and us. Hopefully he finds a good club in 2019 that provides the support he needs around him to fully develop on and off the field

George Guerin was a huge improver in 2018. Coming from U16 rugby locally to 1sts is difficult but he made the transition with ease. He is extremely fit, always committed and always fully involved in our defence and attack structures. His game against Christ's was as good as any fullback played in the competition from any team this year. George will be a very important player and leader in the 2019 team.

Harry Bampton had a tough ask of being a very able loosie and transferring to half back to meet a position gap we had in the team. To his credit he did this superbly and grew in to a better and better player as the year progressed. Harry is a fierce competitor who is strong and has willingness to mix it up with players much bigger than him. 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

The team attended a number of meets throughout the year. Meets swimming for the school are listed first, but national club meets are also mentioned in this report due to the success of our team.

There is also mention at the end of the article about the achievements of Jonathon Smitham, who has competed in Special Olympic swimming events throughout the year.

AORAKI SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

On 10 April, a team of ten TBHS swimmers headed to Ashburton to compete in the Aoraki Swimming Championship. The team consisted of: Riley Taylor, Reed Stevenson, Campbell Lindblom, Jack Sands, Matthew Moore, Campbell Plows, Dominic Coleman, William Tudgey, Harry Sands and Bede Fisher.

It was another successful meet for our strong swim team. The results and records have yet to be confirmed but preliminary results are listed below.

We won three out of the four relays contested. The senior freestyle and medley team of Riley, Reed, Jack and Matthew won both of their races setting new race records. The junior team of Dominic, Will, Harry and Bede won their freestyle relay and came third in the medley relay, going faster than last year's junior team for both relays in the process. TBHS won the overall Boys' Relay Champions Trophy.

SOUTH ISLAND SECONDARY SCHOOL CHAMPIONSHIP

The event returned to Blenheim again this year, with heats and finals taking place on Saturday 7 July.

Only two swimmers from our swim team were available for this competition - Reed Stevenson and Dominic Coleman - but both represented the school well. All 50 metre and 100 metre races had heats and were split into two age groups (14 and under, and 15 and over), with those races over 200 metres being straight timed finals and open in terms of age. Therefore the boys were in separate age divisions for the shorter races.

Reed was seeded second in the 200 Individual Medley, but in an extremely close race, just touched ahead to win gold in this race.

Reed, seeded third in the 100 breaststroke, qualified for the afternoon final in second place and maintained that position in the final race. He swam a personal best in gaining the silver. Dominic also swam a personal best, and having qualified third, finished third in the final.

Swimming the 50 Butterfly, Reed was just overtaken in the last stretch to finish second, while Dominic came fourth. In the next race, the 100 Freestyle, Dominic swam a personal best in his heat to qualify in first place, and then bettered that time in the final, however, it was not quite enough to gain first place, but he finished in a strong second place.

The 200 butterfly is an endurance race, and it was very close for the whole race with Reed just missing the gold by 0.15. In the 200 Breaststroke, Reed finished third with Dominic sixth, and in the 200 Freestyle Reed came fourth and Dominic again finishing sixth.

The 400 Individual Medley is an exhausting race, and the two swimmers were very tired by this stage of the meet. Reed gained a third place and Dominic fourth. Overall, this was an extremely successful meet.

NEW ZEALAND SECONDARY SCHOOLS' SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

This event took place from 13-16 September in Wellington with the swim squad members consisting of Reed Stevenson, Matthew Moore, Dominic Coleman and Will Tudgey.

The two medals won by Matthew were a highlight of the meet. He gained a silver in the 200m butterfly and a bronze in the 400m freestyle. Both of these were great swims, as Matthew stuck to his race strategy and did not get taken in by other boys' tactics. Matthew also gained two 4th placings in the 200 individual medley and the 200 freestyle, and swam five personal best times. It was an amazing meet for him, and to achieve these results at national level is a great feat.

The other three boys also swam well: Reed gained 10 personal bests from his eleven swims, with his highest placing being 10th in the 200m breaststroke, and finishing in the top 20 for five of his races; Dominic placed 9th in the 200m butterfly, swam five personal bests and finished in the top 20 three times; Will finished 8th in the 200m butterfly and 400m freestyle, swam five personal bests and also finished in the top 20 three times.

Swimming in the Senior 16 and over relays was a challenge with three of our boys aged 15 and under. The team acquitted itself well, earning 10th in the medley relay and 9th and 11th in the two freestyle relays

NATIONAL AGE GROUP SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

The National Age Group Championship in Auckland ran for five days, commencing on 17 April and involved Riley Taylor, Reed Stevenson, Jack Sands, Matthew Moore and William Tudgey. This is a club championship event and is the pinnacle of swimming for those 18 years and under and included in Riley and Reed's age division was Lewis Clareburt who won a bronze medal at the recent Commonwealth Games. The boys swam extremely well over a difficult, tiring week.

Riley won three bronze medals: one for his outstanding swim in the 1500 metre freestyle where he knocked 20 seconds off his personal best time, another for the 400 metre individual medley and then a bronze as a member of the zonal relay team. Not only did Riley medal, but he gained entry into finals for every event that he swam, coming close to another medal in the 400 metre freestyle where he finished fourth, and gaining personal bests in every event.

Jack was also successful in gaining two medals. One of these was a silver in the 400 metre individual medley, and the other a bronze in the 400 metre freestyle. Like Riley, he completed an excellent swim in the 1500 metre freestyle taking just over 20 seconds off his previous best time. Jack also made it into every final for each of his events and completed a 100% personal best rate.

Matthew continued the successful run for the Timaru Boys' swimmers by gaining a silver medal in the zonal relay, and swam well enough to compete in seven finals where he placed in the top ten for everything. He also swam above his personal best times in each event, and like Riley and Jack, took 20 seconds off his 1500 metre freestyle time.

Reed gained a personal best in the 200 metre butterfly and William swam well in the 400 metre freestyle and the 1500 metre freestyle.

NEW ZEALAND OPEN SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

This year Timaru Boys' was lucky enough to have swimmers of such a calibre that they were able to attend the New Zealand Opens, enabling them to swim against older and more experienced swimmers.

Riley Taylor and Jack Sands, swimming for their clubs (Swim Timaru and Geraldine respectively), both produced some amazing swims.

Riley had an outstanding swim in the 1500 metre Freestyle to gain a bronze medal, taking 3.44 seconds off his previous personal best.

Jack gained an impressive 4th in the 400 Individual Medley also swimming in a personal best time.

In addition to these swims, both boys continually swam well to record the following results:

- Riley: 5th in the 400 Freestyle (PB), 12th in the 200 Freestyle, and 15th in the 200 Backstroke having gained a finals place in each one of these races. He also swam the 200 Individual medley (PB) and the 100 Freestyle.
- Jack: 6th in the 800 Freestyle taking an amazing 11.64 seconds off his personal best, 7th in the 1500 freestyle (PB), 11th in the 400 Freestyle and 14th in the 200 Individual Medley having gained a finals place in each of these events.

NATIONAL SHORT COURSE SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

During the first week of the third term holidays, our swim squad was busy in Auckland for the 5 day National Short Course Swimming Championship.

Those attending were Jack Sands, Matthew Moore, Reed Stevenson, William Tudgey and Dominic Coleman.

Jack experienced a meet that he will never forget, winning six gold medals (200 Freestyle, 400 Individual Medley, 200 Individual Medley, 400 Freestyle, 200 Backstroke, 1500 Freestyle) and one silver (100 Individual Medley). He was first or second in every age group race he swam. Not only that but he produced some amazing personal best swims – 25 seconds faster in his 1500, 7 seconds in his backstroke and 6 seconds in his 400 freestyle. Outstanding. He then qualified for the super finals. This combines the fastest swimmers from all age groups, including those older than Jack. He finished in the top ten for 4 of these events.

The other members of the squad also had a good meet. William Tudgey finished in the top 20 in all 6 of his races. He came 4th in an amazing 1500 freestyle race where he took 32 seconds off his previous time. He also took 23 seconds off his 200 freestyle earlier in the meet.

Matthew Moore, swimming in a new age group as his birthday was only the week before, made two superfinals, in which he swam extremely well in, taking a total of 6.54 seconds off his 400 Individual Medley time overall and 5.47 seconds off his 400 Freestyle entry time overall. He finished in the top 20 for all nine of his races. His best result was 6th in the 1500 free.

Reed Stevenson had four top 20 placings, with all but one race being a personal best time and taking 2.95 seconds off his 200 breaststroke time. Dominic Coleman finished in the top 20 in one of his races, also swimming personal best times in all but one race, with his outstanding swim coming in the 400 Individual Medley where he took 5.88 seconds off his entry time.

2018 AUSTRALIAN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

While the rest of the swim squad swam in Auckland at Short Course Nationals, Riley Taylor attended a three day New Zealand Training Camp in Auckland, before competing in the Australian State Swimming Championship. Seeded 6th in the 1500 freestyle, he comfortably came home in 5th place.

Riley also gained another 5th in 4 x 200 m freestyle relay. Congratulations to Riley on gaining his New Zealand Cap.

HIGHER HONOURS FOR MEMBERS OF THE SWIM SOUAD

Riley Taylor was named in the 2017/2018 New Zealand Bronze Squad, and as stated above, in the New Zealand Squad to compete in Australia at the 2018 Australian State Championship. Riley was named Aoraki Male Sportsperson of the Year, a huge achievement.

- Jack Sands was named in the 2018/2019 New Zealand Bronze Squad a well-deserved reward for a strong year of swimming.
- Matthew Moore, Jack Sands and Riley Taylor have been selected for the Canterbury Gold and Canterbury Platinum squads respectively.
- Riley will travel with the Platinum Squad to Melbourne to compete in the Victoria State Championship from 5-12 December.
- Matthew and Jack will travel with the Gold Squad to Brisbane to attend the Queensland State Championship from 13-22 December.

All three boys are to be commended for their efforts and recognised for the high level at which they are achieving.


Congratulations to Jack Black who was selected for the New Zealand Wrestling Development Team and travelled with the squad to Indiana, USA during March 2019.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE REPORT

During his term of office Don has worked tirelessly in following up a range of activities designed to enhance the opportunities for Old Boys to participate in the Association's affairs. However, most of these are taking time to get established and, as is common with so many organisations of this type, it is proving difficult to get people involved.

In the previous year a South Canterbury Branch was set up with a group of younger Old Boys acting as a committee. Unfortunately with a number of them moving on and others being overcommitted it ceased to operate. At a recent Executive meeting I pointed out that the Rules and Regulations stated that "the Committee of the Association shall be a Committee of the Timaru Branch of the Association". Wayne Fairbrother (1976-1980) was presented with the Teschemaker Cup at a School assembly. A full report on Wayne's career was included in the 2017 *Timaruvian*.

Various branches held reunions during the year and their reports are included in this magazine. Together with President Chris Moore and our respective wives, we attended a very enjoyable gathering in Melbourne in September 2018.

Warren Leslie completed his term as the Old Boys' representative on the TBHS Board of Trustees and was replaced by Jason Grant (1987-1990), who was also elected to the Executive of the Association. Gordon Prowse stood down as Secretary and was replaced by Carolyn Bunting (School Office). Our thanks are extended to both of these people for their service. Grant McFarlane did not seek re-election as a member of the Executive and thanks are extended to him for his contribution over the years.

Appreciation is extended to National President Chris Moore for his positive leadership, to Don McCully for the work he did as Chairman, to Nick McIvor for his continuing support, and to Bruce Leadley who still does so much in so many ways, and to those members of the Executive who contributed during the year.

Finally, a sincere vote of thanks to Gregor Macaulay who has acted as Editor to the Old Boys' section of this magazine for some years now. He has retired from his position with the University of Otago and we wish him well for a long and fulfilling retirement.

For the ongoing success of the organisation it is essential that individuals continue to offer themselves when assistance is required on the various projects.

TESCHEMAKER CUP

award the Teschemaker Cup (for outstanding achievement by an Old Boy) for 2017 to Wayne J. Fairbrother (1976-1980). was reported in the previous issue of The Timaruvian and he was presented with the cup at a special assembly at the School on 28 May 2018. The award recognised Wayne's outstanding scientific career and his international prominence, leading a department at San Francisco-based Genentech,

a biotechnology company developing drugs to treat human diseases and alleviate chronic conditions, particularly anticancer drugs.



The 2018 award of the Teschemaker Cup is to **Neil W. Gudsell (1976-1979)**, now more widely known as **Mika**. The following is a lightly edited version of a statement supporting his nomination.

Mika was born In Marchwiel in 1962, adopted into the Gudsell family as Neil, and attended Boys' High in the late 70s. He was noted for his ability in athletics, and as a known young gay person while at school; Ray Welch as Rector and Bruce Leadley

supported him at TBHS. He left to become a hairdresser In Christchurch, and won scholarships to study drama and dance; he was the national champion in disco and later was New

Zealand's aerobics champion for seven years In a row, with Ngati Toa, and he ran a Les Mills fitness studio.

He is a well-known entertainer, appearing on television (Shark in the Park and Te Mika live show), in films (e.g. The Piano), on stage (in Hogben Hall and The Rocky Horror Picture Show in Timaru, later in Sydney as Hamlet), and in cabaret shows both in New Zealand and overseas (notably at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, as well as in Cuba, Russia, Japan, India, Australia, and elsewhere). His Matika television show promotes Māori health and is anti-bullying. With a Churchill Memorial Trust scholarship he studied and performed in Los Angeles and elsewhere, experiencing first-hand racial prejudice there, and then he collaborated with avant-garde artists such as author Witi Ihimaera, composer Gareth Farr, and any number of cross-dressers (especially Grace Jones in New York City, and Carmen), and has written scripts for many shows.

Mika learnt of his Māori heritage gradually (initially from Weetbix cards! – then picked up Te Reo and kapa haka, and from a family carver friend). He has been in the forefront of protest movements – in many Gay Pride parades, anti-Springbok tour and pro-homosexual law reform activities, various Mardi Gras – and as well as being a businessman he has often performed fundraisers for charities.

Basically he is a trailblazer, an unconventional extrovert (the Māori Queen once called him her 'court jester'), free from complacency, usually disruptively innovative, often experimenting in costuming (Te Papa has one of his jackets on display) and many complementary arts; he has been seen as 'raunchy and sensual', a tohunga matakite, a leader in modem Māori culture (mentored by Dalvanius Prime and Merata Mita), and has been photographed with the likes of Helen Clark, John Banks and other important figures, usually in camp and moko get-up; he has been in gigs with Elton John, Ronan Keating, and Julian Cleary, and he obviously loves to party. One of his enterprises was with Suzanne Paul.

Mika hastried to create a New Zealand equivalent of Riverdance, and formed his own dance group, Torotoro Trust, succeeded by the Mika Haka Foundation, the main charitable aim of which is the betterment of at-risk Maori youth in Auckland and elsewhere. He is on the Board of Creative New Zealand and his biography, I Have Loved Me a Man: The Life and Times of Mika, by Sharon Mazer with a foreword by Witi Ihimaera, was published by Auckland University Press in October 2018.

The Teschemaker Cup is awarded annually and recognises "an outstanding old boy who has achieved national or international prominence in the area of sport, cultural activities, business or public affairs".

The Executive of the Old Boys' Association would welcome any nomination for this highly regarded award. If you know an Old Boy who is worthy of this award, please nominate him. Include a brief resume and send the nomination to the Old Boys' Executive at the School. Nominations close in October of each year.

HONOURED BY THE QUEEN



Paul Dewsbery Otago Daily Times

Paul F.G. Dewsbery (1959-1960) of Timaru was the only South Canterbury resident named in the 2018 Queen's Birthday Honours. He was awarded the Queen's Service Medal (QSM) for services to the community.

The official citation is as follows: Mr Paul Dewsbery has contributed to the community of South Canterbury for the past 40 years through a range of organisations. Mr Dewsbery has

been involved with the Mountain View Village Trust for 31 years, including eight years as Chairman from 2009. He played a key role in the development of the 95 home retirement village in Timaru, was a member of the Trust's Board from 1986, and provided valuable personal support to the more vulnerable and dependent members of the Village community. He was on the Board of Presbyterian Support South Canterbury from 2007 to 2015, applying his business expertise to help the organisation remain financially sound. He was involved for 10 years in the establishment and leadership of the Kiwi Can personal development programme for primary school students in South Canterbury. He was instrumental in building a team to raise funds and oversee the programme and liaising

with the schools involved. The programme was delivered to more than 1,200 children in its first year and was integrated into the Christchurch Regional Office of the Graeme Dingle Foundation in 2017. Mr Dewsbery has been involved with the Timaru Rotary Club since 1980, was President from 1998 to 1999, and has been a driver of community fundraising and service activities.

Paul's son Mark A. Dewsbery is also an Old Boy (TBHS 1984-1987).

Two Old Boys living elsewhere in the South Island were appointed members of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM).



Ashburton chartered accountant **Matthew C. Hall (1957-1961)** was honoured for services to conservation and fishing.

His MNZM citation is as follows: Mr Matthew Hall has been a member of the Central South Island (CSI) Fish and Game Council

since its inception in 1991 and has twice been Chairman. Mr Hall was a member of the CSI's Steering Committee in developing the draft Salmon Management Plan and is CSI's advocate to the Salmon Enhancement Trust. He is currently a member of the Fish and Game New Zealand Council and was Chairman from 2011 to 2012. He was inaugural Chairman of the Canterbury Water Management Strategy Ashburton Zone Committee from 2010 to 2014. In this role he led a process of community consultation in the Hinds catchment and led the committee through the establishment of the first Zone Implementation Programme and later an addendum to instruct the development of a regulatory plan. In 2017 he organised and co-chaired the Salmon Symposium in Ashburton, which attracted national interest and international speakers. He has been a foundation member since 1981 of Save the Rivers

Mid-Canterbury. He has made significant contributions towards establishing Water Conservation Orders on the Rakaia and Rangitata Rivers. He is Secretary and Life Member of South Rangitata Reserve Inc. Mr Hall was a foundation member of Ashburton Rangitata Instream Users Group.



Gordon Rayner

J. Gordon Rayner (1971-1975), a lawyer in Alexandra, was appointed MNZM for services to kayaking.

His citation is as follows: Mr Gordon Rayner has been involved with kayaking for 45 years. Since the early 1990s Mr Gordon has represented kayakers at local authority hearings and tribunals to protect Central Otago rivers from development, damming, jet boats, and mining. He

was a key driver in the development of the Hawea Whitewater Park near Wanaka in collaboration with Contact Energy. He was a founding member of Central Otago Whitewater in 1989 and from 2000 began coaching whitewater kayaking for youth in Alexandra and later other parts of Central Otago. He also manages a beginner kayaking programme in Alexandra. He obtained grants, sponsorship and established fundraising opportunities enabling the club to purchase equipment and provide travel assistance for junior kayakers to attend national and international events. A number of juniors from Alexandra have represented New Zealand at Australasian and world championship levels. He organises an annual whitewater camp on the Hawea River, introduces junior kayakers to grade three whitewater on a weekly basis during the summer, organises local slalom and freestyle events, and has helped organise seven national and secondary school slalom championships in the lower South Island. Mr Rayner has represented New Zealand at world championship level in slalom, freestyle and rafting, and is the current world masters slalom champion in his age group.

MEMORIES OF A BOARDER IN THE EARLY 1940S

At the Melbourne reunion in August 2018, retired accountant **John E.P. Blackler (1940-1944)**, then 91, shared his reminiscences of life as a TBHS boarder during the Second World War under Rector Allan G. Tait (1887-1970; staff 1913-1925; Rector 1935-1947).

Life was a little different as there were shortages of goods and services and ration books for clothing, food and petrol etc. For a boarder, his day went something like this:

Up at 7.00 a.m., a cold shower (under supervision), dress and then a run around the block – out the front gate, turn left and around the streets and back through the upper entrance (the Native Drive) at the top of the playing field.

Breakfast at 8.00 of porridge and toast. A pat of butter was placed on each table. It was the role of the head of the table to divide this amount into equal portions for each boy at the table. There was just enough butter to scrape across the toast.

School Assembly at 9.00 and then classes until 12 noon and then lunch/dinner – the main meal of the day – consisting of a main course of meat and vegetables followed by a pudding (there were four that have never been tasted since: semolina,

sago, junket, and tapioca).

Tea was at 5.00, something simple and hot.

6.00 saw prep (homework) time, under supervision by a master. The third formers had one hour while the seniors did two hours. Woe betide any boy caught with a novel hidden inside a textbook cover to read and help to pass the time away.

Friday night was shower night when all had the weekly hot shower.

Lights out at 9.00 with the housemaster coming around about 10.00 with his torch to ensure all was well and all boys were in their beds.

Weekends were a little different, in that there were few sports clubs that were that the School elevens or fifteens could play against operational (because of the war), so Monopoly and card games were very popular.

Sundays saw all go to church dressed in their best. There were roughly half each of Presbyterians and Anglicans. The Anglicans went to St Mary's while the Presbyterians went to Trinity Church. There was one Roman Catholic who went to Mass every Sunday at 7.00 and was back before breakfast. There were some confirmed Anglicans and they were required to go to a monthly Holy Communion service at St Mary's at 8.00 a.m. On return to the Rectory for breakfast, the other boarders

had finished with the tables still not cleared. This meant that there was some butter left unused which was quickly "cleared". Those that had been to the 8.00 a.m. service still had to go to the 11.00 a.m. service with the others.

There was no formal procedure for going to church, but the boys went in a loose bunch, leaving the Rectory about 10.30 to arrive by 11.00. After church, back for dinner. Sunday afternoons were free and the boys quite often went on bike rides or pursued other personal interests. Sunday evenings, after tea, there was an assembly in the Memorial Library where the Rector had a little service with a hymn or two accompanied by the harmonium. The Rector would then tell the boys how he saw the war was going in Europe and North Africa (Germans) and in the Pacific (Japanese).

During the winter months, a dance was held with the Girls' High and if we were lucky, one with Craighead as well. The main Assembly Hall was the place. First of all, the Hall had to be cleared of all the seating into the adjoining class rooms. Then grated candle wax was spread over the floor and skated in by enthusiastic boys. The last bit of preparation was to spread talc all over the floor and the test was to be able to slide the length of the floor with minimum effort. Music was provided by a gramophone and bakelite 78s playing foxtrots, quicksteps, waltzes etc. A master would be up on the stage with a beadyeyed mistress making sure her girls were not manhandled by the young men. Supper was served at the close.

It was mentioned that after lights out, a master (usually the Rector for want of a housemaster) would come around with a torch to make sure that all boys were safely in bed. One night he found two empty beds. He roused out the head house prefect and both did the rounds of places where the boys could be. It had been known for boys to pop out and take the risk to have a quiet smoke or a small feast of goodies that kind parents had that were insufficient to go around for any number. The pair waited at an angle so they could catch the boys returning. A little while later the Rector was startled by a voice behind him "Are you looking for us, Sir?" The penalty for the boys is unknown but the apples were sure tasty!

On another occasion, a Sunday, the Anglicans set off, with a master, to St Mary's and when they arrived at the church, there was the verger waiting for them. He told the master that unfortunately the boys' seats had been taken and there was

no room left. The master wanted to know why and said that their seats were always kept for them and that they doubled the congregation on their arrival. Furthermore, the church had no trouble in accepting the threepences each boy put in the plate each Sunday. He then turned around, said to the boys, "Follow me", and took them down to the Bay where there was a shop with slot machines. The threepences were changed into pennies and all were happy until it was time to return to the Rectory for dinner at midday.

One term, there was a boy who came from the North Island as a boarder. This caused quite a bit of a conjecture as to why. It came out that whatever school he was put at up north, he escaped and headed back home. Putting him at a school down south meant he had no way of getting home as the only connection between the two islands was the overnight ferry between Lyttelton and Wellington. After two months, the boy appeared to have settled down until, on the nightly rounds, the Rector found that he was missing. Once again the head prefect was got out of bed, and some senior boys as well. The boys were told to get on their bikes and go down to the railway station, bus terminal, post office etc. with instructions to be back by 10.30 when Matron would have a cup of cocoa and a biscuit for them. Getting near return time, the Matron went to the Rectory entrance and put on the porch lights. While standing there looking onto the row of trees, including the Lovelock Oak, lining the playing field, she noticed that the shadows were not even under the trees, so she went out of curiosity to find out why. The boy's idea was to stay up the tree until all the fuss had died down then he would make a break for it. He soon returned home.

One year, an epidemic of scarlet fever hit Timaru and about a third of the 50 boarders went down with it and the authorities turned a local house into a fever hospital. The boys being sent there were under strict instructions to behave themselves as exertion could well damage the heart. One boy got into a pillow fight. Some years later, I met him and he told me he had never worked at all, as any exertion set his heart racing.

The School had a brass band (and a pipe band) and the brass band went up to Christchurch on a Sunday, to play on 3YA. The return trip by rail cost ten shillings. A North Island conductor heard the broadcast and considered the band to be a top B grade band. Some praise indeed!! [John was a member of the brass band. Ed.]

A GIFT FOR THE ARCHIVES



James Earl in 1919

James Earl (1916-1920) was born in Timaru in 1902 and attended Main School before an outstanding sporting and academic career at TBHS: he was captain of both the First XV and First XI, was head prefect and dux in 1920, and won both the Somes Scholarship and a senior national scholarship. He completed BA and MA degrees at Canterbury University College and played for the College's senior rugby team and toured Australia with a New Zealand university side. His rugby career ended when he broke a leg in a club match in Christchurch. After university, he commenced a teaching career at New Plymouth Boys' High School before moving to Christ's College in 1927, remaining there, principally as a teacher of French, until his retirement in 1960. He married Rita Gwendoline Clark (born 1907) in 1934. James Earl died in 1970, survived by his wife (who married, secondly, Geoffrey Hiatt in 1979 and died in 1982), son Warwick (1944-2007), and grandchildren David, Suzanne, and Michael.

In late 2018 his daughter-in-law (Mrs Julia Earl, of Dunedin) delivered several items concerning him to the editor, for passing on to the archives in the Memorial Library. The collection includes: mounted and named photographs of the First XV (1917 and 1919), First XI (1917 and 1919), and School

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prefects (1919); the printed prize list for 1920 (James Earl is listed as Dux, winner of the Cain Bequest Essay Prize and the Form VI C.W. Wood Elocution Prize, and as achieving first place in Agriculture, French, English, and Latin, and first equal place in History in Form VIA); and four proof photographs of the First XV before and during a match, possibly in Dunedin in 1920.

There are two other items of interest. The first is a War-time Certificate in Place of Prizes (i.e. a certificate rather than book), signed by Rector William Thomas, awarded to James Earl in 1916, when he was in Form IIIA, listing him has having gained first place in Civics, Latin, and French and second place in English, History, and Algebra.


The second is a sheaf of seven handwritten pages with the following wording (on each page a 1920 prefect's signature appears):

For the honour of the School and in order to encourage good habits within ourselves, we the undersigned promise

- 1. Not to smoke until we have left school
- 2. To discourage swearing of all kinds
- 3. To down the fellow who tells the filthy yarn

Note:- You must not sign this unless you are determined to carry out your promise.

I [prefect's signature] promise that the names of those signing and of those who do not sign will not be divulged to any teacher.

In addition to the seven prefects, a total of 136 other TBHS pupils signed the promise out of a total senior School roll (i.e. excluding the Preparatory School) of 223. It was not uncommon at that time for young people to be encouraged to "sign the pledge" to abstain from alcohol and this promise was possibly inspired by that practice.

FASHION WAS THE FIRST PRIORITY







Russell Lund in 2018 Otago Daily Times

The Otago Daily Times publishes occasional articles in which well-known Dunedin residents talk about their first jobs and what they spent their first pay packet on. In January 2019, Russell V. Lund (1977-1979) was featured ...

Dunedin businessman Russell Lund, of Lund South, has played a key part in building the South – from supermarkets and hotels to the Otago Correctional Facility and Forsyth Barr Stadium. He can still remember the day the money landed in his account. It was early 1982, and the 17-year-old had just received his first pay cheque – about \$140 – for his first week as a cadet quantity surveyor at the Ministry of Works in Wellington.

Soon after, the money was gone - spent on, among other things, a pair of bright red trousers: "They had six zips and I thought I was the man."

His second purchase followed the same theme - a black and white striped shirt, which he still has to this day: "I was quite the clothes horse back then, as you are at 17."

The year before, Russell and his family had been living in Nelson when the Ministry of Works began interviewing pupils at his school for cadetships. He was among 20 or so pupils vying for "two or three" spots that year, and was successful. That created a small dilemma, as Russell had also been accepted into Carrington College, in Dunedin, where his friends planned to study: "That was the ultimate ... if you could get into Carrington, you had it made, socially."

He opted for Wellington, where he was paid to study quantity surveying for 15 hours, and work a further 25 hours, each week. He was based in a "rabbit warren" of old houses and offices on Hill Street, behind the Beehive, and duties included collecting the mail and making the tea. He lived in a public service hostel on Hanson Street, in Newtown, which cost about \$60 a week: "It was pretty big. It probably had 70 or 80 kids there, and it was designed for people like me - who lived in the provinces, got a job in Wellington with the Government [and] left home."

He also received some "extremely good" advice from an uncle, who told him to save every pay increase he received. But it took a while for the habit to stick - there were clothes to buy

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CENTENARIAN SURGEON



Former surgeon and assistant superintendent at Whangarei Hospital, Robert (Bob) F. Mulligan, may well be our oldest Old Boy, having been born on 9 February 1917. His 100th birthday in 2017 was marked with three parties, one with his family in Auckland, one with his local friends and one with the residents of Sutton Close, the retirement village where he

Bob's father wanted him to be a

farmer but he "wasn't really interested". After TBHS, where he was a boarder from 1930 to 1933, and spending a year on the family's mid-Canterbury farm, he went off to the University of Otago, where he graduated MB ChB in 1942.

While based in Fiji as an Air Force medical officer he decided to specialise as a surgeon. He deferred travel to England for training until his eldest child was born and worked in the meantime at the Northern Wairoa Hospital at Te Kopuru. After his course in England he returned to New Zealand in 1950 to commence his surgical career in Whangarei. He retired in 1979 and has now been retired for longer than he worked as a surgeon.

In retirement he grew kiwifruit with one of his sons, went tramping and yachting, and played golf.

Bob says that the secret to a long life is diet: "I think diet's got a lot to do with it. Eat all the right things and don't eat the wrong things."

A RECORD IS EQUALLED

The 2015 Timaruvian noted the status of Dion J. McKeown (2015-) as the first direct fifth-generation student in the history of the School. Others have had a great-great-grandfather as an Old Boy, but the link has always been through a maternal line. The enrolment of William David (Will) Grant in 2018 brought another direct fifth-generation student on to the roll.

The patriarch of the Grant succession was Lachlan J. Grant, senior (1901-), whose three sons attended the School (these included the well-known All Black L.A. (Lachie) Grant (1937-1938). The link to Will Grant comes through Lachlan's eldest son, Andrew A. Grant (1927-1929).

Andrew A. Grant, in his turn, also had three Old Boy sons. The eldest of these, A. David Grant (1961-1963) of Geraldine is Will's grandfather. Will is a son of Fairlie farmer Jason A. Grant (1987-1990), the elder of David Grant's two Old Boy sons. Will is the thirteenth direct descendant of Lachlan J. Grant to attend the Timaru High School or Timaru Boys' High School.

Will Grant has even more extensive Old Boy connections. His maternal grandfather is Gavin D. Giles (1964-1966) of Totara Valley and his great-grandfather was the late Eric M. Giles (1936-1937). Moreover, his paternal grandmother was a daughter of Old Boy J.A. (Jim) Dunnett (1936).

PLUS ...



Jason Grant

Jason A. Grant (1987-1990) is newsworthy in his own right. In May 2018 he was elected as president of the South Canterbury branch of Federated Farmers. Jason has wide farming experience, and has been a Federated Farmers member for about 16 years. He currently has a dairy farm at Sherwood near Lake Opuha. but was brought up on a mixed sheep and cropping farm on Rangitata Island

where other family members still farm.

More recently Jason has accepted another appointment, as a member of the national

executive of the School's Old Boys' Association. He has also accepted the position of Old Boys' nominee to the Timaru Boys' High School Board of Trustees. This position has been ably filled since 2010 by Warren J. Leslie (1977-1980).

TAP DANCING TALENT



The tap dancing talents of Caleb G. Cameron (2015-2018) have been the hallmark of his TBHS years, and they will undoubtedly continue as he moves into Old Boy status. Already, in January 2019, he has had international success.

Caleb took out first place in the 17-21 age group in the Melbourne leg of the international Follow Your Dreams competition. placing gained him admission to the Hall of Fame Dance Challenge in Florida in February, but cost factors

deterred him from travelling. However, he has also qualified for a prestigious competition in London later in the year. Caleb plans to take up this offer, as accommodation is provided and he has a greater interest in opportunities in the UK. He also won a local Masonic Lodge music scholarship for 2018.

Caleb began tap dancing as a six-year-old and he dreams of becoming a professional dancer. He has been awarded a scholarship to study in Melbourne, but needs to raise more funds before taking it up. Busking, organising a concert, and working at McDonald's are all part of his fund-raising plans.

Performance at prizegivings and other functions has been a regular part of Caleb's school career. He also had a major role in the 2018 production of Into the Woods. He played for the First Football XI for two seasons, and was a 2018 school prefect.

ANTIPODEAN EMPIRE

The full story of a company which had a profound effect on early New Zealand – particularly rural New Zealand – has at last been written, in a handsomely produced book launched in August 2018.

Retired sheep and beef farmer Noel N. Crawford (1954-1956), of Timaru, has written Antipodean Empire: the New Zealand and Australian Land Company, the history of the New Zealand and Australian Land Company, in its time the biggest land-owning farmer in the country and the pioneer of the frozen meat export trade in New Zealand, as well as the dairy industry.

"My first interest was when I wrote a local history of Cannington," said Noel, a third-generation farmer at

Cannington, near Cave, after his grandfather bought a farm there in 1916. Cannington had been part of Levels Station, once part of the Scottish-controlled New Zealand and Australian Land Company's empire.

All the company's properties were in the South Island, stretching from Acton estate just south of the Rakaia River

down through the Levels in South Canterbury – the jewel in the company's crown – through Central and North Otago (where the company instigated frozen meat exports from Totara Estate) as far south as Edendale near Invercargill. The company also built the country's first dairy factory, at Edendale. A well-structured chain of command extending from Scotland to New Zealand ensured the huge landholdings were run efficiently, with a superintendent to inspect the properties, estate managers, stock managers, all the way down to workers.

In the late 1890s, the Government had instigated a policy of breaking up big estates to allow working men on to the land and it ended the company's role as a major player in New Zealand: "The company sold out and focused more on Australia. The money they got for Edendale, Totara, Pareora and others went to buy properties in Australia."

Noel believes the company had a positive impact on New Zealand: "It was foreign capital to develop the land and overseas ownership of the land but when they came here much of the land was tussock. They bought it from the Government and developed it. A lot of money was needed to do that."

Noel's father J. Norman Crawford (1915-2005) was at TBHS in 1930 and Noel has three Old Boy sons: Peter (TBHS 1993-1997) and twins Edward and Peter (TBHS 1993-1997). Noel's elder brother John was also at TBHS (1952-1954).

SID SCALES RECALLED

When the editor of this section was clearing out his office at the University of Otago before retiring at the end of January 2019, he found a folder containing the originals of four cartoons by **S.E. (Sid) Scales (1928-1934)** that had been used to illustrate a study skills booklet produced by the University's Faculty of Science in 1980. After wartime service as an Air Force pilot, and three and a half years as a prisoner of the Japanese on Java in horrific conditions, Sid studied at the London Central School of Art. He was staff cartoonist at Dunedin's *Otago Daily Times* from 1951 until his retirement in 1981, when he moved to Motueka. Sid, who was appointed OBE in 1983 for services as a cartoonist, died in 2003 aged 86. The cartoons will be donated to the archives in the Memorial Library.





WAIT AND SEE



Lindsay Taiaroa

Wait and See (published in 2018) is a distinctive addition to the long list of books written and published by Old Boys who have donated copies of their publications to the Memorial Library.

This volume is an interesting memoir of the life of **Lindsay S. Taiaroa (1957-1961)**. Lindsay's story centres around his thirty-year career in the specialised role of Secretary (later Executive Director) of the New Zealand Vice-Chancellors' Committee

(also known as Universities New Zealand), working at the

administrative core of the country's university system until his retirement at the end of 2008.

But there is ample coverage of other aspects of Lindsay's life: early years in Timaru, family life, university escapades, sporting success, overseas travel, and personal trials.

A substantial chapter is devoted to his Timaru Boys' High School years, including perceptive comments on teachers and the school system. Contemporary Old Boys will also find themselves well represented. Several school photographs also appear. Indeed, the final photograph in the book features an Old Boy, the late Rev. D.R. (Don) Wilson (1944-1948).

And if you are wondering why the book is entitled Wait and See, you just need to read the book – and wait and see what the answer is.

COLOURS OF A LIFE

An important biography of one of New Zealand's most notable expatriate artists, **Douglas K. MacDiarmid (1936-1939)** was published in 2018. *Colours of a Life: The Life and Times of Douglas MacDiarmid* was written by Anna Cahill, an Aucklandborn writer and journalist (in a range of media), now based in Brisbane, who is also Douglas's niece – her father was Dr Ronald D. MacDiarmid (1920-2013, TBHS 1934-1937).

Douglas, who lives with his partner in a 19th-century Paris apartment, was born in Taihape in 1922, the loved but unruly younger son of Dr Gordon MacDiarmid (1888-1980) and his wife, Mary (née Tolme). At the heart of his "naughtiness", writes Anna, was a confused child, struggling with "an overwhelming feeling of being irresistibly drawn to sexuality and sensuality of being attracted to both men and women".

At 17, newly enrolled in a BA course at Canterbury University College, MacDiarmid fell in with The Group, a dynamic collection of older writers, artists and musicians, including Angus, Evelyn Page, Leo Bensemann, Ngaio Marsh and Lilburn, all working to create a distinctively New Zealand art and cultural form. There were also newly arrived European artists and intellectuals fleeing the spread of Nazism: "He was drawn to them because they were different," says Anna. "They had grown up in Venice, Berlin, Paris – places with astonishing histories, where culture was appreciated in the street ... in daily life, which it wasn't in New Zealand."

Douglas left New Zealand in 1946 to find his way as an artist (his studies had been interrupted during the war by service in the Army and Air Force in New Zealand, but he graduated BA in 1945) and he taught and painted in London and France. After a year back in New Zealand in 1949-1950, he returned to France and has been based there ever since - with homeland exhibitions and regular trips back to New Zealand until recent years. He was a full-time artist in Paris from 1952 and continued to paint into his tenth decade - his last painting, a portrait, was completed in December 2014. After that, he has focused on his biography, unravelling the people, places and art practices that have kept him moored to two worlds. He also writes poetry. Not confined to a style, he has created landscapes, cityscapes, portraits, figures, abstract and semi-abstract forms, many inspired by his extensive travels, and has exhibited successfully in France, London, Athens, New York, and Casablanca.

Coinciding with the publication of his biography, there was an exhibition of Douglas's work (jointly curated by Anna Cahill) at the New Zealand Portrait Gallery in Wellington, including a survey of his portraits and figurative works, ranging from realist figuration through to geometric abstraction, and showcasing

his vibrant use of colour and the network of relationships he formed to places and people throughout his life and career.

OLD BOYS HERE AND THERE



2017 deputy head boy **T.H.** (**Tim**) **Currie** (**2013-2017**) was one of 20 student voyagers and 23 crew membersembarked on an expedition to the Kermadec Islands on board HMNZS Canterbury from 26 February to 9 March 2018. The trip was a Young Blake Expedition organised by the Sir Peter Blake Trust, whose website says "Our experiential programmes are designed to inspire the next generation of New Zealand's leaders,

adventurers and environmentalists. We offer programmes that both 'ignite the spark' and inspire people to care for the environment, as well as 'life-changing' programmes that prepare them to lead environmental change." Tim writes: "Special thanks to the Sir Peter Blake Trust and the Royal New Zealand Navy ... for making this expedition possible, and a

huge thank you to the scientists and adults for making it full of learning, excitement, and good times. This expedition has been life-changing and the best two weeks I have experienced."



Paul Cleland

Paul A. Cleland (1966-1969) is remembered as a talented swimmer and First XV player at TBHS before transferring to Westlake Boys' High School, Auckland. Now living in Fremantle, Western Australia, Paul still swims, as a member of the Fremantle Shivering Shags, who meet every Sunday morning between April and September at a local pool for a swim and breakfast.

The all-male club has members ranging in age from their late teens to their 90s. One of Paul's sons, Tim, is a former member of the Australian men's water polo team and competed in the 2012 Olympics in London.



Simon Bruce

Simon A. Bruce (1981-1984), owner of U-Bake in Washdyke, won first place in the Baking Industry Association of New Zealand's Great New Zealand Hot Cross Bun competition in March 2018. He had been placed third the previous year. Simon has been a qualified baker for about

30 years and has been making hot cross buns for about 20: "I just know we make good hot cross buns and now they're the best." By 10.30 a.m. the day after his win was announced live on national television, 300 packets of the buns had gone and he was sold out, and customers as far afield as Auckland were ordering buns to be sent by courier.



Simon Hoaa

Simon J. Hogg (2004-2008) looks to have a promising future. In 2008 Simon was the inaugural recipient of the Admiral Sir Gordon Tait University Scholarship at TBHS and went on to study for a BSc degree at the University of Canterbury, followed by a BSc(Hons) degree, with first class honours in chemistry, completed in 2012. In 2013 he won a three-year scholarship from the Leukaemia

Foundation of Australia and was a cancer research student at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre in Melbourne. In 2018 he graduated with a PhD degree from the University of Melbourne and was awarded the Peter MacCallum Postgraduate Medal "for excellence in cancer research, displaying the greatest international impact on basic translational or clinical cancer research amongst PhD and MD students at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre."



Wavne Walsh

Wayne P. Walsh (1971-1975), was awarded the Teschemaker Cup in 2016 on the basis of his distinguished legal career. At the time, he was the Hong Kong equivalent of a deputy solicitor-general in New Zealand. He left government service in 2018 to commence practice at the Bar. Also in 2018, his authoritative legal text Cross-Border Crime in Hong Kong was published. It includes coverage of the offence of money laundering;

procedures for surrender of fugitive offenders (extradition), mutual legal assistance, transfer of sentenced persons; and the implementation of United Nations sanctions against financing of terrorism and proliferation of weapons of mass destruction.



Ian Withell

A 1957 School prefect visited in early 2019. Ian R. Withell (1953-1957), of Melbourne, has provided the following notes on his career since leaving school. In 1962 he completed a degree in civil engineering at the University of Canterbury and for the next 20 years worked on construction projects, in Australia and England, and then held managerial positions for a major Australian company in Indonesia, Philippines South Australia

and Victoria. In 1983 he formed his own consultancy company in Melbourne and for the next 30 plus years provided advice

to Victorian Government Departments on development, road and rail projects. Ian retired from active consultancy work in 2013, but continued as an independent chairman of project control groups on several major toll road projects. He is currently involved in U3A activities, gym, symphony concerts, gardening, and reading. Ian has been married to Kay for 55 years and they have two daughters; one lives in England with two daughters, the other lives in Brisbane with two sons.



Ross Pye

Also visiting the School with Ian was his friend and fellow prefect **R. Ross Pye (1953-1957)**, of London, who has provided the following summary of his career. He majored in English and Political Science at Canterbury University, graduating in 1961, and then continued for a further year for an MA in English. While at Canterbury, he was very involved with the Drama Society and other arts groups. He then worked

for the Talks Department of New Zealand Broadcasting Corporation in Wellington for the next year and a half, until there was enough money to travel to the United Kingdom on the Ellenis, arriving in May 1964. For a short time he did supply teaching but found it quite trying - the one-teacher Springbrook School and then TBHS were no foundation for coping with the slum schools of North London. In 1965 Ross started work with a small publishing company, editing books on political and economic matters. He developed an interest in antiques and in 1972 left Pall Mall Press and became a selfemployed antiques dealer, often worked in collaboration with an architect/designer on decorating homes and apartments for private clients and international companies in London and in California and France. In 1973 he bought an ancient cottage in south-west France (curiously, almost the exact antipodes to South Canterbury) and while he was turning it into a holiday home, as no-one there had any English, his spoken French improved in a way that would surely have impressed Buster Moore [Neville A. Moore, 1899-1971, TBHS staff 1920-1960]! Since 1965 Ross has lived in Little Venice in London and has always been involved in community matters, especially with the communal gardens behind the houses that are such a great feature of the area. In 2003 he helped create and then run the local annual music festival. The antiques business had a serious downturn after the Twin Towers disaster in 2001 so Ross retired shortly afterwards. A frequent visitor to galleries and museums, theatres and concert halls, he has also travelled fairly extensively in Europe, North Africa and the Middle East, South Asia and the Americas over the years and more so since 2001. On regular five-yearly visits to New Zealand he often stopped in Melbourne to stay with Pareora bus-boy friend M.P. (Max) Hickey (TBHS 1953-1956) and meet up with classmates Ian Withell and A. (Tony) Wood (TBHS 1949-1957) for an informal TBHS old boys' get-together. Max and Tony died in 2010 and 2009 respectively but Ross always sees Ian and his wife Kay on their regular visits to the UK. And this year (2019) in North Street, Timaru!




Anthony Fowler Timaru Herald

Donald Butler

It was reported in October 2018 that **Donald P. Butler** (1955-1956) and his wife Jacky were placing their business and 11.95ha property (Butlers Fruit Farm and Café) at Hook, on State Highway 1 north of Waimate, on the market, and would move to another property they own

to run sheep. Donald has lived in the Hook area his entire life (he boarded at TBHS) and has always been on a farm; he has grown berries and fruit in the area since he left school. Growing strawberries and being his own boss were what motivated him as a young man. He has dealt successfully with the challenges of government regulations, changing consumer demand, workforce changes (from Kiwis to immigrants), and competition from foreign imports, and their farm is now one of only two run by full-time growers in the Waimate area, compared with 70 when he started out. Donald has two Old Boy sons: Christopher (1984-1988) and Simon (1989-1992).



Richard Tayler

Richard (Dick) J. Tayler (1962-1966) has had a challenging time in recovering from a serious heart attack in Rotorua in June 2017. Although he says that "Physically I'm in better shape than I've been in 10 or 15 years", he struggled with memory loss and depression but now says "Life is just so much better now and I'm feeling so good. I can remember everyone, now." His advice for anyone suffering from depression or any health issues: "If you

have trouble, ask for help."

Former TBHS art teacher **Barry V. Cleavin** (**staff 1968-1969**) is still going strong as a practising printmaker in his 80th year. Born in Dunedin, where he spent his first 22 years, he lived for 50 years in Christchurch, but since 2013 has lived in Portobello, on the Otago Peninsula, and draws inspiration from his southern roots and the local landscape. He spends much of his time in his workshop, which began

life as his house's "magnificent four-car garage": "It's the best workshop that I've worked in. I couldn't do without it." Barry's most recent series of prints is a set of 36 works focusing on the Peninsula's Harbour Cone, partly inspired by the work of the celebrated Japanese printmaker Katsushika Hokusai (1760-1849) and his series *Thirty-six Views of Mt Fuji*.

Comedian, actor, and current affairs host **J.K.V.** (**Josh**) **Thomson** (**1994-1998**) was part of an international cast in the New Zealand-made television fantasy series *The New Legends*

of Monkey, which was screened in 2018. It was a remake of Monkey, a 1970s Japanese cult series, based on a 16th-century Chinese fable. Josh, who played the slovenly god Pigsy, said that his character is "very lazy": 'He's just a gentle giant guy who basically wants to lie down with his full tummy and then wake up and have a nice big meal and then go back to sleep again. So it was very hard for me to get into character."

Trustee of the Roxburgh Gorge Charity Trust and co-director of Central Otago Clutha Trails Ltd Barrie J. Wills (1965-1970) was involved in the installation of new counters on cycle trails in Central Otago in February 2018 as part of a nationwide project that will gather useful data on track usage. He says that the new counters will help trail promotion: "If we know the numbers, there's a lot more information which will support our case for funding applications for New Zealand

Cycle Trails and MBIE [Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment]."



David Howden

In March 2018 the 35th anniversary of the establishment of the Mount Somers Track in Mid Canterbury's back country was celebrated with a dinner and a walk to the Woolshed Creek Hut on the track. One of the key people in the early development of the track and the development of facilities was **David T. Howden** (1952-1955), a local farmer who was also involved with a number of

outdoor recreation groups. David was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) in 2008 for services to outdoor recreation and the environment.

Cole J.A. McDonald (2009-2013) won the Sid Young Memorial Cup for the best commis (junior) chef in the country at the New Zealand Hospitality Championships in Auckland in August 2018. Now working in Dunedin, Cole began his hospitality career when he focused on food technology and

hospitality at TBHS, eventually spending every Friday at Aoraki Polytechnic and completing a trade skills cooking course. After leaving school he completed a two-year Diploma in Hospitality Management at Otago Polytechnic, where he was named the most academic student. Cole says: "This is going to open a

lot of doors up for me. It's a big thing – it's the biggest cheffing competition in New Zealand."



Carl Shuker

R. Carl Shuker (1988-1992) has been garnering favourable reviews for his latest novel, *A Mistake*, published by Victoria University Press in March 2019 and described as "a compelling story of human fallibility, and the dangerous hunger for black and white answers in a world of

exponential complication and nuance". Carl is a former editor at the British Medical Journal and the author of four previous novels: *The Method Actors* (2005), winner of the Prize in Modern Letters in 2006; *The Lazy Boys* (2006); *Three Novellas for a Novel* (2008) and *Anti Lebanon* (2013). He lives in Wellington with his wife and two children.



Rob Peach

R.J. (Rob) Peach (1970-1971) has forged a remarkable career in the United States. Rob was one of a family of seven children who grew up on a farm near Kaikoura before their parents sold up and bought motels. He spent his fourth and fifth form years in Timaru, staying with a married sister, before returning to Kaikoura High School to complete

his secondary education after his sister shifted to Wanaka. He initially graduated from the University of Canterbury before obtaining his PhD in Biochemistry from the University of Otago in 1991. After working with Bristol-Myers Squibb in Seattle and

Princeton from 1991 to 2000, he moved to San Diego and worked at the antibody pioneer Idec. As vice-president of research (2007-2009) and co-founder of Apoptos Inc., a privately held start-up biotechnology company in San Diego, he raised \$28 million in venture capital before becoming a co-founder and chief scientific officer of Receptos, a revolutionary company that figured out how to crystallise G protein-coupled receptors (GPCRs - they are involved in the regulation of immune system activity and inflammations and in the growth and spread of some types of tumours) in order to target them with drugs. That company was sold in 2015 to Celgene for US\$7.2 billion. Rob has co-authored 68 scientific publications and book chapters and holds 17 patents. He currently serves as a director of two Australasian biotechnology companies and on several scientific advisory boards and is a consultant to several companies. Rob still lives in southern California, but retains strong family ties to New Zealand and fond memories of TBHS, and hasn't lost his Kiwi accent, and is now looking to support the growth of the life sciences sector in New Zealand: "This country gave me a free education; I would like to give something back."

PRESTIGIOUS AWARD FOR PILOT

Paul D. Drake (1972-1976), son of Old Boys' Association life member D.E. (Doug) Drake (1940-1941), was the youngest of three men presented with a Fédération Aéronautique Internationale (FAI) Air Sport Medal at the annual conference of Flying New Zealand in July 2018. Paul's citation is as follows.

Paul Drake is a man who has lived out a declaration he made as a

10-year-old that one day he would be, as was his father, a private pilot!

In his first year of secondary education at the Timaru Boys' High School, he joined No. 15 Squadron of the Air Training Corps, and at the age of 15 he was selected with another cadet to undertake initial training as a pilot at the annual ATC training camp at Matamata. At the conclusion of the camp he joined the South Canterbury Aero Club, paying the flying fees with his earnings as a week-end baggage loader for the Mt Cook and Southern Lakes Tourist Company DC3 service in and out of the Timaru Airport. He had only just turned 16 in September 1974 when he made his first solo flight. At the same time, he played a leading role in the ATC (as a sergeant) and its branch at the Timaru Boys' High School.

This activity saw him reach a decision to try to work as an air traffic controller, but his first application was declined on the grounds of his youth. After another year, he renewed his application, and early in 1977 he entered the Civil Aviation's college at Harewood to train in flight service operations. After serving at Wellington for several months he lodged a second application for training in air traffic control. This was upheld,

and he subsequently returned to the Christchurch training school. Following his graduation, he served at Invercargill and Dunedin and, from early 1987, at Christchurch. While he was highly regarded by his peers, he chose to leave his profession for personal reasons after a total of 21 years, and, subsequently, took a position with the Christchurch Airport branch of Civil Aviation's Aviation Security Service. He qualified in several aspects of his work, and held senior rank for several years.

As to his flying activity, he qualified in his early days for both a private pilot's licence and commercial licence, with a C Category instructor's rating, and over the years he twice won the New Zealand Navigation trophy and the commercial pilots' low flying competition. Throughout his long association with both Air Traffic Control and the Aviation Security Service he took a very special interest in serving both the Canterbury Aero Club and the Royal New Zealand Aero Club in an executive role. Eventually, he rose to the rank of CAC president, a position he held for eight years until 2017. His link with the RNZAC (now Flying New Zealand) has encompassed some 16 years in two segments, and in both periods he rose to the rank of senior vice-president. At the same time he played a significant role as a safety officer, assistant ground judge, chief ground judge, at the annual flying competitions held around New Zealand including recently be involved with the WINGS Trans Tasman New Zealand Team selection. He has represented the RNZAC for several years on the Civil Aviation Department's special safety committee which meets in Wellington regularly. At the first meeting following his departure from the Aviation Security service he was elevated to the position of chairman.

Paul had not known about the award beforehand: "I knew nothing of the trophy being presented to me. I was really chuffed to be honoured for all I've put in for 45 years."

SPORTING LIFE

At the Halberg Awards in February 2018, T.P.G. (Tom) Walsh (2005-2009) was named New Zealand's Sportsman of the Year in recognition of his achievements in the previous year. In February 2019 he was awarded the title for a second time, together with the supreme Halberg Award. Tom retained his world indoor title at the 2018 World Indoor Championships, with a then personal best of 22.31m. He surpassed this with 22.67m in March 2018, at the Sir Graeme

Douglas International Track Challenge in Waitakere City, moving him into the all-time world top ten shot putters. At the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games Tom threw 22.45m to set a new Commonwealth Games record and took gold in the final with a 21.41m throw.

Timaru appliance technician **S.D.** (Sam) Wreford (1997-2001) put in a late entry for his first real race in three months and then ran away with the New Zealand half marathon title in Dunedin on 9 September 2018. He made a conservative start to the race, but around the 5km mark he noticed that his main rival was breathing a little heavily, so decided to make his play for the title: "Once I got a gap, I just tried to slot into a good rhythm." His winning time was 1hr 7min 10sec.

Dunedin physiotherapist **G.A.** (**Geoff**) **Anderson** (**staff 1982 and 1985**) competed in the national cross-country championships in Wellington in August 2018 and claimed a gold medal for the Otago team in the men's masters 60 grade. He finished the 8km race in 36min 13sec, to take a 56-second win.

Fonterra Clandeboye apprentice Simon J. Peterson (2012-2015) competed in his first bodybuilding competition in Tauranga in August 2018, placing second in the NZIFBB junior men's category (20-23 age group). Simon qualified to compete at the New Zealand All Natural Nationals in Auckland later in the year, but a back injury caused him to withdraw: "I'm looking at coming back next year. I'm going to go away and put on some size, trim back down, and try my best. I've obviously done a show for experience now." Simon was diagnosed with leukemia as a child and still volunteers for Camp Quality, a volunteer charitable trust which aims to inspire children living with cancer. He took up weight training aged 15 while a boarder at TBHS.

Jason M. Hodgett (2012-2016), who took up golf croquet while still at school, will represent New Zealand for the second time at the 2019 under-21 world golf croquet

championships in England. The tournament runs from 20 to 24 July in Nottingham, Jason's home town (his family moved to New Zealand in 2007). Since finishing 10th at the world championships in Melbourne in 2017, Jason has risen to fifth in the world rankings for his age group.



Cullen Grace

Lincoln University student and former captain of the TBHS First XV **Cullen Grace (2013-2017)** was one of 50 players selected to attend the New Zealand under-20 development camp in Palmerston North in December 2018, the first step on the road to the 2019 World Rugby under-20 Championship. Cullen had an impressive 2018 season, being a regular starter for the Lincoln University division 1 senior champions just a year out of school and was also part of the

Canterbury under-19 side that finished second at the Jock Hobbs Memorial Tournament, losing in the final minute to Bay of Plenty.

In November 2018 *The Courier,* Timaru's community newspaper, included an article by **D.G.** (**Don**) **Garland** (**1969-1973**) on TBHS rugby players who have continued their playing careers after leaving school. Those mentioned were: **Cullen Grace** (**2013-2017**) (see above); hooker **Melvin J. Pauni** (**2017**), wing **Tevita Eukalita** (**2017**), and prop/no. 8 **Maka Mafileo** (**2017**) who had been selected for the Tongan under-20 squad; Celtic halfback **W.A.C.** (**Willie**) **Wright** (**2006-2010**), who played for the New Zealand Heartland XV in November 2018; Celtic and South Canterbury Heartland second five-eighth **Z.C.C.** (**Zac**) **Saunders** (**2013-2015**), who had played for the New Zealand Marist XV; and Highlanders player **Aki J. Seiuli** (**2006-2011**) who unfortunately sustained a season-ending knee injury in the 2018 Mitre 10 Cup campaign.

Christchurch-based golfer M.A. (Matt) McLean (2009-2011) won the Queenstown Open in early September 2018, went on to blitz the field at the North Island strokeplay championships later in the same month, winning by a remarkable margin of nine shots, and also won the Otago strokeplay title in January 2019. In October 2018 he performed creditably in the New Zealand team at the Asia-Pacific Amateur Golf Championship in Singapore, making the cut and finishing 45th out of the 63 players who did so.


Timaru's Harry J. Parker (2014-2016) has performed well in the latest New Zealand Superbike Championship. Racing his Yamaha R3 in the second round, held in Timaru in January 2019, he finished first overall in the 300cc class and was awarded the won the Allan Ramage Memorial Trophy for the best of the fastest 12 qualifiers from the 300cc and 250cc groups. In 2018 Harry was also awarded a MITO (New Zealand Motor Industry Training Organisation) Kick Start Scholarship.

Rally driver **Hayden C. Paddon (2000-2004)** has had a rollercoaster ride recently. In December 2018 he was dropped from Hyundai for the 2019 World Rally Championship, with ninetime WRC champion Sebastien Loeb joining the team in his place. Hayden had raced in seven of 13 events for Hyundai in 2018 and was confident he

had done enough to earn a place in 2019 after finishing second in Australia in November 2018, a result which helped him finish eighth in the drivers' championship. Despite his exclusion from the WRC team, Hayden was signed with Hyundai New Zealand in March 2019 to race in three New Zealand events before joining the Global Rallycross series in Europe later in the year. He will represent Hyundai alongside his currently six-strong Paddon Rallysport crew, which is now based in its new facility in Highlands Motorsport Park in Cromwell. Hayden is pleased to continue his partnership with the New Zealandowned branch of the brand: "I'm incredibly proud to be part of the Hyundai New Zealand family."



George J. Hill (2013-2017), who died in an accident in March 2018, was a talented footballer who played for the TBHS First XI and was also involved with Timaru's Thistle Club, for which his father Davie Hill, a South Canterbury football referee, had also played. The club has established the George Hill Trophy as an annual award for the winner of the first game of the season between Thistle and TBHS.



Christchurch bowler **Bruce Wakefield (1974)**, who has cerebral palsy, was a member of the New Zealand B6/7/8 open triples team that won silver in their para-sport category at the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games. He won the 2016 New Zealand disabled championship singles title and the 2017 New Zealand open triples pairs titles. Bruce's brother Grant E.

Christchurch bodybuilder **S.M.** (Steve) Orton (2003-2006), in the professional open class at the IFBB Arnold Classic Australia in Melbourne, placed a competitive 7th out of 14 in March 2018, and 6th out of 12 in March 2019, making him the best professional bodybuilder in New Zealand.

ARTHUR HENRY JOSHUA BRANTHWAITE

After a full life of activity and achievement, Arthur Henry Joshua Branthwaite died in London on 31 October 2018, just a few months short of his 90th birthday.

Born in Timaru on 15 March 1929, the only son of Sydney and Norma Branthwaite, and brother of Marjorie who was head

girl and dux of the Timaru Girls' High School in 1944, Arthur attended Waimataitai School before TBHS (1943-1945). While still at school, he joined the Timaru Rowing Club, and with schoolmate Dick Speechly became a member of the club's champion eights.

He was somewhat unsettled in his teens, and after leaving school he took to working in ships around the coast, and spent several months of 1945-1946 as a member of the crew of the four-masted sailing ship, *Pamir*.

He devoted the next three years to an apprenticeship in the building trade, as an employee of Desmond Unwin Ltd. This led him to help in the construction of the now-well known Unwin

Hut at Mt Cook. He and Dick Speechly also built a 30 foot yacht together - they sold it in 1954 but the soundness of their work is evidenced by the fact that it was one of only two yachts to survive the Wahine storm in Wellington Harbour in 1968.

In about 1953 Arthur travelled to North America, and for a time worked for General Motors in Canada. Then it was south to the USA and employment in the car-building industry at Detroit before he was engaged by the company to deliver cars to various parts of the country. Midway through 1954 he sailed for Europe, and spent time in Switzerland doing something he had long desired - planning and completing an ascent of the Matterhorn.

It was while he was in London that he focused on an interest that was to remain with him for the rest of his life. Just by chance, a Londoner who was working with him temporarily on making display cabinets at the British Museum spotted Arthur's artistic talents for drawing and water-colouring, and suggested he apply to the then Central School of Art in London. He was accepted and awarded a grant, and three years later graduated with distinction in interior and furniture design.

Arthur had by then married Patricia, a London nurse, and they chose to travel to visit his parents in Timaru and to check on work prospects in New Zealand and Australia. It seemed that Arthur's qualification carried no weight so they returned to England.

Arthur soon secured a position with a London firm of architects, a job that kept him fully occupied for some 40 years, until he chose retirement at the age of 80. Foster and Partners (later called Foster Associates) was a highly-reputable company, and its success - and distinction - moved upwards year by year, with multiple, large contracts for massive buildings in Britain and around the world. One of the biggest contracts of its kind was the construction of a multi-storey building for the well-known Hong Kong Banking Corporation. Hong Kong was Arthur and Pat's home-base for three years.

Arthur was held in very high regard for the work he did and the manner in which he linked what he had to do with that of others, and senior architects of the company paid special tribute to his knowledge and workmanship at his funeral in London on 30 November 2018.

Arthur is also remembered in the brass band world. He learned to play the cornet as a junior member of the Timaru Municipal Band when it was trained and conducted by Lieutenant William (Bill) Osborne MBE and prospered year after year in the senior band, and in the TBHS brass band for his three-year residency. After he settled down in London in the 1950s he took up the French horn, and eventually joined a number of amateur orchestras. A feature of his funeral service was the playing of some of his favourite music.

Arthur's parents and sister all predeceased him, and he is survived by Patricia, his wife of 55 years, and their daughter, Anna.

GRAEME BRUCE EDGAR

One of our most loyal Old Boys, Graeme Bruce Edgar, died

suddenly at his Timaru home on January 29, 2019, aged 65 years, after a brief period of ill-health. Graeme will be remembered for his willing contribution to Old Boy activities - and for proudly wearing his school cap at all Old Boy gatherings.

Graeme Edgar was brought up on a farm at Ealing, entering Thomas House in 1967 after primary schooling at Hinds.

At the end of 1969, Graeme's parents moved to Geraldine and

Graeme completed his schooling at Geraldine High School.

Working life for Graeme covered a variety of occupations, mostly in the service sector. He started as a bank clerk in Geraldine, but moved to Christchurch after a few years. He worked in the travel industry, later sharing in the purchase of a bookshop, and eventually spent some time in the hospitality industry. He managed hotels in Christchurch, and his last such position was as manager of the Methven Motor Lodge. Until his recent retirement, Graeme worked in liquor stores in Timaru.

Graeme loved life. A teenage contemporary, speaking at his memorial service, noted "a shared love of rock music, cars and American cigarettes". Graeme played a bass guitar in his younger days, and he travelled throughout the country to motor racing events.

During the 1970s Graeme became a devotee of Jack Daniels whiskey, building up an extensive collection of paraphernalia and collectables that are marketed with the product. In 1981 he joined the Tennessee Squire Association, based in the home of Jack Daniels in Lynchburg. This gave him rights to a small plot of land of which he was "Squire", a title of which Graeme was very proud.

When Graeme returned to Timaru, he re-established strong links with the School and the Old Boys' Association. He affirmed that he was "not a committee man", but he was always available to help with practical tasks. In particular, he played a major role in the local arrangements for the 2017 reunion of the 1967 new entrants. His thoroughness and attention to detail were especially noted at his memorial service. The respect in which he was held was evidenced by the fact that 1967 Old Boys travelled from as far afield as Auckland and Central Otago to attend that service.

His family moved to Timaru and so John attended TBHS (1952-1957), where he was a crack shot on the rifle range. Other interests included scouting - he became a Queen's Scout - and driving and repairing cars.

He studied electrical engineering at the University of Canterbury on a Post Office bond and in 1964 married Barbara Shepherd.

John was transferred to Invercargill in 1967 where he was involved with the Manapouri project and the transition from rural party lines to automatic exchanges. While in Invercargill he also became an active member of St John's Anglican parish.

The family enjoyed travelling about New Zealand – to Barbara's family in Timaru, to John's parents in Wellington, and later Nelson, and various locations where the Post Office had holiday cottages. On long service leave, John took the family to Norfolk Island.

In 1974, John was transferred to the head office of the Post Office in Wellington, and the family settled in Plimmerton. His responsibilities included a big Christchurch postal centre project which involved travel overseas to see technological advances at first hand. He later especially enjoyed testing new vehicles for the Post Office fleet.

He was a devoted public servant and after the Post Office was corporatised he was happy to take early retirement in the early 1990s.

He entered this new phase of life with gusto, installing television

aerials and dishes all over Wellington, taking an active role in the Pauatahanui parish (as a member of the vestry, lay reader, warden, youth group leader, and handyman), as a musician in choirs and playing piano and guitar, working with the Riverslea Youth Adventure Camp, Habitat for Humanity, the Church Missionary Society, as a member of a walking group, and travelling extensively with Barbara both in New Zealand and overseas (Australia, Europe, and North America).

John was an energetic man and a devoted Christian, who enjoyed life to the full. He is survived by his wife and their three children, Alan, Stephanie, and Adele.

JOHN McGRATH HAMMOND

John McGrath (Jack) Hammond died suddenly at his Timaru



home on 29 December 2018, aged 90 years (he was born on 7 October 1928). Jack spent a lifetime working in the wool industry, where his experience and expertise were acknowledged nationwide.

Jack Hammond, the youngest of five children, spent his early years on the family farm at Merton in North Otago before the family shifted to Timaru. The

older siblings all attended the Technical High School, but Jack was determined to go to Timaru Boys' High School. To cover the extra cost involved, he worked on the night shift at the Timaru Herald from 3 a.m. six days a week, rolling the papers as they came off the press. Jack entered TBHS in 1942, leaving in 1944 to work as an office boy at the Canterbury Farmers' Co-operative Association (CFCA).

The CFCA dominated Jack's working life. He transferred to the auctions department, and then to the wool department at the wool store, where he became wool manager in 1964. His skill and efficiency as an auctioneer became well-known, taking him frequently to wool sales in Christchurch and later in Auckland. In 1975 he was granted the F.R. Callaghan Wool Award to study wool handling and marketing in Australia and South Africa. At that time he was an executive member of the New Zealand Woolbrokers' Association.

Jack Hammond's business acumen was well recognised. He was appointed manager of the Aorangi Fellmongery, acquiring enough knowledge of the tanning industry to reverse the declining profitability of the firm. Likewise, when the CFCA took over North Otago Farmers in the 1980s, Jack's personal contact with farmers saw most North Otago wool marketed through Timaru rather than Dunedin. He retired in 1990 after 46 years in the wool industry.

Throughout this busy life, Jack Hammond coped bravely with the after-effects of a rugby injury to his hip. Treatment included a two-year stint strapped to a special frame in Ashburton Hospital, leaving him with a permanent limp. Only a hip and knee replacement 60 years later enabled him to bend his left leg again.

Jack Hammond had a special commitment to St Mary's Church. In 1990 he joined the vestry as parish treasurer, a role which he maintained efficiently for 28 years until his death. He was also treasurer of the St Mary's Restoration Trust. Jack's financial professionalism was much admired, as was his support for the mission and outreach of the church.

Much of Jack's recreation centred around the Timaru Town and Country Club, playing snooker, pool and cards. He was on the founding committee of the club and was made a life member. Within the family, Jack was noted for his skills at cooking and baking, and for his talent as a crossword and puzzle solver.

Jack Hammond is survived by his wife Fay, Old Boy son John (1973-78), daughter Tracy, and three grandchildren.

WILLIAM RICHARD HAWKEY



One of the School's most talented musical Old Boys, Emeritus Professor William Richard (Bill) Hawkey MBE OAM, died in Moruya Hospital, NSW, on 2 February 2019, aged 87 years. He was noted as a performer and as a music educator and administrator on both sides of the Tasman.

Born on 19 January 1932, Bill Hawkey attended TBHS from 1945 to 1948, and

was prominent in music throughout his school career. He was a talented pianist and played the tenor horn in both the school orchestra and the brass band.

On leaving school, Bill worked first in his father's shop in Timaru, but later moved to Christchurch and became engrossed in the musical world. He graduated from the University of Canterbury as a Bachelor of Music with Honours, and eventually became a Reader in Music at the University. By 1960 he had become the conductor of the Christchurch Harmonic Society, leading the choir on tours of Britain and the USA in 1965 and Australia in 1967. By 1970 he had been elected a life member. In the 1974 New Year Honours, Bill was appointed MBE for services to music.

In 1976 Bill Hawkey moved to South Australia to a foundation appointment as principal lecturer and head of the department of drama, movement and music at Torrens College of Advanced Education. In 1979 he left to become deputy-director of the Canberra School of Music, ultimately serving as Professor of Music from 1995 to 1998.

Bill continued to be active in performance as well as in administration, conducting two of his own works with the BBC Singers in London and with the Adelaide Singers in Adelaide.

After retiring to the south coast of New South Wales, Bill maintained an interest in local musical activities, as well as leading fundraising activities for a voluntary organisation working for the welfare of women and children in Afghanistan. This work has been recognised by the planting and naming of a garden in Afghanistan in his honour. In 2014, he was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) recognising his contribution to music.

Bill Hawkey is survived by his wife Elizabeth and a large extended family in New Zealand and Australia.

ERIC CHARLES HIND

A multi-talented Old Boy with a strong family connection to the School, the Rev. Eric Charles Hind, died at Geraldine on 30 October 2018, aged 90 years. Eric had successful careers in both church ministry and the teaching profession, while always maintaining a strong interest in his old school.

Eric Hind was born in Timaru, the son of C.A.S. (Cash) Hind, who had been the founding teacher in the TBHS Preparatory School in 1914 and continued on the staff

of the Senior School until 1953. Eric's aunt, Miss Kathleen Hind, had also been a Preparatory School teacher (1921-1925).

Moving from Timaru West School, Eric entered the Preparatory School in 1937 and then spent 1941-1945 in the Senior School. He had four years in the First cricket XI and two in the First XV. He played the flute in the school orchestra, became a school prefect in 1944, and was head prefect in 1945. Eric was awarded a McKenzie Scholarship in 1946.

Eric Hind studied at Canterbury University College, taking time out in 1949 to teach in the Preparatory School and serve as a housemaster in Thomas House. He graduated MSc in 1951, and then trained at Auckland Teachers' College. He taught for four years at Whakatane High School, before moving to Freyberg High School in Palmerston North, where he became head of the mathematics and physics department in 1960.

A career change came in 1964 when Eric took up theological training at Knox College in Dunedin, while continuing with some part-time mathematics teaching at King's High School. He completed his Diploma of Theology in 1966 and took over the Motueka-Riwaka Presbyterian Parish. In 1973 he moved to the St Margaret's Parish at Bishopdale in Christchurch, where he stayed until retiring to Geraldine in 1988. While at Bishopdale he served a term as Moderator of the Christchurch Presbytery.

Eric Hind maintained strong sporting interests throughout his life. He represented South Canterbury, Canterbury University, Bay of Plenty and Manawatu in cricket. In retirement he became a talented and competitive bowler, playing a major role in the Geraldine Bowling Club, both in administration and on the green. He was still playing good competitive bowls just a few months before his death.

Trout fishing was an important relaxation, and his hut at Lake Alexandrina was a special place for Eric. He was also a skilled craftsman, especially in woodwork – and even in spinning and knitting.

Eric Hind is survived by his wife Ngaire (whom he married in 1953), two sons, a daughter, six grandchildren and two great-grandsons.

LEONARD STUART HOME

Leonard Stuart Home died in Timaru on 11 August 2018, aged 89 years (he was born on 11 February 1929). Throughout his long life, Len Home made a valued contribution to the business and community life of South Canterbury. In 2005 he

was awarded the Queen's Service Medal for Public Service.

Len Home entered Timaru Boys' High School in 1943, gaining his university entrance in 1946. He left in 1947, working briefly in a bank before joining his father in the building business of S.S. Home and Son Ltd. Len took over the business, their work including some of the first flats and townhouses in Timaru. He also prefabricated houses for the Ministry of Works development at Twizel, spending weeks there with his men in bleak wintry conditions. Len was a very successful builder with a good business brain and was able to retire from active commercial life at the age of 51 years.

Chairmanship of the Waimataitai School Committee was the first of Len Home's contributions to education. He became the South Canterbury representative on the Board of St Andrew's College, and he had a particular affection for Craighead Diocesan School, serving on all of the school's administrative boards. He was instrumental in overseeing the construction of the junior boarding wing, appropriately named in 2000 as

the Len Home Wing. His 25-year contribution to Craighead was recognised by the unusual distinction of being made an honorary "Old Girl".

Len Home's strong Christian faith saw him serve for over 50 years as an elder of the Presbyterian Church, including two terms as moderator of the South Canterbury Presbytery. He was a board member of Presbyterian Support Services for over 40 years. In recent years Len's denominational links widened. He attended several churches, and established a strong affiliation with St Mary's Anglican Church.

His association with Rotary saw Len awarded a Paul Harris Fellowhip by the Timaru North Club in recognition of his woodwork tutoring of people with special needs. The South Canterbury Historic Places Trust was another organisation within which Len served as chairman.

Len was an avid monarchist and an admirer of all things English. As a young man he travelled by ship to England for the coronation of the Queen in 1953. He was delighted when he and his late wife Nessie met the Queen on a later visit to London. Presidency of the Royal Overseas League was one of his proudest roles. Humbled by the award of the Queen's Service Medal, Len's response was "If the Queen decides to do these things, who am I to say no?"

Len and Nessie travelled extensively, especially in the UK. Back home, he loved the outdoors, climbing and tramping and helping to build huts. He went out regularly with a walking group until quite recently. And membership of several poetry groups illustrated his breadth of interests.

Len's wife Nessie (née Talbot) pre-deceased him in 2015. He is survived by five daughters and 12 grandchildren.

PETER LOGAN

Peter Logan died as the result of a fall while running on the Ball Pass Crossing track in Mt Cook National Park on 9 March 2019, aged 55.

Born on 19 November 1963, he attended TBHS from 1977 to 1981. He was a keen chess player at school and was a prefect in his final year before proceeding to the University of Canterbury, where he graduated with an engineering degree in 1985.

In recent years Peter lived in Sydney but had commuted to Twizel every second week to manage his family's business, High Country Salmon, which he had operated since the death of his father, Richard (TBHS 1950-1952), in 2012. The firm breeds and sells salmon and offers visitors the opportunity to buy salmon, feed the fish, and visit their café.

As well as running and cycling, Peter loved fishing, particularly spearfishing and snorkelling, which he spent a lot of time doing in Sydney.

Peter is survived by his partner Natalie (Blue Mountains, NSW) and his children.

COLIN GORDON LYON

Colin Gordon Lyon was born in Timaru on 19 August 1943; he had two older sisters and one younger sister. He had a happy rural childhood at Opihi, 8 km inland from Pleasant Point, where he lived for almost all his life.

He attended Pleasant Point District High School until the end of standard 6, then boarded at TBHS from 1958 to 1960. After three years in the Ag classes, he left school at the end

of his fifth form year, having gained School Certificate, and came home and started work on his father's farm for £5 a week.

Before Colin married his wife Brenda, he was farming sheep, along

cropping, but gradually through the seventies they phased out sheep and moved into more and more cropping. In the early eighties they put in a seed dressing plant and eventually, with business partners and fellow old boys David and Tony Howey, bought the Wrightson's seed dressing plant at Washdyke. They renamed it Seedlands and Colin went in as the manager for two years before handing over to a new manager and returning to the farm. The Lyons continued growing a variety of crops until 2005 when they changed over to farming beef cattle and in due course established a notable herd of Braunvieh cattle.

Encouraged by Brenda's brother, founder of Sandihurst Winery in West Melton, the Lyons began growing grapes in 1991 and eventually had 5.5 hectares of vines. Their first picking of Pinot Gris in 1998 won a gold medal at the 1999 Auckland Royal Easter Show and their wines were in demand. They later exported wine to the USA, the UK, and Japan. They established the Opihi Vineyard Café in 2000 and the first South Canterbury Wine and Food festival was held there the following year. After two years they decided to lease the business and in 2016 sold the building and the block of land.

Colin was a vintage car enthusiast, since buying a 1924 Cadillac in the year he left school. Three years later, when nearly restored, it was destroyed in a fire. At about the same time, however, a 1924 Hupmobile in Timaru came up for sale for £40. He bought it and owned it for the rest of his life. He was a longstanding member of the South Canterbury Vintage Car Club.

Other interests were the Pleasant Point Young Farmers Club, which he joined in 1962 (he was chairman in 1967), followed by Federated Farmers when he turned 30 (he eventually became the chairman for the Arable Section, 1989-1990, and two to three times a year would have to fly to Wellington for National Council meetings), the Pleasant Point Lions Club from 2003, and art classes from 2010 to 2012.

Colin took up playing golf at Pleasant Point in the mid-70s and played regularly until 2008 when back trouble led to a switch to cycling. Cycling highlights included the complete Central Otago Rail Trail in 2009 and 2012 and the Danube Bike Trail in Germany and Austria in 2011.

Colin and Brenda retired from the farm to Mountain View Village in Timaru in 2016.

Colin Lyon died in Timaru on 30 August 2018 and is survived by his wife Brenda, Old Boy sons Alister (1987-90) and Hayden (1990-94), a daughter, and four grandchildren.

MORRIS McLEAN MURDOCH



Mac Murdoch

Commonly known as Mac, Morris McLean Murdoch was born on 15 February 1933, son of McLean and Elizabeth Murdoch, farmer at Mayfield. Sadly, his father died of peritonitis when Mac was just five months old. Mac attended Mayfield Primary School then boarded at TBHS from 1946 to 1949, following a tradition of

"Mayfield Murdochs" at Thomas House.

It was in 1946 that a shift south was made to Stravon, a property near Maungati and Cannington, raising sheep and cattle on hill country. This shift was made possible with the assistance of farm employee, Darcy Anderson. In all the years at Stravon, Darcy was like a father figure to Mac, creating in him a keen interest in horses and dogs.

At Boys' High he studied agriculture under staff member F.J.W. Billings – he and his pupils were commonly known as "Josh and the Ag. Boys". Josh Billings was very keen on organising field trips to surrounding farms, and in 1949 Mac and schoolmate Eric Shaw experienced a two-week "work stint" at the Innes family's Haldon Station, near Burkes Pass.

In the years following, Mac's interests and achievements included being an active member of Cannington Young Farmers, a JP, a church elder, and a member of the Waimate County Council. Mac excelled at debating, being a member of the Cannington YFC debating team comprising Ray Leslie, Hamish McKerchar and Mac, coached by Alec Darling - all fellow Timaruvians. They twice won the national final, with Mac voted best speaker each time. Mac maintained a keen sporting interest in athletics, cricket, tennis and rugby. Rugby was Mac's passion: he attended 92 test matches from 1956, attending many World Cup games in New Zealand and overseas – and managed to remember most of the scores.

In 1957 Mac moved to a new farm property, Glenshee, at Maungati, adding improvements over the next 35 years. In 1960 Mac met again one of his Mayfield class mates, Florence Gallagher. They married in 1962, and during the following six years raised a family of three - Andrew, Suzanne and Peter. While at Glenshee Mac sustained a nasty fall from a horse, from which he recovered, but retained some disabilities. These probably led to the downsizing of farms, and in 1991 a farm at Bristol Road, Kingsdown, was purchased along with sections at Otipua and Washdyke. Mac and Florence were ably assisted on the farm by son Andrew.

Mac's later years were beset with failing health, including hospitalisation for a period. His death occurred on 20 May 2018. He is survived by his wife Florence and their three children.

ANTHONY ROBIN PELVIN

Respected teacher Anthony Robin (Tony) Pelvin died peacefully at Ross Home in Dunedin on 24 February 2019, aged 78 years. Tony spent a lifetime as a language teacher at schools in the Dunedin area, mainly at King's High School.

Born on 25 July 1940, Tony had his primary schooling at Timaru Main School, entering TBHS in 1954. was a talented student throughout

his school career, and was arts dux in 1958. Outside the classroom, Tony's main interest was as a piper. He was pipe major of the pipe band for three years and consistently won the T.H. McDonald Cup for the best all-round pipe bandsman.

Tony graduated MA from the University of Canterbury and trained as a teacher. He joined the staff of King's High School in 1964 as a teacher of Latin and French, staying for 32 years. He was a distinguished linguist, with a natural flair for learning and teaching languages. Latin was his great love, but Tony adapted as the demand for Latin declined. During the 1970s he studied Japanese extra-murally for two years through Massey University and successfully introduced it to King's High School. He also moved into teaching Classics. In retirement he did

relief and part-time teaching at Otago Boys' High School and Kaikorai Valley High School.

Although Tony was not noted as a sportsman during his own school days, he made major contributions at King's. He coached junior rugby teams and went on to successfully coach the Second XV for almost a decade. He became passionate about cricket, coaching the First XI during the 1980s and being especially remembered for his dedicated commitment to the organisation of school cricket.

Tony's colleagues remember him with respect and affection as the pipe-smoking walker (Tony never drove a car) with whom, in retirement, they spent many hours rambling, socialising, and "putting the world to rights". And they admired his fortitude when declining health necessitated his admission to Ross Home.

Tony Pelvin is survived by his wife Moira, three sons and five grandchildren.

GREGORY MICHAEL QUINN



The School community was saddened by the death in Timaru Hospital on 31 January 2019 of respected teacher and Old Boy Gregory Michael (Greg) Quinn. Greg, who was aged 58 years, suffered briefly from motor neurone disease and had been on leave for the last term of 2018. He had joined the staff as a graphics specialist in 2015, returning to Timaru to be close to family.

Born on 17 November 1960, Greg Quinn attended Timaru West School before entering TBHS in 1974. He was prominent as a badminton player, being part of the doubles combination which won the South Island secondary schools' championship in 1978, his final year at TBHS.

Teaching in a variety of schools formed the major part of Greg's career. He completed teacher training and graduated from the University of Canterbury with a BA degree. After a year at Benneydale in the King Country, he moved to Rosedale Intermediate in Invercargill, teaching woodwork and mathematics. He then moved into the secondary service at Waitaki Girls' High School, where he co-authored a mathematics textbook which was accepted into the syllabus.

Overseas travel was Greg's next move, teaching in London and travelling in Europe and the United Kingdom. Following his return to New Zealand, he held successive positions at St Peter's College (Gore), then in Invercargill at Verdon College and (as head of technology) at Kingswell High School. In 1998 Greg became head of technology, graphics and design at the newly-opened Mt Anglem College (also in Invercargill).

Greg continued to be interested in overseas travel, often spending his Christmas holidays in London and Europe. It was on one of these trips that he met his future wife Zhimin. They were married in China and settled in Christchurch. Greg taught at St Thomas of Canterbury College, followed by a time when he went into business operating a window skylight franchise.


In 2008 they moved south again, with Greg relieving at Central Southland College (Winton) and then teaching for seven years at Southland Girls' High School.

Wherever Greg taught, he was fully involved in extra-curricular activities, especially outdoor education and football. He held dean responsibilities in most of his appointments, and is remembered for his willingness to contribute his practical skills to a variety of school activities.

JOHN KELMAN ROSS



John Ross, born in Timaru on 29 June 1926, passed away in Blenheim on 5 September 2018. He was the eldest child of six who were raised on the family farm, Seaforth, north of Timaru. Like his father, Alister (1896-1966, TBHS 1910-) and brothers Alastair (1930-2013, TBHS 1944-1946), Fraser (TBHS 1947-1952), and Euan (TBHS 1950-1954), John attended Seadown Primary and Timaru BHS.

John (TBHS 1939-1942) was a piper in the School pipe band and continued on with the Timaru Highland Pipe Band. After leaving school, John came home to work on the family farm but did not see his whole life being spent there as a farmer. He gained his pilot's licence and flew Tiger Moth aircraft from the then local airport at Saltwater Creek. Together with another TBHS old boy, Len Home (see obituary above), he tramped bush walks and climbed several surrounding peaks.

In 1950 he left the farm in the hands of his brother, Alastair and attended Dunedin Teachers' College as one of the first "pressure cookers" (students who completed a concentrated course in a shorter than usual period). John taught in New Zealand schools for two years before setting off on his OE on board the Mataroa. It was on this voyage that he met his future wife, Noeline Schicker, a Taranaki nurse whom he later married and while overseas they toured much of Europe by motorbike, and visited ancestral sites in Scotland. They raised a family of five children. Noeline died in 2013.

On his return to New Zealand he resumed farming at Seaforth until in 1976 they sold the farm and moved to Picton. He did not adapt readily to urban life and spent many hours sailing around the Marlborough Sounds on his little sailing boat, Pixie, which he built himself. He also built a bach at Onahau Bay and over the years many family and friends were ferried there on Pixie for a night away from civilisation.

John had many interests and hobbies and he treasured family history and liked to write of his memories and travels to places connected with his ancestry. He was always warmly accepting of family and visitors and to recall with them his life memories in great detail. He also had interests in photography, cycling, tramping, and travel. He kept the family connected by dropping in on them in their widespread parts of New Zealand and time was never a priority.

HOWARD FALCON SCOTT

Howard Falcon Scott died peacefully at his Woodbury home near Geraldine on 31 March 2019, aged 73 years. Howard was taken seriously ill while volunteering on a Rotary project in Fiji in November 2018 and sadly did not recover. Howard was a loyal Old Boy who had led a full and adventurous life. Dozens of Old Boys were among the large crowd that farewelled him at his funeral at Woodbury.

Born on 19 June 1945, Howard Scott was the son of Christopher Falcon Scott (1914-1990, TBHS 1928-1930), noted for his exploits with the RNZAF during World War 2. Howard attended Waimataitai School and, although his family lived in Timaru, was a boarder in Thomas House from 1959 until 1963. He played

rugby for the Second XV in 1962 and for the Firsts in 1963. He was also a school and hostel prefect during his final year.

Entering the University of Otago, Howard completed a BCom degree in 1967 and went to work for McSkimming Industries, also learning to fly as a private pilot. But, in the words of school-mate D.W. (Don) McPherson (1959-1963), "there was not enough money in commerce for Howard". He went back to university to study dentistry, completing a BDS degree at Otago in 1972.

Dental practice took Howard around the world during the 1970s - to Australia, the Pacific Islands, South America and eventually the UK. While working in London, he bought the hull of a ferroconcrete yacht. With the help of a few friends, he fitted it out in the garden of his home. The 43-foot Flying Falcon was successfully completed and Howard spent 18 months sailing back in New Zealand in 1980.

He developed commercial interests in farmland and forestry and commercial buildings, and continued in dentistry, setting up a practice in Paihia in 1990. In 2007, Howard moved south to live at Woodbury, close to his mother and Scott and McKeown cousins. He bought and assembled a kitset two-seater aeroplane, travelling all over the country from Woodbury International (as his hangar was labelled) to pursue his interests of yachting, fishing, diving, hunting and skiing. A move back to the Bay of Islands, where his wife Tricia has business interests, was planned for 2019, but that was not to be.

Howard had been active in Rotary in the Bay of Islands, and was president of the Tekapo Ski Club, but much of his community involvement was generous and behind the scenes, such as in charity bike rides.

His attachment to his old school remained strong and practical, especially in the organisation of reunions. While in Paihia, he regularly organised gatherings of Northland Old Boys. He shared with Roger Mahan (1959-1964) the organisation of the 2000 reunion of the TBHS sports teams of 1963-1964. Along with Morrell McFetrich (1959-1961), Howard managed the 2015 reunion of the 1959 boarder intake. And he was a generous (and often anonymous) financial supporter of the School, the hostel and students.

Howard Scott lived life to the full, as exemplified by the words used by friends and colleagues in the eulogies at his funeral: freedom, challenges, resourcefulness, inquisitiveness, loyalty to mates. He is survived by his wife Tricia, daughter Pippa, and sons Chris and Forbes.

DUNCAN REX STORRIER

Well-known Ashburton businessman and entrepreneur Duncan Rex Storrier died suddenly in Christchurch Hospital on 13 May 2018, aged 47 years (he was born on 29 June 1970). Duncan was a son of the late Graeme S. Storrier (1953-1957) and a nephew of John C. Storrier (1948-1952).

Following his schooling at Ashburton Borough and Ashburton Intermediate Schools, Duncan entered Thomas House in 1983. His interests at school

included lifesaving and underwater hockey.

On leaving school in 1986, Duncan worked initially for Mair Seeds Ltd in Ashburton. In 1990 Duncan was one of four Mair Seeds staff (including fellow Old Boy Brian J. Davidson, 1963-1965) who left to form Midland Seeds Ltd. Since then the company has extended its activities and established branches

within New Zealand and overseas. At the time of Duncan's death, Midlands Apiaries and Kaipak had just been opened. Both were very special to him.

Duncan, who was a member of the New Zealand Grain and Seed Board, was a well-known and respected member of the farming and business community, remembered for his loyalty and generosity.

One of his special interests was jet boating, and in 1996 he navigated for Mark Cromie to win the World Jet Boat marathon in Canada. He competed in many marathons in New Zealand each year in his own boats.

In 2005 he formed World Jetboat Expeditions.com, taking a group of between 12 and 20 colleagues to boat on rivers in far off regions never boated before. They included South Africa, Nepal, India, Bhutan, Chile, Argentina, Serbia, Mongolia, Alaska, Cape York Peninsula, and Tasmania.

Duncan is survived by his partner Trudi, daughter Soraya, son Mace, his mother Jenette, and extended family.

In a memorial poem read at his funeral, the family stressed the words "Memories were not what we wanted, we only wanted Duncan".

She returned to Timaru as counsellor at Mountainview High School and subsequently at Roncalli College, as well as some work at Timaru Girls' High School and her year at TBHS. Sadly, her resolve to finally retire completely and enjoy a more relaxed life in 2018 was not to be.

Mrs Vance began a BEd degree through part-time study at Massey University early in her career, completing it at the University of Canterbury. When appointed as counsellor at TGHS, she took up a study grant to complete an MEd degree at the University of Canterbury.

A strong commitment to the Anglican Church saw Mrs Vance serving as vestry member, churchwarden and lay minister in St Mary's parish.

Mrs Dorien Vance is survived by her husband Murray, Old Boy son Matt (1983-1987), daughter Robyn, and five grandchildren.

GEORGE WALTER WARD

George Ward, born on 31 March 1927, died at Radius Millstream Rest Home, Ashburton, on 29 July 2018, aged 91.

George had two years at TBHS as a Thomas House boy in 1942 and 1943, studying both agriculture and wool classing; he left school early and returned home to the farm because of labour shortages caused by the war. He recalled digging air raid shelters at school.

He farmed all his life on the family farm at Newlands, northeast of Ashburton, and was active in rural and community He was involved in establishing the Ravensdown Cooperative and with United Wheat Growers and the Ashburton Electric Power Board. He was awarded the Queen's Service Medal (QSM) for services to agriculture and the community in the 2013 Queen's Birthday Honours.

In the citation for his award, it was noted that George was a leading member of the Chertsey Young Farmers' Club, a member of the Mid Canterbury Federated Farmers, serving as both a chairman on the Ashburton branch and as an Ashburton representative on the Provincial Agriculture Section and Provincial Executive. He was also a key member in the Barrhill Chertsey Irrigation Investigation Committee.

Appointed a JP in 1967, George was a member of the Ashburton Justice of the Peace Association and served as a vice-president and president. After retiring as an active JP, he was patron of the Association. George was also a member of the Royal Federation of Justices of the Peace Association, serving as the southern representative, vice-president and president (in 1986). He was also an active member of the Rotary Club of Ashburton for over 30 years, and was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship in 1997.

He was always the veteran attendee at Mid-Canterbury Old Boy functions for at least a decade.

George is survived by his wife of 66 years, Eileen, Old Boy sons Graeme (1967-1969) and David (1973-1976), daughter Anita, and five grandchildren.

Mrs Elaine Mary Watt (née Wotton) died peacefully at the Moreh Rest Home, Fairlie, on 18 December 2018, in her 90th year.

Elaine Wotton is remembered by Old Boys and staff of the 1948-1951 era as one who filled several roles in the School and in Thomas House. She was secretary to Rector M.A. Bull, tucked away in a small room behind the Rector's office, complete with a typewriter and a Banda spirit copier!

Elaine and I had a close relationship for over 70 years, and I was able to spend valuable time with her at her bedside at Moreh. TBHS was never far from her mind. During her lucid moments she recounted some of our memories and adventures together. Among her last visitors was Old Boy Brian D. Beattie (1948-1952) - a special moment for both of them.

GEOFFREY DAVID WILLBERG

Born on 3 November 1936 and brought up in rural South Otago, Geoff Willberg attended TBHS from 1950 to 1954. He was prefect in 1953, head prefect in 1954, a member of the First XV from 1952 to 1954, and a member of the First XI in 1954.

He graduated in civil engineering from the University of Canterbury and from 1959 to 1961 he worked in Western Samoa where his achievements included completing

the round-the-island road on Savai'i, and upgrading the water supply, and, on Upolo, designing and building a new land court building and assisting with a new three-storey office block.

Back in New Zealand, he worked for the Ministry of Works in Wellington from 1962 to 2000 as Motorway Design Engineer, Assistant Engineer, and Senior Engineer, working on reclamation for the new Wellington urban motorway, resurfacing Rongotai Airport, and designing cooling seawater intakes for the now defunct Evans Bay coal-fired power station.

Of joining the Motorway Design Office Geoff wrote: "I found the work on the motorway extremely interesting and challenging... under some excellent engineers." He was given an award by the Institution of Engineers for a research project, and was involved in pioneering work on developing technical manuals for specific areas of motorway design. Later work included negotiations for land with Kapiti Coast iwi.

Geoff retired as senior engineer and his lasting memorial is the Wellington urban motorway, and specifically a modest but elegant underpass on the motorway between the Hutt Valley and Ngauranga Gorge.

Geoff lived in the Hutt Valley from 1971 and was keenly interested in photography and walking. He tramped extensively in New Zealand with his wife Helen and friends, and enjoyed overseas travel including walking.

Geoff loved his engineering career, and took a lifelong interest in roading and bridging. He was a modest and gentle man, of high principles. He died peacefully at home on 6 July 2018, survived by his wife, two daughters (one in the Ministry of Transport) and two grandchildren.
